### FROM THE VICARAGE

Summer has arrived! At St Mary's we're beginning the service by thinking about all of our vocations. The word *vocation* comes from the Latin *vocare* which means 'to call.' Christians believe that God has called each and every one of us to a special task in our lives, something that will give our lives a deeper meaning. Each and every Christian is called to be a part of a Christian community, usually a church, and to love God and their neighbour. But we can also be called to specific things within our careers and communities.



For some, this calling may lead to ordained ministry, teaching, or healthcare. For others, it might be the quiet but powerful witness of raising children in faith, volunteering, or being a faithful presence in the workplace. No vocation is too small to be significant in God's eyes.


This summer, we encourage everyone to spend some time in prayer, asking: "Lord, what are you calling me to do? How can I

serve You and others in my daily life?" Whether you're young and just beginning to think about your future, or retired and wondering what God might still have in store, God's call is for every season of life.

In September, St Mary's will host the Deanery LPA training. LPA, short for *Lay Pastoral Assistant*, is an important role within the church – LPAs visit people who are housebound or lonely, sharing Holy Communion with them and offering a listening ear and friendly presence. It's a ministry which can be life-giving for those who visit and those who are visited!

Others in the community have felt called to work with specific groups of people, such as refugees or men who struggle with their mental health – all of these acts of service are ways of showing Jesus' love to those around us. I wonder what Jesus is calling you to do?

In other news, summer brings opportunities to celebrate nature and the wonderful surroundings in West Moors. On July 7th, Messy Church returns with the theme of 'Animals' – we will celebrate all the amazing animals found in Bible stories, from Daniel in the Lion's den to Jonah's great fish! Expect crafts, games, food, and fun for the whole family.



Looking ahead to August, we're excited to introduce a new style of church service called 'Fifth Sundays.' As the name suggests, these services will take place whenever there's a fifth Sunday in the month, and will be a chance to explore new and creative ways to worship God. The first Fifth Sunday, on August 31st, at the 10am service we will celebrate the beauty of God's creation, especially the nature in our own churchyard. We'll gather for an outdoor communion, enjoy time in prayer and song, and take part in a very special project – rebuilding the bug hotel into a bug church! Everyone is welcome, especially children and families, and you might want to bring a blanket or warm clothes if there's a bit of a breeze! We will have a plan B in case of rain.

As we move through this season of warmth and growth, may our hearts remain open to God's calling, whatever shape it may take. Let's use these sunny days not only to rest and enjoy creation but also to listen closely for His voice.

### **GOD IN THE SCIENCES**

**Dr Ruth Bancewicz**, based at The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge, writes on the positive relationship between Science and Christian faith.

### Wonder and Worship: Reflections in a Scottish Rainforest

It can be easier to notice things away from home, when we are relaxed and surrounded by unfamiliar sights in an exotic location. But sometimes the same wonders are there in our own back yard. GK Chesterton was a great advocate of intensive observation, and he invited his readers to take a



fresh look at things that might be taken for granted. The rewards for this mental adjustment are great, and can feed into our worship in new ways.

I first learned to appreciate old growth forests on the West coast of Canada: the centuries-old tangle of logs and underbrush, and thick layers of moss and lichen, that provide rich resources for countless organisms. Several years later, in Scotland, I stumbled over a few acres of birch and hazel, lush with moss and ferns, and humming with insect and bird life. Fallen logs lay everywhere, vegetation grew up the trees, creepers hung down, and sunlight slanted through clearings.

I later discovered that this patch of woodland is one of the few remaining areas of old growth Atlantic rainforest, so I visited one sunny morning when I had more time to linger. The wood is home to 140 species of lichen and 100 of moss, so I found myself looking very closely at tree trunks and boulders. Each lichen is a unique relationship between a fungus and a particular collection of single-celled algae – an example of the collaboration that is so essential to every ecosystem.

Places like this are worth preserving, respecting, and appreciating as much as a work of art or a historic city. I'm so grateful to the community that chose to preserve it, and the Creator who used such intricate and patient processes to create it. As the animals and plants around me did what comes to them naturally, I did what I was made for - thanking God for everything I saw. I found myself praising God alongside all those species of lichen, moss and trees. "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord" (Psalm 150).

There is a growing call to take both our personal devotions and our church services outside from time to time, and there are a growing number of resources to help us do this. As you go through your week, can you find one new way to appreciate your surroundings, and praise God alongside the rest of Creation?

### THE SIMPLE PLEASURES OF ORDINARY TIME

One great phrase of the Church of England, which is little-known but carries a wealth of rich meaning, is 'ordinary time'. While the seasons of Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost and Advent all have their fixtures and moments for focus and concentration, the bulk of the summer months is 'ordinary time'! A very evocative phrase – nothing particularly to focus on or to celebrate.

Just because it is 'ordinary', it does not mean it is not important or of no significance to how God wants us to use our lives. For most of us life is lived between high and low points: we look forward to something on the horizon or we are seeking to recover from something. So, it should be no surprise that ordinary time is the longest season in the Church calendar. Abraham Lincoln once said that: "God must love ordinary people because He made so many of them"!

Ordinary people, it seems to me, need 'ordinary time'. Sundays and weekdays inbetween, to sense God's presence with us in the day-to-day mundane, and ordinary comings and goings of life. He is there in the heights of resurrection joy and celebration. He is with us in the vulnerability and frailty of human weakness, modelled in the incarnation. He is with us in our efforts to discipline ourselves and be moulded by him (Lent) but He is also with us whenever we are conscious of life just being ordinary.

When our eyes are opened to these things, we will see what an extraordinary God we have!

### SURGE IN VISITS TO CHURCH SEARCH WEBSITE achurchnearyou.com

The number of page visits to the Church of England's church-finder website soared by 55 per cent last year to almost 200 million, as growing numbers of people searched for their local congregation.

