# July letter from the Dean of Hereford Flush not busted!

It is too easy to have our perception of the Church of England prejudiced by media accounts of our general awfulness, our



dismal failures and our decline- It is also extremely hard - and sometimes demoralising work keeping on with a much loved but apparently unsustainable model of ministry. Are we- we might wonder- doing that against all the odds because it is right and God's will- or because we of a certain generation can't bear to let it go and no obvious replacement is evident? Whether you are part of a tiny church in the middle of a farm or a larger church, priory or cathedral these uncomfortable questions might occur to you from time to time.

I want to offer two rebuttals to the general sense of the weakness of the church. The first is simply that the gospel rather stands on weakness and apparent defeat! Some might say that the Church thrives on it because it stops trying to please the world and focuses on being faithful to the Lord. That is a very hard path- and for churches in places like North Korea, India, and Sub-Saharan Africa - a devastating one. But small and weak keeps on keeping on with its eyes on Jesus. Perhaps most of us are not small and weak enough to let go and rely totally on God. I am not brave enough to incite you all to cast aside wealth and community popularity although I'm pretty sure that Jesus was fairly clear about such things-not least because in today's compliance laden society it would incite breaking the law of the land in many ways and He didn't recommend that. But I am sure that we are less small and weak than we think. Remember Elijah thinking he was the only servant of God left in Israel and God telling him to get a grip because he actually had a sizeable number of faithful Israelites on standby?

The second rebuttal reinforces the point. I sit on the board of trustees of the Benefact Trust, which owns a financial services company that you might recognise as Ecclesiastical Insurance. Benefact gives a significant proportion of its annual profits to the Trust for the sole purpose of providing churches and church organisations with grants to assist with building projects and community transformation work. I am on the board to represent and articulate the broad needs of parishes and cathedrals and I love the days when we consider applications and see what is going on across the church. What is going on is phenomenal!

Ladies and gentlemen, the Church is not dead or even dying. Where there is missional vision and aspiration for community, there is life. Where there is nothing but steady prayer and faith, God can and will work for the good of those who love him and for the coming of His Kingdom.

We are called to trust the God who created us. There will be troubles, but God is bigger than all of these.

So back to me and my worrying as a child. My Dad got me a plaster which he stuck on my wrist, and it read "Confidence and Strength." When the worry came on, and it did, I would look at the plaster and it would calm my fears.

Have confidence in God and his son Jesus. Know that he is with you, and also have strength to trust that he will lead you, especially when times are tough.

### Airmen on the Brown Clee - a Service of Remembrance.

to Commemorate those who lost their lives during WWII and later years.

Karen Simons writes:

A Service of Remembrance took place at the summit of Brown Clee Hill, to remember the crews of two aircraft, British and German, which crashed during operations in World War II. In addition, other airmen, including from a Canadian aircraft, which also came down nearby, were remembered. In total there were crews from 10 aircraft, 30 men lost.

Some 48 people attended the memorial service on a hot sunny day at the top of Brown Clee Hill. Our thanks go to all those who made it possible: the Millington Family, Tony and Babs Brown, Charles Hunter and everyone who drove up to the site, and provided delicious refreshments afterwards. Thank you also to Lord Boyne who allowed us vehicular access so that all could pay tribute to the fallen airmen.

The service was conducted by Revd Joe Simons, who spoke of the bravery and courage of these young airmen. It included the laying of wreaths and prayers of hope, peace and reconciliation for the future.

It was particularly poignant to have Phillipa Hodgkiss present as she had played such a huge part in erecting the memorial in 1981 and in the recognition of these men. In attendance was also Paul Massey whose mother Maud Howells, on hearing one of the crashes as a young girl, rode through the mist to provide comfort to the stricken crew.

It is proposed that this service would now become an annual event, since it had come to an end prior to covid in 2019.

#### Brown Clee Remembrance - continued

Our thanks to Ian Hodgkiss, the nephew of Phillipa, who kindly provided the following account of his aunt's role in the Memorial, with permission to publish it in WN. More pictures of and about the service are overleaf.



*Ian Hodgkiss writes:* 

Having had a long interest in wartime history, possibly through being bombed by the Luftwaffe as a toddler in Birmingham, in 1978, Philippa heard about the wartime crash of a single German bomber on Brown Clee Hill.

