

Pause for Thought

Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar (22nd July). What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed, and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Make Jesus the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest people for His purposes:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words:

'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise;

God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1 Corinthians 1:27).

At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously. We shouldn't be quick to dismiss the things that don't agree with our expectations, as Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we allow Him, He can do it through us!

25th July - St James the Apostle

James and his brother John were sons of Zebedee and fishermen from Galilee - the 'sons of thunder', as the gospel writers describe their impetuous characters and fiery tempers.

James stands out on three accounts: he was one of the three disciples who witnessed the Transfiguration of Christ. Jesus took him, along with Peter and John, to 'watch' with Him in the garden of Gethsemane. Finally, he went on to be the first apostle to die for the Christian faith, when in AD 44 King Herod Agrippa put him to the sword in Jerusalem at Passover time.

In the centuries following his death, James became associated with the evangelising of Spain, and as a powerful defender of Christianity against the Moors. The heyday of the cult of Santiago de Compostela was from the 12th to the 15th century, and the pilgrimage to Compostela became one of the most important of medieval Christendom. This in time transformed the iconography of James, and his emblems became the pilgrim's hat and the scallop-shell of Compostela. Over 400 English churches have been dedicated to James.

News & Updates

Let's rethink Bulky Waste Could you Re-home or Repair it instead?

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils are encouraging residents to think twice before booking a bulky waste collection – because that old cupboard, television, table or unwanted bookcase might still have plenty of life left in it.

As part of a new campaign, the councils are highlighting that there are many smart, sustainable — and often free — alternatives to throwing items away. Whether it's **selling, donating, repairing or rehoming**, a little extra effort can reduce waste, save money and even help others.

If an item is still usable – before people book a bulky waste collection or take it to a recycling centre, we are encouraging them to please check to see if they could:

- Freecycle it or give it away on social / community platforms.
- Sell it on sites like Facebook Marketplace, Gumtree or eBay.
- Donate it get in touch with local charities or community action groups to check if they collect or accept bulky items in good condition.
- Repair or upcycle it ask a local repair café or friend for help.
- Check with retailers they should pick up the old electrical item for recycling when they're dropping off your new one.

Local charity shops, repair cafés and community groups across the districts are often happy to take on good quality furniture or help to bring broken items back to life. Residents are encouraged to check locally before deciding to throw anything away.

And if an item doesn't shift right away, don't give up! Rehoming things can take a little time, but it's worth it and it will be helping the community and the planet.

Firstly, thank you for patience as mains gas works continue in East Challow.

Please can the Parish Council ask you to park responsibly around the village, parked vehicles on pavements and grass verges cause problems for pedestrians and other vehicles, especially the Emergency services.

Concerns have been raised specifically regarding parked vehicles on the road in Sarajac Ave, please do not park opposite another vehicle, narrowing the road and causing congestion and restrictions for larger vehicles. This may inhibit an emergency vehicle accessing properties in this area

District Councillor Report for July & August 2025

Flooding

OCC continue to clear the drains on the A417 around Mellor's (is it still called Mellor's?). All this helps reduce the risk of flooding down there in heavy rain. Clearing the ditch that runs along the north side of the road East from Mellor's will be done when the results of the Ecological Survey are complete which may take some time. The survey is linked also to the proposed weir that will be built on the canal to regulate water flowing down the ditch towards the road. The inspection chamber that sits where this ditch meets the road has also been repaired. All that needs to be done now is for Childrey Brook to be desilted and this is going to take some time. It is heavily silted and produces methane in some places. It will have to be cleared in sections and current objections raised include (i) it does need to be done, and (ii) notice needs to be taken of the ecological report when it comes out. So, when the desilting will be done is anybody's guess.

The Future Flood Resilience Group (FFRG, futurefloodresilience.co.uk), a group of councillors and hydrologists, held a meeting for all 7 villages in this ward (including the Challow's, Letcombe's and Childrey, which are most affected) in Letcombe Regis Village Hall on June 10th outlining how the flooding has arisen historically and what can be done about it. About thirty people turned up. The FFRG are hoping that flood groups might be set up in the parishes affected and become affiliated to the group being set up as part of Wantage Town Council. More on this maybe in due course.

