

From the ministry team

Fruits of the Spirit

I love eating redcurrants. They are not to everyone's taste, I know, but I like them. I remember as a child, sitting outside in the garden, picking the redcurrants off their stalks so that they could be frozen, ready to be made into redcurrant jelly at a later date. Of course, what often happened is that a fair number ended up inside my mouth rather than in the bowl!

One of the joys of the summer months is fruit-picking - whether in your own garden or allotment, at a 'pick your own' farm, or even picking wild blackberries down a country lane!

Fruit is something that a plant produces which we (as well as birds and other wildlife) are able to enjoy and benefit from.

In the bible, in the New Testament, St Paul talks about 'Fruits of the Spirit'; these are attributes that, as followers of Jesus Christ, Christians try and live out. They are attributes that both we ourselves, but more importantly others, will benefit from. Paul lists these 'Fruits of the Spirit' as: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5.22-23).

These attributes are, of course, not easy a lot of the time, which is why they are called 'Fruits of the Spirit' - it is the Holy Spirit, that Jesus sent to us on the day of Pentecost, which helps us. We are not expected to be perfect, and we will certainly not be able to exhibit love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control all of the time. Yet they do, perhaps, make a helpful marker for how we might want to live and treat others, whether in school, at home, in work, or around the hotel swimming pool whilst on holiday!

Whatever your summer holds, I pray that it will be a good time for you - filled with many delicious fruits!

What do we really know about Mary Magdalene?

Fake news is not new. Perhaps one old example is the assertion that Mary Magdalene was a prostitute. Back in the 6th Century, Pope Gregory is said to have confused her with two other women in the Bible. Medieval Bible scholars also attempted to name an unidentified sinful woman who had washed and anointed the feet of Jesus. As Mary Magdalene is mentioned in the next

chapter, they regarded her as the same person! After this, many classical artists painted Mary in various states of undress, perpetuating a falsehood.

So what do we really know about Mary? The Gospels tell us that she came from Magdala, a town in Galilee, and Jesus healed her by casting out seven evil spirits. After this she followed Jesus, with other women, on His ministry providing resources. Later, Mary watched Jesus die on the cross, and having cared for His needs while He was alive, wanted to care for Him after His death.

It was when Mary went to anoint the body of Jesus at the tomb that the risen Jesus appeared to her. He told Mary to go to His disciples and tell them about His return to Heaven. She was obedient and became the first emissary of the resurrection. In those days, the witness of a woman was worthless. Despite ridicule, Mary had the courage to speak about Jesus in a place of great disbelief. We have to ask, do we have the same courage as Mary? How prepared are we to stand our ground to share Jesus with others in the face of those who mock and scoff at us?

Although we usually associate Mary with the Easter story, this month on 22 July, the Church celebrates her Feast Day. In this snapshot of Mary's life we know she had experienced great distress and suffering. After Jesus healed her, Mary expressed her gratitude by being utterly committed and devoted to Him.

Jesus can give everyone a new start; a new purpose and direction in life. Like Mary, we can thank Him for blessing us, loving us and forgiving us and moving into practical forms of service. Only Jesus can transform our lives so that we can glorify God in all that we do.

How do you give money to the Church?

Our three churches continue to exist, only because of the generosity of those who worship regularly, or support our work in the wider community. At the Annual General Meeting, held at St Margaret's on 28 May, we heard that during 2024, the total cost of maintaining our three churches was £77,588, whilst income received was £79,303. We had a small surplus, but some of the income was restricted for specific projects, meaning that there was a £515 deficit on day to day expenditure.

Many of our regular worshippers, and a few who have since moved away, make regular monthly payments by bank standing order. This gives us a regular income and helps us to budget for bills. Others put money in the collection plate at services. Unfortunately many of us no longer carry much cash, but at St Margaret's we have a machine to accept card payments. We have had a primitive machine for several years, but during 2024 we replaced it with a new one that is much easier to use. Probably 50% of our casual collection income now comes by way of card payments.