She made enquiries and met two very knowledgeable local eyewitnesses. Maud Howells had been a shepherdess on the hill, and remembered the German crashing, in fact, as a sprightly 15-year-old, she'd been sent up the trees it had crashed through to recover the remains of the crew. People had stronger stomachs back then, and she was a farming girl. As well as the German, she pointed out several other crash sites nearby. Maud had been first on the scene of a Wellington bomber crash, helping an injured survivor who, having taken hold of her hand, wouldn't let her go. There were more crashes still, another Wellington, a Mustang fighter and a Typhoon so secret that the unfortunate plot's parachute was used to hide its engine from prying eyes.

Philippa also met Tom Bytheway. His family lived high on the East side of the hill, and having been narrowly missed by two crashing Avro Ansons, he took the chance to move to a house on lower ground.

There was no record of one of the Anson crashes, but some parts of the aircraft were found under the turf. A manufacture's part number and inspection stamp on a tiny metal hinge allowed Philippa to identify the aircraft's serial number, and then its crew, from a card index held by the Air Force Historical Branch Office in London. There was no internet back then!

Having heard the stories from Maud, Tom, and many others, and discovered the names of the 23 men lost on Brown Clee, Philippa was sufficiently moved set about erecting a memorial. Another group of enthusiasts from Merseyside, The Warplane Wreck Investigation Group, had helped in her investigations on the hill, and one of their members was able to locate a slate slab from a billiard table at the abandoned RAF East Kirby. A Royal Air Force eagle was cast from aluminium wreckage from several of the crashes and was attached to the engraved slab. A stainless steel plate recorded the 23 names, and on Good Friday 1981, Philippa and the WWIG lads mounted the slab and plate on the saddle of Brown Clee, in a spot suggested and kindly consented to by the landowners, the Boyne Estate. There had been no fund raising or formal dedication, but the memorial was soon pointed out by the Birmingham Aircrew association, many of whose members flew alongside those lost on the hill. They established an annual memorial service on the hill, with flags, standards, and often a flypast from nearby RAF Shawbury.

The last service at the memorial was in 2019, when covid brought everything to an end.

Fortunately, Julian Middleton at the nearby Chetton Heritage Museum, has rekindled interest in Brown Clee's wartime history. Philippa had placed a two-foot square aerial photo of the hill, with crash sites marked and stories told, in the Youth Hostel on Brown Clee. When the hostel closed, the photo had made its way to a museum at Sleap airfield. By now it was looking tatty, but Julian rescued it for his museum. With his mum, Sheila, being very involved with the local church, a fitting service was organised on a sweltering July day, with Philippa, and the late Maud Howell's son, in attendance.

Long may it continue.



Maybe knowing about the memorial, and its purpose, will tempt people to venture up the Brown Clee to discover its incredible atmosphere and take time and peace for their own remembrance. It is a challenging climb, especially for the less fit – but so rewarding!

Quite a few who attended this service were glad to ride up in the shoot wagon, or by car, on the road which replaced the old quarry railway. Others may have climbed from the road through the coolness of the trees.









About 48 people gathered around the memorial itself for the service and the wreath-laying – but some stayed in the shelter of the wood, to pay their own respects.

#### Use it - or Lose it!

As some of you will know, I was the Sub postmistress at Ditton Priors for 27 years - 10 years full time to begin with, then reducing and employing staff whilst I cared for grandchildren. A great deal changed during that time; withdrawal of Pensions and Child Allowances (at least 50% of our business) National Savings, Savings Stamps for TV Licences and BT payments, etc.

Sub-post offices are partly subsidised by the Government but the remaining remuneration comes from the amount of business traffic through the Office - every stamp sold is counted and every bill paid, etc. Despite the amount of responsibility involved many Sub postmasters receive less than £10 per hour for their work, and this is why in Ditton Priors the opening hours have been reduced. There are also overheads of rent and electricity to cover.

We really should value the service available to us. Did you know that our Post Office is the village Bank?

- You can pay in Cheques and Cash and withdraw Cash on behalf of many Banks.
- You can purchase Foreign Currency, either to order or Euros are in stock same day.
- You can still pay bills -I pay Electricity and Council Tax and now DVLA Car Tax is provided as well.

