To believe or not to believe.

Do you ever doubt yourself? Do you have doubts over advice you are given or the veracity of information you hear? When change is proposed, do you ever doubt the optimism of the outcome? There is so much fake news around and spam and malicious mis-leadings, particularly it would seem using the media, social or otherwise, that sometimes it's hard to know what to believe; hard to separate truth from fiction and downright un-truth.

Genuine doubt or hesitancy is often no bad thing. Asking questions is a positive approach. It prevents us from rushing into situations where we have not sufficiently thought through potential consequences. It enables us to gather information which can itself be sifted and clarified. But in most situations there comes a point when we have to risk believing what we are being told, unless we have evidence to the contrary. Moderation in most things is a great leveller.

It's no different with faith. Faith believes with certainty in things we cannot see or prove. Every year after Easter, churches read about the disciple Thomas (often known as Doubting Thomas). Thomas was the only disciple not present when Jesus made his first appearance to ten of his followers after the resurrection. When they tell him that they have seen Jesus, he is reluctant to believe them. Those of you who have heard me preach on that text will know that my own take on this is that it was something so important to him, that he had to be absolutely sure that they had seen Jesus alive—that it wasn't a hallucination or something similar. So, because it was so important to him, Thomas wanted to see and touch the wounds in Jesus' body himself as proof that it was true.

I don't blame Thomas for this. I would probably have felt the same. Jesus also understood Thomas and gave him the proof he needed. The consequence was that Thomas was the first of the disciples to articulate what this meant. He joins the dots and realises that he is in the company of not just his friend and teacher, but the resurrected Christ, the Messiah, the Son of God. His response is total and unequivocal. He looks at Jesus and declares, 'My Lord and my God.'

We also have a choice of when to set aside our doubts and fears and choose to believe, even if the proof is not tangible. Questionning is part of the process to finding out as much as we can and weighing the answers. Then we have a choice: to believe or to reject. That's our choice and ours alone. This applies to questions of faith and many other situations in life. The results of these choices form our value system.

Looking around the world at the moment, value systems seem to be quite diverse. What are yours and do you manage to live by them? It's worth a thought.


on Tuesday evenings and David Poyner holds a meeting via Zoom on Wednesdays, as well as Compline by Zoom on Friday evenings.

I am also very grateful for everyone who helped at the service; for Rachael for playing the organ, Anita welcoming people and all those who worked behind the scenes to clean the church, to make cakes and other refreshments. We are now anticipating a Daddy's Hat concert next Saturday and an exhibition on the history of the church over that weekend, organised by Lyn Parnaby.

The day before we were at the Woodlands, where Toni and Roger Gabb once again opened up their gardens. The weather was sunny, the gardens were stunning and the refreshments were splendid. A significant sum of money for Glazeley and Chelmarsh churches, but the real value is the event itself and how it brings people together. It was almost exactly a year since the mastermind behind the gardens, Caspar Gabb, died; I am sure he would have thought that Roger and Toni did an excellent job. We are very grateful to them. On the Friday the week before, the Gabb family held a very moving celebration of Caspar's life; it made me wish I had known this talented and warm-hearted man better than I did. I am so grateful they organised this.

So, you have received your first letter of complaint. I am not wholly unsympathetic with your complainant, as attempting to marry the bride to the best man would have created havoc with the seating arrangements at the reception. However, you must learn that receiving letters of complaint is an integral part of the ordained ministry. After 50 years of parish life, the number of such letters I have received are now held in bound volumes.

The anonymous ones you will receive, invariably written in green ink on lined notepaper, can be safely consigned to your wastepaper basket, along with all mail, from whatever source, labelled 'Urgent'. You will receive letters complaining that you did not pray for someone who was in hospital, regardless of the fact that you knew nothing of it. Probably by the next post, you will receive a letter complaining that you did pray for someone in hospital – when they had wanted to keep their cosmetic surgery secret.

Those who regard themselves as guardians of doctrinal purity will write complaining of the heresies contained in the previous Sunday's sermon. These can be filed with those letters that complain that your sermons are too short, along with those who complain that they are too long.

The hourly striking of the church clock is a perennial favourite for complaints. I usually reply by saying that we are currently exploring the possibility of getting it to strike the quarters too.

Letters of complaint will arrive in November, complaining that the church is too cold, so making prayer impossible. Others will drop on the doormat in April saying that it is too hot, so making prayer impossible. In Spring, some will write that the churchyard should be mown more often, while others will complain that it is mown too often and ruins it as a habitat for wildlife. The annual Summer 'Procession of Witness' generates complaints that the brass band ruined the slumbers of parishioners having a Sunday lie-in. Then come Harvest, there will be the letters complaining that they did not receive a Harvest gift, which was particularly unforgivable, as their grandmother had once sung in the choir. Thus, the annual round is accompanied by reams of notepaper.

