A PRAYER FOR THE HOLY LAND



Christmas is celebrated with immense zeal and enthusiasm in every Christian family of the world. Partying and feasting form an important part of the celebrations. So, this month, instead of testing your brains why not test you culinary skills with these delicious Christmas recipes?

Christmas Fudge

Ingredients 225g Sugar 115g Butter 120 ml Double Cream Pinch of Salt



Method

Spray an 8"x8" baking dish with cooking spray. In a large saucepan, bring the sugar, butter, cream and salt to a boil over medium heat, stirring frequently. Let boil for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and slowly add the icing sugar and vanilla. Keep stirring until smooth and well combined. Stir in the cherries until evenly distributed. Spoon into baking dish and chill for 1 hour or until firm. Cut into squares. Store in an airtight container.

<u>Gluhwein</u>

Ingredients

175 ml water1 orange10 whole cloves750ml bottle red wine85g white sugar1 cinnamon stick



Method

In a saucepan, combine the water, sugar and cinnamon stick. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer.

Cut the orange in half, and squeeze the juice into the simmering water. Push the cloves into the outside of the orange peel, and place peel in the simmering water.

Continue simmering for 30 minutes, until thick and syrupy.

Pour in the wine, and heat until steaming but not

simmering. Remove the clove-studded orange halves. Serve hot in mugs or glasses that have been preheated in warm water (cold glasses will break).


Maunderings From The Editor

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2023 St. Mary's Church, Manby.



The Remembrance Sunday Service took place at St Mary's Church, Manby conducted by the Revd Keith Dally.

The parade from ELDC car park, in beautiful Autumn sunshine, was led by the Royal Air Force Association, Louth Standard, Standard bearer Mr Graham Malster. It was a special occasion as the Standard often used to be paraded at Manby but as there is no longer a Louth branch the Standard is now

held at the Cleethorpes branch for use at funerals and military occasions. The old Louth RAFA Standard has been laid up in St Mary's for many years. The Beavers, Cubs, Scouts also paraded their banners and the Union Flag and were accompanied by family, friends and people from the

area.

The well attended service started around the Commonwealth War Graves. The cubs had painted poppies onto pebbles, which they had placed on the graves at their last meeting. Wreaths were laid and the two-minute silence observed. The service continued in church with hymns, readings and prayers. A member of the cubs eloquently spoke about "Scouting during the War". Revd Dally gave the address and the names of the airmen killed in action and buried in the war graves in Manby and Grimoldby were read out. A collection raised £135.95 which has been sent to the Poppy Fund. The service ended with an act of commitment for us all to work towards peace with ourselves, our neighbours and within our world.

Maunder Junior Brain Drain




This cute angel can sit as a central table decoration, as a place marker (just write the name of each person on an angel and set them on the plates) or you can put her on top of a small Christmas tree!

Paper Cone Angel Craft

You could either trace the pieces below or scan them on a computer and print them off (that way you

could make them as big as you want to by enlarging the image)

Materials: paper, glue, scissors, $\frac{1}{2}$ large paper doily or $\frac{1}{2}$ circle of white paper, glitter glue, sparkles, sequins, lace or felt pens. **Instructions:**



Cut out the template pieces.

Decorate the cone and the arms and colour the face as desired with felt pens, glitter glue, sequins or lace.

Pull the one edge over to the one that says GLUE HERE to make a cone shape. Tape or glue so it holds

Cut the doily in half OR Cut a piece of white paper into a circle and then cut it in half. (you could colour this or stick on cotton wool or glitter to make them look like angel wings)

Glue the doily onto the back of the cone.

Glue the head onto the top of the cone and the arms onto the side



It was 1999. A few days after Christmas, a black dog with a little white around his mouth wandered onto the front porch and settled in as if he'd lived here all his life. Whenever anyone left the house to do chores or walk next door to my brother-in-law's house, the black dog followed. He'd patiently wait until we were done, follow us home and lie down on the porch. Inside, the house was full of sadness and quiet conversation. My 91-year-old father-in-law, Jim Cravens, was gravely ill.

The family had gathered to see to his care, to cook and to welcome visitors. Jim and his wife, Dorothy, were beloved pillars of the community. This curious visitor gave us something new to talk about, a wonderful distraction. Whose dog was he? Did someone drop him off along the road? Did he intend to stay? Either way, it would be dark soon, and he would be cold. Jim sat in the rocking chair by the front window where he could watch the happy black dog's comings and goings. We called the radio station, animal shelter, newspaper, sheriff and several neighbouring farms about a lost dog. Meanwhile, we made him comfortable on the porch with food, water, and a blanket. The days leading up to New Year brought no news, and we were all just content that our companion had stayed around. My father-in-law said he wanted to live long enough to see the new millennium, and he did. He passed away Jan. 2. That was the day the black dog left. Then the weather turned cold, and snow fell every day for the rest of the winter, it seemed. Some-time later we heard that the black dog was a rescued dog living with a family about a mile and a half from the farm. They named him Bogart. The following summer Bogart returned to see us again. When his owners came to pick him up, we told them about his angelic Christmas visit, how he had comforted our family with his cheerful companionship. We wanted them to know how much that meant. Christmas Myths

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Christmas has had many myths added to it down the ages, and if we are Christians, we need to be honest enough to admit the fact, so that we can move on and focus on the truths of Christmas as well.

Here are some of the myths:

1. Christmas was in winter: "Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone..." Oh no it wasn't! It would have been daft for the Romans to get all the people to travel to their towns of origin in the middle of winter, and the sheep wouldn't have been out in the hills at that time of year. The bible doesn't tell us when Jesus' real birthday was, and Christmas is his official birthday, not his real one. (Like the Queen!)

2. Jesus was the perfect baby: "But little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes..." No he wasn't. He was without sin, but not without human nature. He had to grow in wisdom and stature just like the rest of us.

3. Christmas is about presents: "Ye who now will bless the poor shall yourselves find blessing." No it isn't. Christmas is *first of all* about God's present to us, his gift of his Son, himself come to live among us. The idea of us giving presents to each other only comes a very poor second to the message that we ought to receive God's present.

Here are some of the truths:

1. God really did come to earth: "God of God, light of light, lo he abhors not the virgin's womb..."

We can't really understand how it could happen, but Jesus was God's complete character and personality, living in a human body. You can see it by reading about his life in the four gospels in the bible. The gospels force us to answer a basic question: who was this man?

2. God can come to each of us: "where meek souls will receive him still the dear Christ enters in."

The fact that shepherds, the dirty and smelly people of their time, were the first to hear the news shows God's care for each of us, even though we are nothing special, and even in spite of the dirty bits in our lives. Anyone who opens the door of his or her heart can have Jesus in as permanent guest.

3. God can make us new inside: "light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings..."

If we do open the door of our heart to Jesus, then we will discover he can begin to change and correct the things that are going wrong in us, and put his light where there was once darkness.

Did you spot the carols? However, more importantly, have you spotted the challenge?

May you all find that special present of Jesus Christ this Christmas.
