29th Sept Enter all the angels, led by Michael

What is an angel? Easy, people think: a shining figure with glorious wings, who appears from time to time to do some mighty work for God or bring a very special message from him.

Well, that's right in one sense (apart from the wings, which owe more to stained glass windows than the Bible). But the fact that not all 'angels' in the Bible are 'glorious' or 'shining' should make us hesitate to categorise them in this spectacular way. After all, the three apparently ordinary men who visited Abraham and Sarah to tell them that she would have a son even though she was long past child-bearing age had none of those outward embellishments. Nevertheless, Abraham recognised them as divine messengers.

The Bible is full of angels, from the early chapters of Genesis to the last chapter of Revelation, and often they had a key role in crucial events. It seems, from just two instances, that Michael was their leader, an 'archangel'. In many stained glass windows he's seen with a sword, because in a vision in Revelation he led the angelic host who fought and defeated Satan and his army.

In the Gospels, an angel of the Lord appeared to Zechariah in the Temple, to tell him that his elderly wife was to have a son, the forerunner of the Messiah, John the Baptist. An angel - Gabriel - appeared to Mary to tell her that she would be the mother of the Messiah, the Son of God. An angel appeared 'in a dream' to Joseph, the village carpenter in Nazareth, to tell him to go ahead and marry his fiancée, Mary, and later - also in a dream - warned him not to go back to Bethlehem. A 'young man', whom we take to have been an angel, was sitting in the empty tomb on Easter morning, waiting to tell the startled women that Jesus wasn't there - He had risen (Mark 16:5).

Without going into every biblical reference to angels, those should be sufficient to show that the word covers an enormous diversity of experience. So the Letter to the Hebrews speaks of those who practice hospitality as sometimes 'entertaining angels unawares'. Sometimes people recognised angels for who they were, and sometimes they didn't. Angels, quite simply, are God's agents or emissaries, messengers and ministers of His will. Sometimes they are human; sometimes they seem to be spiritual beings.

Perhaps we could even say that *anyone*, in any situation, who is at that moment God's 'messenger' to us, or serves us graciously, is an 'angel'. So, when we say, 'Oh, be an angel and pop up to the chemist for my prescription', we may be nearer the heart of the matter than we think!

Happy Birthday - Kent Ride and Stride.

Thank you to Ron and Mary and Janet and all the volunteers who this year will man our 3 churches for RIDE and STRIDE DAY on Saturday 13th September, your support on keeping our churches open from 10.00 until 6.00pm that day means so much to all of us who visit you either cycling or walking. Last year your sponsorship helped me raise almost £3,000 to share between our 3 churches which helped to raise the entire sponsorship for the whole of Kent to £151,081. RIDE and STRIDE is one of the main sources of income and grants for churches and here in Kent last year RIDE and STRIDE supported Kent churches for grants of £176,500 to 37 churches and chapels. RIDE and STRIDE is a National church charity with over 30 counties in England taking part on the 2nd Saturday in September. Kent has much to celebrate and celebration is certainly the optimum title for 2025 as Kent's RIDE and STRIDE IS 40 YEARS OLD and during that time has raised over £4.2 million pounds for Kent churches. I have taken part each year right from the beginning in 1985 and have managed to extend my first route of just 30 churches visited to a route with 90 churches in it and 70 visited. My route now covers much of west Kent from Gravesend to Tunbridge Wells and back again. The 70 visited was a record in Kent, those were the exceptional years and now due either to the age of the manual bicycle or the cyclist – I'm not sure which - it is only 60 churches that can be visited before 6.00 pm. Apart from keeping a record of churches visited, money raised and mileage covered I regret not keeping a diary of each year's route and adventures. Not so Margaret Tate, who lived in Yalding, for her the diary was an annual writing task after each R&S day. Continued on page 6

- I. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean cold frames and greenhouses ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting
- 10. Plant spring flowering bulbs

"An Adventure in Peru" was the subject of our July speaker Susan Shaw. 



Hello Everyone,

Our last meeting was a combination of two workshops and a 'stitch and chat' session for those not taking part in the instruction.

Sue D was teaching participants how to do the extremely delicate technique of drawn thread work, while Veronica was showing others Hardanger embroidery. Drawn thread is a form of counted-thread embroidery based on removing threads from the warp and/or the weft of a piece of even-weave fabric. Decorative stitches are then used to embellish the cloth. Good eyesight is required! Traditionally it has been used on fine household linens and ecclesiastical robes etc.

Veronica demonstrated the Hardanger technique to a group earlier in the year and as the day was oversubscribed, this was a second session. Hardanger is named after a Norwegian fjord and like drawn thread work is traditionally stitched in white thread on white fabric but in modern times brighter colours have been introduced to give more variety. Both groups were incredibly quiet as they had to concentrate hard on counting the threads of the evenweave fabrics!

Those not taking part had brought their own stitching to do. Linda was working on a piece of canvas work using a design from the Royal School of Needlework and I was preparing cut out pieces of fabric for a group of young magicians to make into waistcoats to wear when they are performing the tricks they have learnt at Magic Camp! As usual, coffee, tea and cake were available to help us concentrate.

BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

Weddings and bells go together like a horse and carriage or strawberries and cream. Church weddings are less frequent these days but ringers will always ensure the bells are rung if that is the bride's wish.

Usually we ring after the wedding service so we climb up the tower stairs to the ringing room while the wedding service is taking place below. At the end of the service when the bride and groom process down the aisle we get a signal and start to ring as the newly married couple leave the church. Husband and wife are greeted outside by the happy sound of bells at the start of their married life together.

Finishing ringing, one person per rope per bell, we come twirling down the tower stairs and out into the churchyard. Looking across we might see the numerous photographs being taken of the bride and groom by their excited guests specially dressed in honour of the great day. Meanwhile us casually dressed ringers wander away having made our especial contribution to a joyous day. Full-circle bell ringing with its particular traditional sound is the work of people and not of technology nor even of Al.

At Wimbledon this year the line judges, in their smart uniforms, were sadly missing replaced by, not infallible, technology. At least the players are still required to wear white.

The Reverend John Thorneycroft Hartley, the Victorian vicar of Burneston in North Yorkshire, unfortunately not an ancestor but there are many Hartleys in Yorkshire, would have worn whites when he won Wimbledon in 1879 and 1880 and was runner-up in 1881. He is the only vicar ever to have won Wimbledon.

The newspaper article, passed to me by fellow collegian Peter Harvey, tells the story of this priest who in 1879 was surprised to win his Wimbledon quarter-final. Then he had to rush back to his Yorkshire parish to take the Sunday services when he also visited a dying parishioner. Still in the tournament, the next morning he rode to Thirsk, caught the train to London, changed into his tennis clothes in the horse-drawn cab to Wimbledon and went on to win the championship. Victorian vicars were remarkable.






On 3rd September, the Church remembers St Gregory the Great (540 – 604AD), one of the most important popes and influential writers of the Middle Ages. He is well worth remembering, because he also changed the course of history in the British Isles. The son of a very rich Roman senator, Gregory converted as a young man, and then sold his vast estates to found six monasteries in Sicily and a seventh in Rome. He gave generously to the poor and became a monk.

Christians in England owe him a great deal. When Gregory came across some English slaves for sale in Rome, he asked who they were, and was told, "They are Angles." Moved with compassion for these despised men, he replied, "They are not Angles, but angels!" He planned to go to England to evangelize the Angles, but plague broke out in Italy about 590, and during this time he was elected Pope. But Gregory did not forget the Angles. In 596 He sent Augustine to England, and so indirectly became the apostle of the English.
