Hello Everyone

All Souls' at the beginning of the month is a chance to remember with thankfulness those whom we have loved but see no more.

And, of course, there is also our national act of Remembrance, on Remembrance Sunday. As the daughter of a man who served in the Royal Navy during the Second World War and the Korean War, I never fail to be moved as the poppies fall down from the roof of the Royal Albert Hall during the Festival of Remembrance. That remembrance is all the more poignant in our own day as the reality of war and its human cost is once again apparent. There will be services at war memorials and in churches across the diocese as we remember those who died fighting to protect us and bring peace and justice to our world, and we pray for those serving in our Armed Forces today.

Memories, and remembering, are such central parts of our personalities and character, and in many ways make up part of who we are. Being remembered is very important to us, and the thought that we might be forgotten can be heart-breaking. I often read these verses from Isaiah to people who are feeling lost and abandoned for any reason, or who are grieving the passing of years which means that all those whom they knew and loved, and who held the memories of them as younger people, have died:

God says, "Can a mother forget the baby at her breast and have no compassion on the child she has borne? Though she may forget, I will not forget you! See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands." (Isaiah 49:15-16a)

For Christians, of course, the most significant act of remembering is when we come together to remember in bread and wine the death and resurrection of Jesus. Jesus' willing sacrifice of himself on the cross for the sake of others is, for Christian believers, the ultimate expression of the self-giving love at the heart of God, when Christ's hands were marked by the nails of the cross.

"Do this in remembrance of me."

So in this season of Remembrance, as we remember with candles, poppies, or bread and wine, may we all take time to pause, reflect, and be thankful.



Saint of the Month - who are the Saints?

'For all the Saints, who from their labour rest,

Who thee, by grace, before the world confessed;

Thy name, O Jesu, be forever blest.

Alleluia!'

November 1st is celebrated as All Saints' Day, when we remember all those who have walked the path of faith before us. But who are 'the Saints'?

It is easy enough to pick out individuals, from Peter and Paul through to Pope John Paul II. Through the ages, men and women have been picked out as examples of Christian virtues to hold before us in our own struggles with living up to what is, after all, a pretty tough standard. So we commemorate those who have died for their faith, like Peter and Paul themselves; we commemorate founders, like St. Benedict, who wrote the first widespread rule for life in monasteries; we commemorate teachers of the faith like St. Augustine of Hippo; and we commemorate 'confessors' – those who exemplify a holy life – like our own king Edward the Confessor.

But actually, since the earliest saints come from New Testament times, we need to look at the original meaning of 'saint'. The word means the same as 'holy', and is to do with being chosen, set aside for a purpose, living, as it were, on a different level of existence. St Paul, in his letters, addresses the new Christian congregations of the towns he has visited as saints: 'To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints...'; 'To the saints who are in Ephesus and are faithful in Christ Jesus...'; 'To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi...' (although here he adds 'with the bishops and deacons', which is a little alarming as a distinction!).

For the early Christians, they themselves were the saints, small groups distinct from those they lived amongst, a tiny minority united in their faith. As time went on, and Christianity became first accepted, and then official, in the Roman Empire, the numbers grew too large, perhaps, for such an identification. And so, in due course, comes the setting aside of a few specific examples of faithful qualities as inspiration to all believers, and the list of 'the Saints', some well-known, some obscure, some, probably, largely mythical, whose festivals form a part of the annual calendar of the Church. November contains the festivals of several British saints, including Willibrord of York, Margaret of Scotland and Hilda, Abbess of Whitby – see last month's cover picture and Rural Dean's message!

But it's worth remembering that, in the beginning, 'the Saints' were the community of all Christian believers.

Rare Lichens at St Michael's, Aston Botterell

A few months ago, Anne Preece, churchwarden of St Michael and All Angels, Aston Botterell, noticed some visitors in the churchyard and went to talk to them.

They turned out to be members of a Lichen Club who had come from around Shropshire to see the rare and beautiful lichens in the churchyard.

Afterwards one of their number, Mr Kemp, whom many will remember as a dentist in Bridgnorth but who is now retired, sent Anne some pictures and information about the lichens, which we're reproducing here and on the back page in colour. Some of the Aston Botterell lichens are very rare indeed. Mr Kemp cautioned

— don't ever clean them off the stone on which they are growing — they are far too important to be lost!


Mr Kemp wrote:

"The church walls and memorials here support a rich and varied number of lichens. It is worth pausing a while to look and appreciate the wonderful form, textures and colour of these beautiful slow-growing and declining organisms.

Each lichen is a delicate, mutualistic, partnership between species of fungi and photosynthetic, algal and or cyanobacteria species. They generally grow very slowly and so benefit from the stable permanency of the stone surface habitat present on church walls, headstones and memorials. Stone surfaces that may have been left undisturbed for hundreds of years. Because of this permanency, churches and churchyards across the country are important refuges for lichens, often being the only places left in a county where they continue to be found.

Since many lichens only grow on certain types of rock, it is fortuitous that graveyards often contain a variety of different stone types used for memorials. Also churches sport a variety of stone types in their construction. It is no surprise, then, that they can support a good range of lichen species. Sadly, however, in the greater countryside, many lichens are being lost due to habitat destruction, together with agricultural and industrial pollution.

St Michael's supports many species, including a few scarce and unusual lichens for Shropshire."





Incised slab to John Botterell (1479), and wife. Large canopied monument to John Botterell (1588), and wife.

This tiny lichen has only recently been added to the British list and is mainly restricted to ancient churches. It is often found growing on window ledges or surfaces close by. You may spot it at St Michael's close to the window ledges on the south side of the church.

