The quality of community facilities like the village halls and Appleby Hub is invaluable. I have a real affection for the village churches, and only wish I had been able to engage better with the life of the villages, including those like Brampton, Crackenthorpe, Colby and Sandford which don't have their own church building. I have enjoyed collaborating with the Mayoral team in Appleby, those involved with Remembrance parades and the TIC all of whom help the community flourish so well.

We do hope to pass through, and even stay a while, in the future. With our very best wishes.

Our Destiny

Whether we are excited about the discovery of new worlds, tracking down long lost friends or more preoccupied with what we are doing later today, there is a place for us all in God's plan.

The spirit of space discovery

Looking at the amazing new photos from the James Webb telescope today (12th July) revealed the passion with which NASA and scientists continue to probe the origins of stars, and the possibility of there being habitable planets far beyond human vision. Our imaginations are fuelled by Sci-Fi films like Martian and Passengers, where living somewhere completely different has become a real possibility. Of course blockbusters like Star Wars take us even deeper into alternative worlds, just as 2001 A Space Odyssey did as far back as 1968; only a year after that film we saw the first human landings on the moon.

The spirit of their ancestors

The preference some of us have to imagine the 'unknowable' is matched by the desire others have to probe their pasts, to be enchanted by their personal histories, in the way that the TV series *Who Do You Think You Ar?* has achieved in series after series. Although I'm drawn to the drama of someone connecting with royalty in their roots - Josh Widdecombe, with Henry VIII and Mary Boleyn comes to mind, from October 2021 – it was recent episodes where the past was filled with violence, tragedy and social deprivation, like Anna Maxwell Martin's Scottish story, which spoke more profoundly to the darker side of the human condition and suffering in past ages.

The spirit of our compassion

Whether we are drawn to the past, or obsessed with futures unknown, each of us finds ourselves living in the present moments of our lives. This last weekend, in church, we listened again to one of the greatest parables of Jesus – of the 'good' Samaritan, the one who was merciful, broke conventions, to share himself with a victim who was badly wounded, and arguably 'beyond help.' I remember the impact when I understood, as a young man, that Mother Teresa (of Calcutta) lavished her attention and personal resources on the most vulnerable and the dying, while leading a movement from 1950 that eventually spread to more than 100 countries worldwide. This September marks the 25th anniversary of her death. The fourth vow of these sisters 'of mercy' was *"wholehearted free service to the poorest of the poor."*

Our own destiny

Where are we going? Where have we come from? - both great questions about the world we live in. What am I doing (with my life)? Is just as profound a question which might even lead some of us in completely new directions, or simply leave us grateful that we chose to make a difference for another person who needed our help today. For this to fulfil a plan for our lives is something truly wonderful, if we can accept and see where we fit in the grander plan of the universe. As Paul writes to the Ephesians (chapter 1 verse 11) in the Bible's New Testament, "Through our union with Christ we too have been claimed by God as his own inheritance. Before we were even born, he gave us our destiny; that we would fulfill the plan of God who always accomplishes every purpose and plan in his heart."

A new course is set to help encourage people explore what lay ministry they may be being called to across Cumbria.

The Discipleship Project is an ecumenical course and will begin in September, with six core sessions to be run over a year from the Diocese of Carlisle's Church House offices in Penrith and other supplementary modules to be run across the county.

It aims to support those people who want to explore what ministry they may be being called to, in or outside of a church context.

The Rev Nicky Smith, Director of Ministry Development for the Diocese of Carlisle and who has developed the course, explained: "What we're offering is something that's really exciting; it's the chance for churches, parishes and mission communities to draw alongside the course to help people explore their calling.

"This is about blessing those people who take part in the course so that, in turn, they can then bless the churches and communities they serve in new ways."

The course sits within the county's ecumenical God for All vision and strategy which has four main themes: Follow Daily, Speak Boldly, Care Deeply and Tread Gently.

As part of the vision, 35 mission communities have been created across the county which are groupings of mutually supportive and mission-minded churches as together Christians look to grow God's Kingdom in Cumbria.

Participants will be encouraged to gain confidence in their personal ministry giftings, grow as disciples, explore new ways of being church and open up new ministry possibilities.

Nicky added: "The course has been very much developed around the sense of vocation, regardless of what context people may find themselves in. Perhaps you work full-time or part-time, perhaps you are retired or supporting your young family. This course offers something for everyone.

"It will be an opportunity for people to journey together and consider missional coaching: how you are mentored and how can you mentor others. We'll consider how we can all live out our faith in an increasingly secular world, looking at how do pray and read the Bible in community. The premise of the course is that we're all called to be disciples of Jesus and this will look different for everyone. I'm excited that this will open up new forms of ministry and witness."

