

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery

I stood to be your MP because I wanted to make a difference. To help people with real problems, speak up on the issues that matter to our area, and make sure Middlezoy, Othery and surrounding areas aren't forgotten in Westminster. One year in, I hope I've made that difference. Over the past twelve months, my team and I have helped with more than 5,000 cases. I've held regular advice surgeries around the constituency and even set up pop-up stalls in supermarkets so people can speak with me directly.

In Westminster, I've spoken in the Commons 124 times and submitted 197 written questions to ministers. I secured a debate on the proposed salt marsh at Pawlett Hams and used it to raise local environmental and flood concerns. I hope I played a small part in seeing off EDF's absurd plan. I've pressed for better broadband connections, challenged tax thresholds that unfairly hit pensioners on modest incomes, and opposed the Sentencing Council's now-abandoned guidance that risked creating a two-tier justice system.

I've kept up the pressure on Somerset Council to get a grip on the Celebration Mile roadworks and to sort out the wider roadworks chaos in and around Bridgwater. I've raised concerns in Parliament about the lack of bus services. I've supported local parents pushing for a rebuild of Haygrove School and urged ministers to improve access to NHS services right across the Constituency. I've also spoken out against the "family farm tax", which threatens the future of farming in our part of Somerset.

It's been a busy year, and I've learned a lot. Thank you for the trust you've placed in me, it's a real privilege to serve as your MP. There's still plenty more to do and I'll keep working hard every day on your behalf.

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton



I've loved meeting lots of you and this summer, I'll have more village 'surgeries', so please come along, say hello and tell me what matters to you.

After hearing from local residents about road safety, I've raised speeding traffic in Parliament. I know this affects many of you and it's so frustrating that often the law is there, ready to be used, but there are not enough Police to take action when laws are broken. I'm concerned about speeding and will continue to press for stronger action. Thank you if you've contacted me about this.

Over the last month, I've spoken about:

- * water safety and the need for everyone to learn to swim
- * the fifth anniversary of the Covid-19 outbreak
- * management of the contract for electronic tagging of prisoners
- the few who've been excluded from the Government's Infected Blood Compensation Scheme
- * use by the NHS of different computer software systems even in departments in the same hospital which can't 'talk' to each other, thereby compromising patient safety and care

My next regular 'surgeries' are:

SKY AT NIGHT

Sky at Night August

Sunrise Sunset


Beginning of August 5.38-8.58pm End of August 6.24am-7.59pm

Moon Phases

First Quarter 1st / Full Moon 9th / Last Quarter 16th / New Moon 23rd Setting around 10.30pm during August by the end of the month Mars disappears into the Sun's glow, not to be seen again until next year. Earlier at around 9.30pm Saturn appears in the east, then in the early morning Venus and Jupiter shine brightly and if you look east on the 12th you will see these two planets very close together,

Constellation

Cygnus the Swan is another constellation which actually looks like its namesake. Deneb, one of the bright stars of the Summer Triangle asterism, marks the swan's tail, with other stars forming its outstretched wings and with a fainter star marking its head. This faint star is Albireo and is in fact a double star and is one of the most beautiful in the sky. The smallest of telescopes will show Albireo as two jewels, one golden and one blue. Cygnus seems to fly through the Milky Way galaxy which is split here by a dark cloud of dust noticeable in binoculars. This is known as the Great Cygnus Rift.



Phenomena

The famous Perseid meteor shower peaks on the night of 12th/13th but unfortunately moonlight will wash out some of the fainter meteors, although some brighter ones may be seen.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. Drought continues and this was one cause for last month's negative tone. Maize which is spring sown is a disaster in this area of central Somerset. Prices of alternatives have gone through the roof. The farmer himself pays for or funds all this and also takes the risk in the first place. This writer sells the straw behind the combine on an area basis. The buyer bales and hauls the straw at his own cost. Prices for this are more than double last year's prices. Likewise dairy farmers have been feeding next winter's silage to cows as there is no grass growth in the current drought conditions. The price of wheat has not moved in the same way, as it is set internationally. At this point in time that means that wheat prices, for example, are just below last year's figure. It helps that fuel is marginally cheaper than this time last year. The combine runs at a high and constant r.p.m. as the internal threshing mechanism needs to run at constant speed. With a semi-automatic gearbox the forward speed can then be altered to suit crop conditions by



simply moving a lever forward or backwards for higher or lower speed. As regards the cereal harvest this is two to three weeks early which is very unusual. Normally starting at the end of July it started at the beginning.

Yields are correspondingly lower.

Red Tape. It used to be the case that every party trying to become elected to form the next government promised to reduce red tape. Farmers are surrounded by it and we have seen no reduction over the years. For example, we have to apply to the Environment Agency for exemptions to handle our own waste and not use a licensed waste contractor. One cannot argue against such obvious prudence. Except that in the detail this is burdensome. For example, when cleaning out our own ditches we have to



apply for this exemption to put the ditching, the waste, on our own ditch banks. Also, an exemption is required to put mulch or our own fleeces around newly planted trees. An exemption is required to burn non-treated timber. This writer assumes that an exemption for burning treated timber would not be given. Of course, at the root of all this is that farmers cannot be relied on to manage the environment themselves. These exemptions have to be applied for annually.

from our Deanery, a proposal is currently being considered that the position will not be filled, the MOMSS benefice will cease to exist and the various church parishes in the MOMSS benefice will be incorporated into neighbouring benefices.