November Molecule of the Month ... the Cerebellins

oubtless readers of the Wheatland News spend their weekdays analysing the sermon they heard on Sunday morning and comparing it with what the same preacher said a month ago. Please do not contact me about this; I need my illusions. But whatever you reflect on during the week, even if it is "where did I put my glasses", it involves memory.



Memory is a very complicated process, with a progression from short-term memory (finding glasses) to long-term (recalling events years or decades earlier); different mechanisms come into play depending on the type of memory involved. But for important things, that we do need to recall months or years after they happened, there seem to be changes in the way nerve cells in the brain connect with each other; the "wiring" of the brain changes to make it easier to remember things.

One of the first things that happens when nerve cells form new connections during memory is that they form what are called "dendritic spines". The dendrites are thin, finger-like projections that nerve cells send out to communicate with their neighbours. When two adjacent cells regularly "talk" to each other, as occurs when we remember things, the dendrites come even closer together as they develop spines. These are like thorns on a bramble or rose; small, pointed projections that allow very close contact between the two nerves (pictured below).

A number of molecules are important for the formation of dendritic spines but some of the most interesting are a group of proteins called the "cerebellins". There are four main forms of cerebellin. They are released into the space between nerve cells and they attach themselves to a number of different proteins found on the surface of the cells. By doing this, they act as a kind of glue, to hold adjacent cells together. Sometimes, due to genetic mishap, the cerebellins do not have the correct structure; they are mutated. Mutations with cerebellins have been found in a number of conditions such as autism, schizophrenia and Tourette's. These are complex disorders with potentially many causes, but cerebellins may play a role in some cases.

For the formation of dendritic spines, cerebellin 2 seems to be particularly important. Dendritic spines can be found all across the brain but they are mainly concentrated at the front of the brain, where complex memories are stored. Interestingly, this is where most cerebellin 2 is found. All mammals make cerebellin 2, but humans make more than other animals, including many of our nearest relatives such as monkeys; again, we have more dendritic spines than these. Recent research has shown why this happens. The body



produces two chemicals to control production of cerebellin 2; retinoic acid which promotes its production and a protein called SOX2 which inhibits it. Retinoic acid is produced mainly in the front of the brain, matching the expression of cerebellin. And SOX2 works much less effectively in humans than in monkeys or other animals, so removing the "brake" which normally holds back its production, and hence formation of dendritic spines and memory.

So next Sunday as you sit back to listen to the sermon, think of cerebellin 2; if I am the preacher, that will probably be more interesting than what I am about to say.

November Message

By the time this goes to print there will be yet another Prime Minister. This is written the day after Ms Truss resigned after the shortest tenure in history, and candidates are being touted in the press. Some sections of the press are also calling for a General Election, but I don't suppose that that's likely to happen: whoever comes out as the next PM will still have a very comfortable majority in Parliament, and a hideously low standing in the polls, so probably won't be daft enough to call an election until it's absolutely necessary!

But it makes you think, doesn't it? When we vote at a general election, do we vote for a Prime Minister on the basis of personality, or for a Political Party* on the basis of policies? For myself, I mistrust the cult of personality. One of the weaknesses of the democracy system is that it can encourage our leaders to do what it takes to gain power, and then do what it takes to retain it. Integrity can be difficult to maintain in that situation.

I hope that by the time you read this, the Tories will have sorted out their internal muddles (which sounds like indigestion!) and got down to delivering the promises on which they were elected in 2019. I also hope that we will have a return to collective responsibility in government, where it is not all about the Prime Minister formulating policy on the hoof, but a cabinet working together for the good of the people who have elected them to govern.

St Paul used the metaphor of a body for the community of the Church: we all have valuable talents, which on their own are limited, but used together in co-operation are incredibly powerful. The same may be said of government. Ideally it is a collection of talents all used in the same cause – the good of all people, and especially the good of the most vulnerable. That is really critical at the moment, with the backlash from Covid and from the invasion of Ukraine causing so much potential and actual misery.

If you are concerned that this is yet another example of the Church sticking its nose into politics where it doesn't belong, please note that I have not given support for any political party or policy here! But anyone who professes the Christian faith must be concerned about those who will inevitably suffer from times of insecurity, because they are the poor and the elderly and the marginalised. All those we are taught to love as our neighbour.





St Mary's: "Past, Present and Future" Heritage Project

Chris Tibbits writes:

As the accompanying photographs show, the main roofing and stonework repair contract is making really good progress on the north side of the building, with the new tiles in place across the huge expanse of the North Aisle and Nave (north) roof slope. The vestry roof is nearly complete and a start has been made on the north Chancel slope too. If you've not recently ventured around the tower to the north side then do take

a look - a real treat awaits!







In place of the dry-rotten timbers (which have been removed) new floor joists have been laid at the west end ready for the floorboards to be installed in the Baptistry and the kitchen areas - once repairs to the timbers around the pipe organ have been completed. These repairs include adding extra supporting baulks under the



instrument itself and the insertion of extra ventilation grilles into the void there (to help prevent future dry rot recurrence).

One fascinating 'discovery' with the temporary removal of the organ's facia boards is that – in line with our research into the building's history – the 'direct route' from the (main) West door was still in use after the

Victorian 'restoration' work was completed in 1867/8. We know this because the then 'new' floor tiles were laid in a continuous walkway from the Chancel steps to west wall and the Tower beyond.

The organ, which we know was built by Henry Stevenson in Birmingham in "the 1860's", was evidently installed in St Mary's sometime after 1868 – and it was only then that the 'side entrance' via the Porch became the principal way into church, as it is now.
