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

LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Dear friends.

Someone said "A baby is like the beginning of all things - wonder, hope, a dream of possibilities. A baby makes love stronger, the days shorter, the nights longer, savings smaller, and ... a home happier".

As I write this, I am in Poland with our youngest son, his wife and their new little baby boy Artur. It seems a long time since we had a baby in the family - and this little one lives a long way away, so the time is particularly precious.



Poland is a country of generous and open hospitality, and our visit meant we also were able to meet another babcia (grandma) and another dziadek (grandad) and although language was definitely a barrier, we agreed that hands and smiles were universal. Our son and his family live in a quiet village on the edge of a wood, but within walking distance of some small shops and within sight of a beautiful old Roman Catholic Church. Today (15 August) is a national holiday in Poland, being both the Day of the Assumption and Polish Armed Forces Day. The church bells called the faithful to Mass twice this morning, the later time allowing me the opportunity to join families, some bearing traditional bunches of herbs and flowers, for the service. I may not have understood the words, but the pattern was familiar enough for me to know where we were in the liturgy. The cantor's beautiful voice carried on the loudspeaker across the quiet area. Sitting in the church, giving thanks for Artur's safe arrival, I felt so blessed. One of the things a parent develops - quite quickly and almost organically - is a deep

knowledge of their child. They are able to interpret the different cries and respond to the particular need.

One of the favourite psalms in the Bible is Psalm 139 which speaks about our being held in the deep knowledge and embrace of God - a love that understands all about us, and loves us anyway, a love that accompanies us through all the circumstances and days of our lives. "If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast".


SKY AT NIGHT September

Sunrise Sunset: Beginning of September 6.26-7.57pm; End of September 7.11am-6.52pm **Moon Phases:** Full Moon 7th / Last Quarter 14th / New Moon 21st / First Quarter 30th **Planets**

Rising as the Sun sets, Saturn is visible all night as it has its closest approach to Earth on the 22nd and reaches opposition when it is opposite the Sun on the 23rd. If you see a yellow/white star-like object below the four stars that form the square of Pegasus then you have found Saturn. Jupiter rises just after midnight, look for a bright object in the east followed by Venus at 4am, again very bright.

Constellation

The Great Square of Pegasus is an asterism formed by stars, forming a large square which can be seen in the south east, moving west as the night progresses. Only three of the stars are part of the Constellation of Pegasus as the star top left belongs to nearby Andromeda. The four prominent stars are Markab,



Scheat, Algenib and finally Alpheratz which as mentioned belongs to Andromeda. If the centre of the square is devoid of many stars from where you are this means you are affected by light pollution, an increasing problem in rural areas as housing estates and industrial areas continue to be built around us.

Phenomena: As the Moon rises just after 6pm in the east on the 7th it will just be emerging from a total lunar eclipse caused by the Earth's shadow as it passes between the Sun and Moon. This means the Moon will look rather an odd shape as part of it will be in

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darkness. You will be able to see the Moon's full brightness reappear as the evening progresses. The Autumnal Equinox occurs on the 22nd when day and night are of roughly equal length.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. Fields already grazed this year have tended to have almost no grass regrowth. On our farm with land on Sedgemoor, the grass is growing but the production is much less than normal. Unprecedently, on this peat moor the ditches are dry and where there are cracks, they are wide and deep. Not good news. The soil will oxidise and disappear. Apparently, the Environment Agency is unable or unwilling to let water

from the King Sedgemoor Drain back into our ditch system for some reason that is not clear. This author has never seen the ditches to be dry, ever. This drought is not affecting the whole country but a significant area of it. Also unprecedently, we finished our cereal harvest in July. That is a first and also not good news for yields. So, income down this year.

World trade deals. As a result of the Prime Minister's trade deal with America that allowed ethanol into the country without the previous tariff of 19%, Vivergo Fuels, according to the Farmers Weekly of 8 August, is closing. Based near Hull, this company took feed wheat from 4,000 farmers in the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire area and have just taken their last load of wheat. They bought 1 million tonnes a year and produced 400,000 tonnes of animal feed as well. The whole biofuel market in this country is being undercut and likely to close. This ethanol is used as the bio component of our fuels.

Inheritance Tax. Lots of private businesses are either spending money on solicitors and accountants to mitigate the changes in these taxes and/or are investing less in their companies. The working man will pay the price as jobs will disappear. The NFU had a plan to differentiate between the real farmers and the land owners who were buying land for the benign IHT rules. The government were not interested in their deliberations. It affects more than land owning farmers but farm tenants and also the huge private business sector which employ thousands.

NEWS FROM OUR MPs

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery

When Somerset Council announced it was suspending normal planning services for 12 weeks, I knew how serious the situation was. This isn't just a technical issue inside County Hall – it affects residents in places like Othery and Middlezoy who are waiting months for decisions, businesses trying to invest locally and parish councils working hard to shape their communities' future.

