Celebrating 1700 Years of the Nicene Creed

This year, the Nicene Creed turns 1700 – a birthday no human can ever hope to reach! Yet, this remarkable text has been the bedrock of Christian worship for seventeen centuries, and here at St. Mary's, we believe that's something truly worth celebrating!

What Exactly Is a Creed? A creed is a statement of belief. In the Nicene Creed, we begin by proclaiming, "We believe." So, it's not just a handy document to refer back to, but a

public and interactive way for us to commit ourselves each week to the faith we share. You'll notice we say "We believe" instead of "I believe." That's because the Christian faith is lived out in community. We support one another through belief and doubt, walking together on our journey of faith.

The Nicene Creed has four main parts: Father, Son, Holy Spirit, and Church. The first three lay out the three persons of God within the Trinity: The Father who creates us. The Son who became incarnate and saved us through his passion and resurrection. The Holy Spirit who animates and motivates us in the faith and works of a Christian life.

The last part reminds us that we are part of a church that is both of heaven and of earth. Even with the earthly church's problems, scandals, disappointments, and divisions, there is an eternal, universal, and perfect Body of Christ – a church that transcends all of our earthly struggles. It's to that family we will be called at the time of our death, and in which we will live our resurrection life.

So Why Mark This Anniversary? Well, if you're anything like me, you intone the creed once or several times a week and never really think deeply about the words. Spending time prayerfully with this creed could open up new questions and new spiritual depths for us as we look deeper into the fundamentals of our faith..

Join Our Celebration!

To mark this significant anniversary, we're launching a special preaching series on Sunday mornings at church, each member of our clergy team is going to preach on a different part of the Nicene Creed. On top of this, our home groups will be delving into the Creed in more detail throughout September. If you're interested in joining a home group, please get in touch with Rev. Lizzie, and she'll help you find a group that suits you.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, Maker of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God. begotten, not made, consubstantial of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Amen.

Here are some questions to begin exploring the Creed's meaning for your life:

- What makes you wonder at the marvels of creation, the vastness of space, and the variety of life on Earth? How does this help you connect with God?
- The Apostle Paul's letters often use phrases like 'in Christ' and 'in him.' What might living 'in Christ' mean for you individually and for our community of faith?
- Can you think of ways the Spirit is guiding you in your life or the Church today?
- How does the promise of resurrection influence the way we live now?

I pray that during this time of considering the Creed, you find new ways to encounter God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

MARY SUMNER - FOUNDER OF THE MOTHERS' UNION

On 9th August we remember Mary Sumner, founder of Mothers' Union. The Mothers' Union is now more than 140 years old. It has accomplished a staggering amount in that time, and nowadays numbers more than four million members, doing good work in 83 countries. That is a far cry from the modest circle of prayer for mothers who cared about family life, which is how it all began with a rector's wife, Mary Sumner.

Mary was born in late 1828 in Swinton, near Manchester. When she was four, her family moved to Herefordshire. Mary's father, Thomas Heywood, was a banker and historian. Her mother has been described as a woman of "faith, charm and sympathy" – qualities which Mary certainly inherited. Mrs Heywood also held informal 'mothers' meetings' at her home, to encourage local women. Those meetings may well have inspired Mary's later work.

Mary was educated at home, spoke three foreign languages, and sang well. While in her late teens, on a visit to Rome she met George Sumner, a son of the Bishop of Winchester. It was a well-connected family: George's uncle became Archbishop of Canterbury, and his second cousin was William Wilberforce. Mary and George married in July 1848, soon after his ordination. They moved to Old Alresford in 1851 and had three children: Margaret, Louise and George. Mary dedicated herself to raising her children and supporting her husband's ministry by providing music and Bible classes.

When in 1876 Mary's eldest daughter Margaret, gave birth, Mary was reminded how difficult she had found the burden of motherhood. Soon she decided to hold a meeting to which she invited the local women not only of her own class, but also all the village mothers. Her aim was to find out if women could be brought together to offer each other prayer and mutual support in their roles as wives and mothers. That meeting at Old Alresford Rectory was the inaugural meeting of the Mothers' Union.

