LOVE IN ACTION ON THE RIVER KWAI



During the Second World War, Japanese prisoner of war camps were places of death and despair. The prisoners were forced to work until they dropped, building bridges or working to construct the railroad to Burma. Many fell ill from exhaustion, disease, or lack of

food, and many died. Captain Ernest Gordon was among the prisoners of war who were marched into the jungle to build a bridge over the River Kwai. He became desperately ill, suffering, among other things, from dysentery, malaria and diphtheria and its after effects. He could not bear the stench and airlessness of the sleeping platform reserved for sick prisoners, and he asked to be moved to a place in the open air, where the bodies of those who died were stacked. One day he heard the doctors say that he would soon die. But prisoner friends built him a little hut and furnished it with a bed of split bamboo, covered with clean rice sacks. Gently and carefully they carried his thin body and laid it on the bed. Then two fellow prisoners came to see him, offering to nurse him. He was too ill to do anything for himself.

Both men were Christians. Dusty was a Methodist and Dinty a Roman Catholic. Dusty set to work at once. He fetched warm water and some rags and gave Captain Gordon the first wash he had enjoyed for weeks. Then, with great care and gentleness, he cleaned the sores and ulcers that covered his legs. Before he left, he sprinkled the dirt floor of the hut with water and swept it clean. In the evening, when Dusty had to report for duty in the kitchen, Dinty, who had finished work for the day, took over as night nurse.

First thing in the morning, Dusty reappeared with a breakfast of rice. Then he would set about washing Captain and tending his ulcers. Next he began to massage the washed limbs to bring back some feeling and strengthen the muscles. Gordon began to get better. In time he took his first few stumbling steps. His own courage and determination completed the recovery.


The love and care of those two Christians had saved him from certain death, but neither had said much about their faith, until asked.

Both clearly showed Jesus' love in their willingness to do even the most unpleasant tasks cheerfully and kindly.

Captain Gordon and some of the other prisoners began to read about Jesus in the Gospels and let his love come into their own lives. Soon they wanted to show his love to others.

The whole camp was transformed. Before, everyone had fought for his own rights. Now, men thought of one another's needs. Selfishness and despair shrivelled up and happiness and hope grew strong as more and more prisoners began to share the love and care of Jesus, for his sake.

If love and care in this way can be shared in this place of death and despair, may we also show the love of

Betty Woodcock Remembers

REMEMBERING THE SUFFERING INFLICTED ON THE MILLITARY ARMIES BY THE JAPANESE COMMAND AND EXPERENCIES OF A PERSONAL FRIEND.

IT WAS A SHOCK TO, ON FIRST SIGHT, LOOK AT A SKELETON OF MINE AND JAMES FRIEND STANLEY. IMAGINE THE SHOCK FOR HIS WIFE JEAN.

JEAN AND I HAD A COFFEE AND DEBATED OUR NEXT MOVE.

WE LIVED IN IDENTICAL HOUSES ON A HILL, SEDLEY RISE IN LOUGHTON, ESSEX. JEAN AND STAN AT NO 12, JAME'S AND I AT NO 46. WE HAD TO GET STAN BACK TO (GOOD HEALTH), LIKE OURS IN THE UK. JEAN COULD NOT PERSUADE HIM TO EAT ENGLISH FOOD JUST RICE.

I DEVISED A PLAN. I WOULD WALK DOWN THE HILL -ABOUT A QUARTER OF A MILE TO NO 12 AND COLLECT HIM — HE WOULD TAKE MY ARM AND WE WALKED TO 46 AND I WOULD TAKE HIM BACK BY CAR AS HE WAS SO WEAK. WE DID THIS DAILY UNTIL HE HAD SOME STRENGTH TO WALK AND EAT (FANCY) ENGLISH FOOD.

STAN RECOVERED WELL, BUT HE AND JEAN FOUND THERE WERE TOO MANY MEMORIES AT NO 12 AND THEY WOULD HAVE TO MOVE.

THIS THEY DID, AND AS SO OFTEN HAPPENS WE LOST TOUCH WITH THEM. THEIR MOVE WAS TO THE COUNTRY. STAN KEPT HIS JOB AND STILL WENT TO LONDON BY TRAIN. AND WORKED WITH JAMES. MY LIFE CHANGED AS WE WERE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE 2ND WORLD WAR.

AS IS KNOWN I CELEBRATED MY 100TH BIRTHDAY ON 31ST AUGUST 2024.