There has been a lot of consultation between various interested parties and further meetings are being planned. The current situation is that nothing has been definitely agreed or settled upon yet, but it is important that the people of our villages are aware of what is happening before any proposed changes take place.

Middlezoy and Othery may possibly join the Athelney benefice of Burrowbridge, Lyng, North Curry and Stoke St Gregory. At the same time Moorlinch and Stawell may join the Polden Wheel benefice, at present serving the villages of Ashcott, Burtle, Catcott, Chilton Polden, Edington and Shapwick.

Nothing yet has been agreed or settled upon, but changes may take place in the fairly near future. MOMSS Magazine Team

GRANTS FOR MOMSS MAGAZINE

The magazine team is eager to continue to publish the magazine to keep everyone informed of the happenings throughout the benefice. We have been very grateful to our sponsors for covering printing costs through 2024 and into 2025. With the help of other donations and

BENEFICE CHURCHES PAST

The following is how the MOMSS&G Benefice came into being.

In 1981 Middlezoy and Othery joined with Moorlinch, Stawell and Sutton Mallet and became the MOMSS Benefice.

Middlezoy

Church established mid-13th Century, Grade 1 Listed.

Chapelry of Sowy Parish (ie sub-division of a Parish). In 1515 Sowy Parish divided and Middlezoy became a separate parish. Sometimes held with Othery, united with Othery 1952.

Othery

Church established early 13th Century, Grade I Listed.

Chapelry of Sowy Parish. In 1515 Sowy Parish divided and Othery became a separate parish. Sometimes held with Middlezoy, united with Middlezoy 1952.

Moorlinch

Charters of King Ine 725 and King Edgar 971 - neither considered authentic.

Church established 13th Century, Grade I Listed.

Mother Church of parishes of Catcott, Chilton Polden, Edington, Stawell and Sutton Mallet.

Vicar of Moorlinch ceased to be responsible for Catcott in 1815 and Chilton Polden in 1828.

1968-1980 also held Greinton Chapelry.

Stawell

Church established late 13th Century, Grade 2* Listed.

Chapelry of Moorlinch Parish.

Sutton Mallet

Church established late 13th Century, Grade 2 Listed.

Chapelry of Moorlinch Parish. In 1987 taken over by the Churches Conservation Trust.

NEW BENEFICE

In 2009 Greinton was added and the Benefice became MOMSS&G.

Greinton

Church established by 12th Century, Grade I Listed.

Chapelry held by Glastonbury Abbey until the Dissolution of the Monasteries around 1540.

After the Dissolution held by the Lords of the Manor. Sometimes held with Walton and Street Churches.

Pop-up Café


We and the shop hope to run the pop-up cafe when we are available on sunny Saturdays - look for the poster on the fence, or the notice on Facebook to let you know when the


OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP

BISHOP'S LETTER

Do you use Wikipedia? It's often a very convenient place to look for information when we want to know more about something or about a person. But, perhaps, like me you've discovered its limitations. As you might anticipate from a free online encyclopaedia to which anyone can contribute and is open to anyone to edit it is both impressively collaborative and also sometimes incomplete or less than fully accurate. Nevertheless, it remains for me - and perhaps you? - a go-to source of quick information. So, I wasn't surprised when I consulted Wikipedia's August anniversaries to find it is less than comprehensive about the Christian calendar this month. St Bartholomew's Day is recorded on 24 August – alongside Ukraine Independence Day which surely also deserves marking. Bartholemew (usually identified as Nathanael, one



of the twelve disciples of Jesus) isn't generally well celebrated on his festival day, except in places where he's the patron saint of the parish and church, such as Crewkerne where the annual charter fair remembers their link with St Bart. Even so their fair has been moved into September after the end of the holiday season.

August frequently means reduced activity, and fewer events. If that's an opportunity for catching our breath and taking a break from the challenges of deadlines and expectations, then all well and good. But let's not forget, despite them being omitted from the Wikipedia list, the other red-letter August days in the calendar. On 15 August we honour the Blessed Virgin Mary, mother of our Lord Jesus, and on 6 August, we mark the glorious Transfiguration of our Lord. That festival day recalls how Peter, James and John experienced on a mountain top the transformation of Jesus' physical appearance, enabling them to glimpse the glory of his divinity.

Make the most of these three significant festival days in August. As well, don't forget the other significant days this month, such as Ukraine Independence Day (24), VJ day (15) marking the end of World War 2, and – another date missed in the Wikipedia list – the 80th anniversary of the dropping of the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima. Saints' days and anniversaries are significant prompts to our prayers.