When the three parishes merged at the beginning of 2024, I decided to open the new account with NatWest, partly because I worked for them for nearly 40 years, but mainly because they were the only "proper" bank left in Wickford. I was therefore disappointed to learn that NatWest is following in the footsteps of Barclays, Lloyds, HSBC, Santander & Halifax and will be closing its Wickford branch in September 2025. That means that I will have to travel to Basildon or Chelmsford to bank cash received by the three churches.

If you are one of those who currently puts cash in the collection plate, I would encourage you to consider either setting up a monthly standing order with your bank, or using the card machine when it is available. I try to take it along to St Peter's and to St Mary's when we have larger services there, and we may decide to purchase another one.



On 4 May, a community picnic in the park was held in Norton Meadows. Although the weather was cool and breezy, over 200 residents came and enjoyed commemorating the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War in Europe.

The event began with the arrival of the Mayor of Chelmsford, Cllr Janette Potter, and was followed by an act of commemoration in which the lives of all those who served their country both in battle and on the home front, were remembered during a minute's silence.

Afterwards, people enjoyed their picnics while being entertained by the Ladybirds Song Group. There was a variety of other activities including family games, a photo booth featuring 1940's characters "Tommy and Vera", vintage vehicles, a children's scale traction engine ride and a Second World War quiz. The afternoon finished with the National Anthem.

A raffle was held to raise funds for SSAFA, the armed forces charity which supports both serving members of the armed forces, veterans and their families. A huge thank you to Jennie Kohter for organising the raffle which raised over $\mathfrak{L}700$. The sale of hot drinks, plants and other donations, together with the raffle, raised in excess of $\mathfrak{L}1,000$.

All in the month of July

It was:

250 years ago, on 1 July 1775 that the British Parliament brought in the New England Restraining Act. This forbade its North American colonies from trading with anyone other than Britain, Ireland, and the British West Indies. The colonies were also forbidden to fish in the Atlantic without permission.

175 years ago, on 2 July 1850 that Robert Peel, Prime Minister (1834-35, 1841-46) died. He founded the Metropolitan Police Service and is seen as the father of modern British policing.

100 years ago, on 21 July 1925 that racing driver Malcolm Campbell became the first person to travel at over 150 mph. He set a new land speed record of 150.87 mph at Pendine Sands in Wales in a Sunbeam 350HP. He also went on to break the 250 mph and 300 mph records, in 1932 and 1935.

80 years ago, on 5 July 1945 that WW2 leader Winston Churchill lost the General Election to Clement Attlee's Labour Party.

75 years ago, on 5 July 1950 that the Law of Return was passed in Israel. It granted all Jews the right to immigrate to Israel.

Also 75 years ago, on 24 July 1950 that the first rocket was launched from Cape Canaveral in Florida. It reached a height of 25 miles.

65 years ago, on 9 July 1960 that US President Dwight D Eisenhower and Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev traded threats over the future of Cuba.

60 years ago, on 8 July 1965 that Great Train Robber Ronnie Briggs escaped from Wandsworth Prison in London. He lived in Brazil until 2001, when he returned to London and was re-imprisoned. Released in 2009, he died in 2013.

40 years ago, on 13 July 1985 that the two Live Aid concerts were held simultaneously in London and Philadelphia, as well as at other venues such as Sydney and Moscow. They raised millions of pounds for famine relief in Africa.

30 years ago, on 16 July 1995 that Amazon.com first opened its website to the public

25 years ago, on 11 July 2000 that Robert Runcie, Archbishop of Canterbury (1980 – 1991) died..

25 years ago, on 25 July 2000 that an Air France Concorde crashed outside of Paris, shortly after taking off for New York. It killed all 109 people on board, along with four people on the ground.

20 years ago, that the 7 July (2005) London bombings took place. The coordinated series of four suicide bomb attacks on London's transport system during the morning rush hour killed 56 people and injured more than 700. It was the worst-ever terrorist attack on Britain, and the country's first attack by suicide bombers.

Also 20 years ago, on 28 July 2005 that the IRA ended its 30-year armed campaign in Northern Ireland and ordered all units to dump their weapons. IRA leadership said that they would continue their campaign exclusively through peaceful means

10 years ago, on 14 July 2015 that NASA's New Horizons space probe, launched in 2006, completed the first-ever flyby of the dwarf planet Pluto, and returned close-up photos.


