TRINITY 8 READINGS

Isaiah 1:1,10-20 Psalm 50.1-8, 23,24 Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16 Luke 12:32-40

FROM THE VICAR

The Lambeth Conference has exposed again the very deep rift in the communion over sex. The very clear majority of the bishops attending hold to a traditional biblically conservative position that the only legitimate sexual activity for a Christian is between husband and wife within marriage. But a minority, almost entirely from developed nations like the US hold that same sex partnerships should be viewed on the same level as traditional partnerships.

What is the thinking behind it? Well first, I suppose, that God is kind. He has given us love and sex it's unthinkable that he wants any of us to miss out on them. All of us are sexual beings and all of us have a desire to be in partnership with someone.

Another part of the thinking is that while it is admitted that parts of the Bible are very against homosexual intercourse (In Leviticus it is described as an abomination and attracts the death penalty) we routinely reject other parts of the Old Testament Law as outdated, like not being able to mix wool and linen, and not being able to eat milk and meat together.

Yet another part of the issue is the meanings of words. In the New Testament, it is argued, that a word describing homosexual sex may actually mean one particular type of sex between men, not all sex.

Yet another is that non-acceptance of homosexuals condemns them to being second class Christians.

But those on the other side say that the Bible is quite clear even if you discount the death penalty, that homosexual sex is not part of God's plan, not accepted in scripture, attracts God's judgment and that persisting in it is apostasy (standing outside the faith) or even rebellion against God.

At the Lambeth Conference some male delegates came with their husbands and caused offence. Others refused even to take communion while homosexual bishops were present.

All this is not really about feelings. It's part of an ongoing battle between conservative and liberal theology and morals, and the divisions will not end soon. One more thing—it matters!

SNIPPETS JOHN BUNYAN 1628-88

John Bunyan wrote the Pilgrim's Progress and the hymn Who would true valour see. He had a tough life.

He became a lay preacher in the army at sixteen and his best friend was killed standing next to him. When he was seventeen his mother died. He married at twenty one, but six years later his wife died, leaving him with four young children, one of whom was blind. At thirty two he was jailed for preaching without a government licence and his second wife suddenly went into labour and gave birth to a child who died almost straight away.

He was offered his freedom if he would stop preaching the gospel but his reply was, "If I am freed today I will preach tomorrow."

He spent twelve years in prison for his faith. Despite his hard life he wrote and preached faithfully of God's grace.

THE OUEEN WRITES TO THE



LAMBETH BISHOPS

As the head of the Church of England, the Queen has sent a message to those attending the Lambeth

Conference, reminding bishops of the "great need of God - in love and deed" following the pandemic.

She released her open letter today as issues surrounding climate change are top of the agenda. Her Majesty is a proud environmentalist; the passion is echoed by the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Cambridge. After some words about the environment and climate change, her Majesty said in the letter

"Throughout my life, the message and teachings of Christ have been my guide and in them I find hope. It is my heartfelt prayer that you will continue to be sustained by your faith in times of trial and encouraged by hope at times of despair.

"I send my warmest good wishes to you all for a successful Conference and may God bless you in your ministry and service in his world."

COLDPLAY SERMONS IN CHURCH



In a bid to get young music fans listening to the gospel, a church in London has combined their sermons with Coldplay's greatest

hits.

St Paul's Hammersmith welcomed congregations to engage with a new Bible plan titled "Higher Power: What Coldplay and theology have in common."

The sermons were twinned with a Coldplay song, many of which relay similar sentiments to the Bible

Rev Pete Wynter from St Paul's Hammersmith, told Premier: "Some of the band, I think, have got something of Christianity in their background, even if they're not necessarily pursuing that right now, and many of their songs kind of overlap. "

NIGERIA CHRISTIANS AND JIHAD

Extremist groups are specifically targeting Christians in Nigeria.



This is according to new research

by the Observatory for Religious Freedom in Africa (ORFA), which has revealed Christians are between seven to ten times more likely to be killed than Muslims per capita by jihadist groups.

For Open Doors' director of advocacy & public affairs in UK and Ireland, Dr David Landrum these figures are just "the tip of the iceberg."

Christians were also 59 times more likely to be abducted than Muslims by extremists between 2019 and 2020 per capita, with the number dropping to 4.1 times more between 2020 and 2021.

DIGITAL RELIGION MAKES

FAITH EXPERIENCE RICHER

A study in the US and Canada has found that for 18-35 year olds engaging with digital



religion has made their faith experience richer, while some who don't go to church have found religion in digital spaces.

Professor Sarah Wilkins-Laflamme, author of the study, reported that 29% of Canadians and 41% of American people of that age group they consume religious or spiritual digital content at least once a month.

She added "We know that more and more people are turning toward digital mediums for spirituality such as chat groups with pastors, online sermons and religious content on social media,"..."We've found that while digital religion isn't necessarily attracting a lot of new millennials to participate, it is making the experience of those already involved richer."

Mmm! I wonder what the picture is in the UK.

MINI BIBLE STUDY DEALING WITH DOUBT (1)

Sometimes we can feel very strong in our faith and confident in our beliefs. Yet, at other moments, we can find ourselves questioning or doubting everything we believe. Sometimes it only takes a comment by someone and doubt creeps in.

Understanding Doubt

What is doubt? To answer this, first understand that there are two different kinds of doubt. Look up the verses below and then describe what kind of doubt you see described:

John 12:37 - Unwillingness to believe even in face of overwhelming evidence. A hard hearted refusal to believe.

Mark 9:23-24 - "Shaky" faith, wanting to believe but having trouble with doubts or unanswered question we may have.

Describe the differences you see between the two: The first hardens us to the things of God and is a long-term rejection. The second causes us to search more deeply and is often temporary.

What to Do with Doubt

At times, trusting what God tells us is not always easy. The big question is what we will do with our doubt. Will we allow doubt to turn us away from God, or allow it to cause us to search out the things of God more deeply? Notice how doubt was handled in the following passages.

How did Abraham respond to God in **Genesis 17:15-23**? He laughed at what God said. Then after thinking it through, he listened to God and did what God asked of him.

What did John the Baptist do when he had some doubt (Matt. 11:2-3)? When he had questions, he sent people to talk to Jesus. He searched for answers to the questions he had. Notice that even these godly people had doubts.

Having questions does not make a person bad. If we will take our questions to God in prayer, He will give us the answers we look for!

Christ/Messiah/Anointed One

JARGON BUSTER

CREED

The word Creed is from a Latin word *credo* which means *I believe*, though originally the word *symbolum* (*symbol*) was used. Outside church it tends to refer to a religion, for example "Whatever a person's race, colour or creed, he has rights."

In Church it means a *formal statement of belief* basically a formal summary of what we believe. There are three main ones.

THE APOSTLES' CREED

This is the shorter creed, used usually in the Church of England in non-eucharistic services. It begins *I believe in God, the Father almighty.*

No-one knows for certain where this Creed originated. According to Wikipedia 5th century Gaul is most likely, but it would have been based on something older.

THE NICENE CREED

This begins We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty. It's the one we use at Communion. It seems to have been adopted by the Council of Nicaea in 325a.d., and then modified later.

THE ATHANASIAN CREED

You'll find this in the Book of Common Prayer. It's called Quicunque Vult and is a longer creed which has been used since the sixth century. It is used mainly in the Roman Catholic Church, but hardly ever in the Church of England.
