

The Wonders of BBC i-Player!

On Easter Sunday, just before 'Songs of Praise' began on BBC1, I happened upon 'Gareth Malone's Messiah' on the television. (I want to make it clear that I don't consider myself to be a couch-potato and we *had* just come back from an Easter Day service **and** 'Songs of Praise' is a Sunday staple) Since we were expecting visitors and it was almost over, I didn't get to see much but thanks to modern technology, I was able to return to it another day. It was well worth it.

We're often told that singing is good for the soul. It lifts our spirits, releases endorphins around our bodies and enables us to look at life from a better perspective. I'm a child of the 50s and 60s so my first interest in (pop) music began with Frank Ifield and Cliff Richard! Gareth Malone, a gifted musician, is well known for roaming the countryside looking for community choirs. This time he was looking for eight people who had no previous experience of formal choral singing, with the intention of training them to sing with a professional choir and orchestra within a few weeks. He encouraged any one to apply who loved to sing, whether it was in the car, in the shower or dancing around the kitchen or bedroom with a wooden spoon or hairbrush for a microphone. Do you remember those days?

I have to confess to being a bit of a dunce when it comes to classical music—my experience being mainly from school days, when I was in the School Choir. I'm not sure how I made the cut, because I can't read music, but the audition was to belt out the school song to the music teacher one lunchtime and somehow I squeezed in. My claim to fame was that we recorded Handel's Messiah on vinyl record. Sad to say that cash wasn't abundant at home and my parents felt it was a waste of resources to purchase said recording. However, I've always been drawn to Handel's Messiah. It tells the story of Jesus, from the prophecies of a coming Messiah, through his birth and resurrection and final return as prophesied in the book of Revelation. I agree with Gareth Malone that you can't help but be touched by both the words and the stirring music.

Whilst hymns and modern worship songs cover a wide spectrum, they contain words and themes taken directly from the Bible—the Holy Scriptures. Musicians and songwriters have been inspired by the words, often from the Psalms, and have written hymns and composed music which have lasted for generation after generation.

On the opposite page is the story behind a more recent hymn, 'Alleluia, Alleluia, Give Thanks to the Risen Lord', most appropriate for this Easter season as we move onwards from Christ's resurrection, through his appearances to more than 500 people and finally to his return to heaven (Ascension Day) and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. So much to look forward to!

Whatever our taste in music, there is no doubt that there is a spiritual element to singing, whether it is alone in privacy or together in a group or choir. Psalm 98:4-6 says, "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth—let your cry ring out and sing praises."

So keep on singing, wherever and however you do it!

The Story Behind The Hymn

'Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks to the Risen Lord'

Not many university students are able to write Christian songs which become worldwide hits, but Don Emry Fishel managed it with his hymn, 'Alleluia, Alleluia, Give Thanks to the Risen Lord', known as 'Alleluia No. 1'. Nearly 50 years on, it is loved and sung by millions of Christians worldwide. Fishel wrote it in 1971, while he was a student at the University of Michigan and also music leader of a Roman Catholic charismatic community based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. These were the days of folk songs and guitars, and Alleluia No. 1 fitted the prevailing mood perfectly. Written in E Major, it is ideal for guitar accompaniment.

Mr Fishel became a freelance flutist, flute instructor and composer. He was publications editor for the Word of God and Servant Music for a number of years and then worked in computers for 25 years. In 2008 he moved to Nashville and returned to music, teaching the flute. Alleluia No 1 was Fishel's first song, written "rather quickly, in about an hour." It had four verses to begin with, but a fifth verse (which became the third verse) was added later, as he prepared for baptism. As Fishel explained, he wanted the line 'We have been crucified with Christ; now we shall live forever' "to be the centre of the song."

The hymn was first published in the UK in Sound of Living Waters, in 1974.

On why you should never encourage your congregation

My dear Nephew Darren,

I have to say that the couple who complained that you never noticed they had been missing from church for a month had a point. There is a simple way of noticing when someone is absent: everyone sits in the same pew. Every Sunday. Always.

