

Ancient Woodland: A celebration of place.

A major exhibition of works by local artists **Mary Waltham** and **Jacqueline Amies.** (Continues until 20 September).

*I*nspired by and rooted in the ancient woodlands of our locality, the exhibition invites visitors to the Allen Gallery to be curious about these rare and special areas to which we are fortunate enough to have access.

According to the Woodland Trust "Ancient woods are our richest and most complex terrestrial habitat in the UK and they are home to more threatened species than any other. Centuries of undisturbed soils and accumulated decaying wood have created the perfect place for communities of fungi and invertebrates and specialist species of insects, birds and mammals." (Woodland Trust 2024)

Workshops & Events: A programme of activities, supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, accompanies the exhibition, exploring some of the themes presented. There will be opportunities to learn more about some of the stories behind the Allen Gallery's permanent collections and some surprising connections with rural woodland sites and raw materials. The artists will be holding an "In Conversation" session on Saturday 13th September, 2-4pm.

VJ 80 celebrated in Privett Churchyard

On what was one of the loveliest summer evenings this year, over sixty people gathered in Privett Churchyard to mark and celebrate VJ 80 on Friday 15 August, in an act of remembrance and thanksgiving.

After the televised solemn national service and ceremonies earlier in the day marking the surrender by Japan and the final end to the Second World War, the evening in Privett was informal and congenial, but charged with emotion and poignancy as some of those present gave accounts of the experiences of family members who had endured the war in the Far East, mostly in unbearable conditions.

The evening began – of course - with a picnic, with the opportunity to have a very tasty burger and slaw provided by Amanda Wyatt at the Privett Centre.

Then began the more serious part of the gathering. First to speak was Gill Martin, who as a young girl lived in Singapore. Her father had the foresight to arrange the evacuation of Gill, her mother and siblings before the Japanese invasion. Gill told us how he had remained behind, was captured by the Japanese at the fall of Singapore, and remained a Prisoner of War in Chiangi Jail until the end of the war, with commandant responsibilities for his section of the prison. She told us how fearful the prisoners were when they heard of the Japanese surrender, in case their guards shot them in some sort of reprisal.

Pat Sadler then spoke about her uncle, Norman Massey, a young soldier captured in the fall of Singapore, sent as a POW to work on the "Death" Burma-Siam Railway, then sent by ship to Japan (all the prisoners were locked in the hold of the ship) and the ship was torpedoed by a US submarine (which thought it was a Japanese merchant ship carrying war supplies). He survived that and was set to work as slave labour in a factory a few miles outside Nagasaki, where in August 1945 he witnessed the atom bomb dropped on that city.

Others who spoke included Ann Daniels, remembering her Uncle Alf, who fought in the Far East and Rob Baldock, who spoke of his grandfather William who died fighting in the Far East – and Rob reminded us of modern Japan, now a trusted ally in international and defence matters.

VJ DAY COMMEMORATION by David Dobson

The fifteenth of August 2025 was the 80th anniversary of the war against Japan and the end of the Second World War. Commemorations were held throughout the land, and the one for our benefice was held on that day in the tranquil setting of Privett churchyard on a perfect summer's evening.

There were about seventy of us there, and the event took the form of a summer's evening picnic, followed by tributes and family memories of those final days of the war. As the sun went down a beacon was lit, and it crackled away as the stories unfolded. Some had been prepared beforehand, and Edward Sadler, who guided the proceedings then invited anyone else who might wish to contribute. To me it was a masterstroke, for that led to half a dozen people in the audience coming forward to recall their own personal family stories and it was all most moving.

The final account came from Sue Jones, our curate, dressed in her church robes and proudly wearing her father's medals as she talked about his service in a minesweeper, right in the front line off the coast of Japan on the last day. She ended her talk with a prayer and that brought proceedings to a close as the twilight deepened. We all then slipped quietly away into the night after what had been a well organised, highly appropriate and hugely enjoyable occasion.

Catherine Smith spoke about her Uncle John who flew Spitfires in the Burma campaign, and she also mentioned the father of Liz Cawston (Liz lived for many years in Privett) – he was actually present at the signing of the Act of Surrender by the Japanese on 15 August 1945.

Finally, the Revd Sue Jones spoke of her father's service as a very young Royal Navy officer, and in particular his time in the fleet off the coast of Japan preparing for the invasion planned if the atomic bombs had not forced the surrender by Japan – he told Sue in later life that the casualties anticipated in such an invasion would have been such that he was unlikely to have survived, so he – and therefore Sue – owed their lives to those bombs. Sue's father was then engaged in bringing back home survivors from the POW camps in Burma, remembering throughout his life their terrible state and those who died on the journey home.

Sue then brought things to a close with a prayer of remembrance and thanksgiving.

