FROM THE VICAR THE WORLD IS OUR OYSTER

This week Revd Penny and I took a day out, travelling to the forgotten wastelands of the south-east to visit the Christian Resources Exhibition, at Sandown Racecourse in Esher, Surrey.

There were, I think, a hundred plus stalls. Pretty soon I was having a free coffee with someone on the Kingdom Coffee stand. They supply churches with coffee and indeed with gadgets to dispense it.

I had been tasked by a churchwarden to have a look at portable church seating, and was able to visit five stalls, and by another to get information on loop systems, and was able to visit three stalls, in every case bringing away leaflets and business cards, or leaving an email address to they can contact me. The real treat was the heated pew cushions stall!

There were companies selling books, and among them two with a very wide range of children's Christian books and Sunday school materials. Had I wanted a Bible in Arabic or another language I could have got one, or even a well-reduced English Bible. Towards the end of the day I bought 85 Christian Christmas cards and a little nativity set made in Bethlehem.

One stall sold nothing but puppets, for use with children - and the young at heart (of course).

Had I wanted to buy a digital organ or piano, or speak to an architect about building a new church, or get insurance for a church, or sound or audio visual aids for a church, I could have done.

I did find myself talking to charities and missionary organisations about their work and about mine. We got some *Our Daily Bread* material three or four years ago, but from the CRE I was able to have a look at their current work, which includes material in Ukrainian, and I brought away some free stuff.

Had I had time to do so, I could have attended, free, any one of a number of seminars on various aspects of Christian life and ministry.

This was a seriously profitable day, as far as I am concerned.

Simon will take two services a month: one at Goodrich and one elsewhere and Caroline will doubtless be involved in the life of St Giles' church. But we do have to be careful. Simon heads a charity—more than a full time job in itself, and Caroline is also enormously busy with her business and charitable work.

We will be thankful for any time they can give us, but let's not overface them!

PATRICK DARLING RIP

I don't have a suitable photograph, I'm sorry, but I am sorry to say that Patrick Darling, the Deanery lay chairman, died very recently of a brain tumour.

Patrick was active on so many levels in the life of the deanery and the Diocese and will be sorely missed.

For me the most obviously thing about him was his outgoing, outspoken Christian faith. When he thought in Deanery meetings that we were paying insufficient attention to Jesus Christ, he said so. His faith in Jesus Christ as such that, when he was originally diagnosed with a brain tumour, he refused to let it bring him low. He accepted that his life might be cut short, and in a way, was ready to go.

But his family will be grieving so please do pray for them in the weeks ahead.

THE LAY WORSHIP TEAM

Around the time Covid was breaking loose, somehow out of the disruption and distraction, emerged a number of people who were willing to help with leading worship, and this quickly developed into opportunities to expand the ministry within the benefice. This lay group have already done a lot of good work.

At the same our diocesan leaders have been encouraging us to think more broadly about ministry.

Now we are formalising it all, with training and official recognition. But this is not straightforward because no tailor made programmes have existed beyond training towards lay readership.

To cut a long story short, our team have been allowed to join a formal programme which operates on a number of levels, or attend a course which we create on a deanery or benefice level.

So four of the group of eight are now going to Gloucester for weekly training, and three have just begun a much more informal, down to earth course with me.

At some point in the future the group will be commissioned at a service, probably led by the Archdeacon.

It may be that individual ministries expand from here too. We'll see. But make no mistake, the Church is stronger when people are involved in the *ministry* of the Church, rather than simply in the Church.

CHRISTIANITY IN THE NEWS

COFE TRANSGENDER GUIDELINES ATTACKED



Christian parents are calling on the Church of England (CofE) to urgently abandon transgender guidance which says that children as young as five should

be affirmed if they want to identify as the opposite gender.

In an open letter to the Archbishop of Canterbury, Most Rev Justin Welby, Nigel Rowe and his wife Sally have called on the CofE urgently to scrap its 'Valuing All God's Children' (VAGC) guidance which covers 4,700 CofE primary schools.

The letter follows the Rowes' recent legal victory against the Department for Education (DfE) which led to a £22,000 settlement for legal costs and a commitment from the government to reform its transgender policies.

They had raised concerns after two boys in their sons' classes were allowed to come to the Isle of Wight school identifying as girls.

The school had stated that they did not "require any formal medical/psychological assessment and reporting when a pupil seeks to be treated as transgendered."

The Rowes said they were subsequently given an 'accept it or leave' ultimatum by the school after they were told that their son would be demonstrating "transphobic behaviour" if he showed an "inability to believe a transgender person is actually a 'real' female or male" or refused to "acknowledge a transgendered person's true gender e.g. by failing to use their adopted name or using gender inappropriate pronouns."

The local Church of England diocese backed the school's position based on its 'Valuing All God's Children' guidance on challenging homophobic, biphobic and transphobic bullying.

CHINA INTENSIFING CRACKDOWN ON CHRISTIANS

China has intensified its crackdown against Christians and churches says International Christian Concern.



In its latest report, the watchdog details growing Christian

persecution across the country, including raids on Christian schools, the removal of crosses from boats, pressure on landlords to cancel leases to Christian organisations and 32 cases of arrests or detainments.

That's despite Beijing's repeated claim that respecting and protecting freedom of religious belief is the basic policy of the CCP (Chinese Communist Party) and the Chinese government.

And ICC spokesman said:

"In every aspect of a Christian's religious life, the CCP wants to interfere and insert its ideology, a control that is detrimental to China's religious liberty,"

2030 NET ZERO 'AT RISK'

The Church of England's net-zero by 2030 plan may be at risk due to the cost of living crisis, A Rocha, a Christian charity has warned.



"If the Church of England is to reach net zero, then churches requiring new heating systems will need to be looking towards alternative energy supplies to make sure that net zero target can be met."

All churches are seeing energy bills rise, some as much as £14,000 a year, and this is an issue. But green heating systems are still too expensive to buy and to run.

The Church of England has now set aside £15 million to assist churches and is issuing advice to help churches towards moving towards net-zero.

the ordinary walking stick, it was first mentioned as a sign of a bishop's ruling power in 633 at the fourth Council of Toledo. French bishops adopted it in the late 8th century, and it was gradually adopted throughout the Christian world.