As well as the core module - which costs £15 per person plus ticket fee - those who sign up will also have opportunity to sign up for optional modules including theology, chaplaincy, mental health first aid and pioneer ministry. Again, these modules will cost from £15 plus ticket fee.

The course is not certificated but the hope is that those who complete the modules may then consider exploring ordination, Reader ministry (lay people, called by God, trained and licensed by the Church to preach, teach,

lead worship and assist in pastoral, evangelistic and liturgical work) or new models of ministry.

The Discipleship Project will also see the creation of a network of mentors within local church settings who will offer support to those people who sign up.

"We have intentionally developed this course in such a way that anyone can be actively involved in developing God's church," Nicky added.

"As Christians we are learning and growing all the time. That's very much the ethos of the course and our prayer is that as many people as possible feel called to explore this further."

Since we have several St. Lawrences around here, of different spellings - a word on their patronal festival.

10th August Laurence of Rome - and the gridiron

Laurence was a deacon of the Church in Rome who was martyred in 258. His story is found in the very ancient Depositio Martyrum, which tells us that he was closely associated with Pope Sixtus II, who was martyred just a few days before him during the persecution of the Emperor Valerian. We also know that he was much loved for his almsgiving.

St Cyprian, the Bishop of Carthage, relates how the Roman authorities had taken to confiscating all the goods of any Christians they discovered, and then putting the Christians to death. And so it was in August of 258, after Sixtus was martyred, that they demanded of Laurence the wealth of the Church in Rome. He asked for three days to gather it together. During that time he worked quickly, to distribute as much of it as possible to the poor in Rome. On the third day, he presented himself to the prefect of Rome, taking along a small delegation of the poor and crippled. He told the prefect that these people were

the true treasures of the Church, and that 'The Church is truly rich, far richer than your emperor.' This did not go down well with the prefect, and Laurence was condemned to a martyr's death.

It was Laurence, of course who is famous for being roasted alive on a gridiron, and for telling his captors to 'turn him over' when he was done on one side. The story has no historic basis, as the weapon of capital punishment at the time was the sword for decapitation. It is thought by many scholars that the roasting on the gridiron story came about because of a simple spelling mistake by a monk in copying the history years later: the accidental omission of the letter 'p' would have been enough. This is because the customary formula for announcing the death of a martyr was 'passus est' (he suffered/was martyred). If you leave off the 'p' you get 'assus est' - he was roasted. Only - he wasn't!

Town Council

Heritage Action Zone

The conclusion of the Heritage Action Zone project was celebrated in the refurbished Moot Hall on 6 July. Alan McViety, recently-installed High Sheriff, was in attendance. Charles Smith of Historic England outlined the project's achievements in restoring Appleby's historic buildings, although in some cases the owners had refused help. A buffet lunch was served in the Public Hall, at which the Mayor spoke and every guest received a copy of the excellent new illustrated booklet produced by the Cumbria Vernacular Buildings Group Step by Step along Boroughgate,, which can be purchased at the Visitor Centre.

The Cloisters

A legacy of the HAZ project is repair of the Cloisters, built to Robert Smirke's design in the early 19th Century. This has entailed the erection of scaffolding and the closure of the exit from Low Wiend into Boroughgate. The road is expected to re-open on 19th August.

New Tenants

The Council-owned premises on the west side of the Cloisters, vacated by the Visitor Centre, which has moved back to the Moot Hall, are now occupied by Appleby Business Centre, formerly in Bridge Street; its enhanced range of services includes graphic design. The premises at the head of the Arcade, previously occupied by the charity Mind, are now tenanted by Happy Paws, a dog-grooming service.

Post-Fair Meeting

The post-Fair meeting in the Public Hall on 7 July heard reports from the Chairman of the Multi-Agency

Strategic Co-ordinating Group (MASCG) and from the Police Gold Commander. The Chair of MASCG announced that, in response to demands that further consideration be given to the possibility of the Fair becoming an event with an organising body making admission charges, MASCG would engage an independent Consultancy to investigate and report on the practicalities and legalities of any such arrangement.

King George V Field

Problems that have beset the football playing ever since the laying of drains following the flooding of December 2015. Despite further work grass has not grown adequately along the drain lines and the playing surface has been uneven. Eden District Council, which owns the field, has engaged new contractors to lay down a superior quality topsoil to help promote healthy growth and restore to our popular and successful club the surface it needs.

Edenside

The Oaklea Trust still seek the finalisation of planning permission for their project to build sheltered housing units on the site of the former retirement home. Developments have to be 'nutrient neutral', meaning that they must demonstrate they will not add pollutants to water courses, leading to an increase in algae. Because of growing concerns about the poor state of British rivers, Natural England has asked Planning Authorities to insist that all developments meet these conditions. Oaklea are working on meeting the criteria.

