

THE REVD KAYODE OYEBODE WRITES

Dear People of St Barnabas,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

My name is Olukayode Oyebode — though please feel free to call me Kayode — and I am deeply honoured to be joining you as your new Associate Priest.

I come with a heart full of gratitude, prayer, and expectation, trusting in the God who is already at work among us — even in these uncertain times. Like many churches today, St Barnabas is walking through a challenging season. Numbers may be fewer, energy stretched, and the future not always clear. Often in these very moments God brings new life, renews His Church, and leads us into deeper trust. He is faithful, as a new chapter is unfolding — by God, the Author and Finisher of our faith [Hebrews 12:2].

What drew me to this community is your heart: a church rooted in prayer, welcome, and mission. God is already stirring fresh hope, worship, and witness in Sutton, let us journey together as we listen for His voice.

My background spans both the secular and sacred with a lengthy career in Human Resources and Leadership. I was ordained in 2012 in the Diocese of Lagos, Nigeria. Since 2019,1 have served across the Diocese of Southwark in various priestly roles — offering liturgical support, interregnum cover, and pastoral care in diverse communities. I began at St John Chrysostom, Peckham (Sep 2019 - Sep 2020), St Mary Magdalene, Peckham, covering during the Vicar's illness (Nov 2020 - Sep 2022). I was then licensed as Assistant Priest at St Laurence Church, Catford (Oct 2022 - Jan 2025), whilst supporting churches through interregna including:

- St Andrew's, Catford (Feb 2023 Jul 2024)
- St Swithin's, Hither Green (Aug 2023 Nov 2024)
- St Clement with St Peter, Dulwich (Aug 2023 Aug 2024)
- Holy Innocents Church (Sep 2023 Jan 2025) & St Mark's, South Norwood (Sep 2023 - Jan 2025)
- St Margaret's, Blackheath (June 2024)

I also supported Holy Trinity, Tottenham, through her interregnum, ongoing liturgical ministry, Remembrance Day services (2023 & 2024), a funeral (May 2025), Sunday worship, outreach, and mentoring. Prior to my appointment to St Barnabas, I also covered interregna at St Hilda's and St Augustine's, Grove Park (Feb 2025). Each of these seasons has deepened my conviction that the Church flourishes not by strategy alone, but through Spirit-led community — people who choose to pray, serve, and walk forward in faith. I am passionate about building intergenerational worship, nurturing those who feel lonely or uncertain, and helping all God's people discover

and share their gifts.

My loving wife, Aderonke, has been a faithful companion in ministry, and our children, their spouses, and our grandchildren — both in and beyond London in UK — continue to remind me daily of God's grace and the joy of family and faith.

I do not come with all the answers, but I come ready to listen, serve, and walk with you in hope. Please keep me in your prayers as I prepare to join you — and know that I am already praying for St Barnabas: for healing where there has been hurt, for renewed hope, and for the Spirit's fresh fire to fall upon us.

PHYLLIS SANDERS (26TH AUGUST 1928 – 1ST MAY 2025)

Phyllis Sanders was a long term member of our congregation and Mothers' Union, Her funeral was held on Thursday 29th May at North East Surrey Crematorium. Most of her large family, which



included her daughter, four grandchildren, nine great grandchildren and one great-



great grandchild who had visited her at the hospice, were at the service. Both Phyllis' mother and sister had died when Phyllis was in her early teens and she

ran away from home when she was 16 and lived in digs in Croydon.

She was on the bread line and nearly died of pneumonia at that time. This made her a very independent lady, very forthright and quite opinionated but everyone knew that that was just Phyllis. She did office work and worked at an accountancy firm even though she had no accountancy qualifications. Here is her description of the VE Day celebrations in London in 1945: "I was 16 and working for the Foreign Office in Prince's Street, Westminster. I went to Trafalgar Square with a work colleague. Sailors, were letting off fireworks from Lyon's Corner House." Phyllis was only 5ft tall and 7 stone and she was carried along by the crowd down The Mall. She saw the Royal Family on the Balcony but she was very frightened being in such a big rowdy crowd. She ended up back in Lyon's Corner House at 2.00am waiting for the first train out of Charring Cross to her digs in Blackheath.

Phyllis enjoyed cooking, gardening, nice clothes, dancing especially at the Lyceum Ballroom at Tooting. She was a stickler for correct grammar! She was famous for her lemon drizzle cake, and when she was in her 90's used to make a lemon drizzle cake each week for the St Barnabas Bunnies.

The funeral service ended with her favourite hymn "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind".

On Friday 30th May the Mothers' Union held a family Agape Tea (devised by the Diocese of Southwark) as a celebration of Beryl & Richard Thirtle's Diamond Wedding and Pearl Essex's 90th Birthday. The early Christians had a practice of meeting for meals together. Agape is one of the Greek words for love. These were times of fellowship and sharing which strengthened the bond between them.

