I am one of the rarest but loudest amphibians in the country and live on the heath. I have a yellow stripe along my back and my brown-green skin is covered in red and yellow warts!
We are the only mammals that can fly really well. My species is on the endangered red list. If you were lucky enough to see me, you'd know me by my pug-shaped nose.
I have clear wings, green eyes and a yellow triangle on my body which makes me easy to spot even though I belong to a very rare species. You are most likely to find me in Norfolk.
If you see me scurrying along a riverbank, you might think my species is doing just fine. But our numbers have declined more than any other mammal in the country.
It is difficult to spot me nestled in the marshes of the Norfolk Broads because of my well-camouflaged plumage. If you hear a booming song between March and June, it's likely to be me!
