A BRIGHT FUTURE?

A short while after the Twin Towers atrocity in the United States in 2001, one American preacher said this:

After the tragedy that has struck our nation one question we are hearing is "will we ever be the same again" The real question is *should* we be the same?

And he went on to describe how the 'normal' bickering of politicians had stopped, the 'normal' barriers to the public expression of faith in the US had disappeared, the 'normal' racism had gone away, the 'normal' selfishness of people had subsided and the 'normal' prayerlessness of the nation had been reversed.

We should not go back to normal, he said. We should do what we can to keep our current focus and the unity of our country, our community and our churches alive. We have to call our country, our community and our church back to its first love!

It's remarkable stuff, isn't it, especially when you think that getting on for 40% of Americans go to church *every week*? In the UK we get somewhere between 2% and 3%, and fewer every year.

So the big question to be asking, it seems to me, is **After the tragedy that has struck our nation one question we are hearing is "will we ever be the same again" The real question is *should* we be the same?**

It's something we should be asking in the Church, as well as in the nation as a whole.

From Monday the chance is here to go back to normal. We can sing hymns again, and I believe we don't



even have to wear a mask when we do so. And we can take communion., kneeling at the rail and we can even share the chalice. - something we have not been able to do since Lent last year. (If we do that it will mean that others more vulnerable than us won't be able to take communion for fear of catching Covid, but we can ignore them, can't we??) And of course we can go back to the constant fruitless task of trying to persuade those who can't be bothered and don't believe, to come to church, to get their children baptised, and so on.

In the last year and a bit we have done so much, mostly using Zoom, starting two house groups, a prayer group, a Christian meditation group, a weekly wardens' and reps' group and my weekly Update and Light Bite message. We have created a tech and social media group which has achieved masses in only two meetings so far. A lay worship team has come into existence and is going great guns. We are exploring the possibilities of children's work and of a benefice choir. We've got used to benefice thinking and it is

exciting! We are exploring spiritual and practical possibilities together, supporting one another, We have worshipped as a benefice—simpler, lighter services which have released people and stimulated their faith, and in them, thanks to the magic of Bluetooth, we've been able to experience a wider range of Christian hymns.

God has actually blessed us richly and we want more.

But we *could* go back to normal - to parish rather than benefice thinking, formality, the familiar - and dwindle still further.

Things which the Bishop said in his message this week struck a chord with me. For example,

"The Church is not the Kingdom of God: it's a sign of the Kingdom, *if* it's being faithful to its gospel mandate.

"Spiritually vibrant churches draw people to become followers of Jesus Christ.

"but we must ask ourselves the right question: not 'How can we get more people to come to church?' but 'How can we encourage more people to become followers of Jesus?' If you answer the second question *well*, you'll solve the first one too."

How we move into the future is a spiritual matter. You've heard, of course, of the crane rooting around in the mud in a pond, who was offered the life of heaven. "Are there any snails there?" he said. "I just want snails." As we move back to a more normal existence we have to be careful that we don't just want snails.



HOW TO GROW YOUR CHURCH



Remember that for several weeks I'll be bringing you snippets from Neil Hudson's book Imagining Church. The clear message is that growth is a **SPIRITUAL ISSUE** which can only be solved spiritually.

The message this week involves having a look at the two diagrams opposite. The Church is represented by the black dots.

Many or most of us think of the church as being like in the top diagram—at the edge of society, struggling to make connections, a building which we ask people to come to.

But most of the people of God, for most of their time, are not in church at all. We are out in the world, connecting to scores of people in the average week - work colleagues, family members, neighbours and friends.

It's the bottom diagram which needs to shape our mission thinking. We are commissioned to reach society not to expect society to reach us.

NEWS THIS WEEK

FREEDOM DAY

Monday 19 July is so-called 'Freedom Day' in England. For churches, this means that masks will no longer be required in church and that the guidance suggesting no congregational singing will be lifted. But how will churches use these freedoms?

PRIDE EVENT COURT CHALLENGE DELAY

An important court case has been delayed. Children at one primary school made its children attend a Pride event without giving parents the opportunity to opt out. One of the (now ex) parents is taking the school to court to establish whether it was breaking the law. The case has been delayed though, due to insufficient court time being allotted. This case needs to be prayed about.

WINCHESTER DIOCESE PROBLEM

There has been a very public, bitter row in the Winchester Diocese about which we should pray. The Bishop, Rt Revd Dr Tim Dakin and some key figures in the diocese have had a major fall-out, I think over his leadership style and the loss of 20 clergy roles. A no confidence motion was tabled, the first against a bishop in the Church of England's history, and according to the Church Times he has resigned. Needless to say there will be real anger and we need to ask God for his healing for his people there.

FREEDOM TO QUESTION?

A school pastoral administrator and work experience manager was dismissed after expressing doubts about her school's sex and relationships education. She claimed that she had been dismissed for her Christian faith, but her school claimed that she appeared homophobic and transphobic. An employment tribunal found against her, but now she has won the right to take her case to the Employment Appeal Tribunal. This is a really important case for freedom to speak and act as a Christian. Needless to say, your prayers are invited.

MONKEY BUSINESS

A children's literary event in Redbridge has received all the wrong kind of publicity. It featured a rainbow monkey costume with large, exposed genitalia. If you want to be shocked, just go to <https://thecritic.co.uk/monkey-business/> When Library staff were confronted about this they apparently brushed off the concerns with "If you've got it, flaunt it." You might like to ask from this whether it should be parents or someone else who has ultimate responsibility for their children's education.

BACK TO NORMAL?

From Monday, according to the Church Times, we are back to normal, and in particular

- We don't have to wear masks
- We can sing hymns
- We can use the common cup for communion

Unfortunately it's not so straightforward really, is it? With Covid rates rising very rapidly and severe doubt about the wisdom of relaxing the rules, it's not clear that we actually *should* relax just yet.

I suggest that we continue to wear masks, and that we sing hymns from behind masks. As far as Holy Communion is concerned, we think we have found a compromise. Wine will be consecrated in one vessel, a jug, but then decanted into taster cups which have been bought. It might be that an extra short hymn is used so that no disruption in the service is experienced.

The Beginning of the Church

One idea comes out strongly, that God will simply not accept the worship of the people if other things are not right. True faith implies a desire for holiness.

I'm not kidding you when I say that Amos contains the strongest language in the whole Bible. It's enough to make you wince at times.

THE ROUTE TO REALITY

We are trying to find a route back to normality, but the kind of normality which does not mean decline. Here's what we have so far. This may change depending on the Covid situation.

- Probably from September we aim to more than double the amount of services in the benefice, including a weekly Holy Communion
- The Holy Communion might be a full service, or a 'bolt on' act of communion at the end of a Service of the Word. This latter option has proved popular.
- There will be a simple midweek communion service, with refreshments and discussion added.
- More services will be lay led by our seven person lay team. The aim, with the Archdeacon's permission, is significantly to develop its ministry.
- There may be evening services, possibly streamed, online, from elsewhere in the country.
- There will be a *variety of service types* including traditional ones.

Small tin (170g)
evaporated milk
175g butter
110g soft brown sugar
225g self-raising flour
2 eggs
350g mixed fruit
Pinch bicarbonate of soda
Pinch salt
1 tsp. mixed spice

Class 38 Men's cookery class

Pre heat oven to 170C/325F/gas 3.
Grease and line a 2lb loaf tin.
Make milk up to 250ml with water.
In saucepan heat milk, butter and sugar.
