LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

There's a particular spot in Debden I always pause at during my regular dog walk. It's along the path that winds through our village allotments, and it's here that I stop to listen—to the trees swaying gently in the breeze, their soft, soothing sounds creating a lullaby of nature. It takes me back to childhood nights, lying awake and listening to the trees at the bottom of our garden, their whispers eventually lulling me to sleep.

This gentle rustling of leaves—known as *susurration*—can draw us into the secret life of trees. Thomas Hardy, the great novelist, captured this beautifully in his book *Under the Greenwood Tree*. Surrounded by trees throughout his life, Hardy learned to distinguish them by the unique sounds they made in the wind. In the book's opening chapter, he writes:

"To dwellers in a wood, almost every species of tree has its voice as well as its feature.

At the passing of the breeze, the fir-trees sob and moan no less distinctly than they rock;

the holly whistles as it battles with itself;

the ash hisses amid its quiverings;

the beech rustles while its flat boughs rise and fall."

Trees don't just speak—they perform.

Tennyson, in The Lady of Shalott, wrote:

"Willows whiten, aspens quiver."

Aspens, like willows, shimmer and shift in the wind, their long, slender leaves catching the light and movement. It's no wonder they're also called "Quaking Aspens."

Trees are ancient beings—the oldest living organisms on Earth. They absorb pollutants like carbon dioxide and release clean oxygen in return. Beneath the surface, their roots form intricate networks, connecting and supporting one another in a remarkable display of cooperation and mutual care.

Throughout the Bible, trees appear as powerful symbols—from the Tree of Life in Genesis to the tree in Revelation. They feature in many key moments: Noah's ark, built from wood; Zacchaeus climbing a sycamore to see Jesus; and the cross itself, fashioned from a tree's trunk.

Psalm 1:3 offers this beautiful image:

"That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither—whatever they do prospers."

Trees give us so much: air to breathe, shade and shelter, fruit and nourishment. Like God, they give freely, never counting the cost. But if we fail to cherish and protect them, it is we who will pay the price.





Eco Church Update July 2025

The recent Flower Festival was an opportunity to show our eco credentials. We had made an important decision not to use flora foam (Oasis) in any of the arrangements because the foam is non-biodegradable, non-recyclable and toxic for both humans and animals. We used a variety of materials such as wire, Agra-wool, sand and pebbles as alternatives. The resulting arrangements were brilliant; full of imagination and skills which brought our theme 'Art in Flowers' to life. The refreshments were widely commented on for their deliciousness and sensible pricing. Much of it was home-made with the ingredients locally grown or sourced. We try hard to adhere to LOAF (Locally produced, Organically grown, Animal friendly or Fairly traded). The stalls had cakes, preserves and plants all produced at home or in the garden.

The art activity was a great success. It was also eco-friendly; utilizing materials, such as cardboard for the picture and frame and old magazines for collage, that would otherwise have been discarded. The activity promoted environmental awareness by looking carefully at and reproducing paintings of the local countryside and flowering plants.

There was (and is) a display in the porch documenting some of our achievements and events. Do take a look – there will be more to come as we take the final steps to Gold!

Swift awareness week was at the beginning of July and the eco team went to the church to see if the swifts had returned. We were treated to an acrobatic display and a 'fly past' by two pairs of swifts. There were also swallows and martins. It was a joy to see! Also noted was one of the tulip trees in flower.

On June 17th Rev Lynda and I went to an event at Chelmsford Cathedral 'Theology and Action for God's Creation'. We began with Evensong with a Creation theme. Celebrating the Diocese's Environmental Network past and present including Deanery Environmental Advocates and parish Eco links. There were locally produced refreshments and a chance to learn about what churches in the Diocese are doing, including some of the Bronze, Silver, and Gold, Eco churches. Debden was represented in the Bronze category and Wimbish in the Silver. I picked up some useful tips from the Gold award churches who had displays and had a very useful conversation with All Saints Springfield who have just achieved Gold.

We then heard from Rev Dr Dave Bookless, Head of Theology at A Rocha International and author of "Planetwise" and "God Doesn't do Waste" and Jo Herbert-James Head of Engagement at A Rocha UK. Jo suggested looking at https://doughnuteconomics.org/about-doughnut-economics The Doughnut offers a vision of what it means for humanity to thrive in the 21st century-and Doughnut Economics explores the mindset and ways of thinking needed to get us there. First published in 2012 in an Oxfam report by Kate Raworth, the concept of the Doughnut rapidly gained traction internationally, from the Pope and the UN General Assembly to Extinction Rebellion.

We were very lucky to have Andrea Adams. Tri-Service Rural Community Officer based at **Thaxted Fire station** at our meeting.

Andrea talked about keeping safe in our homes and out and about in the community.

Fire alarms are essential in the home and must be in good working order. Currently batteries in alarms last for 10 years but they should be checked regularly. Conventional fire alarm systems and smoke alarms rely mostly on audible warnings to alert building users to a fire, however these signals would not be heard by users who are deaf or hard of hearing, putting them at a significantly higher risk. There is a vibrating pillow pad which is placed under the pillow to help those who might not hear the alarm whilst they are asleep. Equally as important are carbon monoxide alarms.

Other points to note (they might seem obvious but worth the reminder)

- don't use electrical appliances at night or charge phones or tablets
- don't leave electrical items on except for the fridge and freezer of course
- make sure leads are not frayed and don't use 3 way plugs, choose an extension lead but don't over load it
- look after your handbag and don't leave it in your shopping trolley
- don't be distracted whilst shopping by anyone asking you for help if someone really needs help go to the cashier or help desk. It is not your responsibility.
- Andrea can provide bells to put on your purse the noise is not what the thief wants to hear. Even in Waitrose you may get caught out!
- If you go for a walk make sure you have 'what3words' on your phone. This is an app which can track where you are and would save the emergency services much needed time if you were to have an accident or need help.