At the beginning of the afternoon Kaushalya from St Nicholas Mothers' Union brought two lovely bouquets and formally presented them to Beryl and Pearl. Sue Davis made two beautiful cakes, a fruit one for Pearl and an Orange cake for Beryl and Richard. This was Richard's favourite cake. He could not come as he was ill in hospital so Sue made another orange cake just for him so he could enjoy it from his hospital bed. [See also Parish Pump, Page xx]

26 people came in response to the Invitation. The table was laid out with a cross, a candle and a Bible in the middle,

In line with the Diocese's instructions, the afternoon began with the washing of hands to remind us of our baptism, then the lighting of a candle, followed by Graces, which had been selected by the past Mothers' Union Worldwide President, Sheran Harper.

Everyone had brought donations of food and a sumptuous feast was laid out with sandwiches, nibbles and a scrumptious strawberry and chocolate dessert.

After everyone had enjoyed their meal, Humphrey Clarke read the Bible passage about the Wedding Banquet [Luke 14, vs 15-24], after which we all sang the song "The Wedding Banquet" by Brian Westhead (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Z461aepU8us). At the end of the song everyone sang a special verse (see overleaf). After that the Agape ended with the Grace, then the cakes were cut and everyone toasted Beryl and Pearl. A truly memorable afternoon!

THE 'THY KINGDOM COME' PRAYER WALK

As the Lord ascended, he promised the gift of the Holy Spirit to enable his disciples to be his witnesses. 'Thy Kingdom Come', the 11 days between Ascension Day and Pentecost is a time to ask that those without faith encounter God's love and experience his blessings.

On Saturday 31st May, 13 people came on a prayer walk with 11 prayer stations, starting at the church, around Benhill Recreation Ground and, then, back to the church, using the prayers in the Mothers' Union Prayer Diary.

At the first station we wrote down names of those we wanted to pray for and then said The Lord's Prayer. At the second station

inside Benhill Recreation Ground, we did a 'Thy Kingdom Come' craft, making a 'Thy Kingdom Come' keyring. At most of the prayer stations there was a park bench for people to sit on and some of the stops there



was topics for us to think about. Evelyn, who was on the walk, told us that, last year, she prayed for two people to come to Christ and one had actually become a Christian.


During the walk the children had been looking at the play park but they patiently waited to the end of the prayer walk to go and play on the swings, while

LOVE MATTERS

3.THINK SINGLENESS

Increasing numbers of people live in a single-person household yet single people can be easily over-looked. We should not regard singleness as a deficit model, as lesser than living in a family unit with children. Singleness can be a deliberate choice, sometimes the right partner has not been found, and sometimes separation, divorce or death results in the loss of a partner. Most single people are members of a family and need to love and be loved. While in order to flourish, each person must have their basic needs met, true flourishing requires a sense of belonging, being part of a social group with friendship, intimacy and affection, communicating well, and dealing with conflict constructively.

WHAT THE CHURCH CAN DO

- Reaffirm the value and dignity of every human being whatever their circumstances.
- Celebrate and honour singleness, including chosen celibacy.
- Ensure all churches and church families are single-friendly.

BIBLE PASSAGES FOR REFLECTION

Read 1 Corinthians 7. 6-9; 17-20; 27-35

John the Baptist and Jesus remained single for their whole lives. Anna was long widowed [Luke 2. 36-38] - what did this enable them to achieve?

QUESTION FOR DISCUSSION

What steps can be taken to ensure that single people feel truly welcome, valued for who they are, and supported in church communities?

reflection about a Christian's Survival Kit which is useful to all Christians. We were all given a number of articles:

A toothpick to remind you to pick out the GOOD qualities in everyone whom you meet. [Matthew 7:1]



An elastic band to remind you to be flexible. Things might not go as you plan, but everything WILL work out. [Romans 8:28]

A pencil to remind you to list your blessings every day. [Ephesians 1:3]

A rubber to remind you that everyone makes mistakes, but they can be erased (i.e. forgiven). [Genesis 50:15-21]

A plaster to remind you to heal hurt feelings, yours or someone else's, as soon as they occur. (Colossians 3:12-14)

A sticky fixer to remind you to stick with it and that if you do, you can accomplish anything. [Philippians 4:1-3]

A mint to remind you that you are worth a mint to your Heavenly Father. [John 3:16]

A tea bag to remind you to relax daily and go over that list of God's blessings. [1 Thessalonians 5:18]

At the end of the reflection, we all sang "Bind Us Together Lord" and said Mary Sumner's prayer:

All this day, O Lord, let me touch as many lives as possible for thee; and every life I touch, do thou by thy spirit quicken, whether through the words I speak, the prayer I breathe, or the life I live. **Amen**[Mary Sumner, MU Founder, 1876]

All very encouraging, just like Barnabas.