The only letter of complaint I have really treasured came from the bishop, rebuking me for never having attended any meeting when he was present. I have had it framed and hung on the study wall.

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Letter from Westminster



It is a great honour to have been re-adopted as the Conservative parliamentary candidate for South Shropshire. I have spent over forty years of my life in the Marches, having grown up in Herefordshire and spent much of my childhood in Shropshire. These are vital times for Shropshire, and my plan sets out how I will champion the needs and aspirations of our while community to ensure that it can flourish.

I was delighted to host my first 'Meet the MP' event in Much Wenlock. It was a pleasure to speak with residents who do not have specific casework enquiries but enjoy discussing topics of local interest. Please check my website for up-to-date information on future events and

contact me to book a place. In Shropshire, I was also pleased to meet with the Shropshire Association of Local Councils. Local government is responsible for more than 800 different functions. So, it was insightful to learn about the challenges they face in serving rural areas like ours. I also held a round table event with Shropshire Chamber of Commerce, which does so much to help our local businesses. By meeting with some of our largest employers in the area I can understand how we can unleash rural prosperity.

My Pothole Patrol has demonstrated the importance of improving the condition and quality of our roads across South Shropshire. The new government has decided against the last government's long-term approach to investing in our highways - publishing allocations for the next year alone. A quarter of funding has also been held back until councils can prove that they are meeting stringent criteria. I have contacted Ministers with my findings and submitted a list of every road residents have raised with me to Shropshire Council to ensure these roads are repaired as soon as possible.

To support the revival of our high streets, I am seeking the views of local residents and businesses in my new survey. So, I am asking everyone to spend five minutes to fill in my survey and support our local towns (*see on website stuart@stuartanderson.org.uk*). The findings will shape my plan, as I work with key stakeholders to ensure that our other market towns can thrive. I have started with Bridgnorth and then will roll it out to other market towns across South Shropshire. With over 1000 contributions already, this is clearly a campaign that people care deeply about.

I have raised several key concerns from high street businesses in Parliament recently. At Oral Questions to the Ministry of Justice, I asked how removing short-term prison sentences would help deter and punish retail crime. In a Westminster Hall debate I raised plans to change business rates for retail, hospitality and leisure businesses. Having visited and spoken with many fantastic local publicans, shop owners and restaurants, I want to see these businesses supported now. I called for a return to the previous 75% rate relief and a cut to food and drink VAT.

I was thrilled to receive news that the Post Office in Cleobury will reopen after being closed since April 2023. This was an issue that was brought to me by local residents such as Ruth, who collected hundreds of signatures from residents on a paper survey. After a concerted local campaign and raising this with the Post Office I am delighted that we have secured the future of this service. The Post Office will open on June 27th. On another win for the high street, I welcomed Dudley Building Society opening in Bridgnorth, reversing the trend of banking services leaving our local towns. I will continue to help our local communities retain the shops and services we need.

I am sure they will both be a great addition to the council and I'm looking forward to working with them.

Hopefully you will have noticed the hanging baskets which have recently gone up through out the village. This year the colour scheme was chosen to match the favourite colours of long time Parish Clerk Ella Preston who we sadly lost last year. I'm sure you will all agree the baskets are looking great this year. We did have a slight panic shortly after the baskets were hung when the pump on our bowser which is used to water the hanging baskets stopped working. Fortunately local business owner James Green of Specialist Pumping Services Ltd offered to have a look and when he discovered the pump was irrepairable he sourced and fitted a new one, free of charge! Our thanks go out to James for his kindness and for saving the day.

There has been a bit of a change to the street furniture in the centre of the village after the bus shelter was damaged and had to be removed. We are in the process of exploring all options and have decided this would be a good opportunity to explore bus stop provision throughout the village before coming up with a plan. We didn't think we were going to be able to find out who it was that caused the damage but in the last few days we have been passed CCTV footage of a supermarket lorry hitting the structure so we are hopeful we will be able to get any costs covered.

As we enter summer there is lots to look forward to including Highley Carnival. I hope to see many of you there (and hopefully the weather is good!).

- *Plant Bee-Friendly Flowers*: Grow a variety of flowers in your garden that attract and support bees, such as lavender, sunflowers, and marigolds.
- * Avoid Using Pesticides: Reduce or eliminate these in your garden, to create a safer environment for bees.
- * Support Local Beekeepers: Purchase honey from local beekeepers, to help support sustainable beekeeping practices.
- * Create a Bee Bath: Place a shallow dish of water with stones in your garden to provide bees with a safe place to drink.

