Welcome to this Lent 3

Sunday Communion Service



The actions of Jesus in the story from John today are harsh and aggressive. Jesus goes to the temple and makes it plain that he is angry. When we remember just how important the temple was, we can understand that people would not be happy when he used language about raising it to the ground.

Why was Jesus so angry? Why was he so motivated that he made a whip and used it to drive people and their animals out of the temple? The event can only be understood against the background of the understanding Jesus had about who he was and what he was about to do. Jesus sees Judaism with its Passovers and sacrifices to be at an end. Even the temple itself was of no more value. Instead, it was his death which would end all deaths, his body which would represent the visible representation of God being with his people. There would be no more need of the religious trappings, that was the old order and now anew order had come.

When Jesus attacked the traders and moneychangers, which had grown up with in the Temple he was prepared to face unpopularity and the dangers of confronting the powerful. He was willing to be disliked and misunderstood, in order to bring about change. Are we as Christians prepared to be as courageous?

Christ crucified is God's power and wisdom

¹⁸ For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written:

'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate.' [a]

Where is the wise person? Where is the teacher of the law? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe. ²² Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, ²³ but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴ but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵ For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

¹³ When it was almost time for the Jewish Passover, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴ In the temple courts he found people selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money. ¹⁵ So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple courts, both sheep and cattle; he scattered the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ To those who sold doves he said, 'Get these out of here! Stop turning my Father's house into a market!' ¹⁷ His disciples remembered that it is written: 'Zeal for your house will consume me.'

John 2: 13-22 - Jesus Cleanses the Temple

Sermon – Temple Cleansing

Today, on this third Sunday of Lent, we hear of Jesus cleansing the Temple. John, unlike the synoptic (Matthew, Mark and Luke) Gospels, centres his Gospel in and around Jerusalem. This is where the cleansing of the Temple took place early on in Jesus' public ministry.

Jesus is angry because the Temple has been turned into a marketplace, when it is to be used as a place of prayer. The marketplace would be in the place of the court of the Gentiles where non-Jews can come and worship God, so the marketplace is stopping them from doing so, with all the noise the marketplace brings. In asking what authority Jesus has in doing this, Jesus replies that he will raise up the Temple which he is referring to as his body. Here Jesus is referring to his crucifixion and resurrection, which his disciples understand this saying when this takes place. St Paul picks up this theme of our bodies being a Temple in 1 Corinthians 6: 19-20 when he writes:-

"19 Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? 20 For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body."

During this beginning of spring, when we see the daffodils springing to life, we often have a spring clean in our houses and/or garages. Our bodies are God's Temple if we have been baptised with God's spirit. Often and especially during the past year of Lockdown's, our minds, bodies, hearts and souls can get

overcrowded with different things and stop our temples becoming the houses of prayer that can allow God to speak and dwell with us.

On Maundy Thursday in Holy week, the day before Good Friday, we hear of the account of Jesus washing his disciples feet during the Last Supper. Jesus wants to come and wash us clean of all the things that can enter our minds and hearts from the world. The question is will we let him? Are we like the Jews, saying to Jesus, what authority do you have to come this close to me and my Temple?

As John writes elsewhere in his Gospel, Jesus is God made flesh (John 1:1-14), and that he overcome sin and death by his resurrection (John 20:1-30). Here we understand that Jesus is God's son and that he does have the authority and the power to make things clean in our lives. We also see this taking place, when Jesus encounters different people in the Gospels and making them clean from the various things that are affecting them. You may want to make some quiet time for yourself in a place when you are not going to be disturbed and as Jesus bowed down to wash the disciples feet, imagine him kneeling down in front of you, reaching into your hearts and minds and allow him to wash the things in you to make you clean.

In doing this, you may want to play some meditative music and read Psalm 139, Amen.


