Message From The Team Rector

By the time you are reading this we will have celebrated Easter, the clocks will have gone forward lengthening our evenings, and Spring will most definitely be in the air. So, I'd like to take this opportunity to mention our Annual Parochial Church Meetings. Meetings for each Parish will take place around this time of year. These meetings are a chance to hear reports on the life of our church communities, ask questions, and to elect people to help with the leadership of the church for the following year. They are an important part of the churches year and I encourage you to come along and take your part.

My grateful thanks go to all who have so capably steered our churches through this past year. I recognise that, with clergy vacancies, this is not an easy task. It's not necessarily easy with clergy in post either, to be honest. However, it is a task that needs doing if we are to fulfil our task to "proclaim afresh the Gospel is each generation." This is also a time to thank all those who labour, often behind the scenes, in caring for our church buildings and ensuring they continue to run and be available to their communities. Thank you all.

There is a lot that goes in to the proper leading of a church. The Vicar is paid to play a part in that admittedly, but there's just no way a Vicar can carry out that leadership effectively without the help of a committed group of people; that's the Parochial Church Council. Anyone whose on the Electoral Roll can become a member of the PCC, either as a general member or as a churchwarden, secretary, treasurer or Deanery Synod representative. Each role requires a different commitment but offers a different reward. With shared responsibility no one role need become too onerous, and there's always support on offer from the Diocesan Office.

I would like each person who is on the electoral role of our churches to consider and pray whether they ought to become involved in the PCC in a particular role. I am available to explain what each role entails and how you could be supported in it.

It was at that first Easter that Jesus handed over responsibility to his followers and made their success possible. For reasons known only to God he did not choose experts, nor those who together would make the perfect team. He chose ordinary people, plus a few troublemakers, and did something extraordinary through them. He still works that way it seems.

Wimbish Primary Academy is an exciting place to be at the moment! We continue to work on bringing learning to life, providing the children with hands on experiences to enrich and inspire.

Investment:

During the past term and a half, we borrowed 10 ipads from another school in our Trust to use with our children. We have seen the huge benefits of these and we decided to make a big investment which saw us purchase sets of Apple ipads for the school. Each ipad comes with a pencil and case with a keyboard to support the children to use them for learning. We have bought enough ipads for all Willow Class and Birch Class to have one each to use in school, allocated to them personally (with the hope in the very near future that these may be taken home for homework as well) and for Oak to have a set for sharing in the classroom. To celebrate this exciting new investment we welcomed the local press into school for the big reveal. You can see our article in the Walden Local. It was wonderful to see the delight on pupils' faces when the iPads were revealed. We now look forward to reviewing how these devices not only benefit pupils but our teaching and support staff, too. In addition to supporting academic growth, the iPads will enable teachers to create individual learning styles, promoting a more inclusive and responsive educational approach.

Learning:

Key Stage 2 recently participated in a Science workshop with Cambridge Science Centre. This was an exciting event that enabled children to ask questions and explore topics further. The first session was on sound, where the children studied the ear and how sounds travel. They were shown demonstrations of this using every-day objects - which fascinated the them. We were then immersed into learning about the function of food and why it is important to have a balanced diet. It was great to see all of Key Stage 2 working together throughout the sessions building protein chains and understanding how these work. We then took the learning back to the classroom to explore further through an independent learning project.

On the 7th March it was world book day. As a school we read the book 'Flooded' and then each class spent the day exploring the themes in different ways. Oak Class discovered a real disaster in their outside area as the rabbits needed rescuing from the flood but the children couldn't step in the flood water as the rabbits had taken their wellies and waterproofs with them. The children were so good at working together to find a solution just like the characters in 'Flooded'. They used their problem solving skills, communication skills and strength to build a bridge across, but then they got stuck on the bridge so they had to work together to pass all the wellies and rabbits back!! Thankfully they did it and no animals or children were harmed in the process!

Willow class explored why World Book Day is important, and what reading means to them. One fabulous answer to this question was: "Reading makes me feel joyful because I can explore new universes!" They created an acrostic poem using the title of the book, 'Flooded', and it was lovely to see all of the different ideas and writing styles from the children. They then delved deeper into the underlying meaning of the book and had a fantastic class discussion about why it is important to tell people our problems.

Behaviour and Attitudes:

The children continue to work incredibly hard both individually and as a team on following the 'Wimbish Way', earning merits and golden apples for demonstrating wonderful walking, super sitting, lovely listening and quiet queueing. We are incredibly proud of them!

Community:

We are delighted to have 3 regular community helpers who come into school each week to listen to readers. The children are so excited when it is their turn to read and are recognising how they are now reading with more confidence, fluency and intonation. If you have any spare time and

have a skill of interest (we are actively seeking people who could support with art, music, gardening, Forest School) which could support our children, please do get in touch. We do require all volunteers to have a DBS check which we can arrange.

Get Outside in Lent

Monday during Lent a small group have been meeting at All Saints' Wimbish loosely following the Salisbury Diocese resources for Lent. What was perceived by some to be little more than nature study, quickly evolved into a thought provoking and inspirational faith centred activity with bible readings, prayers, time outside and time to reflect. We focussed on the gifts from God of the beauty and bounty of the natural world.

We saw and discussed the way trees shape the countryside, reaching their' arms' up to heaven – providing shelter and food for birds and other creatures.