Bishops' letter to The Times on the Rwanda asylum policy

All of the current Lords Spiritual have recently signed a letter to The Times voicing alarm about the Government's plan to send asylum seekers to Rwanda.

The Bishops wrote in their letter that "this policy should shame us as a nation."

They went on: "Our Christian heritage should inspire us to treat asylum seekers with compassion, fairness and justice, as we have for centuries. Those to be deported to Rwanda have had no chance to appeal, or reunite with family in Britain. They have had no consideration of their asylum claim, recognition of their medical or other needs, or any attempt to understand their predicament.

"Many are desperate people fleeing unspeakable horrors. Many are Iranians, Eritreans and Sudanese citizens, who have an asylum grant rate of at least 88 per cent. These are people Jesus had in mind as He said when we offer hospitality to a stranger, we do it for Him. They are the vulnerable that the Old Testament calls us to value. We cannot offer asylum to everyone, but we must not outsource our ethical responsibilities, or discard international law — which protects the right to claim asylum."

DEC Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal

In this month of holidays and summer travel, it is awful to think that the crisis in Ukraine simply goes on. More than 13 million people have fled their homes. Millions of families have been separated, people have been injured and killed, and their homes blown up. Critical infrastructure such as health facilities, water supplies and schools have been damaged or destroyed.

The UN estimates over five million people have now fled Ukraine. The refugees have fled to Poland, Romania, Hungary and Moldova, often arriving with only what they could carry.

Another eight million people are displaced within the country. Many older people, and those with disabilities, have no option but to remain in their homes. They are now isolated, unable to access food and basic necessities.

In such a crisis, the DEC charities in Ukraine and neighbouring countries are working hard to meet the needs of people affected by the conflict. They say:

£30 could provide essential hygiene supplies for three people for one month

£50 could provide blankets for four families

£100 could provide emergency food for two families for one month

The Ukrainian Church and Moscow

Who is leading the Ukrainian Orthodox Church (UOC)? It depends on who you talk to.

The Moscow Patriarchate has recently reaffirmed its jurisdiction over the UOC, denying claims that the Church has severed its ties with Moscow. The Russian Holy Synod said: "We note with regret the continuing pressure on the Ukrainian Orthodox Church from the Ukrainian state authorities and extremist part of Ukrainian society."

On the other hand, the governing council of the UOC has not only expressed disagreement with Patriarch Kirill over his support for President Putin's invasion, but has passed a resolution declaring its 'full independence' from Moscow.

Meanwhile, the Primate of the Greek Catholic Church in Ukraine, Major Archbishop Svietoslav Shevchuk, has warned that because the Russian blockade of Odessa and other ports has stopped the export of Ukrainian grain, the worldwide food crisis will only get worse.

Edinburgh Festival - 5th - 28th August

This year marks 75 years of the Edinburgh International Festival.

It was in 1947 that the first Edinburgh Festival was held. It was the idea of the then General Manager of Glyndebourne Opera, Henry Harvey Wood, as well as the Head of the British Council in Scotland and leaders from the City of Edinburgh. Their aim was to establish "a world class cultural event" that would bring together audiences and artistes from around the world. Over the past 70 years, it has done just that, featuring performers from the worlds of dance, opera, music and theatre.

Hunger forces Ethiopian girls into marriage

A prolonged drought in Ethiopia has killed untold numbers of livestock and brought millions of people to the brink of famine. And as the crisis escalates, more and more girls are at risk of child marriage.

Tearfund has warned that Ethiopia now has one of the highest rates of child marriage in the world, with an estimated 40 per cent of girls marrying before the age of 18.

It happens because in areas where families don't have enough food or water for their children, they may resort to marrying their daughters off to wealthier families.

Simba Nyamarezi, who oversees Tearfund's work in Ethiopia, explains: "They often believe their daughters will have better chances of survival this way, and they can also use the money from the daughter's dowry to feed their other children."

Sabine Nkusi, who leads Tearfund's gender unit, explains that as girls must walk farther and farther each day to find water, they are dropping out of school. "And again, they immediately become more vulnerable to child marriage."

In an effort to help, Tearfund has supported the construction of more than ten water pumps in and

around schools. Its local partners have also dug wells in drought-affected areas.

"Your organisation came to us with compassion and provided us with water," says Liya, a local woman, whose life has been transformed by the new well. "Before, I spent all my time carrying water. The river is a seven hour walk away from my village."

The story of the yellow ribbons

One of the greatest doctrines in the Bible is the love of God for His people. Both Old Testament and New Testament tell us what God said to His people through Jeremiah: "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (31:3).



