Love In Action On The River Kwai



During the Second World War, Japanese prisoner of war camps were places of death and despair. The prisoners were forced to work until they dropped, building bridges or working to construct

the railroad to Burma. Many fell ill from exhaustion, disease, or lack of food, and many died. Captain Ernest Gordon was among the prisoners of war who were marched into the jungle to build a bridge over the River Kwai. He became desperately ill, suffering, among other things, from dysentery, malaria and diphtheria and its after effects. He could not bear the stench and airlessness of the sleeping platform reserved for sick prisoners, and he asked to be moved to a place in the open air. where the bodies of those who died were stacked. One day he heard the doctors say that he would soon die. But prisoner friends built him a little hut and furnished it with a bed of split bamboo, covered with clean rice sacks. Gently and carefully they carried his thin body and laid it on the bed. Then two fellow prisoners came to see him, offering to nurse him. He was too ill to do anything for himself.

Both men were Christians. Dusty was a Methodist and Dinty a Roman Catholic. Dusty set to work at once. He fetched warm water and some rags and gave Captain Gordon the first wash he had enjoyed for weeks. Then, with great care and gentleness, he cleaned the sores and ulcers that covered his legs. Before he left, he sprinkled the dirt floor of the hut with water and swept it clean. When Dusty had to report for evening duty in the kitchen, Dinty, who had finished work for the day, took over as night nurse. In the morning, Dusty reappeared with a breakfast of rice. Then he would set about washing the captain and tending his ulcers. Next he began to massage the washed limbs to bring back some feeling and strengthen the muscles. Gordon began to get better. In time he took his first few stumbling steps. His own courage and determination completed recovery.

The love and care of those two Christians had saved him from certain death, but neither had said much about their faith, until asked. Both clearly showed Jesus' love in their willingness to do even the most unpleasant tasks cheerfully and kindly. Captain Gordon and some of the other prisoners began to read about Jesus in the Gospels and let his love come into their own lives. Soon they wanted to show his love to others.

The whole camp was transformed. Before, everyone had fought for his own rights. Now, men thought of one another's needs. Selfishness and despair shrivelled up and happiness and hope grew strong as more and more prisoners began to share the love and care of Jesus, for his sake. If love and care in this way can be shared in this place of



death and despair, may we also show the love of God by the way in which we lead our daily lives amongst those with whom we live and work.



Weather

Very dry end of June; showery start to July

The total rainfall recorded for June was 36mm just 60% of average. Most fell in the first half of the month with only 5mm in the second half. This follows on from one of the driest springs on record. July has started on a more unsettled theme with a total of 32.8mm recorded to date, up to the 14th. This is 59% of average and most fell on the 6th (28.8mm) in separate downpours lasting only about 20 minutes each. This was sufficiently intense to cause drains to overflow and local flash flooding to occur. Temperatures have been above average, peaking at 29C on the 1st and the 11th July.

Community Gym

With an increased emphasis on fitness throughout life, and especially 'resistance training' to improve bone

density and muscle strength, it is not surprising that over 50% of the Community Gym's 80+ members are female. Members range in age from their 30s to 90s. Here is a snapshot of our women members' reasons for coming regularly to enjoy our gym facilities and opportunities:

My consultant said she wished more people with arthritis went to a gym, to keep mobile and fit.

I'm over 90 and was one of the original members: I'm still coming.

I love that I can now lift my own suitcases so much more easily than my non-gym friends. I come for well-being and especially resistance strength training which helps manage menopausal symptoms.

I believe if I hadn't attended this gym for years, I'd now be walking with sticks.

Walking uphill with friends, we were the only ones who didn't need to stop to take a breather.

At first I was exhausted after rowing 500m and now I'm not out of breath after 2km.

The gym helps my strength and stamina. I love to support my husband here after his stroke.

I'd definitely be far less mobile after my stroke if I hadn't started coming to this gym.

I've lost a stone and a half and become far more mobile after surgery.

