#### The Vicar's letter

Dear Friends,

The word 'yearning' best sums up the mood of Advent. Advent begins on Sunday 3rd December, and this year Advent is as short as it can be. The Scriptures and prayers of this season are full of yearnings for a world of righteousness, justice, peace, and for a time of freedom from want. This year we can feel very close to such longings, both at home and abroad. Who does not yearn for these things? There is also something else in Advent; a mood of hope that God is able to bring about such a world. In Advent, there is also the presence of an elusive figure, described in various mysterious ways, who will powerfully forward God's plans, and that too is part of Advent's message. The Nativity of Jesus Christ reveals who that person is, but it will be good not to jump the gun, and let the longing yearning mood of Advent, and the figure of a mysterious person yet to come, to remain with us for a while. Then when we come to celebrate the actual birth of this person at Christmas we will have some idea of the hopes and expectations that surrounded him, and which still surround him.

We are expecting a significant publishing event soon; a new service booklet for Shipley, to replace the pamphlets we have been using. A number of people were delegated by the PCC to move this project forward. They dealt with the text itself and matters of size, format and printing. This new departure is to have all the services we use on a Sunday contained within one booklet. So it will include our basic Sunday

service, the Sung Eucharist, together with Holy Baptism, both within the Sunday Service and as a stand alone service. One very good feature is the fact that Evensong is printed in a very clear and easy to follow form. The Family Service completes the compliment of services contained in the booklet. The Sung Eucharist, in particular, is a very careful and balanced revision as befits our main act of worship on Sundays. It retains the traditional structure and wording whilst allowing for some variety, especially in using the many Eucharistic prayers (prayers of consecration) which the Church of England has evolved in the past 50 years as part of the Liturgical Movement involving all the mainstream churches. So while one Eucharistic prayer is printed as a model and guide, others will often be used as well. Many thanks to those who have given detailed attention to what will be a splendid new asset to the parish in its outreach and worshipping life.


services Christmas this unchanged from last year. There is a full list of the services on page 8. Christmas is a time when many people from the wider community come to worship in Church. I look forward to that being the case this year. The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ is God's great world-affirming act, changing the relationship between God and the world for ever - no wonder many people are drawn to celebrate this feast. God has set the scene. Therefore anything we as the Church can do to make a link between the Church and the community, means we are following in God's footsteps and following his example set with the

Incarnation of his Son. Attendance at Christmas, therefore, is often an indicator of how well we are reaching out to the community and making our presence felt as a Parish Church, and more importantly, making God known and loved.

We continue to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace as a New Year dawns and 1st January, the feast of the naming of Jesus, is surely a day to pray for the peace of the world. There will be a Eucharist at 12 noon on New Year's Day, to greet the New Year in the name of Christ and to pray for peace. This year our world needs peace ever more urgently. People often feel powerless in the face of the wars and violence of the world and Our Lord warned us that there will be wars and rumours of wars throughout human history. What we can do is to make sure that in all we do or think, we are basing ourselves not on rumours but on verifiable facts. Wars thrive and grow on rumours- so let's always search out what is known to be true and stick to that.

Looking forward, Easter is early this year, 31<sup>st</sup> March, so Ash Wednesday is on 14<sup>th</sup> February. The Ash Wednesday Service is an important marker in the year, a call to repentance and the beginning of Lent, a serious time of restraint, simplicity and prayer. As last year I shall be leading three Lent Groups in the Andrew Hall. These will be in the latter part of Lent, so more details in the next edition of the Parish News. Provisional titles are: How can we be the Church?, How can we understand the Bible?, How can we pray? So it's not just education which is in view, it's also, how can



we grow in spirituality and commitment to the Church's mission, and move forward? Provisional dates Thursdays, 7 March, 14 March and 21 March.

We are looking forward to seeing the sheep back in the churchyard after a short spell away. They have done an excellent job in hugely improving the appearance of the churchyard. Not only that, they are a very welcome sight, reminding us of the pastoral vocation of the Church to follow in the steps of the Good Shepherd in caring for people, including those not yet a part of the fold or who have strayed away. We hope some of them can take part in the Crib service on Christmas Eve. So I wish and pray for a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year for you all - peaceful for you, and indeed, for

# Shipley History Society

In October we welcomed Peter Baker from the War Graves Commission. Peter gave us a fascinating and in-depth insight into the work of the Commission and its setting up in 1917 by the founder Sir Fabian Ware who was a Red Cross Volunteer. The War Graves Commission looks after the war graves of all those who served during the first and second world wars. The ethos of the Commission was equality in death – that is whatever rank, religion, colour or background of the servicemen, the headstones would all be the same. Each headstone of a known serviceman shows the service badge, the name and particulars, date and age at death, religious emblem and a personal inscription chosen by the family if they so wished. If the grave is that of an unidentified serviceman, the words written by Rudyard Kipling, 'Known unto God' are inscribed on the gravestone. The work of the War Graves Commission continues across its 13,000 locations worldwide caring for the gardens, headstones and memorials, maintaining them and replacing when necessary.