Cornhill Lane survey

Finally, OCC have got around to think seriously about managing access to the Lane. The plan is to limit access to pedestrians, horses, cycles and motorcycles, the latter which will be monitored. They are intending to install gates which will prevent 4 wheelers using it, but they want to know how many people use it and what they use it for. I have put this on Facebook and have had 26 responses. If you have not seen this and want to respond please let me know, by email (see below) or by any other means (a piece of paper through the letter box will do fine), how frequently you use it and whether this is for walking +/- dog, cycles, motorcycles, buggies etc.

I have asked OCC whether they intend to do something similar with Green Lane that runs between the B4507 and the Letcombe's, but they said that they want to deal with Cornhill first and see how it goes (I suspect shortage of money is also involved!)

Parish annual reports

These last 2 months are the time when parish councils in this ward carry out their annual meetings, inviting parishioners to come and have their say. It is always disappointing that so few attend. In East Challow we had representatives of the football and cricket club and the church but no other residents at all turn up! Please don't complain about the state of the village if you don't turn up and let us have your thoughts. The parish council is doing its best to make the village centre something that we should be proud of and the more members and helpers we have the better things will be.

"The leak in the field"

Although this was in West Challow, many of us have seen the leak in the field near the footpath across the field to West Challow and producing something similar to the Okavango Delta in Africa but on a smaller scale. It was a water main that feeds the bungalows on the canal. It has now been fixed by Thames Water – after 2 years.

Vale Community Impact (VCI)

I attended one of their pop-up cafes, held in the Legion on the 4th June. The VCI does almost everything for those who need help, including driving to medical appointments, day centres, helping with finance advice etc. They always need more volunteers, drivers etc. If you are interested in volunteering give them a call 01235 765348 or email them at recruitment@vci.org.uk.

Local Government Reorganisation

Central government going back several years decided that the separate district and county councils should combine (seems very sensible in terms of efficiency and keeping costs down) forming unitary authorities – and with a mayor. We have no choice in this. The councils need to propose how they will do this otherwise

a structure will be imposed by central government. There is more than one option for this, but our local district government would like to combine with South Oxfordshire and West Berkshire, to be called Ridgeway Council (they are similar in terms of landscape, town size etc, are all fairly rural and there is some history behind the proposal). This will cover the south of Oxfordshire. The northern-most section would form Oxford and Shires Council. The only concern I have is that councillors will need to look after our villages and there may conceivably be less contact with "the grass roots".

County Health Scrutiny Committee

We met on June 5th and discussed further NHS reforms, pressures on the system

and health inequalities at county level. I can send a detailed report if you mail me but in essence, health is managed at three county level (Bucks, Oxon and West Berks) and central government is looking to make further saving by merging with other groups in the Southeast. This is clearly a concern in terms of the level of service, and I am not sure that the savings made will lead to an improvement of services, but I guess it might stop it deteriorating further? The system pressures are largely those connected with the high cost of living in Oxfordshire making recruitment and retention of nursing and other staff difficult.

At a more local level we still have not yet heard what additional services will be run out of Wantage Hospital. Three similar health hubs are being set up in Oxford which, once they are up and running, should take some pressure of the big hospitals particularly the JR.

While out and about with Meg. I enjoy the ever-changing countryside, different shrubs flower and bear fruit at different times. The elder bushes have blossomed, and the berries are ripening off. They are a great source of food for the birds, unfortunately if your washing line is in the vicinity, you may have experienced the birds depositing on your laundry. My mum always said that it was lucky to be deposited upon, I was never convinced myself.

Seeing the berries reminded me of a few years ago when my husband and I decided to utilise some of the berries and make wine. What could possibly go wrong! We picked them, plucked them from the frames they grow on, and away we went. It was eventually stored in demijohns with airlocks, and we forgot about it for several months.

Then one cold and dismal winter evening we remembered it. It was a beautiful colour very clear, and very inviting looking, after syphoning some off and tasting it, we decided that it was very good. Some more was decanted, tasted and enjoyed, then some more, and so it went on.

Needless to say, if you embark on homemade wine making, drink sparingly, we had no idea just how potent it was. Our heads the next day told us all we needed to know. Be warned. It was fun though.

