


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PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends HOLIDAY PACKING

In a recent sermon, I confessed to being an over-packer when going away. For a recent trip to Scotland, in a car shared with 3 others, my bags alone took up one half of the boot space, which didn't go unnoticed!



After the sermon and my confession, someone kindly sent me the delightful poem printed on the next page. The humour of the poem was not lost on me, and nor was the rather painful parallel to my own thought processes. It's the *just in case* thought that fills my bags. The sermon of that day related to Jesus sending out the seventy (Luke 10:1-12, 17-20), and in verse 4, Jesus instructs his disciples "Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals". Excuse me???

Its important to remember that Jesus is a teacher who used hyperbole to drive home a point: for example, He isn't really expecting us to tear out our right eye out, or cut off our right hand (Matthew 5:29-30). So maybe Jesus isn't saying to us "travel irresponsibly, without any preparation and basic provisions". Maybe He is extending an invitation to *travel light*. And not just in the practical sense, but in the spiritual one too.

I wonder if there are other examples of *just in case* thinking going on in our lives?

We pack our days with extra tasks just in case we're not doing enough. We rehearse conversations in our heads just in case they go wrong. We buy more stuff online just in case we don't have enough. We keep scrolling on social media just in case there is something even funnier in the next post.

And does *just in case* thinking really serve us? Or can it overburden our minds, as well as the boot of the car? Maybe, by not trying to cover every eventuality ourselves, we can leave some space in our lives for God's grace. And this, in turn, can become a conscious act of trusting God.

What if we took small steps to travel lighter: in our schedules, our conversations, our relationships, even our holiday packing?

So here's a gentle challenge for myself, that you may also consider adopting: packing just a little less, scrolling just a little less, overthinking just a little less.

My prayer is that through a practice of *just a little less*, I will come to understand what is *just enough*. And in moving from *just in case* thinking to *just enough* thinking, I will grow and deepen my trust in God Learning to trust that all will be well, even with *just a little less*.

Notice that Jesus didn't send the 70 out unprepared, He sent them unburdened: free to receive hospitality, to depend on the kindness of others, to discover that God provides through strangers and setbacks and the simple grace of enough. And God wants the same freedom for us. For us also to be unburdened, to not be weighed down by the effort of managing every risk or meeting every expectation (or, indeed, by filling half the boot of a Range Rover for a five-day trip!).

So if you, like me, sometimes feel weary from carrying too much (literally or emotionally), lets remember Jesus' invitation:

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest... For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28–30).

Let us travel light, trusting in God's grace. With every blessing, Jacky





Whether your loss is recent or long ago, you are warmly invited to a small, safe group where we explore grief in light of Christian hope.



Serena Quartermaine Hutton

17th December 1935 – 5th June 2025

Our mother Serena was born in Tottenham, North London, into an observant Church of England family with solid non-conformist connections, notably to the Primitive Methodists (though Serena signed the pledge as a child, as an adult she decided fine wine and Campari were amongst the joys of life and not to be renounced). On her mother's side her roots were in Kingston Blount, so it was to there that our grandmother went with her two small children to escape the Blitz, whilst her husband was in the army; Serena's great-grandfather had been a 'Prim' preacher on the Chinnor Circuit and what had been his chapel still stands at the Crowell side of the village.

Serena was the first of her family to go to university, winning a scholarship to Nottingham, where she met our father, Brian. They were married in 1958, a partnership that lasted until his death in 2023. The young couple soon went to live in Northern Ireland where Brian had family connections and where Patrick and I were born. Serena trained as a primary school teacher in Belfast, later returning as a lecturer to her teacher training college and then transferring to the Ulster Museum as their first Education Officer. During this time she studied for an external degree at the Courtauld Institute in History of Art, an interest that shaped the rest of her long life. A move to Edinburgh in 1974 meant Mum had to start again, as her primary school teaching qualification was not recognized in Scotland, but this turned out to be a blessing in disguise as it led her to teach at Edinburgh University, WEA, Newbattle Abbey College and the Open University. She stayed with the latter for more than forty years, for adult education proved to be her passion, enabling hundreds of people who might otherwise have missed out on a university experience to realize their dreams. Serena organized numerous field trips, notably to Florence and Venice. This continued when our parents moved south to Kingston Blount, the place where they lived for the longest period of their lives and where she added teaching at Rewley House in Oxford, Southampton, and at Chinnor Village Centre.