# The Boy, the Sheep, the Ox and the Donkey

There's a heavenly "otherness", a mystery, about animals, isn't there?

I remember a friend telling me how, having reached the end of his tether, he'd gone for a walk "with despair at my side". He'd trudged several miles before he saw a field of horses, and as he stood still, an elderly horse came and stood with him. He said it was "like being visited by an angel".

Artist Charlie Mackesy drew inspiration for his book The Boy, the Mole, the Fox & the Horse from an old horse he knew in his childhood: "I used to go and chat to him after school. He was the wisest creature that I knew then, including humans," he said in an interview. His book was turned into an animated film and was premiered on TV last Christmas, and has become a classic, given the public's adoration for his four creaturely characters, which seem to represent (and

honour) parts of us all: the wondering child, the greedy mole, the wounded and withdrawn fox, the kind soulful horse.

One of my favourite pages in the book is when the boy and the horse have this short exchange: "So you know all about me?" asked the boy. "Yes", said the horse. "And you still love me?" "We love you all the more."

The story we tell of Jesus' birth is also happily graced with animals - at least in our imagination. And, given he was laid in a manger, why wouldn't there be a donkey or an ox or a sheep standing by? Or all three - praising God with the gift of their silent, creaturely presence. Beholding the little Boy, as the boy beheld them! For me, their closeness to God in the stable speaks of their closeness to God in every moment - which is why, I'm sure, we feel drawn to animals. They're not self-conscious like we are - we, who can spend our lives chasing after self-worth. They are free to feel with child-like simplicity that they belong at God's side.

For us to be part of the same family, it helps to become child-like too. Perhaps, then, we could invite the child in us – the one that Charlie Mackesy draws so beautifully – back into our lives, to step through the stable door and join the boy, the sheep, the ox and the donkey in their silent adoration of each other. At the same time, we might wonder at the nature of God's love, the kind which knows all about us, and – yes – then loves us all the more.

# "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men."

So writes St Luke in the second chapter of his Gospel. There can surely be no greater aspiration for the whole of mankind than that, yet how very, very far it is from being achieved. There is so little real peace in the world.

The illustration shows part of the glorious east window by Charles Kempe in our church of St Mary the Virgin, Shipley. It is dated 1893 and illustrates the 'Madonna and Child enthroned among Angels'. (There are eighteen angels in the whole window!) Angels are among the most significant elements of almost any Kempe window. They wear wings



of peacock feathers, are clothed in sumptuous vestments richly embellished with pearls and precious stones, and are shown swinging golden incense-burners or playing harps.

In 1911 the Kempe Studios produced twelve stained-glass windows for Washington Cathedral, Washington DC in the United States of America, all made in London and shipped across the Atlantic during the year 1912 that saw the tragic loss of the liner RMS Titanic. Four of these windows depict a multitude of Kempe's angels proclaiming "peace on earth, and goodwill toward men" to illustrate the 'Adoration of the Magi.'

Ten years ago in December 2013, just prior to Christmas, the Kempe Society produced its final Newsletter - known then as the 'Wheatsheaf' - after thirty years of its existence. The Society had been formed to research and catalogue the precise whereabouts of over 4000 stainedglass windows produced by the Kempe Studios covering the period from 1865 to 1934 (when the firm closed). It now forms part of the Kempe Trust founded in 1992. Kempe's work is represented in Shipley by all five windows in the choir and chancel, and a sixth by the pulpit. His glass was installed in cathedrals, city churches, schools, universities, college chapels and great houses in the UK and

abroad. Sometimes he would include a small wheatsheaf from his family crest as his trademark. You can see one in the far bottom left hand corner of the window by the pulpit.

Specialising in the production of stained glass, Charles Kempe came from a wealthy Sussex family, and was born in Ovingdean near Brighton in 1837, the year of Queen Victoria's accession. He was educated at Rugby and then Pembroke College, Oxford. As a contemporary of William Morris, Edward Burne-Jones and Rossetti, his work became so admired that he was named during his lifetime as 'Master of Glass.' Kempe lived in Lindfield but died unexpectedly in 1907. Today the history and importance of Kempe glass in local churches is increasingly recognised and valued.

As we celebrate this Christmas, let us recall with Charles Kempe his

Yet while they moan about clothes moths in their wardrobe, I just stand there smiling, reassured by the knowledge that these people have wildlife living right under their noses. Well, to be more precise, right in their noses.

