MISSION COMMUNITY CONFIRMATION SERVICE

Our local confirmation service (for adults and young people in school year 10 or higher) is planned for the evening of <u>Sunday 9th November 6.30pm at St Thomas & St John's Lostock.</u> This service will not only include people from our own team of churches but also others from across our Mission Community. The service will be led by Bishop Matthew, Bishop of Bolton.

Being confirmed is *a choice* not a requirement – the Church of England doesn't have a formal membership in that sense - everyone is welcome to come along to church, worship and be a part of the church community. Being confirmed is simply a sign of your commitment and involvement and an opportunity to publicly affirm your faith.

You will need to be baptized before you are confirmed. If you were not baptized as a child and want to make a commitment of faith, you can be baptized and confirmed in the same service, or baptized at a separate service shortly before your confirmation.

STILL RELEVANT

IMPORTANT UNIMPORTANT PEOPLE

Jeremiah chapter 45, verses 1 to 5: In the fourth year that Jehoiakim, son of Josiah was king of Judah, Baruch wrote down what I had dictated to him. Then I told him that the Lord, the God of Israel, had said "Baruch, you are saying, 'I give up! The Lord has added sorrow to my troubles. I am worn out from groaning and I can't find any rest'. But I, the Lord, am tearing down what I have built and pulling up what I have planted, I will do this to the entire earth. Are you looking for special treatment for yourself? Don't do it. I am bringing disaster on the whole



human race, but you will at least escape with your life, wherever you go. I, the Lord, have spoken".

The bible is full of very important unimportant people, they don't get the glory but they play a vital role in God's work, says C.J. Wright in his commentary on Jeremiah. Think of Moses' mother and sister who saved the life of one of Israel's greatest leaders; the slave girl who introduced Naaman to Elisha so he could be cured of his leprosy; Paul's nephew who gave the tip off that his life was in danger, and one I love is in Romans 16 where Paul is greeting some important people who have supported him and it is Rufus's mother – no name! "who has been a mother to me", says Paul, that simple statement speaks volumes.

Baruch was one those very important unimportant people, he was Jeremiah's secretary. We wouldn't have the book of Jeremiah in our bibles without Baruch. Jeremiah was not a popular prophet because his message from God to Israel was one of judgement on God's people who would not repent of their disobedience and idolatry. He was vilified for it and so was Baruch who stood by Jeremiah faithfully. The judgement would come in the form of a brutal war waged against Israel by King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon, and Israel would lose it and there would be great suffering and death. God, through Jeremiah, told Baruch to write down all Jeremiah's prophecies on a scroll and read in public before the king – the king rejected it. Baruch was a model secretary, accurate and hardworking and courageous because it took courage to read out those prophecies of judgement before the king; he risked imprisonment and execution. But it all got to him one day, and in these verses Baruch is at a low ebb, he is depressed, weary and afraid, ready to give up. If Jeremiah's prophecies came true what would become of him and his family? Would they die too? God knew Baruch and how he was feeling and he was not too busy to reach out to him in love and to promise him he would survive, and he did.

The Church is full of very important unimportant people, they are not centre stage, in the spotlight, getting the glory and applause but God's work couldn't go on without them. St Paul in 1Corinthians 12 calls them 'helps'. Our Team of Churches has some very important unimportant people and without them we could not continue God's work and mission here. The challenge for us is to ask ourselves where and how do my life, gifts and abilities find their place in God's work in the church. Those who sweep a room because they love God are not unimportant people.

(Brenda has reminded us that we all have at least one ability/skill that we can put to good use in our individual churches. As we start back after the summer holidays perhaps this is a good time for you to find out what you can do and sign up? - Cleaning, coffee rota, flowers, sides persons, children's groups, reading, intercessions and so the list goes on! In the words of the wartime slogan (adapted): Your CHURCH needs YOU!!). Just speak to a PCC member or churchwarden.

Appointments are offered at tax surgeries in AgeUK and similar venues. Home visits are available for those with a disability or other difficulties.

To decide if you qualify for support from our specialist tax team, we will ask you about your finances and personal circumstances.

We will ask you about your annual income and whether it is below the individual Minimum Income Standard (MIS) currently £28,000 and we will ask you about any debts or savings you have.

We will ask you about your personal circumstances as you may be experiencing disadvantages or hardships that makes it difficult for you to get the help you need.

GREEN NEWS—and none of it good news (well there is some if you read through to the end of the article!)

EVERY DAY UK homes throw away approximately, 20 million slices of bread, 4.4 million whole potatoes, 3.1 million glasses of milk, 2.7 million whole carrots, 2.2 million slices of ham, 1.2 million whole tomatoes, 920,000 whole bananas and 86,000 whole lettuces.

SARAH Clayton from the Love Food, Hate Waste campaign, says, "Getting to grips with freezing and managing your shopping are big factors in preventing waste. Ata time of ever-rising food costs and public concern about climate change, tackling food waste at home is something we can all do to make a difference and save money. On average food waste for a standard family can cost up to £700 per year!"

