Thanking two kinds of Mother on 10th March

Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, is the day for honouring our Mother Church, and has been celebrated since the Middle Ages.

Mothers' Day is an annual day to honour our mothers, and it began in America in May 1907. In the US, Canada, Australia and Mexico, Mothers' Day is still held in May.

In Britain, Mothers' Day is held on Mothering Sunday, so the two days are often merged in people's minds.

If you ask Google for ideas of how to be nice to your church on that day, you won't find much. But if you want to be kind to your mother that day, you will be spoilt for choice. High on all the lists are suggestions for taking her to lunch, giving flowers, a card, or paying for her to have a day doing something she loves.

Whatever you choose to do, probably the best thing to give your mother must surely be yourself: some time and some love. Remind her of the funny and touching stories of your childhood and thank her for all the things that she did for you. Give her some good company and show her some gratitude. Let her know that you love her and appreciate her.

Remember that the Commandment 'Honour thy father and mother' was the first commandment that came with a promise of blessing on you, if you obey.

March Message

March 31st 2024 will be a memorable day. Not just because I will become a state pensioner then (exactly 14 days after Steve Lillicrap!). Not just because it is a fifth Sunday of the month and we have a United Benefice Service on these Sundays. Not just because the Bishop of Dover is coming to Teynham Church for our 10.30 am Benefice Holy Communion Service. But, chiefly because it is Easter Day. The resurrection of Jesus on Easter Day was God's response to Jesus' self-sacrifice of himself on the cross. It not only gave new life to Jesus but promised new life to all who trust in Him. It opens up the way to immediate eternal life, which is a right relationship with God starting in this life and blossoming in eternity. Death is defeated. Jesus is alive, today, so we can have a relationship with Him through God's Holy Spirit. The Bible says that He is at God's right hand, praying for people, waiting to return to take



those who know and love Him to be with God forever.

You may have noticed that I started off talking about Jesus, not the Bishop of Dover. I am sure that she would agree with this. The last time she was in our Benefice was when she licensed me as Associate Priest at Newnham Church on 28th September.

The Rt Revd Rose Hudson-Wilkin, was born in Jamaica and, at age 14, felt called to serve God. She was ordained to the priesthood in 1994. After serving as an Assistant Curate and working in a diocesan role in the Midlands, she served as a priest for sixteen and a half years in Hackney, North East London. In 2007, she was appointed as a Chaplain to Her Majesty the Queen and in 2010, she became the first female Chaplain to the Speaker of the House of Commons. In that role she led prayers in the House of

Commons and provided pastoral care to MPs and staff. In November 2014, Bishop Rose became the Priest in Charge of the city Church, St Mary-at-Hill near Monument.

In 2019, Bishop Rose was given the Order of Distinction by the Jamaican Government (Rank of Commander) and was awarded an MBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours list. In November 2019. she was consecrated and installed in Canterbury Cathedral as the Bishop of Dover with the responsibility for the diocese of Canterbury for the Archbishop of Canterbury. She has a vibrant faith and is a very good speaker, so I would encourage anyone and everyone to come and worship the risen Jesus with Bishop Rose at Teynham Church. It is a large church, so there will be space for many people to come, and you will receive a warm welcome. Rev'd Jim Pye

Looking for the Resurrection

An old couple are driving down the motorway when the wife gets a call from their daughter. 'Mum, there's a car driving the wrong way down the motorway!' The wife warns her husband that there is a lunatic on the motorway. Her husband, clutching the wheel in terror, replies: 'One lunatic? There are dozens of them, all headed straight for us!'

What we see is determined by our perspective on life.

In the Nicene Creed we say: 'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.' In the gospel accounts of the Resurrection, there is a lot of looking and seeing. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of

Salome went early to the tomb. They saw the stone rolled aside and inside the tomb a young man dressed in white said to them:

James and





'Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him...He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him' (Mark 16: 6,7).

Like the women we would probably have been left 'trembling and bewildered' by what we saw that morning. Had the body been taken? Was the young man an angel or deceiver? Was Jesus raised to life again, or was this an elaborate hoax?

Easter gives us a choice. We can approach life looking for disappointment, fear and despair. Or we can look for resurrection and



find not just an empty tomb, but encounter the living Christ. He continues to meet us in our daily lives bringing new hope, forgiveness of sin, healing and wholeness and the assurance of His presence through the darkest of times. God invites us to see our lives differently and look for Christ's resurrection life at work in our lives and the people around us.



Reflecting Faith: Lychgates

On the moors near to where I used to live in West Yorkshire, there were a couple of large stones with crosses marked on them. Many people thought that they were boundary or marker stones, and in so far as they marked the way towards the oldest church in that area they were. To be more exact, they were on the route towards the oldest churchyard.

In ages past bodies were carried by hand, sometimes over long distances, and there were restrictions placed on where they could be laid to allow the bearers to rest. These two stones were 'resting' stones.

When a body arrived at the church for burial, it would again be put down while the administrative formalities were carried out, and again the bearers could rest. So, a resting stone was placed at the edge or start of the consecrated land around the church.

The priest conducting the funeral would meet the cortege here, not originally out of respect, but rather to receive the required legal certificate for burial before he allowed them to enter the church grounds.

Because of typical English weather - rain and wind - it was usually sheltered, and benches were built for the bearers. There would also be a cross within the construction to signify the start of holy land. This is what today we call the 'lych-gate'; lych coming from the anglo-saxon word *lich* or *lic*, related to the modern German word *leiche*, all meaning corpse.

Few old lychgates remain today, as many were destroyed or damaged after the Reformation, and most of those that survived were constructed of timber and have since decayed. In the eighteenth century, when the use for the resting stones and thus lychgates declined, many were removed and replaced with gates, often retaining the shelter as it continues to be a meeting place for the priest to receive funeral parties.

This month

Try and visit a lychgate this month and actually spend a few moments under its shelter. Have a think about what burdens you want to lay down. From what do you need to be sheltered?