I've been watching the bird table as usual, keeping it well stocked with things that are bird friendly, and the robins look decidedly disapproving if I am late. Meg likes to keep the pigeons and jackdaws at bay, but she does let the little birds have their fill and feed their babies. One little bird, which frequents the garden but doesn't use the bird table is the wren. It's a tiny, round, brown bird, with a pointed beak, long legs and toes, a narrow short, cocked tail, and a big very beautiful voice. It moves very quickly flitting about the ivy and foliage looking for insects. Both male and female are identical, the male builds the nest, and he may be polygamous, building several nests, and installing females in all of them. The hen lays between 5 and 8 eggs, once hatched, both parents feed the chicks. The male must have to work really hard if he has several homes to run. They are fascinating little birds a real delight to watch.

More than just fly-tipping

Fly-tipping is more than an unsightly mess; it can be big business for criminals.

From roque traders claiming to be properly licensed, to large scale organised criminal gangs who will use threats and intimidation to illegally dump hundreds of tonnes of waste and the impact on victims and the environment can be huge.

In the last year alone there have been more than 100,000 incidents of fly-tipping across the Southeast and it is estimated that the cost to the economy in England is nearly a billion pounds.

Responsibility for waste dumping falls across several agencies. Local authorities are responsible for investigating, clearing and taking appropriate enforcement action in relation to small scale fly-tipping on public land. The Environment Agency is responsible for dealing with large-scale fly-tipping (more than a lorry load), hazardous waste and flytipping by organised gangs. Too often responsibility can be passed from one organisation to another.

So, I have joined forces with Police & Crime Commissioners in Hampshire, Surrey, Sussex and Kent in an attempt to get police forces, specialist police units, the Environment Agency and councils to work together to tackle the problem. We held our first meeting in Kent in early June.

Many people don't realise that often criminals who are involved in waste crime will also be responsible for vehicle thefts, money laundering, drug trafficking and a wide range of other offences.

Victims are often hit twice. Not only will rural and industrial businesses be impacted by having waste dumped illegally on their land or in their buildings, but they often have to pay for the cost of the clean up - or face stiff fines themselves! This needs to change, and I will be working to put pressure on the government to protect victims.

Thames Valley Police's Rural Crime Task Force have had some successes in tackling organised waste gangs by working with councils and the Environment Agency, but there is more to be done.

We can all play our part. If you discover fly tipping (large or small) please report it to Vale of White Horse District Council. They can investigate offenders. If you see someone in the act of illegally dumping waste, call 999 - it's

a crime in progress!

If you pay someone who is unlicensed to take away your waste. You could be fined £600 if they dump your waste! So, it's always worth checking the Environment Agency's website to see if someone is reaistered.

Why you should drink Tea

There is a popular greeting card which says: 'All things are possible with a cup of tea'.

And for many of us, that is almost always true.

Tea comes from the Camellia sinensis plant, which is often blended with other plants for different flavours, such as Earl Grey or chai. Tea is the UK's favourite hot beverage, which besides from cheering us up, has cancer-fighting properties and can improve our heart and gut health.

So here's what's good about Tea:

Tea is rich in polyphenols, which have antioxidant effects on the body, and can reduce inflammation. Milk does not hurt their absorption, so add milk if you like!

Tea has flavanols, which helps your blood to flow and lowers your blood pressure. One study at Harvard found that drinking three to four cups a day means you are less likely to have a heart attack.

Tea is prebiotic, which means it promotes healthier kinds of bacteria in your gut, which helps with your digestion, your respiratory system, and your immune system.

Tea lowers blood sugar, and even the risk of Type 2 diabetes, due to the polyphenols.

Tea may reduce your risk of cancer. Again, the polyphenols are your friends here, as they may be slowing the development of certain types of cancer.

Tea helps you concentrate. Coffee may speed you up, but it can also give you the jitters. Tea contains around 40-50 mg of caffeine, which is only half the amount found in coffee.

But tea also has an amino acid called 'L-theanine', which helps produce a feeling of 'calm concentration', by lowering stress and improving mental focus.

Tea improves sleep – due to the polyphenols, L-theanine, theaflavins, thearubigins, and gamma-aminobutyric acid (GABA), which help lower stress and create calm.

Finally, black tea or green tea? Without going into some complicated science, it seems that they are equally healthy to drink. Black tea has more caffeine, which may help if you need more energy!

Bananas could be lost to climate change, Christian Aid warns

Bananas are in danger. Almost half of the world's banana-growing regions may be lost to climate change in the next 50 years, a new report has warned.

Bananas are the world's fourth most important food crop globally — but rising temperatures, droughts, and fungal infections are threatening where most of the world's crops grow, in Latin America and the Caribbean.