Officers have described the service as being at a "past fail point". For three months, many applicants will be told not to chase for updates. Replies will be reduced to standard holding messages, site visits will be cut back and planning enforcement — which residents in our villages already rely on to protect local character — will be pushed even further down the priority list. Older, more complex applications risk being left at the back of the queue while newer ones are processed first. That is simply not fair. Instead of tackling the warning signs early, Somerset Council allowed the backlog to grow. They failed to recruit and retain staff, failed to integrate inherited IT systems, and failed to provide political leadership when it was most needed.

The result is a service in crisis and it didn't have to be this way. Before the creation of Somerset Council, we had Sedgemoor District Council whose planning service was efficient, award-winning and trusted. That model could have been adopted across the county, giving villages like Othery and Middlezoy the same high level of service. I hope Somerset Council can stabilise the service over the coming weeks. But this new low level of service cannot be allowed to become the new normal. The public must have confidence that their applications will be treated fairly, that their voices will be heard and that the planning system will serve the whole community, not developers. Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton

I've had a busy August here as Parliament takes a break. I'd like to thank all of you who've written, called and met me in my surgeries to tell me what you care about, be that of local, national or international interest.

One of the most pressing issues for this part of Somerset is the Environment Agency's inability to carry out maintenance on our main rivers, confirmed by a letter to riparian landowners recently. The Agency's withdrawal has huge implications for areas like ours. I have spoken to both the Flooding Minister and the Chief Executive of the Internal Drainage Board and will keep you updated.

The Government has indicated that over the next quarter, MPs are likely to consider:

- Mental Health Bill
- Bus Services Bill
- Sustainable Aviation Fuel Bill
- Victims and Courts Bill
- Pension Schemes Bill
- Elections Bill
- English Devolution and Community Empowerment Bill
- Diego Garcia Military Base and British Indian Ocean Territory Bill

The Government may also introduce Bills covering the following:

- A Rail Bill
- A Hillsborough Bill
- A Sentencing Bill
- A Cyber Security and Resilience Bill

LOOKING UP IN OTHERY

Has anyone noticed that the pinnacle at the top of the church tower has all its castle type crenellations (called merlonettes) back in place?

The 8 original merlonettes were carved from Ham stone which has a tendency to delaminate over time. Whenever they broke apart they had been pinned back together, but the pins themselves then rusted and caused further damage to the stones. On inspection they were removed and laid down



on the flat roof of the tower as they were considered unsafe, with the slight possibility that they might break and fall off the tower! Thanks to several repair grants the new merlonettes have now all been carved in



Doulting stone which does not delaminate and should stand proud for many long years to come.

A grant of £2,100 was received towards the work from Benefact Trust, whose funds come from its ownership of the Benefact Group, an independent specialist Financial Services Group, who give all available profits to charity and good causes. One of the UK's largest grant-making charities Benefact Trust, in 2020 awarded more than £23 million to churches, charities and communities.

The specialists from the contractors JP Conservation caused quite a stir on one occasion when they were seen on the top of the tower garbed in bee suits due to the active beehive there and on another occasion when they hung off the tower on ropes to complete the installation.

Their tour took in the splendid medieval wall paintings of St. James Cameley, All Saints Langport and several others, and we were pleased to welcome them with a delicious afternoon tea before they set off

The wildflowers flourished this year and we enjoyed a bright display of cowslips, yellow vetch, celandine, wild alliums and flowering plantain. BISHOP'S LETTERGENEROSITY BEGETS GENEROSITY

In August I was privileged to dedicate the restored clock in the tower of Montacute church. It's not just any old clock. In fact, Montacute's is amongst the oldest in the country. Built in the village in around 1400, the clock is so old that it is held in place by iron wedges. At the time of its construction, the



nut and the bolt wouldn't be invented for another hundred years!

The Montacute clock is an artefact that seems to generate generosity. In the 1980s the clock was restored by Humphrey Hamlin, for whom it is now named. Humphrey poured time and energy into its mechanism, preventing it from being scrapped. During the last two years, heroic efforts by the people of Montacute have led to its further restoration. All this was marked last month by a whole village gathering. The community choir sang, Morris men danced, the local pub provided a hog roast, cake was dispended in huge quantities.

Montacute is a beautiful example of how generosity begets generosity. Like a chain reaction, one act of generosity, the restoration of the clock, led to another, another and another. As a result, a whole community was brought together in celebration and joy. In his second letter to the Church in Corinth, Paul writes of the church in Macedonia that "their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity" (2 Cor 8:2). Having nothing, the Macedonians discovered that they could still give. In turn, their generosity enabled Paul to challenge and encourage the church in Corinth to do the same. All to help the struggling Church in Jerusalem.

As I travel around our diocese, I see this pattern of generosity begetting generosity happening in so many places. One person starts, another adds their contribution, more join in and soon we learn that together we are so much more than the sum of our parts. This is the economy of God. It's an economy that all of us are invited to join.