Little Miss Margison sits in the pew after the third pillar on the right here at St James the Least. As she walks up the aisle, you can sense her counting the pillars until she reaches the right one, which then allows her to sit in front of it. I have speculated that if I ever had that pillar removed, then the following Sunday, she would have a complete mental collapse.

One Sunday a visiting family arrived early and sat down; three people in an empty church seating 200. Colonel Wainwright and his wife were the first of our regulars to arrive and froze in horror. The Colonel said in a deafening whisper to his wife: "There's someone sitting in our pew."

At least they had the grace – no matter how reluctant – for one week, to sit somewhere else. Unlike the Prentice family of husband, wife and three children, who arrived to discover that a visiting family of husband, wife and four children were sitting in their pew; six people in a pew that held eight. Or, it normally holds eight. That Sunday, it held thirteen.

We at least have one iconoclast in Miss Pemberton, who makes a point of sitting in a different place every week. This thoroughly unsettles the rest of the congregation, who fear she may sit in their seats during her nomadic wanderings. I sometimes wonder if she has a chart at home with all the pew spaces marked on it and she strikes one off each week as she returns home after Mattins.

Occasionally the unexpected can happen. Mrs Cholmondeley arrived one week in good time, settled herself in her accustomed place, but half-way through the Service suddenly ran out of the building. Ten minutes later, she was back and in her usual place once again. When the church filled with the smell of burned bacon, we understood.

That is why replacing pews with chairs in your church was a mistake. Pews can never be moved. You know where everybody is – or should be!





Letter from Westminster

The increased costs being faced by everyone this April is a serious challenge. I continue to raise with the Government the need to support our hospitality businesses with a VAT cut and warn about the dangers of tax increases on businesses. Many constituents have also got in touch with me to explain how the welfare reforms will affect them and their loved ones. I am launching a survey to collect more views and pass them on to Ministers. We must encourage people back to work while properly supporting those who are unable to do so.

I spoke with the BBC about the campaign being run by local constituent Rachel Baker on family access to mortuaries. Rachel's son, Joe, an accomplished aircraft engineer, tragically lost his life in a road traffic accident in November 2023. The family were denied access to his body for 10 days despite many desperate appeals. I am supporting Rachel's heroic campaign and petition to improve the support offered to families in this most tragic of circumstances. After my initial enquiry, Ministers said there were no plans to change these rules, so I have requested a meeting with Ministers to explain the hurt this policy causes families.

Potholes blight rural areas like South Shropshire, costing the owners of damaged vehicles almost £400 each year. So, I was delighted when the last government committed £8.3 billion towards resurfacing 5,000 miles of road as part of a decade long repair scheme. I am calling on Ministers to stand by the previously announced investment for Shropshire. It would equip the Council with the certainty needed to plan ahead. I am also urging residents who have experienced potholes and other problems with road surfaces to tell me about it as part of my new Pothole Patrol initiative.

Backing our farmers is a key part of my plan for South Shropshire. They are the backbone of our rural economy. So, I was delighted to welcome Shadow Farming Minister Robbie Moore to South Shropshire recently. We met with local farmers and representatives from the National Farmers Union at a third-generation family farm near Craven Arms. We discussed the impact of government policies and how farmer confidence can be restored. Shropshire has the highest number of farms per county in England, so this is an issue that is very important for our rural economy.

South Shropshire is, in my view, the most beautiful constituency in the country. It was great to celebrate this in my photo competition - there is still time to vote for a winner on my website. Our countryside is cherished by us all and must be protected for future generations to enjoy. It is critical residents have the confidence that any new applications which come forward for development are judged fairly and openly, while guarding against encroachment on our precious countryside and the farmland that is vital for food security. I will continue to advocate for local consent in the planning system.