In the afternoon of Sunday 15th June, the Social Committee arranged a strawberry tea to celebrate St Barnabas Day. It was held in the church hall as the church

roof repairs were in progress. About 40 people came, including 8 children. There

FAREWELL TO THE VENERABLE MOIRA ASTIN, ARCHDEACON OF REIGATE

On Wednesday 18th June, Sally Reed and Sally Bramdaw went to the Archdeacon's Visitation service at St Patrick's Church Wallington to be sworn in as Churchwardens of St Barnabas for 2025 along with all the churchwardens in the Archdeaconry of Reigate. They were supported by 7 members of St Barnabas Church. This was Archdeacon Moira's final




At the end of the service there were speeches about Moira's life; how good

However, this was not the last time we heard Moira speak as, on the next day, 5 members of St Barnabas were invited to The Church of the Good Shepherd Tadworth to hear her talk about how Christianity



came to Britain. Her research showed that the Good News of Jesus came from St John the Evangelist, via Lyon in Gaul (France) long before St Augustine. THE ORDINATION & CONSECRATION OF THE VENERABLE MOIRA ASTIN AS BISHOP OF CREDITON

Michelle Reed writes:- I had been to a said Eucharist at St Paul's Cathedral once before, in 2023 at the beginning of my progress around London's churches; I thought I would begin at the top, the big one so to speak. But when I heard that the Ordination & Consecration of our dear friend, Moira Astin from Reigate to be Bishop of Crediton in Devon with a full Sung Eucharist, I simply had to be there.

On arrival at the Cathedral, I was shown by one of the superb stewards to the seats which were in a semi-circle beneath the Dome. I was asked for my ticket but I explained that I didn't have one; I'd paid on the door! I was shown to the back rows of the semi-circle and I sat on the end with a great view of the proceedings.

Suddenly, the Choir emerged, along with the Interim Chaplain, Archdeacons and Chapters of Southwark and Exeter Cathedral, the Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury and the College of Canons processed to their places under the dome. Then, from the West End of the Cathedral the main procession began to move up the Nave while we sang the processional hymn "How shall I sing that Majesty, which Angels to admire?"

The main procession was-

A Verger, the Crucifix and Acolytes; The Ostiarus [Editor's note: the Cathedral Door-Keeper]; The Proculator of the lower house of the Convocation of Canterbury; Moira, the Bishop Designate along with those presenting her; Visiting Bishops, including Rosemarie, Bishop of Croydon, the bishops of the Northern and Southern English Provinces; various retired bishops, the Dean's Verger; the Chapter of St Paul's and a Verger: the Bishops of Salisbury and Winchester wearing their white mitres, the deacons and, then, Dame Sarah, Bishop of London, resplendent

in her Gold Mitre and golden Crook followed by her Chaplain. They made their way to their seats under the dome. By now I had definitely sensed the grandeur of the occasion but also a sense of peace and the presence of God.

And so, the service began. With the Greeting "Blessed be God, Father Son and Holy Spirit — Blessed be his Kingdom, now and forever". Bishop Sarah asked us to affirm our faith in God, as we said the Creed. Then followed the section of the service called the Liturgy of Ordination. We joined in with responses at various moments so playing our part in the Ordination of Moira as Bishop. She was then presented with a Bible by Bishop Sarah who also anointed Moira as Bishop.

Then the rest of the Eucharist was conducted by Bishop Sarah. So lovely to be there for that.

And then it was time to go, A Deacon sang "Go in the Peace of Christ", the choir sang and we responded "Thanks be to God".

The clergy then processed out back down the Nave and out of the West Door and, I imagine, for photographs. Once they had departed, the congregation left through a side door as directed by the stewards. I was hoping to take a few photos and, if possible, have a word with Bishop Moira.



By the time I got out and round to the front of the Cathedral most of the senior Clergy had gone back inside but Bishop Moira was still there chatting to a small group of Clergy. Eventually at what seemed an appropriate moment, I and a chap I had got into conversation with slowly mounted the steps and approached Bishop Moira. She recognised

me and we greeted each other. I said greeting and God's blessings from St Barnabas in Sutton. I'd seen a couple of others do it and so I asked if I could take a selfie. "Of course," she said.

When that was over, I went down the steps and spotted Graham and Jennie Reed who were looking for





a cafe for some refreshments. We found somewhere suitable



round the back of the Cathedral and had a cup of tea and a sandwich. They mentioned that they had seen Cathy Brown and the Revd Charles Cotton too who has been taking some services at St Barnabas during our current interregnum.