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Serena trained for the Anglican priesthood, alongside her dear friend Joan DeVal, as soon as it was possible for women to do so. Many locally will remember Serena's service as a non-stipendiary local minister for the diocese of Oxford, preaching, baptising, marrying and conducting funerals in the United Parish.; she even said that residents of Hempton Fields would book her for their final farewells. Latterly she found spiritual solace in silence and reflection in the Quaker Meeting House in High Wycombe, a community that along with dear neighbours and friends

gave her immense support in the twilight months of her life in her nursing home in Benson, as memory and mobility were eroded. Her funeral in the church at Crowell reflected those twin strands of her spirituality. It was where she had served and where her parents and younger brother are buried, but it was conducted within the Quaker tradition, gently guided by Charlotte Collins.

We said Goodbye to our dear friend Mary Walker on Wednesday 30th July. Here is some the wonderful eulogy Mary's daughters, Fiona and Karen, shared with us.

Mary Walker

6th June 1937 - 6th July 2025



How lovely it is to see you all here — thank you so much for coming to celebrate our mum. We thought we'd start at the end and let you know that Mum died peacefully, with Fiona and me by her side. She was in no pain or distress.

Mum had been ill for about three weeks. She became increasingly sleepy, but she remained relaxed and happy throughout. During those final weeks, she had precious time with all of her adored grandchildren. To her

delight, Ruby came up from Cornwall, she saw Luke buy his first home and Jodie came to visit nearly every day. She Facetimed with Sam in New Zealand and Otis in London. She told them all she loved them.

Fiona had the brilliant idea (a very rare thing, as we all know) to bring some of Mum's favourite poetry books into the hospital, and we read lots and lots of poems. Mum invariably joined in — she knew so many poems by heart. She had a couple of wonderfully lucid days, and we took turns reading Robbie Burns in truly terrible Scottish accents. We laughed. A lot. Then Mum outdid us — she recited a poem none of us had ever heard before, which she claimed was from Whitehaven:

"Red, white and blue
The dirty kangaroo
Went behind the rubbish bin
And did a number two."

Mum was born and bred in Whitehaven, with three brothers, Alec, Tom and Jimmy and one sister, our lovely Auntie Ann. It was a close-knit family, and her bond with Ann was especially strong. We're so glad Ann's three boys are here today.

Now, Whitehaven isn't exactly one of the Lake District's chocolate-box villages but Mum absolutely loved it. And despite teasing her mercilessly

about it, we did too. Her dad was a miner, her mum ran the roost (which may explain a few things). She told us in recent years that she never once heard her dad raise his voice. Not once. Isn't that lovely?

Mum was super clever. She passed her 11+ aged nine and went on to grammar school, where she also excelled at sport. She captained the school rounders team, played county netball and county hockey — and eventually went on to represent Hong Kong at hockey.

She trained to be a teacher in Yorkshire and kept dear friends from both school and college for the rest of her life.

During the college holidays, she worked at the Wasdale Head Inn, at the top of Wastwater— and it was there she met Dad. It sounds like an idyllic time: falling in love, surrounded by beauty and brilliant friends. If you've never been, you really must. Dad loved Mum's family and although he struggled a bit with the accent, it was apparently much easier after a pint or two.

Mum and Dad married in Whitehaven in 1962. On their wedding day, Dad sent her a telegram that read: "Congratulations, you lucky girl." Theirs was an enduring love and Dad died just before their 51st wedding anniversary.

After marrying, they moved to Bradford — and when Mum was nearing the end of each pregnancy, she wasn't allowed to leave the county - in those days you had to be born in Yorkshire to play county cricket. Dad must have been thrilled to have two daughters... We think he got over the disappointment eventually.

They were in Bradford until 1971 when we moved to Hong Kong. It was a massive wrench to leave family behind, but it became one of the greatest adventures of their lives. Mum taught primary school for the first time and settled on the age group she loved most: 8-9-yearolds. We knew she was a brilliant teacher — we were at the same school! — and saw first-hand how much the children loved her. Hers was a true vocation. We've received so many messages from former colleagues and pupils, and the word that comes up again and again is "inspirational." And I have to say 'naughty' also comes up as a recurring theme...

