

Sharing love

5th July 2025

The mercury was rising; how high would it go as most of South East England sizzled in the mid-thirties and Southern Europe passed into the mid-forties. With night time temperatures looking more like an average British summers day sleep deprivation has probably affected most of us this week. I guess the only good thing about England is that each hot spell is broken with sudden drops in temperature that we are now experiencing before the next heatwave, predicted for the end of next week but not quite thankfully as hot. The weather is a national obsession of our conversation for several reasons, firstly we are a small Island (sometimes we forget this) and as such many coastal towns have historically always looked to see what the weather will do before putting out their fishing boats or journeying across the ocean. We are also a farming nation and what the weather does tells us what to plant and when to harvest. Then we have a climate that sometimes can almost give us all four seasons in one day, how on earth do we know what to wear on days like that. Finally talking about the weather is a kind of ice breaker for wider conversation, do we really care about whether it will rain or shine as we open that introductory conversation to a wider umbrella, (do see what I did there).

What is clear is the extreme heat kind of beats us all up, it drains our energy, it saps our ability to go about normal daily activities, and some activities should be avoided for health reasons and for the kindness of other living things. Dogs really shouldn't be walked on scorching hot pavements yet alone the consideration that they can't take a layer of clothing off. Putting a bowl of water out for the wild birds and other critters that inhabit and visit our gardens reveals our humanity and enables us to think beyond ourselves. Like every extreme weather event we need to look out for each other and not be over expectant that everything will work and run as on a normal day, it teaches us patients and reveals our compassion.

As I have struggled at times this week to find any space where I can be comfortable it reminded me that many in this world are facing events that will not simply pass in a couple of days. There has been much controversy this week over a performance last week at Glastonbury and I need to say that no one should ever wish any other party or person dead. Jesus explained and expanded the commandment on murder in the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 5: 21-22 and said that even if you hate or show anger against another you are guilty of murder. The second commandment is this Love your neighbour, love your enemy. We live in a world of many contrasts, there are wonderful acts of love happening all the time around us that never get reported and then equally there are acts of violence and destruction that dominate our headlines as we see so many suffer not because of the hand of God, but because of the lack of ability to live by the command to love each other. We do need to highlight the plight of others such as in Gaza but not with further words of hate, for hate only breeds more hate and has no room for forgiveness and reconciliation. Just read some of the local social media feeds as communities comment on what they think is right or wrong and you soon see a frenzy of hatred and negativity and lawlessness, and sadly very few comments that support love and tolerance and understanding.

I did read on a Facebook post this week that if we embrace the command to love it goes from being a command to being a fulfilment of a promise, it becomes our nature. I guess it is a sad reality that Jesus had to enter into our lives to tell us, remind us how we should truly live life on this planet, within God's creation, should we really need a command to tell us not to kill each other, to steal from each other, to love each other!

The church exists to give us a place where we can gather from all walks of life and share our common humanity with each other, it is a place where we can bring our joys and our sorrows, a place where we can share various gifts that God has given each of us. A place where every person is equal and the only head is Christ Jesus himself who teaches us how we should love each other setting aside difference and drawing us back to a place where we worship God and learn to live by His commands not because they are a chore or a burden in our lives but because they are second nature. To this extent our church building remains at the centre of our community, a hub to use a modern expression where we learn to embrace that second nature of love and support each other day by day in all the ups and downs because like our weather we all experience different seasons and in that we can help each other by protecting ourselves against all the storms, the droughts and grow together when each condition is right.

I look forward to seeing many of you in the Rectory Garden which is open to all this Sunday between 3-5pm.


