FROM THE VICAR AN ABUNDANT LIFE



This is Caylee Dugger, ministry student and Church volunteer from Oklahoma, US. Caylee preached to a women's group at her church recently, then a few hours later was killed in a car crash. At her memorial services she was described as was described as "always having a smile on her face" and being "full of joy". "She lived her life well. She lived it to the glory of God," a member of the family said.

So sad.

It reminds me of someone else, George Chapman - odd jobman at my old Bible college. He had gone there as a student in the 1930s and never left.

The college community was in the chapel praying for the coming missions, and George prayed a really rather beautiful prayer about commitment and salvation—then he collapsed and died there in his pew. He went out on a real high - among the people he loved, praying to the Saviour he adored.

And of Lorraine Warren, Chairman of the Church Council at my church in Chile. Lorraine was a bouncing Christian, full of joy and with far too much energy for a woman of 75.

At our Bible study one week we had two guest speakers, from Scotland and Ireland, who led us in a really rather good session on heaven. Afterwards, as I remember, Lorraine was so excited, hopping from one ...continued on next page

foot to the other, wringing her hands and with a marked expression of joy and gladness. "Oh! I'm so excited," she said, "I wouldn't care if I died tonight."

That evening it was the church Annual Meeting, and Lorraine, as Chairman, had to give her report. She stood up to speak, but then after a short time she complained of a terrible headache and had to sit down. Then she went into a state of collapse. So we carried her out, put her into a car and took her to one of the small hospitals that they have in Chile. I well remember watching her husband lan writing out a blank cheque for her care and treatment (you go to jail if it bounces, apparently) and Lorraine was admitted.

In the early hours of the morning I was allowed to go in to see her, attached as she was to all kinds of tubes and wires. Later that night they switched everything off and she died. It was a huge shock.

Two days later we had the funeral - a huge, lively affair full of joy and laughter and celebration because Lorraine wouldn't have approved of anything else. Her home is in heaven.

I half suspect that when I die I'll be welcomed into heaven by Lorraine, who will be completely at home with its noisy, exuberant glory. And somewhere in the crowds will be Caylee and George too.

What does the Bible teach about death for all who belong to Christ?

"Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" John 11:26

"So we are always confident, because we know that while we are living in the body, we are away from our home with the Lord. We live by faith and not by sight. We are confident, and we would prefer to leave the body and to be at home with the Lord." 2 Cor 5:6-8

"I assure you that whoever hears my word and believes in the one who sent me has eternal life and won't come under judgment but has passed from death into life." John 5:24

⁵³ For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality. ⁵⁴ When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: Death is swallowed up in victory. CHRISTIANITY IN THE NEWS

THERMAL TENT CHURCH

A Cumbria church, Christ Church Cockermouth, has decided to save thousands of pounds by erecting a 'tent' inside the building.



The 'tent' is made

from scaffolding sheeting, which is flame resistant. It puts in an artificial ceiling at the height of the church's balcony and blocks off the chancel, reducing the worship space by three quarters.

For a a total outlay of £750 the church is set to save £4000 in heating costs.

Not bad as a temporary measure!

THE POOR HAVE BEEN ABANDONED

A new report has found significantly more churches have closed in low income areas than in affluent ones in the past decade.



Research from **Church Action on Poverty** revealed a disproportionate affect on

poor communities when churches in the UK have shut their doors. The three year study - Church On The Margins - examined closures across Greater Manchester over the past ten years, in Church of England, Roman Catholic, Methodist, Baptist and United Reformed Churches., and only the URC had more closures in affluent areas.

The churches gave familiar and convincing reasons as contributing factors to church closures: declining attendance; buildings costs and repair and a lack of clergy.

Niall Cooper, from the charity, expressed his concerns: "Churches are effectively withdrawing from low income communities. And if that trend continues for the next 10 or 20 years, then it's really about abandoning communities." He noted that the closing churches tend to be in areas where lots of other things are closing too, but that when the church closes people feel abandoned and left behind.

LENT COURSE THE KING'S SPEECH

The last Lent course I attempted to run, on the film *The King's Speech*, was cut off by Covid after only one session. In my opinion the King's Speech is one of the most outstanding films ever to be made, and I have decided that I want to have another go at the course, repeating the first session.

The commitment is to six sessions at the Vicarage. Each session will happen both on a Wednesday evening and a Friday afternoon, to give people the best chance of getting there. You can come to either one. A booklet will be provided.


Tea/coffee and biscuits will be served. Each session will be over in about an hour and a half. It will consist of the showing of two clips of between four and about six minutes, and discussion.