A recent study by Christian Aid found that 80 per cent of global banana exports come from this region, but that 60 per cent of the land currently used for the crop will be unsuitable, due to climate change, by 2080.

The director of policy and campaigns at Christian Aid, Osai Ojigho, said: "Bananas are not just the world's favourite fruit, but they are also an essential food for millions of people. We need to wake up to the danger posed by climate change to this vital crop."

UK consumers eat more bananas than any other European country, eating on average about 85 bananas a year each.

"To those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God."

John 1:12

As I write, the church has been celebrating Pentecost – the miraculous coming of the Holy Spirit with wonders and signs – an event described in acts chapter 2 of the Bible that sounds so far-fetched as to be unbelievable. But it was the beginning of an explosive growth in the church, that has carried on until today. And such stories are by no means confined to the past.

When Tarik* in southern Philippines went to a programme run by Christians, it was partly to hide from the police. As a drug lord and hitman, he was 'wanted'. But he couldn't hide from God, and unusual things began happening, sparking an astonishing transformation.

Within weeks of beginning the programme, Tarik – who'd suffered with a persistent stomach condition – prayed for the first time. "If you are truly Isa al-Masih (Jesus Christ), heal me," he said. "After three minutes, the pain was gone." But given his Muslim background, Tarik resisted becoming a Christian.

Tarik then had the same dream three times. "I dreamt about Jesus, and that I cast out evil spirits in His name. Those dreams didn't change my view, though, I still stubbornly believed He was a prophet."

"Until one day, it wasn't a dream any longer," he continues. A local boy was demon possessed. "I said the name of Isa and he was healed." The same happened with a woman who was also healed. News spread that Tarik had powers – powers he knew weren't from him. "From then, I began to seek Jesus."

After attending a literacy class where God's Word was taught, Tarik asked for a Bible. "One night, God woke me up. I didn't know how to open the Bible, but I did and the first thing I read was: 'To those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.' (John 1:12). I never experienced being a child – I had no father figure. When Christ said that, if I follow Him, I'd become the Father's child, I cried. The Holy Spirit worked in my hear so that I finally understood who Jesus is."

Since becoming a Christian, Tarik has survived attempts on his life by Muslim extremist groups. "Believing in Jesus where I live can lead to death," he says. But amazingly, extremists are exploring Christianity, and some have come to faith. "Despite persecution, we're growing deeper. It doesn't mean we want it, but through persecution we experience God's grace, love and power."

Key to this is the role of Open Doors local partners, through initiatives including persecution survival training, food programmes and literacy classes.

"Having you journeying alongside us has impacted us significantly," says Tarik. "We're not alone. We know that there are people who pray for us. When challenges arise, we're not ashamed to talk to them. Before there was none of that. We were afraid we had no one with us. We are very thankful."

The Danger of Electric Cars

Electric cars may be the 'future' of British motoring, but meanwhile, more of them are catching fire. From 131 blazes three years ago, there were 232 blazes needing a fire brigade last year – a 77 per cent increase in just two years.

Electric car fires are more dangerous than petrol or diesel car fires, because they are extremely hard to put out. This is because water, foam or fireproof blanket have little to no effect: lithiumion battery fires are self-sustaining and continue to burn until the entire battery is consumed.

Electric car fires are normally the result of 'thermal runaway', where batteries have got damaged or overheated, and then begin to irreversibly overheat.

There is to be a total ban on new petrol and diesel cars by 2030.

Rise in Older Shoplifters

More and more pensioners have turned to shoplifting. They aren't in criminal gangs, they are hungry.

So says a security firm which works with hundreds of stores across the country. Kingdom Security reports that food retailers have seen a "massive" increase in pensioner shoplifters over the past year, involving "people who just can't afford to buy food."

John Nussbaum, director of service for retail at Kingdom Security, said that the cost of living is "pushing people to something they've never done before".

Mr Nussbaum estimates that five per cent of all those caught shoplifting by Kingdom staff on a weekly basis are aged over 50. "We've not seen this before, and I've been in security for 30 years. People can't afford to spend £10, £20 on food. It's desperation."

The number of shoplifting offences reported to police last year passed 500,000 for the first time.

Replastering work near the Font and Hazel Brown Room, and the **Tower Louvres** will be fitted during June.