After a stroke I've been given so much help especially with my balance.

The thing I'm really proud of is that I can now get up from the floor without help.

I feel so much stronger. Attending this gym has been life changing.

On 14th August 1945 World War Two ended as Japan agreed to an unconditional surrender. At the stroke of midnight, Prime Minister Clement Attlee broadcast this news to the British people and the following day, August 15th, then became known as VJ Day (Victory over Japan). The Dean of Norwich Cathedral, the Very Revd Dr Andrew Braddock gave permission for the hub of commemorations in Norfolk to be in Norwich Cathedral 2 years ago. From that moment, planning for this special occasion has been ongoing. Our aim is to honour veterans, both those who returned and those who sacrificed their lives in the Far East during the WW2.

Why Norwich you might ask? It seemed appropriate as FEPOW (Far East Prisoners of War) has strong links with the Royal Anglian



Regiments (Royal Norfolks, Suffolks, Cambs, Beds and Herts) that suffered so horrifically in this conflict. By the time you receive this approximately 900 tickets will have left my house: 150 lunches ordered; table plans in place; numerous meetings held and correspondence with HM the King, Government officials and Commonwealth

ambassadors, and many military and civic officials. All in a day's work you might say! I am hugely delighted that HRH The Duke of Gloucester will be present as well as HM Lord Lieutenant Lady Dannatt and General the Lord Dannatt. Do look out for a Dakota aircraft flying overhead – expected over Norwich at approximately 12.40-12.50pm. Villagers' memories



Neville Hogan

My father, Neville Hogan was born in Rangoon in 1923 the son of an Irishman and a Burmese mother. He joined the local Burma Auxiliary force at the age of 16 in August 1939 to learn to drive, ride, shoot and map read. He, like many,

was preparing himself for the Japanese invasion of Burma which started in 1941. He was sent to officers' training and was commissioned into the Burma Rifles. They were the eyes and ears of the Chindits (Wingate) expeditions in 1943/44. My father was a reconnaissance commander. Along with other allied troops, he had to parachute deep inside enemy lines looking for the best spots to receive supply drops from their support. He also had to find good landing sites where planes could pick up casualties, locate food and water and find places where 400 men and 100 mules could hide for the night, plus set booby traps for the enemy. It was exhausting and painful as the men were hunted like animals by the Japanese.

In 1944 Vera Lynn came to visit the troops wounded in a hospital in India. My father was recovering from a bullet wound in his shoulder, pneumonia, malaria and typhus. When she asked would he like anything, he replied "a kiss", as it had been his 21st birthday the day before. He met Vera Lynn again at the 60th anniversary at the London Imperial War Museum where he reminded her of

that day he had treasured over the years and she gave him another kiss!

Major Neville Hogan was awarded an MBE on the 1st January 2004 for his services to The Chindits Old Comrades Association for providing welfare to war widows and disabled veterans. He accepted it on behalf of all the people that had helped him, including a big thank you to my mother.

My mother, Glory Rose Hogan, had a very different war from my father. She was at boarding school and had to be rushed home when war broke out. The family tried to leave for India by plane but before they could, the Japanese bombed the airport. They started their long journey to India, but on their way they were captured and sent to an internment camp in Maymyo. She was only 11, but was expected to do many jobs to keep the camp running smoothly. The Japanese commandant had been educated at Cambridge and was therefore less harsh. However, Glory had to stay there until the end of the war.

Like many veterans of that war my father did not talk about the horrors on the battlefield, certainly not to his children. His Artillery Battery was among those regiments trapped in what was

known as the Admin Box, an area surrounded by jungle-clad hills hiding Japanese artillery and snipers). There are detailed accounts of the deprivations suffered by the Colonial troops on YouTube.

