Grains of Sand

My grandparents lived in Leigh-on-Sea, so summer holidays always involved a trip to the beach. Perhaps you have a plan to visit the seaside, whether locally or in more exotic climes, this August.

Have you ever wondered how many grains of sand there are on a beach? Have you ever tried to work it out? Google tells me that a small beach would contain more than 781 trillion grains - can you imagine how many grains of sand are in the Sahara desert?!

A few thousand years ago a man wrote a song that is now known as Psalm 139, and in that song he used this image of uncountable grains of sand to describe how big and vast God is - vastly beyond our human comprehension.

Yet he also tells of how, in spite of how small and insignificant we must be when compared to the vastness of God, God loves us as much as if we were the only grain of sand on the beach. God showed the vastness of that love in Jesus Christ, who died for us out of that love so that nothing would separate us from God's love.

Here is just a small part of Psalm 139:

How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand – when I awake, I am still with you.

(Psalm 139:17-18)

Ethelwold, Wessex saint who founded the first monastic cathedral

St Ethelwold (c.912 - 84) did great things for the church at Winchester, which in those days was the principle town of Wessex. He began as a simple monk, eager to restore the Rule of Benedictine in England, a major reform for the church of the time. So, after serving at the abbey in Glastonbury, he was sent on to restore the old abbey at Abingdon. The king thought highly of him, and used him to teach his son, the future king, Edgar.

When in 963 Ethelwold became Bishop of Winchester, he replaced the cathedral canons with monks, thus founding the first monastic cathedral in the land. This was a uniquely English institution, which remained until the Reformation. The monastic reform quickly gained momentum: with the King's support, Ethelwold restored old monasteries such as Milton (Dorset), New Minster and Nunnaminster in Winchester, while new monasteries were founded and richly endowed at Peterborough (966), Ely (970) and Thorney (972).

Ethelwold was austere, able and dynamic. Under his leadership, the monks excelled at music, illumination and writing. When Ethelwold set the monks to work with the masons in the cathedral at Winchester, he built the most powerful organ of its time in England: it was played by two monks and had 400 pipes and 36 bellows. In music, Ethelwold's Winchester had the distinction of producing the first English polyphony in the Winchester Troper.

Ethelwold's monasteries also produced a surpassing new style of illumination, and his school of vernacular writing was the most important of its time: with accurate, linguistically significant translations. A major event of his episcopate was the consecration of Winchester Cathedral in 980.

All in the month of August

It was:

1,700 years ago, on 25 August 325 that the First Council of Nicaea ended with the adoption of the Nicene Creed. It summarised the Christian faith and established the doctrine of the Holy Trinity.

250 years ago, on 5 August 1775 that the first Europeans entered San Francisco Bay. Spanish explorer Juan de Ayala and his crew on the ship San Carlos explored and mapped the bay.

Also 250 years ago, on 23 August 1775 that King George III issued the Proclamation of Rebellion. It stated that the American colonies were in a state of open rebellion, and must be suppressed.

150 years ago, on 4 August 1875 that Hans Christian Andersen, Danish writer, died. Best known for his fairy tales, such as The Emperor's New Clothes, The Little Mermaid, The Princess and the Pea, The Snow Queen, The Ugly Duckling, and many more.

125 years ago, on 25 August 1900 that Friedrich Nietzsche, German philosopher and philologist, died. His work had a major impact on modern intellectual history. One of his most prominent concepts was the 'will to power', which he believed was the main driving force in humans.

100 years ago, on 5 August 1925 that the Welsh nationalist political party Plaid Cymru was founded. Today it holds four of the 32 Welsh seats in the UK Parliament, 12 of the 60 seats in the Senedd, and 202 of the 1,231 principal local authority councillors.

90 years ago, on 21 August 1935 that John Hartley, British tennis player, died. He was the only clergyman ever to win Wimbledon, and in fact he was world number 1 player in both 1879 and 1880 – winning Wimbledon both years.

80 years ago, on 6 August 1945 that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on the city of Hiroshima in Japan. The centre of the city was totally destroyed, and about 80,000 people were killed immediately. A further 60,000 died by the end of the year, from injury or radiation. Hiroshima was the first city in history to be hit by a nuclear weapon.

Also 80 years ago, on 9 August, that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on Nagasaki, killing 40,000 immediately and more than another

33,000 by the end of the year. It was (so far) the last nuclear bomb to ever be dropped.

75 years ago, on 15 August 1950 that Princess Anne, the Princess Royal, was born.

70 years ago, on 28 August 1955 that Emmett Till, an African American teenager was mutilated and killed in Mississippi, after flirting with a white woman. His death was one of the key events to motivate the Civil Rights Movement.

65 years ago, in August 1960, the following countries gained independence: Central African Republic, Chad, Cyprus, Dahomey (Benin), Gabon, Ivory Coast, Niger, Republic of the Congo (Brazzaville), Senegal, and Upper Volta (Burkina Faso),

Also 65 years ago, on 6 August 1960 that the Twist became a national sensation in the US, and triggered one of the biggest dance crazes, when singer Chubby Checker performed the song on the show American Bandstand.

60 years ago, on 6 August 1965 that the Beatles' Album HELP! was released.

50 years ago, on 1 August 1975, that the Helsinki Accords were signed by 35 nations in an attempt to improve relations between the Communist Bloc and the West.

Also 50 years ago, on 20 August 1975 that NASA launched its Viking 1 space probe on a mission to Mars. It became the first spacecraft to land successfully on Mars, and to complete its mission.

40 years ago, on 22 August 1985 that the Manchester Air Disaster took place when a British Airtours Boeing 737 burst into flames after an engine caught fire and a fuel tank ruptured. 55 people were killed.

30 years ago, on 24 August 1995 that Microsoft released both Windows 95 operating systems and also Microsoft Office 95.

25 years ago, on 4 August 2000 that Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother celebrated her 100th birthday. (She died in March 2002, aged 101).

20 years ago, on 22 August 2005 that the last Israeli settlers left the Gaza strip, ending 38 years of occupation.

Also 20 years ago, from 23 to 30 August 2005 that Hurricane Katrina hit the Bahamas, Cuba and several southern US states. The city of New Orleans was flooded by 80 per cent when the levee system was overwhelmed. More than 1,800 people died. It was the costliest natural disaster in US history.

15 years ago, on 5 August 2010 that the Copiapo Mining Accident in Chile took place. A cave-in at the San Jose copper and gold mine trapped 33 workers 700 metres underground, and an international rescue operation was

launched. The workers were brought to the surface on 13 October, 69 days later. Around one billion people watched their rescue on TV.

10 years ago, on 1 August 2015 that Cilla Black, pop singer and TV presenter died. Known for her hit song Anyone who had a heart and for presenting Blind Date and Surprise Surprise.

Holiday reading

When I go away, I first write a list of things to pack. I pride myself on being able to pack quickly; just throw some spare clothes in a bag, toothbrush, other things I need and of course plenty to read. My experience tells me I need at least a book a day. I take old books which I have read, guidebooks and maps about the place I am visiting, and some of the books from my pile of 'to read'. 
Are your sunglasses good enough?