I have been visiting many local schools recently, from Stottesdon to Newcastle on Clun to Dorrington and Clee Hill. It is really great to meet with students who always have excellent questions. One issue that comes up often are financial constraints. In a recent announcement South Shropshire missed out on funding for nursery provision within primary schools. This is a significant rural challenge that I will be raising on behalf of constituents.

It was great to visit Clickingmad, a digital services company celebrating their 25th anniversary, and launch their '25 Acts of Kindness in 2025' initiative in Bridgnorth. Our small businesses are a cherished part of South Shropshire, so I was also delighted to recognise Ludlow Nutrition as the winner of my Small Business Awards, alongside 85 other nominated businesses. I continue to encourage businesses to take part in my small business survey.

An extract from my annual report, presented at The Annual Parish Meeting:

It has been an honour to spend another year as Chairman of the Parish Council. It can be a challenging role but it is very fulfilling to assist with improving our village and making sure every penny of your council tax which goes to Highley Parish Council is spent wisely. The Parish Council has changed significantly since I first joined over four years ago and I am proud of how we currently operate, getting things done and actually making a difference within our rather tight remit.

The Parish Council has been incredibly busy since I was stood here a year ago. Last year I spoke about our focus on liaison with the police and the formation of our Police Working Group. We have continued to work closely with our local Safer Neighbourhood Team and I have been very pleased to see a high level of co-operation, co-ordination and police presence in Highley with the local officers being based out of the Police Station in the Severn Centre whenever they are on shift. Since then we have increased our focus on young people in the village. We have always been involved and supportive of the Highley Reach youth club, but we took the decision to also form a wider Youth Working Group to allow us to address the requirements of the younger members of our community. It was great to see some teenagers actively involved in this, including attending meetings. I also convened an Anti Social Behaviour Task Force to address a rise in Anti Social Behaviour in the village. It was great to hear about all of the work already going on to address Anti Social Behaviour, not just from the police but also from the staff at the Severn Centre where a lot of the behaviour was taking place.

The last year has seen significant public participation in some Parish Council activities especially when they revolve around what may be seen as controversial planning applications. Whatever the result from the planning department at Shropshire Council I've been pleased with the level of community involvement in these issues, as a village far from Shrewsbury it's vital Shropshire Council remember we are here and that we will be heard! There is a national housing shortage and because of that it would be foolish to think we could prevent new houses being built in the village but we must ensure what ever is built here is suitable for the village and is accompanied by infrastructure improvements. The roads are falling apart with the amount of cars which are on them now let alone adding more.

As a new year in local government approaches I'm feeling positive about the effectiveness of Highley Parish Council, our current councillors are all fantastic and are all fully motivated to drive the village forward. We will continue to represent the people of Highley as they deserve to be represented, to operate professionally in all we do and to continue to instil a sense of pride in everyone living in the village.

Why you should draw your curtains at night (especially if you live in the country)

Most of us draw our curtains at night, in order to ensure privacy. But there is another very valid reason: to help protect local wildlife.

It seems that insects who live in the countryside are very susceptible to bright lights, which can badly disrupt their overall health and general behaviour.

As one scientist explained: “We don’t know exactly how fatal it is, but one estimate is that 33 per cent of all the insects attracted to light die before morning. And even if they don’t die, they’re spending all their time at the light instead of doing the things they’re supposed to be doing.”

Light pollution is now seen as adding to what some scientists have called “insect Armageddon”, with a 75 per cent decline in insect populations in 30 years. As one scientist said: “Small individual actions such as drawing curtains can make a big impact to our smallest creatures.”

An unexpected way to cut violent crime


How to get children to behave better? Feed them better. It seems that providing children with healthy diets and regular nutritional supplements can help reduce anti-social behaviour.

The charity Youth Endowment Fund (YEF) puts it this way: improving the nutritional diets of a child is ‘low cost’, but ‘likely to have a high impact on violent crime.’

