

Prayer During the Day for the First Sunday of Lent

Introduction

We meet in the name of God.

All Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Good morning and a very warm welcome to you wherever you may be. Our service for the First Sunday of Lent comes from Christ Church, Long Lane.

I am very grateful to Frances Rymer, Steve Johnson, and David Vincett, who is playing the organ for their contributions to this service. As usual, my husband David is doing the recording.

The forty days of Lent remind us of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tested by Satan. Traditionally it is a time for self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, almsgiving and preparation for Easter.

The calculation of the forty days has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual in the West to count them continuously to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays), beginning Lent on the sixth Wednesday before Easter, Ash Wednesday. At our Ash Wednesday service recorded

earlier this week, we symbolically set fire to the Palm Crosses we held aloft on Palm Sunday last year.

Churches are kept bare of flowers and decoration. The Fourth Sunday of Lent (*Laetare or* Refreshment Sunday) was allowed as a day of relief from the rigour of Lent, and is now linked to the modern observance of Mothering Sunday.

As Holy Week approaches, the atmosphere of the season darkens; the readings begin to anticipate the story of Christ's suffering and death.

We recall Jesus's time in the wilderness as we sing the Lenten hymn, Forty Days and Forty Nights.

Hymn

Forty days and forty nights thou wast fasting in the wild; forty days and forty nights tempted, and yet undefiled.

Sunbeams scorching all the day; chilly dew-drops nightly shed; prowling beasts about thy way; stones thy pillow, earth thy bed.

Let us thine endurance share, and awhile from joys abstain, with thee watching unto prayer, strong with thee to suffer pain?

Keep, O keep us, Saviour dear, ever constant by thy side; that with thee we may appear at the eternal Eastertide.