Andrea will come and fit fire alarms and carbon monoxide alarms free and will offer advice. Several of our number will be having a visit from her and she hopes that this article is a timely reminder to anyone else in the village that she is here to help and keep us all safe.

As we approach the end of another school year, life at Wimbish has definitely not been slowing down. We have been working closely with Carver Barracks to rebuild our raised beds to create a new allotment. Our old planting area had become rather dilapidated and unused and the children were very keen to get it back up and running.

Thanks to a grant secured by the barracks, through the Royal Engineers Association our allotment has been completely rebuilt and is now home to 7 new raised beds that are full of plants from tomatoes, strawberries, courgettes, green beans and herbs to lavenders which the bees are loving. We had a grand opening a couple of weeks ago, where Major General Alistair Dickinson CBE officially opened the allotment and presented us with a stunning plaque. The children are enjoying taking responsibility for watering and weeding the allotment.

It was our annual sports day at the beginning of July. The children competed in a carousel of activities for their house team and then individually in the races such as running, egg and spoon and the obstacle race. There was a real team spirit on show as the children worked to earn as many points as possible to try and make their team the winners!

The whole school recently enjoyed a trip to Walton on the Naze for a day on the beach. The children had a wonderful time splashing in the sea, building sand castles and many other creations as well as completing a beach scavenger hunt. No day at the seaside would be complete without an ice cream and these were enjoyed by everyone.

Breaking news...as the deadline for this article to be submitted goes to press, we are able to announce that we have been successful in our grant bid from the Army Covenant Fund for £75,533 to improve educational outcomes for military children. This money is going to allow us to implement new interventions and ways of working to support our military children from the moment they join us to when they sadly leave, ensuring their transition to a new school is smooth and well supported. The Ministry of Defence, fund the grants and we are very grateful to have been awarded our grant.

Peter's Musings

I have heard it said that the wings of a butterfly in the Amazon can cause enough air turbulence to affect the wind pattern in the UK. It's a tough theory to prove, but is does provoke the idea that we can all have some impact, whether benevolent or malign, in our families, communities and the world at large.

Let's be positive and think about things, both large and small, that we have done, and which had some beneficial outcomes. Ananias was extremely apprehensive, but agreed. The man in question was known as Saul but would later be called Paul. Thanks to Paul's conversion and dedication, the new Christian faith would be established and consolidated throughout the Middle East. Without Ananias we would not have Paul. Without Paul, history - and today's world - would be very different indeed.

In the First Book of Samuel, we hear about a little known lady called Abigail, who was blessed with wisdom and courage. Her advice to King David saved the country from entering a bloody war, and proved that there are other ways to deal with difficult adversaries.

So this month how about becoming a metaphoric butterfly and doing your bit to save the world? No pressure!

District Councillor's Report

There is a wealth of news and updates to share with the Wimbish community this month. While space is limited, I have prioritised several key topics relevant to our residents.

Tribute to Absent Friends

We recently said farewell to two valued members of our community. **Mr John Clarke** a respected farmer from Debden and long-standing member of the Wimbish Good Companion's club, was known for his dedication and memorable tales of farming life. His commitment to running the raffle at club meetings made him an integral part of our gatherings.

Mrs Tina Knight also passed away in July. A dedicated local figure and conservative representative for Debden and Wimbish Ward, she frequently demonstrated strong leadership and independent thoughts. Among her many achievements, being named Businesswoman of the Year by Margaret Thatcher stands out. **Rest in Peace, Tina and John.**

Local Government Reforms

One significant issue facing the younger generation of our community is the impending Local Government Reform (LGR). Post 2028, the structure of representation is likely to change substantially, potentially diminishing the influence and voice of villages such as Wimbish if representatives are appointed from more distant areas like Harlow. This shift raises concerns about continued local advocacy and effective representation.

Updates from Uttlesford District Council

A new Director has been appointed at Uttlesford District Council, a decision well received due to her proven efficiency. The appointment is necessitated by the CEO's increased commitments, spending considerable time representing Uttlesford at LGR-related meetings.

Police and Crime Commissioner Attendance

The Council continues to seek greater accountability from the Police and Crime Commissioner, encouraging attendance at Scrutiny meetings. However recent invitations were declined due to the Commissioner's involvement in LGR activities and preparations for next year's mayoral elections.

Local Plan and Regulations 19 Feedback

The local plan hearing was conducted over approximately a week, yielding positive feedback. 135 comments were submitted; these are currently under review by the inspector and may prompt further action.

Blueprint Uttlesford and Financial Planning

Blueprint Uttlesford, the district efficiency and cost saving initiative, has been scaled back amidst uncertainties regarding the future structure of local Government after 2028. This lack of clarity presents significant challenges for long-term planning.

Climate Change Initiative and Renewable Energy Projects

Addressing climate change remains a core responsibility. While there have been some opposition to integrating biofuel into the community transport fleet, it was determined that taking proactive measures was necessary. Additionally, several residents have raised questions regarding proposed Solar Farms; current guidance indicates that final decisions will rest with the Government.

Looking Forward

Given the evolving landscape of local governance and ongoing uncertainties, I continue to reflect on the value of serving as District Councillor. Community engagement and advocacy remain priorities, but the effects of Government reforms warrant careful consideration for the future.