SO HOW ABOUT TRYING THIS FROM THE INDEPENDENT *©The i Paper*—The six-to-one grocery method is very simple. Popularised by US chef Will Coleman it's a way to plan your weekly shop using basic arithmetic: you pick up six vegetables, five fruits, four proteins, three starches, two sauces or spreads and one treat. This is theoretically for any household – simply the bigger the house, the more you buy of each. In the end, the volume of each item goes up but the number of different items stays the same. That's it. Some of these numbers may seem excessive, but if you grab the fundamentals of onions, carrots, potatoes you're already nearly there on the veg count.

PLASTIC WASTE: this is a message that is still not getting through to manufacturers and big supermarkets. Token attempts are made. But over half of food and drink is packaged in unnecessary plastic. A quarter of food and drink companies are off target for their individual packaging goals. The Materials Change Index, commissioned by the FTSE100 sustainable packaging company DS Smith and conducted by Retail Economics found that 51% of food and drink items found in supermarkets are unnecessarily packaged in plastic and can be safely replaced with alternative packaging. OK—we have plastic recycling bin collections now but there are not enough recycling plants to cope with the amount we produce! And once again—international talks have broken down as no agreement could be reached on reducing the amount of plastic used and disposed of.

SOME GOOD NEWS! The empty metal canister inside your inhaler can be recycled at the local chemists so please hand them in and Novo Nordisk pens can now be recycled (NB PLEASE TAKE NEEDLE OUT FIRST!) - how to do it? Collect a PenCycle return box (holds 12 used pens) from your pharmacist or you can order online from www.pen-cycle.co.uk put your empty pens in the box and when it's full return it to the pharmacy or mail it back free of charge. Currently, every year, 23,000,000 pens go to land fill. Now they can be recycled the glass goes to make lamps and the plastic goes to make furniture—brilliant!

TEETH—those little inter tooth brushes and toothpicks are now made from plant based recyclable material so please look out for them when you restock.

As we know being outside and getting some form of exercise is good for us physically and mentally—why not give one of the walks a try—usually a gentle walk with a guide and plenty of company.


NOVELS AND RELIGION NO. 5: "THE GREAT GATSBY" BY F. SCOTT FITZGERALD

In the distant background of this novel is the journey in 1620 of the Pilgrim Fathers, a group of Puritans from England, to create the first permanent settlement of Europeans in what became the American nation as we know it. Fitzgerald presents a portrait of what that America has come to in modern times.

Set in, and written during, the Roaring Twenties, the novel shows a very glamorous world. Jay Gatsby hosts sparkling social occasions at his large mansion, attended by wealthy, expensively-dressed people. They have luxurious cars, at a time when cars were the prerogative of the rich, and have all the latest mod. cons., such as telephones, in their homes. However, the author looks at this world critically. Gatsby lives in a beautiful world, but behind the glittering surface, from another angle, these people are addicted _______

to hedonism, materialism and conspicuous consumption. They live in a world of conmen and dishonesty. Many people are having extra-marital affairs. This lifestyle leads, by the end of the novel, to a tragic outcome.

The modern America the author portrays is a betrayal of the high moral and religious principles of the Pilgrim Fathers, and of the noble ideals of the later Founding Fathers. Gatsby typifies this. He has lived the American Dream, rising from humble beginnings to great success, but by following a false version of religion, with false, superficial values and false aims: "He was a son of God...and he must be about His Father's business, the service of a vast, vulgar, meretricious beauty." CELEBRATING 28 YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP: HORWICH & RIVINGTON'S BOND WITH OKATHITU & RUACANA, NAMIBIA

For nearly three decades, a very special link has blossomed between the churches of Horwich & Rivington and the parishes of Okathitu & Ruacana in Namibia—a relationship built on hope, resilience, and mutual support which continues to grow stronger each year.

Life in these Namibian communities is exceptionally challenging. With relentless sun and infrequent rains, droughts frequently turn the land into a barren, desert-like landscape. In this harsh environment, unemployment soars as high as 85%, leaving many families dependent on subsistence farming just to survive. Necessities many of us take for granted—clean water, electricity, adequate housing, and sanitation—are elusive luxuries for many people living in northern Namibia.

Yet, amidst these difficulties, the success of the pigeon pea plant - *introduced by the Namibia Committee* - has provided a bountiful supply of nutritious food which has supplemented the diets of the school children. Building on this success, plans are underway to expand the gardens at the two schools in Okathitu. (*Photos were in the July/August magazine*).

Already, land adjacent to the schools has been secured and fenced to protect crops from wandering animals. The next stage is to connect a water supply from which water tanks can be filled. Then work will begin to prepare the soil for planting vegetables and fruit trees by adding fertilisers and pesticides. This will provide a much more varied diet for the school children.

In a proud new chapter, the Namibia Committee decided to take an ambitious step. To ensure sustainable support, they have established 'The Mopane Tree' as an independent charity. This will secure vital funding for both existing and future projects.