Our Post Office is a VALUABLE ASSET to the Community and I for one use it whenever possible. My message is clear: **USE IT OR LOSE IT.** And Thank You, Lily, for the excellent service you provide. [See Editorial for Government page – Ed]

In the case of Ellen it was a trip made by Bob, her late husband, in the 1950s, for Donna it was a much more recent trip. Both also showed us various objects from these trips; an Alpaca skin rug and the brightly coloured shawls. Donna noted on her visit how the traditional dress is being replaced by western fashions, perhaps a rather sad comment. I did the "God slot", about Paddington Bear, a visitor from Peru who shows some very Christ-like features in the books and films.

As at Glazeley, the socialising after the formal event is all part of the occasion; we finished the service at 6.45 and an hour later we were still talking. # A day spent tidying up a churchyard

Anni Calver writes:

I had a lovely time recently in a churchyard, with the Churchyard Task Team. We go out most weeks and 'tidy up' where we are working. We all love it in the summer as it is time for the annual cut of the grasses and flowers.

It was bit of a surprise to find the village school pupils waiting to see us and to find out what we were doing in "their" churchyard. Their school overlooks the 12<sup>th</sup>-century building, which is surrounded by a quite large burial ground. First, they wanted to know why we use old-fashioned tools like scythes instead of a mower. We soon convinced them that manoeuvring a modern mower even without wires was difficult because of the tombstones.

So what else do we do? We explained that scything did not cut the grass as

close to the ground as mowers did and this was better for the wild life in the space. We also did not use fertiliser or pesticides and we could control the space

such as mice, shrews and the threatened dormouse. With fallen branches we make habitat piles, which offer warmth and protection to small animals from big ones.

We do cutting down too. We might trim some ivy, not because they kill the trees they are leaning on, but because ivy is an amazing plant. It offers shelter to birds and insects in the winter when trees are bare. In Spring, the leaf growth provides hidden spaces to build a nest so big bad birds do not see chicks as their next meal. They eat the berries too.

And what about the headstones? They can tell us so much about the people who lived here hundreds of years ago. We cannot read one much before 1700 as the weather has usually worn the stonemasons work away. If your family has lived in the village for a long time, you may be able to find name just like yours. Discovering your ancestry is very popular today, encouraged by television programmes.

The children had to go back to school as it was playtime for them and work time for us ageing scythers. We had learned a lot from each other. We had touched on history in the building, learned a lot about the environment, compared old and new with surprising outcomes. We had also agreed that brambles are good for blackberries and in patches are good places for our wild life to hide but it does hurt if you got scratched.

So we started our work after our tea break and managed to get everything done that we planned to do. The main lesson learned though is that maybe we do not use these village havens for education as much as we could. So if you're involved in teaching maybe this article will encourage you to look again at what is just down the road.

# Hereford Motion at the General Synod

#### The Motion

Bishop Michael of Bath & Wells to move on behalf of Bishop Richard of Hereford and the Hereford Diocesan Synod;

'That this Synod:

- (i) call upon the Church Commissioners and Archbishops Council to undertake everything necessary to effect a redistribution of financial resources directly to Diocesan Stipend Funds to reflect the value of contributions made by Diocesan Boards of Finance to the Church of England Funded Pension Scheme since it was established by the settlement of 1997 (£2.6 billion); and
- (ii) call upon Diocesan Boards of Finance to manage the funds redistributed as a result of the above to support parish ministry in the ways discerned locally to be most effective in enabling growth and sustaining the Church of England's commitment to be a Christian presence in every community.'


# Molecule of the Month: Amphiregulin - and heart attacks in the morning

It has been known for many years that most heart attacks occur in the morning. We work on daily rhythms, perhaps the most obvious being that we usually sleep at night and are awake in the day. These are known as diurnal rhythms and are driven by a intrinsic clock that is at work in our body.

The clock drives levels of a number of key proteins, so that their levels fluctuate over 24 hours, with a peak and a trough. These are known as clock proteins. Typically, they in turn switch on or off the production of other proteins, that, for example, might cause us to be sleepy or alert. In the case of the heart, a number of factors such as blood pressure come together in a morning to make it a dangerous time. However, research has now shown that there is also a defence system that follows the same pattern, so that if someone has a heart attack in the morning, the body is prepared for it.