A violence-reducing diet would include more fish, green vegetables and nuts, and fewer processed foods. Recent government-backed research has even found this may reduce violence in children by as much as 50 per cent. Just two examples: Iron, found in shellfish, red meat, liver, beans, broccoli and green leafy vegetables, improves cognition, memory and mood. Zinc, found in shellfish, legumes, meat and nuts, helps grow the brain. Regular nutritional supplements are also very helpful.



All in the Month of May

It was:

150 years ago, on 1st May 1875 that Alexandra Palace in London was officially opened. It became the home of BBC television in 1935.

125 years ago, on 17th May 1900 that during the Second Boer War, the 217-day Siege of Mafeking was relieved by 2000 British forces and South African volunteers. Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, who led the forces defending Mafeking during the siege, became a national hero, and later founded the Scouting movement.

90 years ago, on 19th May 1935 that T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) died in a motorcycle accident, aged 46. A British Army officer, military strategist, archaeologist and writer, he is best known for his activities in the Middle East during WW1.

Also 90 years ago, on 25th May 1935 that Sir Frank Watson Dyson, British Astronomer Royal (1910-33) died. He introduced the Greenwich time signal (the 'pips') and also, helped to prove Einstein's theory of general relativity.

80 years ago, on 1st May 1945 that German radio announced the death of Adolf Hitler. It was reported he had died a hero's death fighting, but in fact he had committed suicide.

Also 80 years ago, on 8th May 1945 that VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of WW2. It was celebrated as a public holiday.

75 years ago, on 13th May 1950 that the first Formula One World Championship race was held, at Silverstone. (Also known as the 1950 British Grand Prix.)

50 years ago, on 27th May 1975 that Dibble's Bridge Coach Crash in Hebden, North Yorkshire took place. 32 people were killed and 13 injured when a coach's brakes failed on a steep hill. It remains the worst road accident in the UK, by fatalities.

40 years ago, on 13th May 1985 that the pop album *Brothers in Arms* by Dire Straits was released. It became the world's most successful album released on compact disc, and the first CD album to sell over a million copies.

Also 40 years ago, on 29th May 1985 that the Heysel Stadium Disaster took place in Brussels. 39 football fans were crushed to death during rioting at the European Cup Final between Liverpool and Juventus.

Also 30 years ago, on 13th May 1995 that British mountaineer Alison Hargreaves became the first woman to reach the summit of Mount Everest unaided (without bottled oxygen or Sherpas.) She died later that year, in August, in a storm, while attempting to climb K2.

25 years ago, on 4th May 2000 that Ken Livingstone became the first Mayor of London.

Also 25 years ago, on 7th May 2000 that Vladimir Putin was inaugurated as President of Russia.

15 years ago, on 2nd May 2010 that during the Greek debt crisis, the European Union, European Central Bank and International Monetary Fund authorised a three-year 110 billion Euro bailout loan to Greece.

Also 15 years ago, on 6th May 2010 that the British General Election resulted in a hung parliament. A coalition government was formed on 11th May by the Conservative Party leader, David Cameron, and the Liberal Democrat party leader, Nick Clegg.



Do you Believe This?

Anyone who believes in me Will never die

John 11:25-26

Author Chuck Swindoll tells about a couple whose marriage had been a fifty-year battle. The husband died, and it fell to the wife to choose a gravestone. She contacted a stonemason and told him, 'I don't want to be fancy or spend a lot of money. Just engrave the words: "TO MY HUSBAND" in a suitable place on the stone.' She went to visit his grave and, to her horror, read these words: 'TO MY HUSBAND...IN A SUITABLE PLACE.'

Swindoll writes: 'A humorous story helps mask the pain and confusion surrounding death, but in the end, the laughter stops because death still comes. Humour, as good as it makes us feel, is powerless to stop the grim reaper. Remember the bumper sticker: "Don't take life too seriously, you won't get out alive"? Well, the truth is, we *should* take life and death seriously because we *do* get out alive. We all face life after death because we all have eternal souls. We'll live forever somewhere. The question is where. And the "where" depends on how we answer this question of Jesus: "Anyone who believes in me...will never ever die. Do you believe this...?'

