He is risen!

If you come to one of our churches in April or the first week of May this year, you cannot fail to notice the minister's bidding: *He is risen!* to which all respond: *He is risen indeed! Alleluia!* The resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead is at the heart of what we believe as Christians. Of course his humble birth in a stable, the miracles that he performed and the way that he taught his disciples are important: we learn about all of those through the year. But we already had the miracles and teachings of the prophets before the birth of Jesus. However, on Good Friday we remember that Jesus took our sins with him to the Cross and died for us, and on Easter Day we rejoice that he conquered death and rose again, having defeated evil and conquered death. He showed us that death is not the end and thereby transformed the way that we should regard our lives. He showed what it means to have a God whose love for mankind is never ending. No prophets before then or since have done all that.

By the time you read this it will probably be too late to encourage you to come to one of our special Easter services: the Maundy Thursday vigil, the Good Friday meditation and devotional services or the Dawn Eucharist on Easter Day itself. But please do come if you read this before the end of March. However, we have services each Sunday throughout April and May when we will be celebrating the resurrection, including our Ascension Day service at Broughton at 7pm on Thursday 9th May, when we commemorate the risen Jesus' ascension to Heaven to reign with his Father, so that he can be present in all of our hearts.


I have agreed to start confirmation classes for those who have not been confirmed yet and would like to understand our faith more fully and to proceed to confirmation by

Nat was born on 22nd September 1920 in the Victoria Tower of the Houses of Parliament, where his maternal grandfather Sir Thomas Butler was Yeoman Usher to the Black Rod. His father was a regular soldier in the Royal Artillery and his governess encouraged his love of cricket.

He attended St David's Reigate from 1929, then Eton College from 1934 to 1939, where he was Captain of the XI. As war broke out, he went up to New

He joined the Royal Warwickshire Regiment as a private soldier at the end of 1939. His middle brother, Ingel, was killed aged 19 on his first operational flight, shot down over the Mediterranean in 1941. His youngest brother, Oliver, became Dean of Lincoln in

1969.

Nat was commission into the 8th Battalion, Rifle Brigade, becoming Adjutant in 1943. He landed at Juno Beach in Normandy on D-Day + 7, part of Operation Epsom in the heavy fighting on Hill 112 and Operation Goodwood near Caen.

He went into the concentration camp at Bergen-Belsen the day after it was discovered in April 1945. He ended the war as Military Governor of the island of Sylt, off the coast of northern Germany. He joined MECAS – the Middle East Centre for Arab Studies – in Jerusalem, and in 1946 became a Staff Officer at HQ in Palestine.

He returned home and began training to be a Chartered Surveyor, qualifying in the early 1950s. After a time with Lofts and Warner, and then John D. Wood, he set up in partnership with George Laws. Laws and Fiennes continues to manage properties and estates.

He married Mariette Helena Salisbury-Jones on 4th December 1958 in St Margaret's, Westminster. They moved to Broughton Castle in 1968.

toiletries. We managed to raise £200 from the generous donations given at the lunch. Lindsay Mills gave an informative short talk about the charity and the work that has been going on to do collections since the start of the war.

The church has also been awarded a grant of £8000, by OHCT, towards the cost of plasterwork and limewashing, due to be completed during the summer, and later than expected.


Attendances at services were at a 20 year high in 2023, thanks to several weddings, but are relatively small compared to the total village population.