Shropshire County Councillor

Local Activity and Support

It's been a busy start to my time as your County Councillor, and I wanted to take this opportunity to share a few updates on what I've been doing since stepping into the role.

I attended my first Full Council meeting at the Guildhall in Shrewsbury on 22nd May — a formal but important introduction to Shropshire Council. During the meeting, I was appointed as a member of the Economy and Environment Overview and Scrutiny Committee, which oversees key areas including highways, the environment, climate change, economic growth, flooding, housing, and community.

One of my first local actions was helping to arrange for barriers and cones to cordon off the Parish Council-owned bus shelter after it was damaged. I worked with Shropshire Council's Highways team to put these in place while the Parish Council organised the removal. A large part of my time so far has been spent listening to concerns from residents about traffic and road safety — especially around speeding, pavement parking and double parking on narrow streets. I've now started a full review of traffic issues in the village and am preparing a report to submit to Shropshire Council with a set of practical recommendations. I've also been in contact with Diamond Buses to ensure residents were kept informed when the usual bus route was diverted during recent roadworks. Good communication in situations like this makes a real difference.

Environmental Concerns – Severn Trent Odour

Several residents living near Kinlet View have contacted me about persistent odours from the Severn Trent waste site. I visited the area and spoke directly with four property owners to understand the extent of the issue. I've since contacted the Environmental Protection Officer at Shropshire Council and am chasing to arrange a site meeting so that the issue can be properly assessed. Unfortunately, on a previous visit before I took office, no odour was detected. To avoid this happening again, I've asked the residents to keep a log of when the smell is most noticeable, so that the officer's next visit can be timed to coincide with it. I'll continue to follow this closely.

Direct Support for Residents

Beyond these broader issues, I've also been supporting residents directly, helping two households remove bulky waste by personally taking items to Bridgnorth tip; I've also been assisting a resident with housing-related queries — ensuring they know what support is available and who to contact.

Looking Ahead

There's a lot to learn and plenty to do, but my early focus has been on getting visible, getting involved, and getting things moving. I'll continue to work closely with the Parish Council and local residents to raise concerns, share updates, and do what I can to represent Highley effectively at county level.

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
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Wordsearch



If you ever struggle with doubt, take heart: so did one of the apostles, whose Feast Day is this month. St Thomas just could NOT believe that the Jesus he had seen crucified and dead on the cross could ever come back to life. But Thomas was an honest sceptic, because he really wanted to know the truth. Jesus could help such a man. And so He appeared to him and the other disciples. Instead of scolding him, Jesus simply showed him the wounds. Understanding the word 'imputed'

Righteousness...shall be imputed [transferred] to us who believe in Him who raised up Jesus.'

Romans 4:22,24



Planning and nature - Craig

The Government's Planning and Infrastructure Bill, in its current form, fundamentally undermines its commitment to protect nature. The bill replaces vital nature protections with a weaker substitute in an attempt to allow more planning projects to proceed. However, nature does not block growth. If our leading politicians understood this, they might be able to explain the actual reasons for a failing planning system, not just blame nature.

In fact, in 2024, bats and great crested newts were a factor in just 3% of planning appeal decisions (see wildlife trust website). Natural England also recently stated that "out of the tens of thousands of planning applications that we are consulted on each year, 99% result in Natural England and developers finding ways for development to proceed whilst protecting nature. A mere 1% result in an objection.


The Labour manifesto is full of promises about restoring our beautiful countryside and the wildlife that resides in it. They need to provide proper guidance, ensuring those seeking planning permission provide all the necessary environmental information alongside their planning application, ultimately helping to speed up planning decisions. Working with nature is the only way forward. Working against it is to the detriment of humanity.


Prepare to stop using plastic - Alastair

Plastic is very useful. You can wash it, use it over and over again and it can be made into pretty much anything. Is that a reason to embrace it? Unfortunately plastic is choking our seas and natural world. It poses a huge threat to wildlife because it doesn't just disappear; it simply breaks down into smaller and smaller pieces. Aside from the dangers of becoming trapped or injured, animals often ingest plastic fragments, with the potential to build up in the bodies of animals right up the food chain - from microscopic animals right up to large predators, including humans! In fact, 1 in 3 fish caught for human consumption contain microplastics (SAS 2025).

It's scary to think, but there could be **more plastic than fish** in the sea by 2050 (Ellen Macarthur Foundation, 2016). More than **100,000** marine mammals and **1 million** sea birds are killed by marine plastic pollution every year (UK Government, 2018). Plastic is not only terrible for our environment, it's also bad news for the climate. It's made of oil, and to make about 1kg of plastic, you end up generating about 2.5kg of carbon dioxide. Check out the Surfers Against Sewage (SAS0 website to find out lots more, and how to help.