Graeme spoke eloquently about his feelings for trees and sent me this piece to include here: "We were completely free to walk and wander around the Wimbish Church Yard and enjoy the atmosphere, the sunshine, the plants, the flowers. the birds and our own thoughts. After what Fran had said I found myself seeing trees in a new way; looking at them memorably and finding warmth on my hands where the sun had shone on the bark. In these moments when my hands rested upon and cherished the tree it was good to be able to linger. I believe that I will more keenly have a desire to look at trees, see them, understand them and ask myself questions".

We followed on by looking closely at many spring flowers and Sue said the beautiful, scented cascade of white lacy blossom made her think of 'The Bride of Christ' with confetti of white petals at her feet. After looking at the flowers we thought about the importance of seeds. Plants and trees grow mainly from seed so seed comes in great variety. We looked at samples of seed and were shown how quickly a bean could grow given good conditions (planted the previous week).

Spring is when many insects are drawn from their winter rest by rising temperatures, the bright colours and myriad scents of the spring flowers and they emerge ready to resume their tasks of pollination, waste disposal and working in the beehives. Other than the industry of insects many are a joy to observe.

Every living thing depends on the gift of water which sustains us all, providing the babbling of brooks, the tranquillity of still lakes and the power of rushing torrents and stormy seas reflecting the sky in so many ways. In the trees birds sing joyfully, they distribute seeds and also cull grubs and slugs from our gardens while providing beauty and pleasure for all.

All in all we collectively and individually learned more about the wonders of the natural world and God's love for all his creation.

Janet Remembers..

Skills and Occupations

Wimbish in the past was home to a surprising number of skilful and of necessity, very hard-working people. As a community, we were almost self-sufficient, with the possible exception of a butcher. The Post Office at Howlett End was the home of Mr & Mrs Herbert Buck and sold everything. Half was an extensive grocery shop and the Post Office side had clothes, rubber boots, kitchenware and anything for the household. Across the road were sheds which had many uses. The one I remember contained a large tank of paraffin, for which there was continual demand, as that was the main source of light and also of heat for cooking. Previously Mr Benjamin Buck had made coffins and arranged funerals; one shed was the 'killing shed' used for the slaughter of animals and another housed a large mangle, which was hired out to women on wash days.

At this time Mr Munson owned the mill in Mill Road, which was driven by the wind, but also Olive Smith remembers her uncle Will Swan saying that when he left school at the age of 12, his first job was to lead a horse which operated the mill when there was no wind.

Jack Parkin was a cobbler who lived with his wife Sally at Cobblers Cottage in Mill Road. He had a club foot but was able to chase boys who were scrumping his apples. Ben Taylor said that when he was a boy, Jack made him a pair of boots which he could wear on either foot!

Mr 'Hubby' Frost was a hurdle maker and lived at Howlett End. Hurdles were a very important part of farming equipment, particularly for confining animals and building lambing pens etc. Mr Frost made his hurdles from certain kinds of wood which were easily split, such as hazel, and he cut his poles from the nearby wood. His work was in great demand and hurdle making is one of the ancient skills you now see demonstrated at County Shows and similar events.

Mr Mynot lived at Lower Green, beside a mill which was no longer working. However, the bakery was there and Mr Mynot provided bread for the village and delivered it in a bread van pulled by a horse. The baker went from door to door with a huge basket, so customers could make their selection. I remember during the war (when bread was rationed) he also brought meal which was rationed to help feed the chickens.

I have recently completed the Church accounts ready for the Annual Parish Church Meeting on April 15th. Andrew Walters has kindly undertaken the role of independent examiner for which we are most grateful.

The accounts show that we can just pay our way when we consider general running costs and that if we have a 'crisis', serious thought has to be given to how we pay. In the last two years we have had to take monies from our meagre savings to pay for roof repairs and tree maintenance.

Our latest, unforeseen, problem is the heating system. This has been in situ for over 25 years and needs a thorough overhaul. The organ also needs new bearings and is not currently playable. We also have St Paul's Mission to look after. Unexpected expenditure this year has been the need of a replacement window.

We have a generous congregation and supporters whose financial assistance is essential. But we do need more funds. The Society's logo is a wood-cut by the late Eric Ravilious.

Eric Ravilious and Edward Bawden were both Royal College of Art students when, on a cycling holiday, they happened upon Great Bardfield in Essex. There, they rented Brick House, starting a fascinating period for the village. Over the next two decades, numerous artists came to live there; they became known as The Bardfield Artists.

In 1932 Bawden married fellow student Charlotte Epton, a potter, and his father bought Brick House as a wedding present for them. In the same year Ravilious married Tirzah Garwood, an artist and engraver, and they lodged for a while with the Bawdens at Brick House.

Bawden's work can be seen today on three Victoria Line stations - Victoria, Tottenham Hale and Highbury & Islington - for which he designed the logos.

Another artist, John Aldridge, bought Place House in Great Bardfield in 1933 and soon became friends with Bawden. They produced Bardfield Wallpaper together for the company Cole & Sons to distribute.

In 1952, painter Stanley Clifford-Smith moved into Bucks House and later to the Old Bakehouse. He was very involved in Open House exhibitions that were held in the 1950s when the public could view and buy art in the studios and homes where it had been created.

Marianne Straub, a textile designer, moved to Great Bardfield in 1953, buying Trinity Cottage. She was the senior designer for Warner & Sons of Braintree.