For 11 years, the Mothers' Union was limited to Old Alresford. Then in 1885 the Bishop of Newcastle invited Mary to address the women churchgoers of the Portsmouth Church Congress, some 20 miles away. Mary gave a passionate speech about the poor state of national morality, and the vital need for women to use their vocation as mothers to change the nation for the better. A number of the women present went back to their parishes to found mothers' meetings on Sumner's pattern. Soon, the Mothers' Union spread to the dioceses of Ely, Exeter, Hereford, Lichfield and Newcastle. By 1892, there were already 60,000 members in 28 dioceses, and by 1900 there were 169,000 members. By the time Mary died in

1921, she had seen MU cross the seas and become an international organisation of prayer and good purpose.

FROM BISHOP STEPHEN

September is always a month of endings, as well as new beginnings. As the bright colours of summer fade into the oranges and browns of autumn, shiny new school shoes make an appearance, along with fresh notebooks as we head back to our desks after a break over August. We start again, carrying with us the feeling of a new year beginning.



September then is always a month of change, and because of this it can be unsettling. We reflect on or maybe grieve for that which is drawing to a close, and can feel a mixture of anticipation about what is new or next. It is likely that we feel this even more acutely this September, living in a world which feels increasingly insecure from the perspective of fast-changing global politics and conflicts around the world that show no sign of abating. All is changing; all feels very fragile and deeply uncertain.

One of this country's much-loved hymns is 'Abide with Me', famous for being sung at every FA Cup Final since 1927. The words are based on Luke 24: 29 and were written by the Reverend Henry Francis Lyte, with one of the stories about this suggesting that he wrote them in September 1847 – just after he had conducted his final church service and when very ill with tuberculosis. He died two months later.

Putting aside questions of when Lyte wrote these words, the fact remains that they capture the constancy of God's presence and love, even as the seasons change, our lives change, our world changes; in life and in death:

Change and decay in all around I see O Thou who changest not, abide with me.

This then is a beautiful reminder that even though we, and indeed our world, pass through times of change and can feel unsettled as a result, God goes with us. God in Christ abides with us, his presence and love unchanging in our ever-changing world:

"Abide with us, for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent." And He went in to stay with them. (*Luke 24: 29*)



A HISTORY OF ENGLAND IN 25 POEMS

Some of you will know or remember Catherine Clarke, a very active former member of this church. You might be interested in looking out for news of her book to be published by Penguin in September. And listen out for coverage on the airwaves and in other media too.



"This is the history of England told in a new way: glimpsed through twenty-five remarkable poems written down between the eighth century and today, which connect us directly with the nation's past, and the experiences, emotions and imaginations of those who lived it.

These poems open windows onto wildly different worlds – from the public to the intimate, from the witty to the savage, from the playful to the wistful. They take us onto battlefields, inside royal courts, down coal mines and below stairs in great houses. Their creators, witnesses to events from the Great Fire of London to the Miners' Strike, range from the famous to the forgotten, yet each invites us into an immersive encounter with their own time."

TRANSFIGURATION

Canon Paul Hardingham

'There Must Be More to Life Than This'.
These words from Freddie Mercury of Queen will resonate with many of us, when we are looking to get more out of life, even as Christians. At a deeper level, we want to see and hear more clearly what God is doing in our circumstances. The Transfiguration of Jesus, which we remember this month, helps us to consider this issue (Luke 9:28-36).



Jesus was transfigured alongside Moses and Elijah, 'As He was praying, the appearance of His face changed, and His clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning.' (29). To understand our circumstances, firstly we need to see Jesus as God wants us to see Him. The disciples' eyes were opened to see Jesus' divinity. The presence of Moses and Elijah confirmed Him as God's promised Messiah. By helping us the grasp who Jesus really is, this event powerfully calls us to entrust our lives into Jesus' hands to experience His presence and power.

Secondly, if we are to make sense of our circumstances, we need to hear what God says about His Son. A cloud covered them and 'a voice came from the cloud, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him." (35). God affirmed His love and call on Jesus as His beloved and chosen Son. Do we hear God speaking these same words to us? When we know that we too are loved and accepted by God, this transforms our understanding of our lives.