OK, I warn you now: after reading this article some of you will be scouring your face with a Brillo pad. But it's time to face the facts. Your face is crawling with animals. You, yes you, have face mites. And there's no 'might' about it research has shown that 100% of adults have them. Our faces are one big nature reserve for mites: from your mountainous nose and skin pore caves to your eyelash jungles. In fact, our faces are home to two different species. Demodex folliculorum thrive in your eyelashes while Demodex brevis lurk in your pores. They're feeding on dead skin cells and oils but don't harm us – a commensal parasite.

Before you run to the bathroom mirror, these guys are tiny. I'm not going to lie to you, they're not pretty (unless you think a microscopic 8-legged slug is pretty) and under high-powered microscopes they look like something you'd encounter in a galaxy far, far away. The egg and larval

stages last two weeks and you'll probably be relieved to hear that the adults live for just five days and then die. And it's right about here you'll realise that these things are constantly mating on your face. You can scrub and scrub but you can't wash away the hard truth: you're just a mammal. And like dogs, cows, orangutans and meerkats we're the perfect hosts for a range of parasites.

Personally, I've grown quite fond of my little pets – despite never being able to see them. When I go to bed at night, I imagine Clarence the Demodex, climbing from his pore, going for a wander across my cheek and hoping to meet a girlfriend. But instead he meets his nemesis Evil Arthur and a mite fight ensues until ... well, you get the idea. There are hundreds of these little adventures happening on your face every night. Sweet dreams.

# Holly

I'm sure you'll agree that these are crazy times, folks. Back in Ancient Rome they had a festival – Saturnalia – which saw their society turn upside down for a week each December. It seems Saturnalia's traditions of chaos and mayhem are now the daily norm for us Brits but, as we career towards Christmas, we have another thing in common with Saturnalia. We will soon be paying our respects to the Holly tree.

Holly has been celebrated in many traditions over the centuries because, as a native evergreen, its vibrancy in the dead of winter could easily be mistaken for immortality. Holly was the sacred tree of Saturn, the Roman god of agriculture. In pagan tradition, the Holly King ruled over the Oak King from Midsummer to Midwinter. Holly was easily adopted by Christians, who saw many links between the tree and the life of Christ. Today, Holly remains a centrepiece of our Christmas decorations, cards and cakes.

Each Holly tree is either male or female. While both produce delicate white flowers in May, it's only the female Holly that bears a berry as red as any blood. When these berries are produced in profusion, it's taken to be a sign of an oncoming hard winter -although in reality it's the outcome of a successful spring. Holly's prickles provide protection for nesting birds, their flower buds are food for the





Holly Blue butterfly's caterpillar and their ripe berries are essential for thrushes.

If you're after a tree filled with folklore then Holly must take a bow. So if you're planning to deck your halls with boughs of the stuff this Christmas, here's a quick user guide. First off, never cut down a Holly tree - that's guaranteed bad luck, a superstition which has spared many Holly trees from the woodsman's axe. And make sure you leave Holly trees in your hedgerows to prevent witches from running along the top. If you bring Holly into your home at Christmas, it'll help protect you from those pesky festive faeries. Only female Holly leaves under your pillow will allow you to predict your future in your dreams. Oh, and don't forget to get rid of your Holly decorations before Twelfth Night (but don't burn them, that's bad luck too). Holly trees will protect you against lightning strikes (I'm not sure if this has been scientifically proven so don't blame me if you still get zapped). And don't eat the berries, they're poisonous, but if you have smallpox you can drink an infusion made from the leaves.

Stick to those rules folks and you'll have a peaceful Christmas. Me? I've had enough of the state of the world today. I'm going to pour some wine, put on my toga and pretend I'm in ancient Rome. Somebody pass me my fiddle.



These awards 'celebrate the people and brands who go above and beyond in our global fight against climate change.' The hugely deserving winner in our category is The Bull Inn in Totnes where our own Ned Burrell, owner and chef at Knepp's Wilding Kitchen, trained back in 2021. This project, supported by a Natural England working group, aims to link ancient High Weald forests to rejuvenated kelp forests along the Sussex coast. It also hugs three river systems, helping to prevent floods and keeping the water super clean. Weald to Waves is led by farmers and the local community, with more than 15% of the corridor earmarked for ecosystem restoration, reinforcing the commitment to our local environment.

The Scrubland Superheroes project, another local initiative, will create nightingale and turtle dove habitats and reintroduce lost Sussex species. The

Foundation recently received additional funding from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Garfield Weston Foundation, which will be an exciting turbo boost for this nature highway. If you've been enjoying walking around Knepp this season, you may have noticed that it has been a fantastic autumn for fungi due to the warm and damp weather. Our eagle-eyed roaming ranger volunteers and ecology team have been recording all sorts of interesting species while on duty - there is such a variety of colours, shapes and sizes of fungi being found locally! Having a wide variety of fungi is a really important part of an ecosystem. Wood-decaying fungi recycle the carbon, minerals, and nutrients so that they can be used by other living things.