STANLEY'S IS A MEMORY THAT REMAINS WITH ME LIKE SO MANY OTHERS. STANLEY'S, I FEEL SHOULD BE SHARED, AND I HOPE THIS IS RIGHT.

VJ Day 80 – August 15th 2025

VJ Day is often an overlooked part of Second World War history but it left an indelible mark on the collective East Anglian memory from halfway across the world. For almost 25 years as Chaplain to Far East Prisoners of War I have been determined to not let this country forget those members of our Armed Forces that were

still in captivity and sacrificing their lives in the Far East whilst there were celebrations throughout the country celebrating what has become termed as the 'end of the second world war' in May 1945. (VE Day)

The ill-fated 18th Infantry Division was a territorial formation of East Anglian battalions including the 4th, 5th and 6th Royal Norfolk's. Whilst originally heading for the middle east, Japan's declaration of war and subsequent rapid march down the Malayan Peninsula saw them divert for the island 'fortress' of Singapore. Despite its reputation, the Battle for Singapore was a brief one, and the British Army surrendered on the 15th February 1942.

The men captured in Singapore would go on to suffer three and a half years of brutal treatment at the hands of the Japanese, with many being sent up country to build the Thai-Burma railway, otherwise known as the 'Railway of Death'.

Around a quarter of these men would die from starvation, brutality and disease, but their stories stand as testament to the enduring nature of the human spirit in the face of seemingly hopeless circumstances.

With the 80th anniversary of VJ Day on the horizon, I have organised with the permission of the Dean the Very Revd Dr Andrew Braddock, that the hub of commemorations in Norfolk are set to be in Norwich Cathedral.

The service is on 15th August 2025 at 11am.

I would love to have the support of members of our Benefice Community in the congregation. Please do let me know if you are able to come as it is ticketed event (for security purposes).

Many of you will recall the 70th Commemorations shown on TV at St Martin-in-the-Fields, however, I do not anticipate such honoured guests this time – except of course yourselves!



Steam and Sail Tuesday 5th August and Thursday 21st August 2025





RAF AIR DEFENCE RADAR MUSEUM



The dark shape of a Junkers bomber slips in and out of the clouds, high over the North Sea in September 1941. The pilot had learned the hard lessons to survive the massed raids on Britain the previous summer. He knows on a cold night the bomber's engine contrails would glow in the moonlight and make them an easy target for British night fighters, so by skimming the clouds he hoped to mask his course, but the poor tail gunner behind him couldn't see much through the fogged glass of his turret.

If he could see, he might have spotted the black shark fin parting

the clouds just 400 yards away. The fin belongs to a Beaufighter, a twin-engine RAF night fighter equipped with 4 cannons and the wonder that is airborne radar.

Onboard, the radar operator can see little outside his bubble in the fuselage of the fighter, but with his



forehead pressed to his glowing radar scope he focusses on the flicker of interference which shows exactly where the enemy bomber is.

The fighter's radar has a range of a few miles, but with the careful guidance of 'Seacut' they have snuck into the perfect position below their prey. 'Seacut' is the callsign of the ground controller operating the radar from a canvas covered lorry parked in the middle of a field between Horning and Neatishead. Watching his circular radar display, he nervously watches the blips of the bomber and fighter close and then merge.

It takes seconds for the Beaufighter to emerge from the cloud, unleash devastating cannon fire, and watch as the bomber rolls towards the dark sea, a large white circle of spray marking its end. The development of radar was a crucial part of Britain's air defences, to enable the survival of the RAF during the Battle of Britain, to interrupt the night raids of the Blitz and even to combat the V1 Doodlebug flying bombs that struck London and Norfolk in the last year of the war. The RAF Air Defence Radar Museum has fascinating displays and talks about radar technology, strategy, but more importantly the real stories of the men and women who were involve in this secretive world through wartime and peace.

The volunteer-run museum is open 10am-5pm, Tuesday to Saturday every week until the 15th November and entrance tickets last a year from date of purchase.

After confirming the paddleboarder was safe and well, our volunteer crew returned to station and made the boat ready for service.

We were delighted to welcome members of the Bure Valley Rotary Club for a recent tour of our lifeboat station. The visit offered a fantastic opportunity to showcase the vital work we do and the equipment that helps us save lives at sea.

During the tour, we provided an in-depth look at our lifeboats and the specialist equipment we rely on during shouts, from navigation and communication tools to our comprehensive first aid kits, including the rigorous training our volunteers undergo to stay rescue-ready.
