

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Part of my wider role within the diocese is as a vocations adviser, helping people to discern their calling from God, most notably to Licensed Lay Ministry or ordination but also to other roles within the Church. I encourage everyone to think about who God is calling them to be and what God is calling them to do.

Having St Paul as the patronal saint of one of our two churches we are very familiar with the account of Saul's conversion. He was an extremely zealous Jew who believed that those who followed Jesus were going against God. He hunted for followers of Jesus so he could arrest and kill them for what they believed. But Saul had to face the fact that he had been wrong all of his life when Jesus came to him on the road to Damascus and blinded him with a bright light. Saul changed from hating Jesus to loving Jesus and became known as Paul the Apostle who had a gift for encouraging others. We see this running through his letters. He affirmed, encouraged and enabled. He responded to who God was calling him to be and then helped others to do the same. Vocational discernment and recognition of people's gifts and God's calling isn't an individual activity, but part of the whole Church's journey

I want to share a poem called The Summer Day by Mary Oliver to help us to reflect on our calling:

Who made the world? Who made the swan, and the black bear? Who made the grasshopper? This grasshopper, I mean the one who has flung herself out of the grass, the one who is eating sugar out of my hand, who is moving her jaws back and forth instead of up and down who is gazing around with her enormous and complicated eyes. Now she lifts her pale forearms and thoroughly washes her face. Now she snaps her wings open, and floats away. I don't know exactly what a prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass, how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields, which is what I have been doing all day. Tell me, what else should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon? Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

The heart of the poem are the lines - Tell me, what else should I have done? Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

Our lives are wild and precious precisely because they're given and chosen by God. In the light of this truth, the question is one we turn to God to for an answer. Because, finding and following our calling doesn't start with ourselves, but with God. God has a plan for each of our lives. Of course, because God designed them. It's not an obligatory plan – God will be there even if we don't follow it. God's plan for us is one for our flourishing and fruitfulness. We don't fail if we err or stray from it. Rather it's a rolling plan that meets us where we are and evolves as our wild and precious lives unfolds, just as we saw with the example of Saul.

As you seek God's plan you might want to hold on to three key truths:

First, God calls each and every one of us, no matter where we're at – because God made each of us and God loves each of us, just as we are. Second, God can and does use just about anything to equip us and point us towards the adventure he has in store for us.

Third, God's plan involves our future flourishing and fulfilment – redeeming the past, not limited by it.

So, I offer thanks and celebrate those people using their gifts and skills in the service of God in both of our churches, affirming them and the things they are doing so well. I pray for those yet to discover how they might use their gifts for God, and how we might help them discover the different ways the Church might enable them to use their gifts.

The words of the hymn by Frances Ridley Havergal – go like this .....

Take my life, and let it be, consecrated, Lord, to thee; take my moments and my days, let them flow in ceaseless praise.

Ask God to open your eyes, ears and heart –so you might begin to imagine all that he longs to do through you.

If you feel called to serve our church in any way please pray about it and speak to me.

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### **Update on Secret Santa**

St Paul's church and Holy Trinity, Freckleton raised a grand total of 80 parcels for homeless people in this area. 50 parcels went to the Foxton homeless centre in Preston and 30 to the YMCA home for young people, on Dock Road, Lytham.( At this time I am unsure how many other parcels were raised elsewhere.)

The Foxton Centre, on Fox Street, Preston, offers free breakfasts, showers, washing machine facilities, changes of clothes and new toiletries as well as advice to people on the streets. They now have a pile of super presents to give out as well.

Each parcel also had a Christmas card and a copy of the Gospel booklet "Outside/In" which tells the nativity story from the point of view of the "outsiders" in the story. (There are free copies to be taken at the back of church.)

### **Patronal Festival**

The feast of the patron saint or title of a church, school, religious order, or other organization. The custom of having a patron saint can be traced to the practice of building churches over the tombs of martyrs. Patron saints may be chosen for a variety of reasons. For example, a church that was founded on a saint's day might have that saint as patron. Some patron saints are associated with particular countries, regional or ethnic backgrounds, or forms of ministry. St. David is the patron saint of Wales, and St. Luke is the patron saint of physicians. The patronal festival is usually the feast of the church or organization's title, but in some cases the patron is not mentioned in the title of the church or organization. The feast of a church's patron or title may be observed on or transferred to a Sunday, taking precedence over the usual Sunday observance in the calendar of the church year. This substitution may not be made in the seasons of Advent, Lent, or Easter

Our Patronal Festival is on Sunday, January 21<sup>st</sup> at 9.45am and everyone is cordially invited to share this special occasion with us.

Paul the Apostle was an eventual follower of Jesus (though not one of the Twelve Apostles) who professed the gospel of Christ to the first-century world. He is commonly regarded as one of the most influential figures of the Apostolic Age. He founded several churches in Asia Minor and Europe. He took advantage of his standing as both a Jew and a Roman citizen to counsel to both Jewish and Roman audiences.

According to records in the New Testament and before his conversion, Paul was committed to persecuting the early followers of Jesus in the region of Jerusalem. In the account of the Acts of the Apostles Paul was travelling on the road from Jerusalem to Damascus with the purpose to "arrest them and bring them back to Jerusalem" when the resurrected Jesus appeared to him in a great light. He was struck blind, but after three days his sight was renewed by Ananias of Damascus and Paul began to preach that Jesus of Nazareth is the Messiah and the Son of God. Approximately half of the book of Acts deals with Paul's life and works.

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It has been wonderful to welcome the children and families back to school for 2024. In December it was lovely to welcome Bishop Phillip, Rev. Anne Beverley and our very own Rev. Tracy Swindells into school. Bishop Phillip led our Worship and then had a tour of the school. The children asked Bishop Phillip lots of questions about his role and how he serves God.



This half term our Gospel Value is "Hope".



At St. Paul's we have high hopes and aspirations for our future, our school and community. We also understand that faith gives us hope for both now and for the future, and that this hope brings confidence. Hope for us means that there is always a future whatever situation we are in, because God promised to never leave us, to always love us, and to help us in times of need.

What makes hope a distinctively Christian value?

Christian hope is rooted in God's love for us. Christians believe that: God has our best interests at heart; God will never leave us; God will provide for us when we are in need; God knows us (even the number of hairs on our head!); and God promises us of a better life to come. When we are in our darkest time, God is there, and will help us. Hope is grounded in the character of God; the Bible is full of stories of how God changes situations.

We see hope shown in the Christian narrative in many ways. The resurrection gives us hope for eternal life. The gospel stories tell of hope, for example, the woman who touched Jesus' robe ("If I just touch his clothes I will be healed."). The rainbow after the flood is a sign that God will never break his covenant of love with us. God used Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt, when slavery seemed their destiny. The lost coin and the lost sheep tell us of the lengths God will go to bring us back.
