## Lent is nigh!

I am writing while our celebrations of Christmas and the Epiphany are still firmly in my mind: it was lovely to see so many people in our churches over that period; the story of the birth of the baby Jesus and the homage paid to him by shepherds and wise men seemed to be a fitting contrast to the drama of war, floods and earthquakes unfolding on our television screens over the same period. But by the time you read this the season of Lent will be nearly upon us: Ash Wednesday takes place on 14<sup>th</sup> February, a date more usually associated with St Valentine, but this year for those with time to attend one of the two Ash Wednesday services I shall be marking your foreheads with an ash cross as a sign of penitence and a reminder of our mortality, using the words *Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ*.

But Lent is not just about penitence, it is also about growing our faith: traditionally it was the period in which Christians prepared for baptism or confirmation. While we now tend to baptise fairly soon after birth and no confirmations are planned for Easter, at least not in this Benefice, it is a time when we should seek to increase our understanding of what Christians believe through study and prayer. This may be through a commitment to reading the bible every day, perhaps attending the Morning Prayer sessions which happen around our churches at 9am on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays each week, or by a commitment to spend more time in prayer every day. But I can also recommend the *Come and See* programme, *the way of love*, that is being offered by the Diocese – with a series of daily emails and a weekly video, designed to help us grow in our faith. I will be leaving cards describing the programme in each church, but you can access it directly on <a href="www.oxford.anglican.org/come-and-see">www.oxford.anglican.org/come-and-see</a>. And I am delighted that our Diocesan Bishop, the Bishop of Oxford, will be preaching for us at the Benefice Eucharist on 3<sup>rd</sup> March at Shutford.

We have planned a series of Lent lunches to join with others on our journey through Lent, as listed on the front cover, all at 12.30pm, with precise details to follow in the weekly pew sheets.

We pray we will be blessed with a New Priest by the summer. Lots of love to everyone in the Benefice, Jennifer.


## News from the Diocese - Candidate for a Rector

We can share with you that, unfortunately, there were no short-listable candidates brought forward this time, and therefore the post will be re-advertised. This process cannot happen for 6 weeks but may hopefully attract more candidates by that time of the year.

Whilst this is disappointing news, it was generally felt that it is better to wait and have quality candidates rather than rush in for the first one that applies and we hope that you will appreciate this approach. Please continue to pray for a suitable candidate for our benefice.

#### Thoughts for prayer time for Lent -

In John's introduction, he mentions a couple of meditation programmes to support you through Lent as well as Benefice Morning Prayer sessions.

Many of us will start our day with exercise or with brain teasers but how many of us prepare our inner selves to face the day with God at our side? We all know it's important to pray and to meditate to be able to grow as a Christian, so we can learn about God and ourselves. It brings us knowledge, understanding, courage and peace for the day ahead. Nevertheless, I imagine most of us find it hard to make the time to do this.

During the day you can offer up prayers of praise and thanks or give Him your worries. You can ask for guidance at any moment. You can offer to serve Him anywhere - but perhaps what God would love is for us to give Him a small amount of concentrated time to just focus on Him and learn from Him each day. With our hectic lives we need to learn how to just slow down, sit quietly, and with ease, as you would with a dear friend. How does one release the rat race in our mind, be quiet and be still – not just pray, but listen, even to the peace of silence? We know, if we are prepared to practice prayer, it becomes less of a challenge and more part of what we are.

"Slow down, where are you going What's so important that can't wait....
...!'Il be the light to guide your feet,
If you just slow down, just slow down
And meet with me.

...Why hurry when you can walk with me, just slow down and meet with me."



#### How do we slow down for God, even for a few minutes?

Here are some suggestions:

- Find your own quiet space and close the door on the world. It can be anywhere.
- Perhaps listen to a piece of music, a song that draws your focus on God.
- Start by breathing with intention. Consciously inhaling, holding the breath for a moment before
  exhaling. Do this slowly, 5 or 6 times.
- It can help to listen to a reading, a chant, a prayer.
- Draw upon the word or phrase that stands out for you. Repeat it, absorb it.
- Be still, absorb this moment of quiet. Thank God for it and for what it has meant to you.
- When you are finished, get up slowly and pause before you re-join your day.
- Now armed with His word and peace, carry this exclusive moment with God with you for the rest of the day.

It will be God's glory, not yours, that will guide your feet, support you, and love you today.
