# St Michael and All Angels District Church Council

The Annual District Church Meeting was held on 3<sup>rd</sup> April 2022 after the service. At the meeting Pat Clarke and Carol McKee were again nominated as Churchwardens for the year, and duly formally elected at the Annual Parish Meeting.

The Churchwardens are automatically, by virtue of holding that office, members of the DCC for the year. The following members of the congregation were elected at the ADCM to serve on the DCC: Wendy Churchill, Kathy Foster, Smile Imoh (subsequently elected Treasurer), Grace Silvera, Felicity Ojo and Andrew Whittington.

The Deanery Synod Representative is also an ex officio member who is elected to a three-year appointment which runs to 2023. Currently held by Grace who is also a DCC member this position is, therefore, to be filled at this year's ADCM.

Details of the 2022 ADCM are in the minutes which will be available to view at the 2023 ADCM. The DCC met seven times during the year and at the time of the drafting of this report in February 2023 a further meeting was proposed for 5<sup>th</sup> March.

We have again faced a challenging year. The absence of the Team Rector for the whole year due to ill health has added to the strain on the parish as a whole.

During the summer damage to the structure of the church hall became evident. Cracks appeared in the walls at the NE corner of the hall. Consultation with professional parties is continuing but fortunately it has not meant that the hall must be put out of use. The Welcome cafe and the warm spaces scheme have continued.

Safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults remained an issue and again we finished the year with no Safeguarding Officer for St Michael's.

The DCC is charged with considering all aspects of church life and matters raised this year ranged from the continuing liaison with the Air Cadets who help in cutting the large church hedge to the review of pandemic arrangements. This has resulted in most restrictions being lifted and the common cup is now offered at Communion.

I hope this brief note gives some idea of what the DCC does but if you would like to know anything further or would be interested in becoming a member of the DCC please speak to me or any of the DCC members or alternatively if would like to attend a meeting you would be most welcome.

# **Churchwardens Report**

Please don't tell me that time goes more slowly as you get older! Believe me, it does not as it seems to be no time at all since I was putting pen to paper last year. We finally returned to some sort of normality, while still using sanitiser, which was a great relief to all.

The routine maintenance and upkeep of the church and hall continued as usual. The boilers, gas heaters and fire extinguishers were serviced. The PAT testing was carried out and the lightning conductor checked. The Archdeacons Inspection was carried out on her behalf by Canon Richard Osborn and we were pronounced to be in good heart. The Quinquennial Inspection took place and most of the report was reasonable with no particular urgent or major repairs, apart from some cracks which had appeared inside at the rear of the hall. These cracks became much worse over the summer and resulted in an Insurance claim, inspections by surveyors and others and the findings were that it was due to subsidence and not covered by our insurance. However an independent survey by a surveyor who volunteers for the Diocese gave us the good news that the hall can still be used as normal as the repairs are not urgent and can be dealt with in due course.

The church needed attention to the electrics in the boiler room and the lady chapel, which was done, new light were fitted in the vestry, boiler room and entrance lobby and the piano was tuned. The main church door also needed a bit of attention as it had 'dropped'.

Extensive work has been carried out on the emergency lighting in the hall, as stipulated by the Fire Brigade at their visit in 2021 and the expense was covered by a very generous donation and we thank this person. A new fridge for the kitchen and a vacuum cleaner for the church were

purchased. A donation paid for repairs to the fence at the side of the hall which was damaged in the dreadful gale. The Air Cadets cut the hedge once again. And members from the Day Centre keep our gardens in good order. Some potholes in the car park were filled in but this is always an ongoing problem. Andrew and I dealt with a dead fox found in the church grounds and gave it a decent burial!

The hall continues to be busy and we have 3 new groups as well as the Welcome cafe and Warm Spaces. 40 children's parties were hosted, as well as a pantomime and a Foodbank meeting. As always my thanks to the VERY few who help to keep our church in good shape. Thank you to the cleaners, the flower arrangers, and all on the coffee rota. Thanks to the welcomers (there are still vacancies). My thanks to Grace and her team for cleaning the hall after children's parties, to David for his work on the grass and church grounds and to my son in law for doing any bits of DIY that crop up. Thanks to Carol for her support and her role as resident DJ. We look forward to another good year together.

