




TOWER HEALTH & SAFETY REGULATIONS

Due to the steep narrow access to the Tower the following points should be observed –

- No high heels or flip flops
- Only children aged 8 and over are allowed up the Tower, and they
 <u>must_be accompanied by a responsible adult</u>
- No children under the age of 8, this also includes babies in slings
 - No rucksacks, large shoulder or hand bags
 - It can be windy and cold at the top so you are advised to wear a jumper/coat

Dundry Primary School Year 6 Leavers

On the 7th July we welcomed the Year 6 leavers from Dundry Primary School to the church for a tour of the tower and ringing chamber where they each had the chance to ring one of the church bells.

Then on the July 17th the church was full for the leavers service, with parents, teachers and all the pupils from the school, hear the leavers tell us their memories.

The leavers were presented with a Bible from the school and a book about starting secondary school from the church. We wish them well in their new schools

Reading An Interrupted Life: The Diaries and Letters of Etty Hillesum, 1941-43 while the Israeli Defence Force was simultaneously laying waste to Gaza and attacking Iran was a disconcerting experience. Born in Holland in 1914, Etty was a highly intelligent, vivacious and perceptive daughter of intellectual Dutch Jewish parents. One of her brothers was an extremely talented concert pianist. Her diaries are immensely vivid, thoughtful, spiritual, searching and open, even as they chart the closing down of Jewish life in Holland by the invading Nazis. Etty and her family were all murdered in Auschwitz at the end of 1943.

Etty sees clearly the squeezing out of life, the piecemeal removal of rights and dignity, the dehumanising of her fellow Jews and their transportation to the death camps. She is sanguine, accepting that this is also her fate, turning down opportunities to escape. However, she is never angry, because she believes that to hate her oppressor makes her no better than them. Throughout it all she continues to read, in various languages, many books, especially her beloved Rilke and the Bible – all of it. She takes much inspiration and consolation from the Gospels and the writings of St Paul, and her openness to a faith not limited by labels of Jew or Christian is simply breathtaking. Every day she looks for beauty, in her garden, the countryside, her friends, in the German soldiers she meets, and she relishes little acts of kindness.

The utterly degrading brutality she documents, the randomness of death, the vicious efficiency of the concentration camps, are intensely painful reminders of why the Jewish people in Israel are determined to use every means in their power not to fall prey to bullies and aggressors. At the same time, Etty's writings make it crystal clear that following a path of hate and treating others as they have treated you is not only immoral, it also diminishes, perhaps irrevocably, the humanity of all involved. It leads to death of both body and spirit.

Etty found a way to transcend the terror she was thrust into. Her ability to keep looking for goodness and beauty, even in the darkest of places is open to us all. There are no simple answers to the immense complexity of the Middle Eastern conflict, but searching for the humanity in all those involved might be a worthwhile place to start.
