The Wednesday celebrations of Holy Communion at Ryton are temporarily suspended.

Services in our three parishes following the retirement of the Revd. David Wintle.

Now that we have no parish priest, we are having to implement a temporary/ interim schedule of services. We are aiming to hold one service each Sunday in each church, but we have had to suspend weekday services until further notice. The schedule above shows what services we shall endeavour to hold in each parish, but we are finding it extremely difficult to recruit clergy to officiate. You will see that the times of the services are mainly what you are used to, (but note changed times on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month at Bubbenhall) and we shall be continuing to offer coffee and tea after the services where this is customary. If a priest is unfortunately not available, an authorised Service of the Word (with hymns and refreshments) will be offered instead of Holy Communion. We shall give as much notice as possible in the weekly email update and on noticeboards.

A Message from our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle, on his retirement.

You will probably be aware that I am about to retire. I know the word has gone round, because quite a few people - some of whom I know only slightly - have stopped me in the street and wished me well. That means a lot to me. It has been a privilege to be part of your lives over the last 23 years (only 22 years for Baginton), and to be with you and to share in some of the happiest and saddest times.

My last service will be a united celebration of Holy Communion at Baginton on Sunday 30 April.

I would like to express my thanks to everyone who has worked so hard to support me over my 23 years as Priest-in-Charge and Rector: Rosemary our Reader, visiting clergy, all of the Churchwardens and the PCCs, including those no longer with us, Sunday Schools, our organists, the choirs, the servers, the bellringers, village worship, village service and family service teams and musicians, those who read and lead intercessions at services,

the flower arrangers, sidespeople, the churchyard tidy-up team and cleaners, and most of all Frances.

In this country, we are going through perhaps the most rapid decline in Christianity and in church attendance that there has ever been, and Covid has accelerated this decline still further.

I don't offer this as an excuse for any part I may have had in our congregations dwindling and ageing and running out of steam, but I state it as a fact. The Church of England hierarchy certainly does not help in this, as on every issue it vacillates between liberalism and conservatism, and ends up with compromise, giving everybody what nobody wants. I don't know whether you feel encouraged or discouraged to know that the majority of congregations are in the same situation as you are.

I hope it will be sooner rather than later that you will have a new incumbent, or incumbents: it seems likely that Bubbenhall and Baginton will go into a different group of parishes than Ryton. Nobody is prepared to say exactly what will happen, though, and if you are unhappy about the uncertainty, I am too. It is my hope and prayer that the new situation, whatever it turns out to be, will breathe new life into all three parishes.

I have always tried to keep the three parishes as separate going concerns, because I believed that the way to encourage those on the fringe of church was to have a service in each church, preferably at the same time, each week. The intention was that anyone who came on the off-chance and returned the following week would find something going on, and maybe start to establish a regular pattern of church attendance. That has not worked as well as I had hoped, but I think that it probably has retained more of the existing congregations than the alternative of rotating the service around the churches: here one week, somewhere else the next. It is only now, with congregations ageing and the numbers declining as they are, that I can see that working together more closely and combining the energy and skills of several parishes might be the best way for the future. Too late for me, but not too late for you. Seize the opportunity, welcome the new priest(s) and listen to him or her (or them).

I wish you all well and you will continue to be in my prayers.

Thought for the Month : **Ascension Day, Pentecost and Corpus Christi.**

Three joyful Spring festivals.

Ascension day and Corpus Christi always occur on a Thursday- this year, Ascension Day is on May 18 and Corpus Christi on June 8.

While the Revd. David Wintle has been our parish priest, these festivals have always been celebrated at St. Leonard's Church, and some people may remember the visiting choir, Musica Sacra, joining with the St. Leonard's Church Choir to make Corpus Christi even more special. Some may remember the party following the service, when some of us managed to eat prodigious quantities of cheese scones!

Sadly, for the time being at least, we are only able to provide Sunday services, and so Ascension Day and Corpus Christi will not be celebrated in our churches this year.

So perhaps it's a good opportunity to consider the meaning and significance of these Springtime festivals.

Most people are aware that Ascension Day marks the occasion when, 40 days after his rising from the dead on what we now call Easter Day- 40 precious days when his friends had enjoyed his company in the flesh-

Jesus finally left them and returned to join his Father in Heaven. You can read the account of how they perceived his departure in your Bible, in Luke's Gospel (Chapter 24, verses 50-53) and again in the Acts of the Apostles (Chapter 1, verses 6-14) You might

expect that Jesus' friends would be very sad and sorrowful to have lost the physical presence of the one they called their Master. But the Bible says otherwise: They returned to Jerusalem, it says, They returned to Jerusalem **with great joy.**



And they stayed in Jerusalem until they received the 'Comforter' whom Jesus had promised them- the Holy Spirit- on the Jewish Feast of Pentecost (or Hag Shavu'ot), which we celebrate in our churches here this year on Sunday, May 28. It's the day we used to call "Whitsunday"

And that's where the Church began. Sometimes we have even had a birthday cake for the church to share after the Pentecost service.

And ten days after Pentecost, the church celebrates Corpus Christi, or the Institution of Holy Communion.



We recall the time, just before his death, when Jesus shared bread and wine with his friends and told them “This is my Body... this is the Covenant in my Blood”

Jesus is not with us in bodily form as he was for 30 or so years 2000 years ago. But he is alive and on the loose in us and in the world: spiritually in the Holy Spirit and even physically as we eat and drink the shared bread and wine of Holy Communion.