Jesus alone has the power of resurrection. And our assurance of spending forever with Him in heaven depends on our response...If we say, "Yes," by asking Jesus to forgive our sins and commit to following Him as Lord – then and only then do we have His power for living at our disposal... only then can we face life's end with a calm...joyous expectation.

What's the Big Idea?

An introduction to the Old Testament Book of Ecclesiastes

'Meaningless! Meaningless!' This is how the book of Ecclesiastes begins (1:2), as it examines the futility of human experience *'under the sun'*. The author is named as *'The Teacher'* (1:1, Hebrew *qoheleth*), traditionally identified with King Solomon. Although focusing on life in the physical world, the book ends with, *'Fear God and keep his commandments'* (12:13).

Ecclesiastes reminds us of the limitation of human wisdom, which cannot find meaning and purpose without God:

Our strivings *'under the sun'* can only lead to disillusionment (1:5–11). Therefore, we need to accept the life God gives us and enjoy it to the full.

Wisdom is given to those who please God (2:26). Such wisdom cannot solve all problems (1:16–18), or secure enduring reward (2:12–17). We cannot control our immediate future, resulting in uncertainty (6:12), and there are difficult questions about life and death itself (9:1–3). In response, we need to understand our human limitations before God.

God has ordered all things in their time; things we cannot change or fully anticipate: *'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven'* (3:1–15).

However, the world is not fundamentally chaotic or irrational, as it is ordered by God: *'He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end.'* (3:11). We should remember our Creator when we are young before the infirmities of advanced age stop us from enjoying the good things of life (12: 1-8). In summary, Ecclesiastes shows us how to live meaningfully and joyfully by placing God at the centre of our life, while trusting and obeying our Creator.



Eggs in the oven - Charmaine

Whenever we used to put eggs in the compost heap, they always resurfaced, looking fairly intact. If you leave them overnight on a baking tray in the oven, after using it, they will go brittle. If you grind them up or crush them, they break down quicker and provide your compost with more calcium. Plants need calcium for strong cell walls, especially tomatoes and squash. The worms like them too (they help prevent the soil from becoming too acidic). Don't bin them - use them!



Chemicals in the water - David

If you are doing some painting in the dry weather, then think carefully about where your paint ends up. If you are using a roller tray or a paint kettle, don't spend time rinsing all the leftover paint down the drain and into our sewers. Leave it out to dry. When it builds up so much, you should be able to simply peel it off (especially if it is a plastic pot) and throw it in the bin. If you are doing more painting in the next month or so, get rid of the excess paint on the brush by painting something like a scrap of wood. Then submerge the bristles of the brush in a pot of water. This way, the air won't be able to dry the paint, and it will be ready to use (with a wipe on a cloth) next time!


Tree planting on the Orchard - Alastair

As part of our local nature recovery strategy in Highley, a few volunteers from the Parish Council's environmental group managed to plant a strip of native woodland on the Orchard in Garden Village. About 35 whips were planted, including rowan, hazel, wild cherry and silver birch. There was plenty of interest from residents, and they appear to be growing well. Not only will they provide a perfect habitat for local birdlife, they will (in time) offer some protection and shade to children playing on the field. The grass around the trees will be cut manually in September, and the arisings removed, in an attempt to reduce the fertility of the soil, and encourage more wildflowers to grow. It will be great to see these trees grow in our community, and attract more flora and fauna to the area!

Soaked oats - Aubrey

In the winter time sometimes we have porridge for breakfast. When it is warmer, and when we go on holiday we have soaked oats instead. Just pour the milk on the oats and leave them to swell up. You can eat them straight away, but the longer you leave them, the more it soaks in! Add some dried fruit and you won't be hungry until lunch time. Also, oats normally come in a paper bag, which is easy to recycle and avoids using any