The beacon in the Churchyard was lit as a symbol of light and hope, and as dusk fell people were content to sit round the fire pit enjoying the warm evening and the peace and tranquillity of the beautiful Churchyard with its views across the South Downs, reflecting on what they had heard, and the courage and fortitude, as well as the sorrows, apparent from those wartime experiences.

Reported Dog Fouling On & Around The Boundaries of High Cross Playing Field.

Stepping in a dog's mess can ruin your day. As well as being unhygienic and repulsive, it's also a public health and safety risk - and if you don't clean up your dog's waste you could face a fine. Here's a guide to everything you need to know about dog fouling and UK law.

Where is it required by law to clean up dog mess?

Dog fouling in public is covered in the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act of 2014 for England and Wales - and areas protected by a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) will be decided by your local council. Places covered by the Public Space Protection Order usually include:

- Parks, playing fields, and playgrounds
- Town centres, shopping centres and car parks
- Footpaths, pavements and roads

What is the fine for not cleaning up dog mess?

If you don't clean up after your dog in a public place in England and Wales, you could receive a fixed penalty notice (FPN) of up to £100 on the spot, with amounts determined by your local council.

- You can be fined up to £100 fixed penalty notice (FPN) in England and Wales, escalating to £1,000 if unpaid. In Scotland, FPN is £80, rising to £100 if unpaid within 28 days.
- Dog excrement can cause toxocariasis, leading to serious health issues like breathing problems, seizures, and blindness, especially in children.
- Report repeated fouling or non-compliance to your local council, providing details of the incident and for issues on private property, councils can investigate but aren't required to clean it up.

I have often reflected on the privilege it is to be a governor at Foxfield CE Primary and Preschool and as Chair I am proud to have such a dedicated and talented team of governors all of whom volunteer their time and expertise to ensure the ongoing high standard of education and opportunities on offer at this wonderful small school in its lovely rural setting.

Writing in the middle of August with almost 3 weeks left of the school summer holidays means that I have no school news to report so I thought it might be of interest to readers if I tell you a bit about my talented team of governors

Of course the headteacher sits on the governing body and she is joined by an elected staff governor. There are four categories of non-teaching governors for a church school –

- Foundation Governor who, following a nomination by the Parish Church, is appointed by the diocese to ensure that the School maintains its special Christian ethos.
- A local authority governor appointed by the LA,
- Two parent governors elected by the parent body
- Co-opted governors people with particular skills that the board has identified.

Froxfield School has two foundation governors – Revd Sue Jones as a priest is the ex officio governor (church schools always have a member of the ministry team from the parish on their governing board). As well as being our local priest, Sue has a wide experience to bring to the team – she began her career in the city later moving into teaching where she became the Headmistress first of Tormead Girls' School in Guildford and later of Withington Girls' School in Manchester before realising her call to the priesthood. Edward Sadler, who is also Vice-chair of Governors, is a Foundation Governor and Chair of the Curriculum & Learning Committee. Edward brings great wisdom to the team with his experience as a retired lawyer and judge.

David Handley is a Co-opted Governor. His career in the British Foreign Service and then working for a major UK industrial company means he brings to the board his experience in Finance, HR and Strategy at a senior level in both organisations. I am delighted that he Chairs our Resources Committee as well as sitting on the Curriculum and Learning Committee with a special focus on Literacy. David also volunteers with British Red Cross Refugee Services.

Captain Ben Vickery is a serving Royal Navy Officer, Ben oversees Safeguarding throughout the school – a vital role requiring him to be on top of the latest information from the D f E and all the changes in legislation. Ben says it is a genuine privilege to get a deeper understanding of the school, the superb teaching staff and of course the incredible "resilient learner" children.

Susanna Shepherd is another Co-opted Governor, having recently moved to Froxfield and wanting to be more involved in the community Susanna answered an advert in this magazine for the role. Susanna brings her legal experience as a qualified solicitor and sits on the Curriculum and Learning committee with responsibility for SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disability) provision within the school. Her contribution and leadership in this ever more important aspect of education continues to be invaluable.

Keith Durward, a recently retired senior executive from KPMG has joined us as a co-opted governor – his experience and understanding of financial matters and auditing make him aptly suited for his role on the resources committee with a special focus on health and safety within the building.

Our two parent governors are Grace Pike and Francis Buner.

Grace is a research and development scientist and used to thinking outside the box, whilst working within tight regulatory requirements, she enjoys using her analytical skills to help support the team at Froxfield and she too sits on the Resources committee.

Francis is a senior conservation Scientist, a team and project leader in wild life conservation. His understanding of data and how to interpret it is a great asset to the Curriculum and Learning committee.

I am the Local authority governor and with my background in training in effective communication, coaching and leadership I hope that I am able to use my experience to lead this powerful team however as David Handley rightly said "The contribution we Governors can make is dwarfed by that of the staff and is to provide the framework within which the School and the children can continue to flourish."