Lieutenant James McMillan, was attached to the Indian Army, 19/6th Puniab Rifles RA which was made up of Indian Sikhs. Given that his troops were Indian, Dad had to learn Urdu to command his men. Officers were expected to take an Urdu exam within three months. My father was "Mentioned in Dispatches" in 1946 distinguished service which I believe referred to an occasion in 1945 when travelling in his Jeep with his driver they passed a road convoy of military vehicles moving on a main route. Having passed the convoy and continued for a short distance they heard gunfire coming from the road they had recently passed. As they were armed they turned around to find out what was happening. It transpired that there was a group of Japanese soldiers who had ambushed the convoy and were firing on it from an area of raised ground. Having been unseen by the Japanese my father and his driver were able to reach higher ground and start attacking the Japanese resulting in the failure of the Japanese attack on the convoy. It is most likely that the Japanese had seen the Jeep passing but as they were there for the convoy they let the Jeep pass. My father was on parade in Rangoon on 12th September 1945 when the surrender of the Japanese in Burma was signed.



Sydney Vincent Echoes of Captivity (ed Louise Cordingley) is collection of memoirs by the children of Prisoners of War who in 1945. returned. from several years of captivity in the Far East. recurring Α theme is how these men rarely or never talked about horrific experiences.

Neatishead's Pauline Simpson has her own chapter in the book. Pauline remembers her father Sydney George Vincent, born in Norwich in 1917. Sydney worked in the village shop in Topcroft before joining the 560th Field Company Royal Engineers as a driver. Sydney was taken prisoner in 1942 and held at Changi Singapore, then transferred to Thailand, to several jungle camps. He then worked as a mechanic at a transport camp when he received news of the Japanese surrender on 16th August 1945. Sydney returned to Norfolk to work back in the village shop which expanded to be a newsagents and post office before marrying and starting a family at the end of the 40s. He died aged 84 in 2001. Pauline writes, 'I often wonder how he ended up in the Royal Engineers because he was living in a Norfolk village and many of the families that I know around me were all in the Norfolks. It's a question I wish I'd asked him. He was a driver and, this is what I like to believe, that maybe he wasn't as badly treated as some because he was looking after some of the Japanese vehicles. He used to tell stories about doing things to the vehicles, so that they didn't work and they would conk out or whatever, but maybe I'll never know.'

As many NIB readers will know Pauline eventually became the Far East Prisoner of War (FEPOW) chaplain. She has worked tirelessly for many years to ensure that their stories are not forgotten; that the war did not in fact end on VE day in May 1945.

Whilst everyone in Europe was celebrating VE day, 'they were forgetting this large contingent of men in the Far East, who were still under sentence of death and at the time, digging their own graves.' In 2015, to mark 70th VJ day anniversary, Pauline spent over four years organising a prestigious event at St Martins in the Fields in Trafalgar Square. With only a month to go she recalls, 'I had a phone call from the Royal Household saying that it had come to the notice of Her Majesty that I was hosting this service and she would like to know if she could come.' Pauline had to keep this amazing, and stressful, news to herself. 'Basically I said to myself that I had to be strong and that it was the veterans' day. That they would be remembering their colleagues that they left behind, the men they saw suffer just as they did, but who didn't actually make it. The hymns, the readings, the poems were all planned around the veterans.'

John Spurgeon Kendrick by Vincent Kendrick



A short analysis of his experience in the Burma Campaign.

My father was a surveyor in the Royal Artillery attached to the Indian He Armv. travelled by ship firstly to Cape Town, then on to Chittagong before seeing active service

Burmese Jungle. His mission was to set up Trig Points on hills in enemy territory, to calculate the elevation of fire for his artillery who were positioned behind him on the allied front line. Too high and the shells would go over the heads of the Japanese entrenchments and too low, they would hit him!

He experienced horrific atrocities of colleagues being garrotted under the cover of darkness. He always said he owed his life to the Gurkhas with their Kukri knives as they escorted him through the jungle with hand-to-hand combat. He was confirmed in the jungle by the Bishop of Assam, presumably in case he didn't survive. Survival was multi-faceted, he contracted dysentery and hepatitis and by the time he returned home he was skeletal and jaundiced. Not an experience he relished recalling.

