From Your Parish Priest:

Last month, in this column, Revd Taylor reminded us that time is not ours to grab but God's gift, to encounter and receive. Like many gifts, it's value depends on how we well use it – or waste it! Time also has an impact on how we view events around us. Something that happens frequently, perhaps even predictably, becomes a commonplace – unremarkable. Sadly, some of the recent severe, life-threatening, weather events, which in the past were thought to be “once in a hundred years” occurrences, have also become more frequent, less remarkable. We are going to have to learn to live with such phenomena, until and unless we do something quickly about our human impact on our planet earth.

In contrast, during this last month, we have mourned the death of our much-loved Queen, and celebrated her life of service that was truly remarkable. An un-precedented, self-less, 70 year reign which will not be repeated for decades, and possibly even centuries - perhaps never. A truly historic event and period for our country, and indeed the world. In her 21st birthday address, she had pledged herself to the service of the country, for her whole life “whether it be long or short”. In the event, it was a long life and a long reign, sustained by her firm Christian faith and a determination to use God's gift of time on this earth wisely, and for the benefit of others. In common with many parishes throughout the country, our churches have been open, as always, for prayer, for reflection, for thanksgiving for the Queen, and to express support for King Charles and the wider royal family as they mourn both our beloved sovereign and a loving mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother. The multitude of messages on the condolence sheets bear witness to the affection and esteem in which she was held. These will all be bound into a Book of Condolence and eventually presented to Buckingham Palace.

As we mark the passing of this second Elizabethan age, the Queen's example of dedication and loving Christian service gives us all cause to reflect on how best we should use our God-given time and talents. We pray that our new King may reign as wisely as his mother, and that the Queen's lasting legacy may be a people ever more committed to lives of peace, justice for all, and service to others.

Letters from the community

– The Queen –

The people of Great Britain and Northern Ireland will not forget September 2022, the time in our history that the longest serving Monarch was our Queen Elizabeth II who died having been on the Throne for 70 years.

I have had the privilege of being part of that history and the ups and downs, in fact, not only Queen Elizabeth, but her father too King George VI, when he died I was 28 which doesn't take you long to work out that I am now 98.

Whilst I, too, would like to pay my respects to our Queen, it is not possible for me to go to Westminster Hall but I was able to go there to pay my respects to her Father, George VI, a particularly moving experience and I now have had THREE Monarchs in my lifetime.

Living in Chiswick, West London, from the age of 9 months, it was not difficult to go to all the celebrations that occurred especially relating to the Monarchy, and of course living where I did, we always had the day off school to go to the Boat Race! A friend and I were the lucky ones, her Father worked in the Mortlake Brewery and we were able to go to the top of the building and sit in between stacks of barrels of beer (I can remember that smell now!) to watch the race where we had a grand stand view of the Thames. It was a regular treat which unfortunately ceased on the outbreak of World War 2. I was 15 and schools were closed, never, in my case, to re-open, so I lost the last year of my education. The Central High School for Girls which I attended taught Shorthand, which turned out to be a bonus. The Head Mistress booked me in at Pitmans College (to continue Shorthand and learn to be a touch typist) at Ealing and I travelled on the Tube, which in this area was above ground so one witnessed Sirens and Aircraft raids, some of them dropping bombs. On occasions the trains were stopped until the raids ceased. It was a 15 minute walk home, so Mother was pleased to see me back. I got a job at Permutit Water Softeners. There were 26 typists in one large room and as the new girl had to sit beside strict Miss Barnes, hair tied back in a bun was in charge, strictly no talking or laughing – you were sent to a Director or Manager at a given time. No, I didn't stay there because life took a different turn, but that's another story and I am sure readers of The Reach will have their stories to.

But, as I write, we are preparing for the funeral of Her Majesty with great sadness, which only remains for us all to now say 'GOD SAVE THE KING'

From the Horning Reach Archives
– The Queen and Horning –

I have delved back into the HR archives and found two charming articles relating to when The Queen took a visit to the Norfolk Naturalists Conservation centre at Ramworth and made a trip through Horning. The first article is encouraging the community to get involved and the second is a full recount of that special day for the village.

The queen comes to Horning (November 1976)

On November 25th Her Majesty is going to open the new observation centre on Ranworth Broad. Fortunately she is going by river in Mr. Ian Mackintosh's yacht "Albert of Blofield" and will embark at Horning Staithe at about 11am. This gives us a chance to express our feelings, one which we are certain you will all take.

