

Social Media

At PCC this week we had a long chat about social media especially **WhatsApp** which is so commonly used to communicate and share information.

We have sereval of these groups within the life of the church which support the name St. Helen's.

Recently it has come to our attention and in the wider diocese that some conventions and the sharing of information has broken several rules and laws around GDPR and safeguarding and this is a reminder that any association with the church, St. Helen's needs to fall within those guidelines and laws. As a PCC and church, we have already signed up to the archbishops guidelines which can be found by clinking the link

below.

The prayer chain for instance is for just that: Prayer

Share a request with permission for prayer from person concerned wherever possible. Use first names only.

Brief description of problem or request.

Do not always expect a result to be given, ask no questions, just trust that God knows.

If the person or situation has not given permission just use an initial, example 'can we pray for J who is to have an operation this week.'

No sharing of links to other sites there are no guarantees that these are appropriate or that they do not lead to scams.

No further conversations just respond with for example: I'm praying, praying hands emoji, may God bless J or situation, keep it simple, but please pray fully.

Do not use the new open chat request as this cannot be monitored but does show that a conversation has taken place on the back of a prayer request.

Always remember Keep it simple.

If you want to chat about other things then use your own private chat groups. We will be setting up a community WhatsApp forum for all individual WhatsApp groups that are associated directly or bare the name St. Helen's to monitor each so as we comply with the law and safeguarding. Each group will keep its own administration and be responsible for conversations and activities.

Reverend Clifford's Weekly Blog 'rotten windows'



26th July 2025

Well, this week Paul and I started painting and repairing the windows in St. Helen's House, it's a big job. This is a job that has been put off for a while now and the result is that the work needed now is far greater than if they had had regular maintenance.

Someone stopped me on Friday and said, 'this isn't a job for the vicar,' well unless the vicar does it then it won't get done and that will cause me more problems in the long run. Then how can any vicar preach if life doesn't throw up examples of our everyday living, sometimes we need to experience it, life that is, to emphasize and sympathize with those we shepherd. After all Jesus was a carpenter (like me) and I bet he got his hands dirty from time to time, it's just part of a wider practical ministry, Jesus preached by telling parables about everyday things around him.

Windows then, as the paint has peeled off over the years it has allowed water to penetrate the softwood beneath. This has caused in many areas wet rot which needs cutting out and replacing, shortening the overall life of the windows, they need a carpenter not just filler. What could have with the right care have lasted for a hundred years will only now last as long as the patchwork of repairs now desperately needed can hold off future water incursion.

It got me thinking about our lives, for you see we all start off as it were as good human beings but it's not long before we must face the storms of life and then the rot slowly sets in.

In the Christian life that rot is known as sin, which is both the things we do wrong or simply don't do at all when we could have, and it is everything that separates us from God. We talk about Satan, (maybe not enough these days as we have made God all nicey, nicey) Satan simply is a deceiving voice that says, 'everything is alright, don't worry about God.' The real truth is that Satan eats into our relationship with God, lies are told and yes life on the outside might seem a lot better without God. A quick lick of paint can transform a product but unless the time, real time is spent in preparing the whole thing, protecting it against the elements, cutting out the rot for new stronger materials, the lies and the destruction will continue to eat away at the inner areas of our lives.

These lies slowly rot away at our very core, when I started working on those windows the inner core of wood was nothing but dust, held together by a thin outer framework, it crumbled at my touch, the once supporting wooden structure was gone, not everything is quite what it seems on the outside.

We can go through our lives like that as well, looking good on the outside, or seemingly good, or maybe just a little tatty, yet somehow holding it all together, but God sees the inner person that we are, and He knows if we still have enough strength to support ourselves or whether we just crumble and return to dust on the final day of judgement, scripture is clear, there will be a day when we have to stand before God and be accountable for our relationship with Him and others, thankfully we won't stand alone because Jesus will stand there with us, which is good if we have had a relationship with him and allowed him to do as it were a few repairs, if not it isn't so good, the whole thing becomes nothing but dust when handled.

Fortunately then God has intervened for us and has sent us, yes a carpenter would you believe it, but Jesus is far more than a carpenter he is the one who can make us fully whole again, he is the one who can patch us back up and make us strong enough to stand before God on that final day and say, I'm fit for purpose to serve and worship God as He expects me to. We are called by God to be a Church, a body that supports each other in our daily worship, no body part can work on its own, my repair wood is no good sat beside the window frame, it must be cut in, to make the whole thing structurally strong. Church is the same, if you are sat on the outside, you're like that piece of wood, you could be useful but not part of the structure which in this case is the body of Christ Jesus.

Our windows will face and survive many more storms and as long as we set a regular maintenance program in place they will out see me as vicar and maybe the next one. God has put that same maintenance program into our lives, and as long as we regularly attend to our relationship with God through Jesus, we will see God's eternal kingdom. Don't though be fooled by Satan who will convince you otherwise because he is happy for you to rot from within and on that final day of testing it will be to late as what stands before God crumbles. Jesus warned us about this time and time again, we can heed the warnings or just keep slowly rotting away, believing the lies that 'God wouldn't do that', well that's right God wouldn't, we do it to ourselves as we all have freewill.

Meanwhile I have a lot more painting to do over the summer.