Public page views on <u>AChurchNearYou.Com</u> hit 198.6 million in 2024 – up from 128.1 million in 2023 and up more than three quarters on the previous year.

The figure does not include the 9.7-million-page impressions from the site's army of local editors, who maintain and update parish pages, adding and tagging worship services, events and community action projects such as food banks.

Users shared a total of 11,733 church services and events from AChurchNearYou.Com on social media last year – a 268 per cent increase in a year.

And 18,445 services and events were added to calendars on people's mobile phones and other devices, a 200 per cent increase on the previous year.

The surging use of AChurchNearYou.Com comes after polls suggested growing interest in faith.

The Bible Society's recent report *The Quiet Revival* pointed to evidence of a turnaround in the numbers of young people identifying as Christian, and who say they regularly attend church.

The Church of England's Head of Digital, Amaris Cole, said: "We're delighted that more people than ever are looking for a local church via our church-finder tool, AChurchNearYou.com.

"The staggering increase shows the public are more interested than ever in connecting with one of our communities, whether for a service, an event, a family activity or one of the amazing projects our churches run.

"Our churches regularly report newcomers who have found them through the site, so the rise in page hits is giving our editors confidence in inviting the public in to one of our 16,000 spaces.

"Because everyone is welcome, we've prioritised accessibility by adding tags to help visitors find the service for them – whether there is wheelchair access, gluten-free refreshments, British Sign Language translation or dementia friendly. These can be found by using the tags when searching for churches in your area."


Also art books you no longer need that guide the reader through the drawing/copying/painting process.



### **GOD IN THE ARTS**

'He gave us eyes to see them': John Martin's 'Manfred on the Jungfrau'

In July we start looking with eager longing to holidays, a chance to get away from it all - to rest and recharge the batteries of life. Holidays are also a time to explore and visit new places. It might be the wild splendour of the Northumberland coast or the serenity of the Italian lakes, the vastness of the Grand Canyon or the magnificence of the Lake District.



This month's artist had a gift

for creating paintings that expressed this epic quality of landscapes. John Martin was born in 1789, and as an artist was drawn to religious and historical scenes on the grand scale. He illustrated the Bible and Milton, and his final works were on the theme of the Last Judgement. These are in the Tate Gallery in London, but for this July we visit the Art Gallery in Birmingham with its amazing collection of over half a million items, including many Pre-Raphaelite treasures. The entrance to this Victorian building is beneath the clock tower known as Old Brum.

The Art Gallery is home to John Martin's watercolour of 1837, 'Manfred on the Jungfrau.' It is a large work, almost 5 feet by 3 feet, capturing the rugged, imposing glory of the Jungfrau. Now a railway takes tourists to the summit in the Bernese Alps in Switzerland. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century climbers had to navigate glaciers, high passes and steep precipices. John Martin captures the grandeur of all this in his painting of snow and sky, crags and torrents, mountains and pine trees. Against that immensity we see two characters: Manfred, tortured by guilt and about to throw himself off the edge, and the mysterious hunter who leads him to safety.

Byron's poem 'Manfred' inspired the music of Tchaikovsky and Schumann, as it inspired John Martin. They were each attracted by the romanticism of man and nature in the poem. Like Manfred and the hunter in the watercolour, we look at this grace and nobility and feel humble and insignificant. Byron wrote:

'How beautiful is all this visible world! How glorious in its action and itself!' Manfred seeks redemption, but, sadly, finds only the solace of death. As we look at this painting, we see reflections of the landscapes we shall visit on our holidays. Such beauty, such glory, evoke for us those feelings of wonder and awe that inspired John Martin.

Manfred sees life in its true perspective as he gazes on the majestic scenery of the Bernese Alps. Holidays help us to put life into perspective. Away from the pressure of responsibility and duty, we often realise what is essential in our lives and with those around. We behold the majesty and glory of creation; we see this world as the handiwork of God; and we ask ourselves how we might make our way through it and be always alert to its mystery and its beauty.

### BANANAS COULD BE LOST TO CLIMATE CHANGE

Bananas are in danger. Almost half of the world's banana-growing regions may be lost to climate change in the next 50 years, a new report has warned.

Bananas are the world's fourth most important food crop globally — but rising

temperatures, droughts, and fungal infections are threatening where most of the world's crops grow, in Latin America and the Caribbean.

A recent study by Christian Aid found that 80 per cent of global banana exports come from this region, but that 60 per cent of the land currently used for the crop will be unsuitable, due to climate change, by 2080.

The director of policy and campaigns at Christian Aid, Osai Ojigho, said: "Bananas are not just the world's favourite fruit, but they are also an essential food for millions of people. We need to wake up to the danger posed by climate change to this vital crop."

UK consumers eat more bananas than any other European country, eating on average about 85 bananas a year each.

After recent years of remote attendance due to various circumstances, it was both refreshing and encouraging to gather physically with fellow churchwardens from across the diocese. The event offered not only the formal commissioning and commitment to our responsibilities, but also a strong sense of community and shared purpose. The setting of Wimborne Minster, with its rich history and sense of sacred continuity, provided a fitting backdrop to the occasion. The service reminded us of the importance of our role in supporting the ministry, maintaining the fabric of the church, and serving our congregations with care and diligence.

At the beginning of August, we have our church Quinquennial Inspection, a legal requirement. This will involve a professional architect inspecting the church building to assess its condition.

The inspection report covers:

- The state of the fabric (roof, walls, windows, etc.)
- Urgent repairs needed
- Medium and long-term maintenance recommendations

It will ensure the church building is safe, weatherproof and structurally sound, prioritize repair work and complies with church regulations.




