

Social Media

At PCC this week we had a long chat about social media especially **WhatsApp** which is so commonly used to communicate and share information.

We have several of these groups within the life of the church which support the name St. Helen's.

Recently it has come to our attention and in the wider diocese that some conventions and the sharing of information has broken several rules and laws around GDPR and safeguarding and this is a reminder that any association with the church, St. Helen's needs to fall within those guidelines and laws. As a PCC and church, we have already signed up to the archbishops guidelines which can be found by clinking the link below.

The prayer chain for instance is for just that: Prayer

Share a request with permission for prayer from person concerned wherever possible.

Use first names only.

Brief description of problem or request.

Do not always expect a result to be given, ask no questions, just trust that God knows.

If the person or situation has not given permission just use an initial, example 'can we pray for J who is to have an operation this week.'

No sharing of links to other sites there are no guarantees that these are appropriate or that they do not lead to scams.

No further conversations just respond with for example: I'm praying, praying hands emoji, may God bless J or situation, keep it simple, but please pray fully.

Do not use the new open chat request as this cannot be monitored but does show that a conversation has taken place on the back of a prayer request.

Always remember Keep it simple.

If you want to chat about other things then use your own private chat groups. We will be setting up a community WhatsApp forum for all individual WhatsApp groups that are associated directly or bare the name St. Helen's to monitor each so as we comply with the law and safeguarding. Each group will keep its own administration and be responsible for conversations and activities.

Reverend Clifford's Weekly Blog 'Transition and choice'

19th July 2025

What a week, long, fun, emotional, challenging, tiring. I wonder what words you would use to reflect your own week as you look back. At the start of the week, we met as usual to pray for the needs of our community, our fellowship, our family and friends, the nation, the world and everything in God's creation. Monday the first day of the week with 7 of us, is that a holy number; sharing all those needs and issues and requests before God. As ever so much in each prayer has changed throughout the week as we witness God's hand at work and as other needs arise.

My most emotional moments came on Tuesday and Wednesday as I led two assemblies and handed out little leaving certificates to the toddlers at Pre-school as they start their summer holidays before starting school for the first time. Many of them I will get to see again because of the assemblies I lead at St. Helen's and Cliffe Woods primary schools. Then there were the year sixes who too are about to transition from primary school to senior schools. It was clear in assembly that many of them are of mixed emotion, not wanting to leave the known for the unknown, the stability and familiarity for new ventures but also with trepid excitement of a new start, a fresh page to make their mark.

It was at the pre-school graduation ceremony that I got all emotional as I handed out all their certificates and shared high fives with each one as was read out what each little young life wanted to do when they grew up, hairdressers, mechanics, firemen, dustmen, nurses and teachers and much more. Once that was over I stood in the wings and watched the parents get all emotional taking photo's of their loved ones in their graduation gowns and mortar boards, they were cute.

I stood there and pondered what lies ahead for each young life in a rapidly changing world, what the reality will actually look like. I guess as I have had a few funerals in recent weeks and having done hundreds over the years I have been privileged in the sadness to hear the other end as families look back and record those dreams that where once held in the innocence of youth. What did the reality look like?

Maybe like myself you never achieved what it was you dreamed about as a child, for me it was to become a dog handler in the police, then an army musician, a long way from the things I have actually done as a musical instrument technician, bus driver, train driver and instructor and now a full-time priest. Like those on that stage in the village hall I have learnt that life will play out its own cards and some will fulfil their dreams and others will find different avenues. Some will have nothing but joy and others will face the tragedies and struggles of life and even life itself.

As I stood there I prayed quietly in the wings that whatever the journey is for each of them they will experience the best that life can offer each of them, that they will find protection in God, that they will find support in each other and that their world will be a better one because of that love that we are called to share with each other.

That was my message in assembly to the year sixes, to take with them the values they have learnt in both schools, and the love they have experienced and shared with each other into their new schools. The truth is that the innocence of primary school is soon evaporated by senior school as older children and young people start to experience more of the wider world and experiment with it and pass that onto a watching younger generation and so the human story repeats as independently each learns how they want to model their lives.

Discipleship is about modelling your life on Christ Jesus, those who first listened to Jesus's teaching had a choice to adopt what they were being taught or reject it and find their own way. The transition many of our young people will be making now allows them to make that choice to, as they grow and mature, I pray that they will take onboard much that I have taught them in my assemblies about this way of life that is Jesus. Love, forgiveness, and the fruit of the Spirit of which just a little bit will change everything and the way in which they approach whatever it will be that life will present before them.
