FROM THE VICAR THE GENERAL SYNOD

The General Synod meets next week in London. But what actually is the General Synod? The answer, I suppose, is that it is like a Church Parliament and it has been in existence in its present form since 1970s.

The synod initiates, scrutinises, debates and passes legislation to do with almost any aspect of the Church of England - from changing key doctrines to creating new guidance for Sunday worship to tweaking the rules on when clergy retire, and everything in between. It scrutinises and approves the Church's annual budget. It also debates national and world issues – such as climate change or knife crime. The resulting resolutions have no legal force but express the thinking and will of the Church as a whole.

Membership of synod is in three *houses* - Bishops, (42 diocesan + 9 suffragan); Clergy (around 200) and Laity (around 200). All diocesan bishops are members automatically. Clerical and lay members are elected to serve. Here in the Diocese of Hereford our members are

For legislation to be passed it must pass in *all three* houses by a *two thirds* majority. This means that Synod is inescapably conservative and change is hard won.

This year the thing to watch for is the debate on human sexuality and marriage on Monday afternoon. The bishops have indicated that they will not vote to allow homosexual marriage, but there is bound to be a lively debate about it.

Pray for the Synod—that they will know and enact God's will for us, and not simply follow society's whims.

CHRISTIANITY IN THE NEWS

CALL TO 'WAKE UP'



For the first time in census history, the average age of people who identify as a Christian in England and Wales is over 50.

New data from the

Office for National Statistics (ONS) reveals the median age of people who describe themselves as "Christian" in 2021 was 51, an increase from 45 in the 2011 census.

Those who identified as "Christian" had the oldest average age out of the main religions in the country, with Muslims having the youngest average age of 27.

Meanwhile, the ONS figures showed that most young people in England and Wales (22.2 million) say they have "no religion".

One Christian leader commented that the Church needs seriously to prioritise getting the gospel to youth. "The Church needs to wake up and make mission and outreach to young people a priority," he said.

"The Church just needs to shift its resources and make them our focus. It's what Jesus did. When he decided he was going to change the world, he found a youth group, who were a bunch of young lads, his disciples."

Ben writes:

I suppose what worries me is the dishonesty we often use in talking about the issue. We'll put a positive gloss on it by saying that young people are 'spiritual' or still 'searching for meaning' or show Christian love by supporting charities. Or we'll make excuses by saying that there are too many distractions on a Sunday morning.

How long will it take to get the message "The average young person would not be seen dead in Church, even if there were nothing else to do." But a few churches are full of youngsters. We need to be learning from them.

GYM BAD LANGUAGE BAN

A man who's bought a disused church and renovated it into a gym has banned customers from swearing.



Joe Newbold bought

Culmstock Methodist Church in Devon for £93,000 and transformed it into his gym, called Mypremcoach.

He said those that come to exercise are asked to keep cursing "to a minimum" because he still views the building as a holy site.

He acknowledged that people were likely to do a bit of cursing of swearing when their trainers required them to some extra reps, but said that his aim was to keep that to a minimum.

ERITREA IMPRISONMENTS

Christians in Eritrea are being imprisoned in unprecedented numbers. The most recent account points to 44 arrests, taking the total to 415.



It has been difficult for Christians for more than 20 years, with most churches forced to close in 2002.

partner Dr Asmelash Berhane, of Release International, said: "Eritrea is like a giant prison. The country is filled with jails. It is like North Korea."

In May 2002, the county's government closed down all religious groups except Sunni Muslim, Eritrean Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Lutheran Church. Christians who continue to worship in banned congregations are treated as "enemies of the state".
