

St Michaels is presently preparing for the bishop's arrival on the 20th July, all aimed at Baptising 7 people and confirming 11. Men and Women, young and Old, students, employed and others. This day is indeed going to be a massive undertaking however it is an honour and a privilege to be in such a position to be assisting new disciples.

Also, we have three people now on a ministry discernment route, at various stages. Monastic, ordained, licenced lay ministry, and though it is still very early days for these people I would ask that you really do hold them in prayer alongside those being confirmed and baptised. Ordination season is underway

Every summer the C of E ordains its new deacons and priests. The services are traditionally held during Petertide (29th June), a feast day that remembers the martyrdom of Saint Peter. He was the fisherman who became a devoted disciple of Jesus, and who then went on to be an instrumental figure in the early Church in Jerusalem.

Although the ordinations this summer will be held in a variety of cathedrals across the country, those being ordained will have certain important things in common:

They will have felt called by God to serve as a deacon or priest.

They will have passed a rigorous selection process.

They will have completed a two-to-three-year training course (diploma or degree) at one the of theological education institutes (TEIs) based around the country.

And so here they are now – called, accepted, trained and soon to be set apart for this specialised ministry. If you know a deacon or a priest, pray for them and their families this month, as they begin a lifetime of public service to God.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held on **Sunday 18th May** after the service in the Church. There were around **34 people** in attendance.

As usual the first part of the APCM is the Vestry Meeting, this is to elect the Churchwardens for the ensuing year. Rosemary Lunt was standing down, as she has done her 6 years as Churchwarden. So there were two nominations (both Proposed and Seconded), they were Chris Challoner and Robbie Littler and both were elected as churchwardens.

The next part is the general part of the APCM, is where the reports from various groups were presented to the meeting along with Church Accounts and Maintenance Appeal Accounts. Next was the election of members to the PCC. With our numbers on our Electoral Roll going **over 100**, we can have more people on the PCC. So there are 6 places and 6 nominations and these people proposed and seconded. They were Cath Wright, Rosemary Lunt, Trevor Mainwaring, Pam Rawal, Jo Thornton and Colin Keam. Thanks were given to certain people within our church, who have worked hard during the past year.

Before the meeting was concluded, there was a presentation to Bob Browne. Bob has retired after being St Michael's Treasurer for **38 years**; he has done a sterling job. Revd George presented him with an engraved crystal clock.

Sweets



Churches mark 80th Anniversary of VE Day with commemorations, bell ringing, and prayers for peace

Churches across England have played their part in the recent commemorations to mark the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day. The commemorations on 8th May provided an opportunity to honour the sacrifices made by those who served in the conflict. They also provided an opportunity to pray for lasting peace, echoing the spirit of unity that defined the end of the Second World War in Europe. Across the country, thousands of church bells rang out at 6.30pm on VE Day. This echoed the bell ringing that swept across the country in 1945, as churches and cathedrals joined in the national joy and thanksgiving. Thousands of parishes held their own services of commemoration, while people at home lit virtual candles online, in honour of loved ones who had taken part in the war. The Bishop of St Germans, Hugh Nelson, the lead Bishop for the Armed Forces, said: "The 80th anniversary of VE Day was a time to remember with deep gratitude the courage and sacrifice of those who fought for the freedoms we enjoy today." He went on to say that in this "increasingly dangerous world", it was good "to offer prayers for peace. As we honour the past, so we renew our commitment to building a more peaceful and just world for all."

Fire of Pentecost

"You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you and you will be witnesses to me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth" Acts 1:8



We all get tired and battle weary sometimes. The disciples of Jesus had just been through a three-year long roller coaster adventure with Jesus that had culminated in His death, resurrection and ascension into heaven. The range of emotions would have been hugely taxing in the days leading up to Pentecost, as they remembered Jesus weeping in the garden of Gethsemane, betrayed by Judas, brutally beaten and crucified, and then dead and buried. Then there had been the shock and awe of finding out that He was alive again! But then He had left them again, to return to His Father. By the time the day of Pentecost arrived, the disciples would indeed have welcomed some fresh spiritual fire! For us

today, many of us have felt emotionally drained with the uncertainties caused by Covid 19, the worry of prices rising at an alarming rate, and now the pain and uncertainty of what will happen in the war in Ukraine. So, what better day to pray for fresh spiritual fire for each of us? As we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and birth of the Church, let us thank God that He will never leave us or forsake us.

Reflecting Faith: An Offer You Do Not Want to Refuse

For the last couple of months, we've been thinking about baptism, and last time we finished by saying that, even as late as the tenth century, only baptised people could stay in the church to watch, never mind actually consume, the celebration of the Eucharist. This tells me how highly regarded the consecration of the bread and wine actually were, and still are, within the Church. Even today this is still the 'highlight' of the main Sunday service. Everything we do within the service leads up to this special moment, when the priest offers the bread and wine to the people. Prior to this, we've said prayers of penitence and have been absolved. We have heard stories from the Bible and had them expanded upon in a sermon. We have stated our faith in response to this, and recognised God's awesome power by saying prayers of intercession for ourselves and others. We have acknowledged God's amazing gifts of love and peace by sharing this with those around us, and we responded by offering to Him our gifts as token of our whole lives.

And then – finally we get to the Eucharistic Prayer.

As soon as this is concluded and the priest invites the congregation to come forward to receive the consecrated bread and wine, we are 'so overwhelmed' by the enormity of what is being offered to each of us that we 'fall on our knees' with the Prodigal Son and say, "Lord I am not worthy'.

This month: When you next go to a Communion Service, take note of the pattern of it as a whole and then 'think' about how you feel as you are invited to take the bread and wine.

Are bananas really good for you?

So, here are some pros and cons of bananas:

<u>Pro:</u> High in potassium, good for heart health, lowers blood pressure, has Vitamin C, helps digestion, provides energy, full of fibre, cholesterol-free.

Cons: Can raise potassium levels too much (avoid them if you have kidney disease), can lead to wind and bloating, cause blood sugar spikes, weight gain, and disrupt sleep. Overall, experts recommend eating no more than two bananas a day.