Mum had a special gift for the more challenging children. One pupil at Windmill School in Oxford was refusing to write a single word. So Mum, in front of the whole class, said: "If you do half a page of writing, Martin, I'll dance on the table." That was all he needed. Of course, she kept her promise — just as the headteacher walked in...

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Hong Kong life was full and rather glamorous. The miner's daughter now had a live-in maid. Despite working full time, she managed beach days, boat trips, weekly hairdos and manicures, endless dinners and dances — but most of all, lots and lots of hockey. Every Saturday, we were dragged along to watch her team (usually win). Dad was her most vocal supporter — occasionally too vocal. Once, a member of the opposing team threatened him with a hockey stick.

Mum's matches were often written up in the papers by a journalist with a little crush on her. He frequently credited her singlehandedly with the team's victory. His name was Yakoob Aladin, and the family joke became: "Yakoob Aladin — he never wrote a bad'un." But she was a great player and even played for Hong Kong when Australia came to visit.

When we returned to the UK in 1979, Mum and Dad were happy to be back among family and old friends. They moved to Chinnor and quickly built a community there — often centred around The Wheatsheaf pub and many a raucous singalong round the piano. Karen and I glided through our teenage years as saintly models of decorum and restraint. It's rather satisfying to say that in a space where Mum can't correct me.

I think she was generally happy with the marriages we made! On the odd occasion she would confuse Paul and Joe by taking their side in an argument – only to realise it was her tendency to support the underdog.

Mum taught at Windmill School from 1980 to 1997. She championed sport - especially girls' football - organised trips, and threw herself into every bit of school life. When she retired, the messages she received from children (past and present) were so full of warmth and affection — it was clear how deeply she touched their lives. Her colleagues became firm friends.

Fiona and I ensured her retirement wasn't too peaceful. She'd been badgering us for grandchildren, especially as Ann already had three. I very kindly timed Ruby's arrival for the year Mum retired. Luke followed a couple of years later with Sam, Jodie and Otis in close succession.

She was an incredible grandma. You'll hear from Ruby, Luke and Jodie after this, and they'll say it better than we ever could. She really really loved them — and they knew it. We had countless holidays and Christmases all together, the chaos of which she (mostly) embraced. As they grew up and got a bit less cute, she took no nonsense. "Judge Dredd" was a nickname for a while... and the day she tipped a bowl of cereal over Sam's head is family legend.

Despite the chaos of grandchildren, Mum and Dad still snuck off for holidays, often in the UK, and often to their beloved Cumbria or Yorkshire. But they also returned to Hong Kong, and visited Bali and Fiji on – surprise surprise – a golden oldies hockey trip. They kept in touch with and visited family and lifelong friends. After Dad retired at 65, they had twelve happy years of joint retirement before he died in 2013. She missed him terribly — but carried on with extraordinary resilience and grace.

Mum was so happy to have the Farrells just around the corner and we came to visit often from London. She remained fully involved in the lives of all of her grandchildren and it was especially lovely to see them all develop adult relationships with her and to visit her on their own. Her faith played a greater part in her life and she helped with toddlers' church, Chooseday church, the summer Pulse groups. She took the children with her as often as they would tolerate but was less keen on the idea after Otis turned his Palm Sunday cross into a gun... She was lucky to have such kind neighbours and friends nearby and always felt very looked after especially in the months immediately after Dad's death. Thank you.

In the last 2-3 years, we noticed her becoming more forgetful, and eventually she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. But, astonishingly, she never got upset by it. She just laughed about it.

Even then she continued to live a full life, swimming every week and with regular little adventures for musicals, mini road trips - ok usually to funerals- and of course grandchildren time. It's only in the past year that she needed extra help. And yes she wasn't thrilled about that at first, but she got there. She was very well supported and again her wonderful neighbours were there to help whenever needed - including a daily newspaper run. Her carers loved her. The hospital staff loved her. And all of them commented on her smile. Yes that unforgettable smile.

We are beyond grateful that Mum lived such a full, rich, and love-filled life. She taught us to serve, to love, to laugh and to be happy — and she also showed us how to age with grace, humour, dignity and a large dose of naughtiness.