#### **Barnet Deanery Synod Report**

The Barnet Deanery meets approximately three times a year, with guest speakers for most meeting and are held at various churches throughout the Deanery. Since the last ACDM there have been three meetings:

<u>1st June 2022</u> at St Giles, South Mymms with David White, St Albans Diocesan Secretary as guest speaker, and the main discussion points were:

1) William Marsterson, Churchwarden of St Giles, spoke about the history of St Giles Church. And he also spoke briefly about the work of the Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust of which he is Secretary.

2) Richard Osborn gave a brief overview of the new deanery website

4th October 2022 at Holy Trinity Church, Lyonsdown Road, New Barnet. The main discussion points were:

- 1) Bike 'n Hike Eco Relay. Louise Collins updated the meeting on the event held on Saturday 10th September 2022.
- 2) Deanery Youth Programme. Revd Canon Laura Hewitt advised the meeting that the Revd Atalie Gaines is the lead person for the Barnet Deanery programme. The aim is to organise three youth events per year.
- a) The first was held during summer at Holy Trinity Church, Lyonsdown and about 15 children from 7 different churches attended. Great event lots of games BBQ and reflective message delivered by Rev Atalie.
- b) The next event will be held in St Michael and All Angels Church, Borehamwood on Sunday 30th October 2022.
- 3) Tony Lang presented the Barnet Deanery website to the meeting by briefly discussing each of the main sections and the information available within each.
- 4) Update from each church

8th February 2023 at St Giles Church, Blanche Lane, South Mymms with Guest Speaker Maggie Dodd, from the Anna Chaplaincy 'Offering spiritual care in later life'

- 1. Upcoming events were discussed and are all on the Deanery website.
- 2. Dr Jacob Kurien, Chair St Albans Diocesan Racial Justice Action Group (RJAG) and the Dispute Advisory Service (DAS) presented the background and summary of the activities of these two groups.
- 3) Deanery pilgrimage to St Albans Abbey. LH advised the meeting that a pilgrimage is being planned to St Albans Abbey later in 2023.

#### **Welcome Café, Summer Meals and Warm Spaces**

The 'Welcome Café' was established in 2021 as the country began to come out of lockdown. It welcomes people from across the Parish for coffee, cake and an opportunity to socialise. It has a weekly attendance of up to 30 or more and a programme of activities, including Keep Fit, Knit and Natter and Craft. It is popular with friends from the Adult Day Centre in Aycliffe Road. A Harvest Lunch was held in September. A highlight was joining a summer day trip (over 60's) to the seaside at Broadstairs organised by the Town Council.

Working with others, St Michael's has recognised and responded to the cost-of-living crisis faced by many people locally. Over 1,000 hot meals were served, Mon-Fri, over the 6-week summer school holidays thanks to Watford-based charity 'Akshaya Patra', Hertsmere Borough Community Engagement Team and others. A 'Salad and Salsa' Party has held to thank the volunteers.

Building on the success of the 'Welcome Café', St Michael and All Angels Hall has been open as a Warm Space on three days a week from November 2022-March 2023. Attendance has been up to 30-40 people per day. Thanks to generous local donations and grants from Hertfordshire County

Council, monthly free fish and chips have been served and parties held on several occasions. Volunteers have come from across the community and Parish Churches. Talks have been held by church members and others, e.g., living with visual impairment, finding hope as a refugee, shopping on a budget, personal / fire safety.

# Paying Our Way ...

It costs over £900 a week to run St Michaels.

Our income comes fees, hall letting, regular stewardship, gifts and offerings, fairs, fund-raising, public donations and occasional grants. Grants for 2022:

- Sports England / Herts Sports Partnership Keep Fit £650
- Jubilee Grants from Hertsmere Borough Council £335
- Diocesan 'Fresh Expressions' grant for Warm Spaces Fish 'n Chips £250
- HCC Community & Well-Being Festive Grant for Christmas Party £360
- Hertfordshire Communities Foundation for Warm Spaces Welcome Café £2,000
- Church Commissioners Energy Grant £1,279

Our expenses include electricity, gas, water, repairs, renewals, maintenance, supplies, services, PAT testing, fire safety, organ upkeep, insurance, administration, mission costs, Parish Office costs, Vicar's expenses and more.

In addition, we pay towards the costs of having a Vicar and a Vicarage, plus the training and support of ministers and legal advice. This is covered through the **Parish Share Scheme** whereby each Parish in St Albans Diocese pays their Parish Share to the Diocesan Board of Finance. In the Parish of Elstree and Borehamwood, this is split four-ways between the Parish Churches as follows:

St Michael and All Angels pays 34% All Saints pays 33% St Nicholas pays 17% Holy Cross pays 16%