It was that love that moved the Father to send His Son into the world (John 3:16). Paul writes glowingly of "that great love with which He loved us" (Ephesians 2:4). John emphasises the same great truth in a magnificent creed of just three words: 'God is love' (1 John 4:8). Quite simply there is nothing in all creation more reassuring, more comforting, more encouraging, more uplifting than to know that God loves us. And we can even put it in personal terms as Paul did. 'He loved me and gave Himself for me' (Galatians 2:21).

The following true story, from the life and ministry of John Wilbur Chapman, is a good illustration of such love.

Back in 1893, Chapman was a Presbyterian minister from Richmond, Indiana, who had moved into full-time evangelistic ministry. Chapman told of how one evening he was travelling by train in a rural part of the state of Kansas. The only other passenger in the carriage was a young man and Chapman noticed that he was becoming very agitated. He kept glancing out of the window and then covering his face with his hands. Finally, Chapman asked if he could help.

The young man was a bit reluctant, but finally opened up. Many years before he had run away from home and 'sown his wild oats.' He had not contacted his parents for many years and now he was afraid they wouldn't want him back. He had written home some weeks before and told them he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked if they wanted him to come home. If so, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.

"Sir," he said to Chapman, "the train will soon pass my home but I'm afraid to look. If there's a yellow ribbon on the tree, I'll get off at the next station and go home. If there's no ribbon, I'll just travel on. But I'm too afraid to look out for the tree." So Chapman offered to look for him. The young man hid his eyes and Chapman kept watch.

"You can open your eyes now," he said a few minutes later. The returning prodigal looked at Chapman with tears and quivering lips. "All is well," said the evangelist. "There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there's far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores and scores of them. Your parents love you so much and want you to come home." If parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved

Keeping Calm in the Storm

with everlasting love.

One of the most famous stories about Jesus is the calming of the storm (Luke 8:22-25). Of course, anyone could say that the wind stopped suddenly of its own accord, but the disciples were not fooled. They had seen a number of these 'coincidences' in Jesus' ministry, and they weren't about to ignore this one. Jesus had calmed the waves with only His words. Wasn't this an act of God? Who else could be in complete control of creation?

Jesus dealt graciously with the very pressing and practical issue of the raging storm before He did a bit of teaching, asking His followers "Where is your faith?" It's not surprising that they were scared, given the circumstances, but clearly Jesus expected better of them. He had already been teaching them for some time, and clearly knew they were ready to trust Him.

In similar circumstances, Christians often do several things in quick succession. We start by panicking and being afraid. After a while we might remember what we know about God's character and pray for help, trusting that whatever happens He will help us to handle it. Most often, we don't get the storm-calming effect when we ask for it, but battling on with faith and God's help is much easier than trying to keep going in a panic.

'Peace' in this kind of situation is a very active holding on to what we know about God. The difference between trusting and not trusting can be like night and day in terms of stress levels. I have found that it can make the difference between unmanageable stress and something that stretches me and teaches me something new.

Knowing some science can help us to trust God. A Being who created the whole

universe, sustaining the wonderfully creative processes that produced diverse life on earth, must be both extremely powerful and extremely wise. The God who can both calm the waves and walk on them must be in complete control of the things He made. When this knowledge goes hand in hand with experience of God's intimate love for us and care for us in every situation that we find ourselves in, I am reassured that He's got things in hand. I will always need help from others to pray faithfully in stormy situations, but hopefully I've seen enough now not to panic for too long.

Time (and my closest friends) will tell!

6th August: The Transfiguration of Jesus

It's an unusual story. One day, Jesus is with three disciples on a high mountain in Galilee, when His a p p e a r a n c e dramatically changes. Also, Moses and Elijah suddenly appear, and from a cloud comes the voice of God. What is this all about?

This event was witnessed by James, Peter, and John. They were close friends of



Jesus. In the future, they were to become prominent leaders in the Early Church. They needed to see something special that would help them remember Jesus in the difficult years ahead. They had a glimpse of Christ in His divine glory. His face shone like the sun and His clothes turned white as light.

While this was an extraordinary sight for the disciples, it served to encourage Jesus who once had glory and majesty in Heaven. One day He would have it again. But firstly, He had to fulfil His mission: to suffer on the cross and die.

The wonder of the Transfiguration was a short interlude before Jesus had to return to His work and subsequent death on the cross.

This story is a reminder that our times of spiritual blessing have to be followed by down-to-earth commitments and responsibilities. In the same way that Jesus gave His friends a glimpse of His awesome glory, to help them face challenging and traumatic times ahead, our special times in His presence are provided to encourage us and equip us for the trials we may have to face.

Our journey through life may sometimes rise to the peaks but we can't stay on a 'high' all the time – no matter how much we want it! We have to descend to face everyday challenges if we are to fulfil our calling in Christ. From *our* mountain-top experiences we all need to find a balance between times alone with God and serving Him in the company of others.