To know her was to love her — and we loved her very, very much. How lucky are we. Thank you, Mum. x



ST ANDREW'S CHURCH: RESTORATION OF LADY CHAPEL AND INSTALLATION OF STORAGE CUPBOARDS IN CHOIR VESTRY

LADY CHAPEL:

Due to the extensive water damage to the walls in the Lady Chapel, quotations have been obtained and a faculty granted for the full restoration. This work will be carried out by qualified contractors who will carefully remove the two paintings and store them. The contractors will provide protection to the flooring, fixtures and fittings in the Lady Chapel while the work is undertaken. The contractors will have to remove the defective plaster and then replaster the area with lime putty render to match the original construction of the church. This will have to dry before painting. The planned date for this work to start is 11 August and will take approximately three weeks for the work to be completed. The approximate cost will be £4 500.00.

STORAGE CUPBOARDS:

With the growing work with children in schools and in church, resources to support this vital work are essential and need to be stored in the church for use by the Rector and the volunteers. The two choir robe cupboards will be stripped, and new purpose-built cupboards will be built reusing the wood to match and blend with the existing style. The cleaning items including the vacuum cleaner will be stored in the right-hand cupboards, and in the left-hand side cupboards will be storage for children's work resources. The work will start on Monday 4 August and will be completed in one week. The cost of the project will be £6 250.00.



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A Walk around Chinnor's Community Spaces

The BBOWT Community Network project works with community volunteer groups in Berks, Bucks and Oxon to support and encourage their work looking after nature. We arrange networking events, and on-line meet ups.

"I attended the zoom meeting last month and really enjoyed meeting others from a variety of groups. We shared challenges, and I have taken away contacts for people who may be able to share experiences and give advice on a number of subjects, such as CIO status and sponsorship." *Maureen Dyroff, member of Donkey Lane Community Orchard, Chinnor*

Chinnor is a large village in South Oxfordshire, on the Icknield Way below the Chiltern escarpment. The village is home to a cluster of volunteer groups looking after nature; Mill Lane Community Graden; Donkey Lane Orchard; Chinnor Churches Go Wild!, Greening Chinnor.

In May 2025 the Chinnor groups hosted other members of the Community Network for a guided walk around their projects. Local conservation expert Nicole Clough joined the walk to offer advice and encouragement.

"I thoroughly enjoyed the day – the energy was harmonious and positive. All the group hosts were super well-prepared!! Their excitement was palpable and were clearly very proud of showcasing their actions." *Nicole Clough*

Through bringing community volunteers together, facilitating networking, and providing opportunities for skill-sharing, the Community Network ensures that the great work going on locally is seen by a wider audience.

"There was a delightful mix of local presence and visitors from further afield! We

were all there as we wanted to learn more about the projects as we all had underlying nterest in wildlife, also wanted to share our experiences."

As well as seeing the results of the community volunteering work, the walk gave participants the opportunity to discuss common problems and themes.



"It also became evident that there is a core group of volunteers behind all these projects, and the question of 'succession planning' was a concern. How do we get the 'younger generation' engaged and involved in sustaining these projects?" *Valerie Pike, walk attendee.*

One of the strengths of the Community Network is our links with other local organisations working in the community. CAG Oxfordshire are a network of over 100 community action groups working across Oxfordshire to make it a safer, fairer, greener, more sustainable place to live, work and visit. Jo Milton who is the CAG officer responsible for their food waste project, joined us for the Chinnor walk and met useful contacts for her work.

The Team looks forward to planning for the next academic year and the opportunity to create memories that will stay with us all, young and old for years to come.







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Wordsearch - The Transfiguration

The story of the Transfiguration is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36). On that day, high up on a mountain, Peter, James and John were given a glimpse of Jesus' true glory. For Jesus' face began to shine as the sun, and his garments became white and dazzling. Then Elijah and Moses, suddenly appeared, talking with him.

Overwhelmed, Peter offered to build three tabernacles on that holy place, one for each. But God's 'tabernacling', or God's *dwelling* with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. It depends on being in the presence of Jesus, instead. And so a bright cloud covered them, and a voice spoke, saying that Jesus was his beloved son, whom the disciples should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our *listening* to Jesus.

Why did Moses and Elijah appear? They represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. But now they were handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.