Our camping and safari season just about closed in time before the floods in early November, just as we welcomed Sarah Talbot to our Knepp team as our new campsite manager, who is here as maternity cover for Rachel. We also welcome Brad Albrecht from Dial Post who has joined





us on the property compliance arm of the estate. Josh Chalmers has joined the gardening team to maintain Charlie Harpur's stunning landscape at Swallows, which has seen a great deal more planting in the past few weeks since we opened. Meanwhile congratulations to Molly Biddell, our natural capital specialist who has won a coveted place on the prestigious Worshipful Company of Farmers Rural Leaders course.

A big thank you to our amazing volunteer workforce, and their outstanding leader - our Ranger Tom Burns. #### Top tips for safe buying online this festive season

There were 117,000 reported cases of people being defrauded whilst buying online in 2022, totalling losses of £67 million. But the actual figure is considerably higher, as most purchase frauds go unreported by their victims.

Whatever you're buying, take some simple steps to avoid becoming a victim.

#### Your top tips

- Never pay for anything by transferring money directly to a person or company you don't know. If you can, pay by credit card.
- Make sure a website is authentic by carefully checking the address is spelled correctly. Type it in rather than clicking on a link, or copying and pasting. Use www.getsafeonline.org/checkawebsite
- Learn how to spot fraudulent advertisements on social media, online marketplaces and forums. Never part with money even a deposit for goods you haven't seen in person.
- Don't click on links in random emails, texts or posts, nor open unexpected email attachments.

- Make sure payment pages are secure by checking that addresses begin with 'https' ('s' is for secure) and there's a closed padlock in the address bar.
- Don't knowingly buy counterfeit goods.
   They're not only illegal, they may also be unsafe.
- Be wary of 'low-cost' or 'free' trials. Whether they're for the latest handset or slimming pills, you could be signing up for large monthly direct debits. If it's for slimming or any other pills, check our advice on Buying Medicines on the Get Safe Online website.
- Text messages and emails claiming to be from delivery firms informing you that there's a charge for re-delivering a parcel, or a shipping fee to be paid, could be fraudulent. Keep a record of everything you order.
- Note that some sellers advertise bargain or lower prices during sales or events like Black Friday, when in fact they're no cheaper or even more expensive.

Hello, I'm the new Rural Engagement Officer employed by West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service and I'd like to tell you briefly about our Safe and Well visits which is a free service offered by the Fire Service to support our vulnerable residents to ensure they are fire safe at home and support with their general health and wellbeing.

We can advise on important aspects of fire safety including testing smoke detectors to ensure they are working and talk about how to reduce the risk of fire in the home including kitchen fire safety, electrical fire safety, safe heating practices, smoking cigarettes safely and escape plans. We can also supply free equipment such as smoke detectors and deaf alarms if you live alone and cannot hear your smoke detectors when they are activated and we can also provide equipment to protect you when you are smoking in your homes.



It was when he was the Vicar of Radley Church that he met David and Sue Horner, who became good friends, and when he became Vicar of Kyrenia in Cyprus, they met again and it was there that they informed him there was a position available in Shipley. The rest is history.

So, he arrived as Vicar of Shipley Church in 1992 and over the next 8 years, he and his wife Morfa, had a huge influence over the parish and made many friends. He officiated over a large number of weddings and other services and it was a shock to all when he died in service in December 2000.

His impact on the community was such that many parishioners thought about how they could honour his contribution, and it was once again David and Sue Horner's idea that we should set up a Memorial Fund to help the development of special talents of young people who had been to school in Shipley, in which the family would otherwise have difficulty in financing.

The initial appeal for funding was supported by 45 families and hence the Dan and Morfa Pope Memorial Fund was created and registered as a Charity.

It was not long before the Fund was called on to support additional coaching for a child who was applying for a scholarship (which he got) and another of the earliest and most successful, was Matt Charman, who was raised in Shipley and went to Shipley Primary School. He wanted to be



time. He won the Verity Bargate award in 2004 for his first play "A Night of the Dog" and went on to co-write the film "A Bridge of Spies" for Steven Spielberg. Over the years, a total of 38 donations have been made to young people who have studied singing, piano, violin, swimming, rugby, game and wildlife management, yoga, cake making and more recently during the pandemic, funds have been made available to help children work from home, and through Shipley Primary school and William Penn





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
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# Defibrillators - Where's your nearest?
