December Link News Sunday 3rd and Sunday 10th 1st and 2nd of Advent



We're in a period of 'difficult' readings in the Bible at the moment: apocalyptic, cryptic readings that trouble and tease.

Advent begins on 3 December, a season of preparation, of active watching and waiting for the celebrations which recall the first advent of the Messiah, Jesus. Watching and waiting, preparing for the second coming of Jesus in clouds of glory to usher in the new heaven and new earth.

New heaven, new earth. Realities which feed my imagination. But before the advent of this new world of wholeness and harmony we continue with the troubling and teasing themes of death and judgement, heaven and hell through the four Sundays of Advent. It feels as though we have been touching on these already.

Parallel to, but related to these themes, is the story of the Hebrew spies sent to bring back report of the Promised Land, that land flowing with milk and honey, an earthly experiment with living the new heaven and new earth in this heaven and earth, with God's love and justice permeating all. Rabbi Jonathan Sacks in his essays on the Book of Numbers comments on the failure of ten of the twelve spies to see with eyes of faith. I was struck by his comment:

"Those with faith hearts see a world filled with danger. Those with strong hearts see the same world but it is not filled with danger. It contains risks but that does not make them dismayed." He goes on to say these words which seem to me to encapsulate the Advent atmosphere and also the feeling of our world at the moment with its wars and rumours of wars, its plagues and famines: "Faith is the courage to see the world precisely as it is while refusing to be intimidated by it."

Advent seeks to encourage our faith by reminding us of the wide arc of God's active presence in the world. God has not left us to our own devices. God is present and active in this crazy beautiful and suffering world. As we explore Advent themes we are offering three sessions on Zoom on Peace in our Time (Monday evenings, 7pm). All are welcome, whether you are of faith or not, to join in these sessions.