In the case of the heart, the key clock protein is known as BMAL1. This can pair with a number of other proteins; the choice of its partner defines what it will do. In the heart, the key partner is the protein HIF-2. This is normally produced when blood oxygen is low; it causes cells to make other proteins that protect them against the low level of oxygen. In a heart attack, the blood vessels that supply the heart are blocked. As blood carries oxygen, the heart cells cannot get enough of this and become damaged or die. Paradoxically, the most dangerous period is when some degree of blood supply is restored; heart cells react badly to this and often die.



HIF2, when it pairs with BMAL1, can protect against this type of damage, known as reperfusion injury. BMAL1 levels are low at night, but rise during the day, fortunately coinciding with the period when people are most at risk of a heart attack. The HIF2-BMAL1 pair works by causing heart cells to make another protein called **amphiregulin**. This activates what is known as the "cell survival pathway", which does exactly what the name suggests. It also improves connectivity between heart cells. This reduces the damage the heart experiences.

Tracing the path of this natural protection mechanism against heart attacks is scientifically satisfying. However, it also has some potential practical applications. There are already drugs that can activate BMAL1 and make HIF2 more stable inside cells. In experimental models of heart attacks, giving these drugs is beneficial. Our new knowledge opens the way for these, or derivatives of them, to be given to patients by medical staff as soon as possible after a patient has a heart attack.

#### Keeping the Show on the Road during the vacancy - part 21

As July drew to its thundery close, we reflected that in recent days 'doing what church does well' had been an enormous challenge 'in vacancy' as our communities were deeply shocked - in an unimaginable variety of ways - by the impact of the tragic fire at The Fighting Cocks.

Six days later, on the Sunday, St Mary's hosted an informal worship service for Community Reflection. Over 40 people turned out in the rain simply to 'be together', to remember better times and to share hopes for the future. Thanks to Joe, Jeannetta and Fiona for reaching out and to Fr Justin for his sensitive support in achieving the mission: "God bless Annie".

# Completion of the St Mary's Bell Restoration Project

The Bell ringers at St Mary's celebrated the completion of their Restoration Project on 14th July with the dedication, by Rev Val Smith at the Sunday service, of a special plaque which marks the restoration of the Treble Bell, achieved through generous local benefactors, and the memory of Lizz Backhouse ... a ringer at the Tower for many years.

The project - led by Tower Captain Derek Overton

## Under Your Feet!

By August, areas of long, flowery grassland should have been cut (unless you have late flowering species such as scabious or betony present, in which case these areas can be left a little longer). With the cutting and raking of long grass there is often an opportunity to spy onto the world of small rodents such as mice, shrews and voles who may have made routes through the sward that are revealed by the cut.

Small rodents are short lived and highly reproductive, wood mice for example tend to live for about a year, during which time they may have up to six litters of between four and eight young. In a churchyard you may have several species of mice, shrews and voles, the most likely being wood mice, field vole and common shrew. Wood mice have large ears and eyes, useful for their largely nocturnal life whilst field voles have blunter noses and smaller ears and eyes, they can be active during the day and night. Shrews are distinctive with a long, pointed nose and tiny eyes. All of these animals need to feed frequently and are always on the move seeking food, with shrews eating 80 to 90% of their body weight each day. They feed on insects and other invertebrates but will also tackle quite large earthworms, far bigger than they are! Mice and voles seek out seeds, berries and fruits, some of which they may stash for later. Whilst mice can be agile climbers, voles tend to stick to the ground, following the trails they make through grassland that you can see after a cut.

Unfortunately for voles and mice, they are important prey items for a range of other species. Tawny owls, also often found in churchyards, hunt silently for small rodents as do kestrels, weasels, foxes and of course cats. If you are interested to find out more, look for owl pellets beneath a nest or roosting place, these are regurgitated bundles of the inedible parts of their food and often contain bones which can be teased out of the pellet and then identified, giving information on what they have been eating. Shrews by contrast are not such a staple food item, you may find a bitten and dead shrew lying on a path suggesting that it has been hunted but was not very tasty.

Churchyards and other burial grounds are havens for rodents, containing a mosaic of grassland, shrubs, woodland and lots of places to make burrows or use existing cracks, nooks and crannies. Free of herbicides and pesticides they are full of food, both invertebrates and plant material whilst areas of long meadow and tussocky coarse grass provide perfect cover. See if you can spot their burrows and runways and imagine their busy lives in the fast lane!

