Adrian Long gave us a fascinating talk about the Archives of the late Mr. Martin Ramsbottom. He died in 2021.

A County Librarian in his working life, Martin was best known locally as a leading authority on the history of Kirkham and author of many publications.

He was a passionate enthusiast of local history, always keen to share his knowledge and expertise with others. He loved leading walking tours of Kirkham for local groups, and published several books and pamphlets, including his "town trail"

Martin was one of the driving forces behind the establishment of the Kirkham-in-Amounderness Museum in the 1990's, but it had to close when its premises were sold.

He was the author of a published "History of the Church", and of his family's long-standing connection to the Church. He bequeathed the extensive personal archives and memorabilia which formed the core of the Kirkham Museum's content to the care of St Michael's, the town's Parish Church.

The presentation Adrian gave was entirely the work of Martin Ramsbottom. It told of a Domesday Book settlement and a medieval borough; Kirkham was for centuries the focal point of the surrounding villages. The centre of a large ecclesiastical parish of fifteen townships, a market town and, later, the railway gateway to the Fylde's coastal resorts.



Changes have, however, done much to reduce its position in the area and its role is now largely that of a dormitory town. We saw a lot of photos of the surrounding settlements namely Freckleton, Lund, Warton, Treales, Wesham and Wrea Green, which were also recorded in the Doomsday Book.

We also learnt about the Roman Fortification which stood on top of Carr Hill, just a little way from Kirkham's town.

Adrian ended the talk by showing his own presentation of the changes taking place in Kirkham.

These are meant to create a much-improved Market Square that will allow greater use for markets and events, as well as the narrowing of roads and widening pavements to increase pedestrian space and creation of outdoor seating/dining areas.

Thank you to members who made the lovely cakes for our Mothering Sunday Cake stall. And to everyone who bought the cakes. The money raised will be sent to the Mothers' Union Make a Mothers' Day Wish appeal.

A PEEP AT PAST WARTON

Our wander down memory lane takes us this month to West End Lane, photographed here before the three-centuries-old "cruck" cottages were demolished as the modern builder arrived. These were typical Fylde houses built on timber supports having walls of clay and cobbles from the shore.

Sadly, by the time this photograph was taken the thatch had long since gone under corrugated iron, the trouble and expense of its replacement being too great for many in the 20th century. The last resident of the cottage shown here was one John Hogarth who had lived in only two houses from his birth in 1879.

He was born in a thatched cottage next to the Clifton Arms, (actually, two knocked into one) with its clay floor and timber crucks. At age 24 with the princely sum of £13 in the bank he married Emmeline Hankinson and moved to West End Lane. His bride worked at Balderstone Mill in Freckleton, starting work at 6.00am and, as he also had to be at work at a very early hour, the young couple saw their home in daylight, for months on end, only on Sundays!

The whole family lived on West End Lane before they moved to Lytham Road and then my Grandfather [who was baptised at St. Paul's and attended the school] worked and lodged at Bryning Hall Farm. Interesting connections!

Charities we love



The Foxton Centre, Preston.

Number 3, Fox Street in Preston has an inconspicuous front door and belongs to an old building - quite unlike the YMCA home in Lytham that was purpose-built in 2007. Go down some steep steps inside and you are in the basement of Preston Central Methodist Church (built 1817) and you are in the Foxton Centre. That church has supported the poor since as long ago as the cotton famine & more recently, from about the 1980s, had a soup kitchen and an overnight shelter for homeless people. Funding was given by the government to the charity "Methodist Action NW" which enabled the Centre to expand & be successful up to 2020. Covid then hit them, as it did all of us, and the space stood vacant.

In the meantime, another homelessness charity (Foxton) was looking for premises and the church was more than happy to let them have the basement. Church members still volunteer at the Foxton Centre and we have also supported the Centre for the last 18 months.

We do this in 3 ways:

- Linked with Graham from Freckleton Methodists we donate new items such as knitted hats and scarves; T-shirts; socks; underwear; gloves.
- Linked with Holy Trinity we collect seasonal gifts & last year we were able to donate several HUGE bags of Easter eggs and Christmas presents & cards.

 Linked with our own Fred Taylor and Warton Singers, we have given more than 30 bags of warm outdoor clothes since January.

Inside the centre there are hot showers, washing machines, clean clothes and the offer of a free breakfast every weekday. In the afternoon advice sessions are held, covering issues such as finding accommodation; finding a GP & optician; sorting finances; staying safe & healthy; reconnecting with family.

There is also a vital weekly outreach system on the streets and a children's fun space in a park in Frenchwood, financed by Children in Need and the National Lottery.

In the overall scheme of things we know that we do not have the resources to bring homelessness in Preston to an end, but it seems to me that the small gestures that we do make help to cheer up not only the clients of the Foxton Centre, but also the staff & volunteers. Everything we take is always gratefully received.