I had had an absolutely wonderful and spiritual morning, in that truly inspiring building and among the many leading figures of the Church of England, especially Dame Sarah, Bishop of London, one time Team Rector of Sutton Team Ministry of which St Barnabas was once part and our dear friend Moira from Reigate, the new Bishop of Crediton.

CAMP KENYA



Patricia Butler's son, Arthur (on the right) and his friend William Brown went to Kenya in July this year as part of Camps International, a social enterprise which runs educational and impactful four week expeditions for school groups. Each expedition has four elements: community, environmental, wildlife conservation

projects and adventure. Some of the congregation gave them jobs to do to help raise £4,700 each to pay for the trip. Here is Arthur's report.

On the trip to Kenya, I helped with community and nature projects. At Camp Muhaka, we helped Mama Eddie, a local woman without a house, by building part of her house using mud building





methods. Then, at Dive Camp Firefly, I learned to scuba dive and did four dives in the Indian Ocean, going as deep as 18 meters. We saw lion fish, clown fish, scorpion fish and much more.



Our group then went to Diani Beach Camp, where we cleaned up the beach, picking up rubbish. We also made art by repurposing old flip-flops into animal figures. We learned about different kinds of turtles and how pollution, like light, noise, and plastic, endangers them.

At Camp Tsavo, we met with the Tamaini women's group, learning their traditional dances and how they make money with crafts like jewellery. They also showed us how to make paper from elephant dung. We also built fences to keep elephants away,

protecting both villages and elephants. We also helped fix up a classroom at a local school, giving teachers a place to work. This included painting and making bricks for further construction, which future groups will continue. We also met the students there and played football and volleyball with them and helped teach English and Maths.





We went on a safari where we saw many animals, including elephants, giraffes, zebras, and many different types of antelope and birds. We were also lucky enough to see lions, a cheetah, and a hippopotamus.

Lastly, at our final camp, we helped build a shelter for local farmers to protect their goats from lions at night. We also finished fences to protect young trees, helping the forest grow back to support the reintroduction of black rhinos, which eat from low tree branches.



I am incredibly thankful for the opportunity to have gone on such a trip and meet all the wonderful people, whilst learning about their way of life. I am also very thankful for all the people that supported

me to go on this amazing trip.

AN UPDATE ON THE ST BARNABAS MAJOR REPAIR WORKS



Work on the major repairs to the church, including the South Valley roof, got underway

on 28th May when scaffolding to gain access to the roof was installed. Under the programme of the works, only external work was planned to



take place during the first few weeks but very little of that was able to be observed from ground level as it concentrated on the roof. Inside the church however, the work being undertaken left its mark with large amounts of dust continually settling on the pews and tables inside. Every Saturday, members of the congregation gathered to clean up ready for Sunday's service but such was the amount



of work involved that the decision was taken early on to cordon off the back half of the pews in the Nave so as to concentrate on making those in the front half as dust free as possible. A benefit of this was that it meant that everyone was able to worship together in a smaller group instead of being spread all over the whole church. The organ had already been fully covered in dust sheets but it was decided also to cover the Memorial Chapel sanctuary in dust sheets as well. The torrential rain over the weekend of 19/20 July managed to make its mark as well.







Robert Caple has been keeping an eye on the progress of the works for the St Barnabas PCC and has been meeting regularly with the architect and the works' foreman.

On the finance side, once works began, I was able to start requesting those bodies who had awarded grants to pay over the funds they had awarded so that the early invoices of the contractor and the architect would be able to be paid as and when presented.

In early June, I received the good news that another grant awarding body, the Congregational & General Trust, had awarded the PCC a grant of £15,000. This was especially excellent news as this body mainly supports United Reformed Churches but other churches, including Anglican ones, are eligible to apply for grants so I made an application last year.

As soon as invoices are now paid, I am submitting requests to the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) which controls the budget for refunds of VAT under the Listed Places of Worship Scheme. Following the drastic reduction of its 2025/26 budget by the UK Government earlier this year, I am endeavouring to ensure that, before the DCMS' budget runs out, as much of the VAT that the PCC pays can be reclaimed (now up to a maximum of only £25,000; the PCC is due to pay VAT of £45,000 on the whole project).

In the meantime, fundraising continues to ensure that the target figure of £286,570 is reached (total funds raised or available for the whole project so far are 82% of that figure) without the need of the PCC having to resort to borrowing money from other sources which would, of course, have to be repaid in the future. Individual donations can also still be made; there is a collecting box on the long table at the back of the church.


BIBLE SOCIETY IN UKRAINE

If you would like to join the Bible a Month Club at St Barnabas, just talk to our Church Warden, Sally Bramdaw who runs the scheme.