RAF AIR DEFENCE RADAR MUSEUM

The dark shape of a Junkers bomber slips in and out of the clouds, high over the North Sea in September 1941. The pilot had learned the hard lessons to survive the massed raids on Britain the previous summer. He knows on a cold night that the bomber's engine-contrails would glow in the moonlight and make them an easy target for British night fighters. By skimming the clouds he hoped to mask his course, but the poor tail gunner behind him couldn't see much through the fogged glass of his turret. If he could see, he might have spotted the black shark fin parting the clouds, 400 yds away. The fin belongs to a Beaufighter, a twinengine RAF night fighter equipped with 4 cannons and the wonder that is airborne radar. Onboard. the radar operator can see little outside his bubble in the fuselage of the fighter, but, with his forehead pressed to his glowing radar scope, he focusses on the flicker of interference which shows exactly where the enemy bomber is.

The fighter's radar has a range of a few miles, but



with the careful guidance of 'Seacut' they have snuck into the perfect position below their prey. 'Seacut' is the callsign of the ground controller operating the radar from a canvas covered

lorry parked in the middle of a field between Horning and Neatishead. Watching his circular radar display, he sees the blips of the bomber and fighter close and then merge. It takes seconds for the Beaufighter to emerge from the cloud, unleash devastating cannon fire, and watch as the bomber rolls towards the dark sea, a large white circle of spray marking its end.

The development of radar was a crucial part of Britain's air defences, to enable the survival of the RAF during the Battle of Britain, to interrupt the night raids of the Blitz and even to combat the V1 Doodlebug flying bombs that struck London and Norfolk in the last year of the war. The RAF Air Defence Radar Museum has fascinating displays and talks about radar technology and the real stories of the men and women involved in this secretive world through wartime and peace. 

Wildlife Notes

Having written about dragonflies in last month's notes it was with some surprise that in July I encountered a new species for me locally. Many of you will be familiar with the Emperor Dragonfly which is Britain's largest species and is a pond loving dragonfly which can be guite territorial. The males are blue-bodied with a green thorax and blue/green eyes and often fly with the abdomen drooping downwards. In recent vears there has been a big increase in its smaller relative, the Lesser Emperor (Anax parthenope), being recorded in the UK having first been seen here in 1996. Most of the sightings have been males and they are usually seen during July and August. During July this year I have seen males at both Wroxham and Salhouse Broads whilst I have been sailing. They are slightly smaller than the Emperor and have green eyes, a violet brown thorax, below which is a thin yellow line and then a bright blue section with a dark coloured abdomen. It is the bright blue section which catches the eye as it is just below the wings and is quite distinctive. Dr. Pam Taylor, Norfolk's dragonfly recorder, tells me that there has been an increase in sightings this year.

I am indebted to Duncan Hale-Sutton for another insect record during July as he found and photographed a large black Longhorn Beetle (Stictoleptura scutellata) which appeared inside his

house on the 11th. Its identification has been confirmed by the Norfolk beetle recorder and it appears that it is a nationally scarce species which has been recorded in the Broads at Sutton Fen since 2016 and has



also been found at How Hill and East Ruston. Longhorn beetles, as the name suggests, tend to have long segmented antennae and are often large bodied (Duncans was 17mm in length) and sometimes brightly coloured. The beetle is nearly all black in colour but has a small orange marking mid-body just below the thorax on what is called the scutellum.

Jon Kelf has been busy with his moth trap during July and has recorded a Tansy Plume moth (Gillmeria ochrodactyla) which is also a nationally



scarce species with only around 40 records from Norfolk. Plume moths are very distinctly shaped dainty moths with elongated thin wings. The name

derives from the fact that the larvae feed on tansy which is quite a tall, yellow-coloured aromatic plant flowering at this time of year in dry places. It can be found on many of our village verges, often at the top of a bank, and if you rub the leaves between your fingers, it will release the oils revealing a nice smell.