# More Green Ideas – continued from Back Cover

Children love water, but so do garden creatures in this hot weather. Ponds don't have to be expensive with liners etc, any household item that will hold water will make a small pond. Be creative in making it a habitat, with rocks, stones, sticks and plants, but if it has steep sides, do provide a ramp as an escape route. Put it in a shady place and top it up regularly. If you do make one, creatures will find it surprisingly quickly.

Growing plants from seeds is interesting, try runner bean seeds in a jam jar, cress on a damp cloth....even put it in an egg shell decorated with a face. Cut the tops off root vegetables and watch them re sprout in a dish of water. These quick result growing projects can then be transferred to veg growing in the garden.

Enter vegetable or flowers the children's section of Clee St Margaret Summer Fair on 16th August 2pm. See advert.

Collecting and pressing wild flowers was popular in the 1960's, still ok to do if you make sure its not a rare species! Having a competition to see who can collect the most different species of grass is challenging when your out for a walk too

Rummage in the recycle bin and make a sculpture out of disposable cartons and boxes.

Empty milk cartons can be shaped into great bird feeders and water sources, then hung from a tree.

Decorating trees by winding fabric around tree trunks and branches is an ancient art form from eastern countries, but wool plaited or crocheted length looks interesting dangling from branches in the breeze.

If you are lucky enough to have a butterfly net, purchase a butterfly chart from FSC, they are sturdier for children to use outside when identifying species. The bee chart is really good

and you will be amazed at the variety bees in the UK.

Take part in The Big Butterfly Count organised by the Butterfly Conservation Charity to help scientists monitor their population, taking place now.

Making charts of what you see, or writing a journal is an important record of what's around your local area. You can even upload your species list to irecord, an UK recording website.

Mammal tunnels are fascinating to see what creature has tip toed through overnight. A length of square drain pipe, length of paper inside with charcoal and veg oil making an inky pad to be walked over at the entrance, the little feet leave great tracks to identify.

Check if your local wildlife group has a moth trap you could borrow. A parent might even be able to make a simple one. Moth are a fascinating species, there is such a variety of them flying at night.

Make use of binoculars, a magnifying glass and a camera to record what you see.

Scrappies Store in Church Stretton, is a wonderful place to grab bargain craft equipment, it has a section where you can fill a basket for about £5. Items like card, jars, remnants of wool and fabric, pens and surplus items from retailers, are in there. Worth a visit.

## Green Ideas to Entertain the Children this month

The long-awaited summer holidays are here. Children are eager for the time at home to play and relax. But it can be anything but relaxing for parents and grandparents. After the first couple of weeks, entertaining children can be both exhausting and expensive.

So here are a few ideas to pass sunny days away and help children to connect with nature .....

We know it's important for children to play outside, it develops them physically and by running, climbing, exploring it helps them stay active. It improves balance and coordination and the time in sunlight helps the body produce that important vitamin D.

Green spaces have a calming effect on children, especially woodlands, it improves their mood and lowers stress. Research has shown that time in nature improves concentration and stimulates their imagination.

Children who spend more time amongst animals, plants and eco systems, we find helps their connection with other living things and will hopefully inspire them to care for their natural environment when they get older.

Painting outside is fun, when my grandchildren were little they loved painting each others' bodies!
Cheap rolls of lining wallpaper can be rolled out in the garden and footprints, leaf prints, rolling

painted pebbles, stamping with sticks etc, produces lovey textures. Outside painting can be big. Use chalks on paving slabs and fence panels, it can easily be hosed off.

Make a kite, lots of design ideas on the web. Flags are fun to make too, a centre piece in the garden or small ones on lollipop sticks for a trail. Rip up some old cotton sheets or pillow cases to make them.

Collecting small twigs that resemble a person, then wind wool around them to make different characters ........ you could have a go at Stickman or even a scarecrow.







Carving sticks is fab, experiment with different branches to find a species that carves well. some are much easier to carve than others. Again you can wind wool, fabric and beads to decorate your hand made walking stick. You could make a holly wooden spoon for cooking.

Bee hotels create great habitats: look at the one in Sainsbury's car park in Ludlow and see just how many bees have used it for a base. There are lots of designs again on the internet, but a tin can used as the base, works very well