Members of the parish council are going to put up the flags on the green, the playgroup children will be safely placed behind a fence in a riverside garden and the school will be at the vicarage equipped with union flags. After the Albert has passed they will be able to drink H.M.'s health in fizzy drinks supplied by a reader of this magazine for that good purpose.

The wherry "Albion" will also be at the vicarage with members of the Trust aboard.

May we suggest that those with riverside gardens invite their friends and put up their own flags so that we can make the passage of Horning a triumphal progress.

The Queen's day (January 1977)

For the record (for we hope that these little magazines will be a source for those who in the future are interested in the story of Horning) Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the second, accompanied by the Duke of Edinburgh, came to Horning on November 25th 1976. We owed this to those who arranged H.M's visit to open the Norfolk Naturalists Conservation Centre at Ranworth and whoever had the good idea of letting her have a broads trip beforehand. Mr. Ian Mackintosh supplied the transport in his yacht "Albert of Blofield" and Group Captain Montgomery of the Trust made all the arrangements.

Horning reacted splendidly. We were very proud of the appearance of the Green and it was only just that H.M. should walk across and speak with Thelma Biggs, for Maurice had been in charge of decorations and Thelma had sat up late making the new banners so that our green should look as much like St. James Park as possible.

Besides those on the Green, the banks of the Bure were lined with parties right down to the Ferry and the children did their stuff at the vicarage and "Albion" a little later. The children wrote to the Queen later who by her secretary has thanked them for their greetings.

As the Phantom IV arrived just where Fred had done such noble tidying – up, the Duke was heard to remark "We would never have found the place without a map!" Well, its not many places of our size which get a royal visit. We were very lucky.

Also for the record, the chairman of the parish council and his wife were included among those who had the great honour of being presented.

Will someone arrange a little party in the Village Hall, where we can all see the various films, photos and slides that were taken that morning?

Letter from a treasurer (St. Benedict's Church)

– A Ghost Story –



In 1873 Charles, a small boy was staying at the vicarage with the Rev. Augustus Pyne. He could see the river from his nursery window and had been given a fishing rod with a first lesson from the safety of the large green painted vicarage boat.

One afternoon while lying idly under a mulberry tree, temptation got the better of him, although forbidden to do so, he went to the house for his rod and a can of worms, successfully landing a five inch perch. In the river a quanting wherry with its sails down turned, coming into the boathouse dyke with its skipper announcing his cargo as Matthew, Mark, Luke and Jack “That be as true as Gorspel”.

Later in the evening twilight Charles, forgetting it was passed his bedtime, heard voices calling for him. He went through a gap in the hedge leading to the churchyard, near the vestry door, looking back saw close to him four colossal men twice or three times his size, white clothed, their heads uplifted, hands held up in silent prayer. A cold sweat ran down his spine and fear gripped him, being terrified of the supernatural, ghosts, churchyard walkers and shuck dogs (ghostly black dogs). He ran to his nursery, where he saw the wherry depart, hoping her four passengers had gone with her.

A few days later there were strange noises in the churchyard, shouting of orders and rattling of chains, where the sounds appeared to come from both the ground and high up in the air with comings and goings between the house and the Church. After tea he ventured across the stableyard and peeped through the gate. The figures were gone, he was saved!

That evening there was a loud rapping on the french doors, that parishioners knew was the best way to gain the attention of the vicar. It was

Beavis, a pig dealer and carrier to Norwich, who for a while was unable to speak. "I wor driven' up here with a parcel, it be bright moonlight, bright as day and – there be something on the Church tower" The vicar asked Beavis what he thought they were "why there's four graveyard walkers up there, master clare to Gawd tis true and in their white grave clothes – Come and see for yourself".

The vicar threw himself back in his chair and roared with laughter, but Charles listening to this was shaking with fright...

At last the vicar spoke. "Why you silly fool, Beavis, haven't you heard? Those are stone images of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John. A lady had presented them to the Church and they came by wherry three days ago and were placed in position today."

Beavis had been driving bullocks to the other side of Norwich the last few days and had not known.

Charles was relieved to know they had been stone Apostles all the time and not real ones.

In 1946, John was struck by lightening, crashing onto the roof of the church, finishing in the churchyard near the north porch as a headless figure. This remained on the ground for some time but was repaired and reinstalled following a much needed overhaul of the tower.

Today. we still do not have a lightening conductor, although this remains on the list of much needed work on our Church as funding (and energy) allow.

Charles Fielding Marsh (1867 – 1927) originally wrote these memories from when he was 6 years old for the "Cornhill Magazine", February 1922, later reproduced in "Life in a Norfolk Village" edited by Charles F Carrodus in 1949. Augustus Pyne was vicar of Horning 1855 to 1888.
