

#### Stoke Church PCC- notes from meeting held on 14.7.25

In the interest of being open and keeping our community informed of what's going on at church here is an abridged version of the draft minutes from the last PCC meeting. Any questions arising from these notes, please get in touch with the Churchwardens.

**Vacancy Update-** We are delighted that our newly appointed vicar- Rev'd Keith Johnson and his wife Rachel, will be moving to Nunney at the beginning of October, the start of his ministry with us will begin with his service of welcome to be held on 16<sup>th</sup> October. More details about this nearer the time.

**Church fabric**- we have decided to prioritise the repairs to the vestry roof (which is leaking badly) and the south-west "Villagers" window (which is in danger of blowing out, like the 'Dove' window did). Substantial funds are required to cover the costs, and research around grants will be done; plus a fund-raising initiative locally.

**Church finances**- the squeeze is on our finances, as with us all individually. We have major repairs required in the church. We will launch a "Friends" organisation in the local community to help support the church with practical tasks and financially.

We were delighted that the *To Love and Cherish* Wedding exhibition raised a wonderful £900. And the Stoke Fest (teas and coffees) £375. Thank you to all involved and to those who supported these events.

Help at church- There are always lots of tasks needing doing to keep a church community going, and we are thin on the ground and need to recruit others from the community who would like to support our village church. We hope the new "Friends" group will help with this. We need help with many tasks, including seeking grants for building works, basic simple maintenance; new people on the PCC; and now that Justine is leaving the village we need a new Churchwarden and Safeguarding officer. Anyone interested in helping, even in small ways, should talk to Jane in the first instance.

#### Letter from Bishop Christopher Foster

Do you use Wikipedia? It's often a very convenient place to look for information when we want to know more about something or about a person. But, perhaps, like me you've discovered its limitations. As you might anticipate from a free online encyclopaedia to which anyone can contribute and is open to anyone to edit it is both impressively collaborative and also sometimes incomplete or less than fully accurate. Nevertheless, it remains for me – and perhaps you? – a go-to source of quick information.

So, I wasn't surprised when I consulted Wikipedia's 'August anniversaries' to find it is less than comprehensive about the Christian calendar this month. St Bartholomew's Day is recorded on 24 August—alongside Ukraine Independence Day which surely also deserves marking. Bartholemew (usually identified as Nathanael, one of the twelve disciples of Jesus) isn't generally well celebrated on his festival day, except in places where he's the patron saint of the parish and church, such as Crewkerne where the annual charter fair remembers their link with St Bart. Even so their fair has been moved into September after the end of the holiday season.

August frequently means reduced activity, and fewer events. If that's an opportunity for catching our breath and taking a break from the challenges of deadlines and expectations, then all well and good. But let's not forget, despite them being omitted from the Wikipedia list, the other red-letter August days in the calendar. On 15 August we honour the Blessed Virgin Mary, mother of our Lord Jesus, and on the 6 August, we mark the glorious Transfiguration of our Lord. That festival day recalls how Peter, James and John experienced on a mountain top the transformation of Jesus' physical appearance, enabling them to glimpse the glory of his divinity.

At our July monthly meeting, we had the pleasure of welcoming the talented Sabrina and Sharon from Bespoke Home UK. They treated us to a truly inspiring and hands-on demonstration focused on the art of upcycling and revamping old furniture—a perfect way to spark creativity while giving tired pieces a fresh new look.

During the session, Sabrina and Sharon walked us through two beautiful techniques. First, they demonstrated how to decoupage a drawer using a simple paper napkin. It was fascinating to see how a basic item could transform a plain surface into something charming and unique. Next, they showed us the stencilling process on another drawer, adding elegant and intricate patterns with ease.

Both methods were explained clearly and executed in a way that felt very approachable, even for beginners. The overall process was straightforward, and the materials required were minimal, making it a wonderfully accessible craft. Many of us left the meeting feeling inspired and confident that we could try these techniques ourselves at home. It was a delightful and educational experience that sparked lots of conversation and creativity among our members.

We all then enjoyed a cuppa and cake/biscuits and a lovely chat with other members of the meeting.

#### Sunday Stokers


"...we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us." (Romans 5: 3-5)

In June, the Stokers explored the theme of **hope**. We looked at some powerful photographs and talked about the symbols of hope that we see in the world around us: the rainbow, first shown to Noah after the flood and displayed in so many windows to encourage people during COVID times; the dove, iconic in our church's recently mended stained glass window; and, of course, the cross. We talked about the need for hope in these troubled times of war and climate change.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu said, 'Hope is being able to see that there is light despite all the darkness.' We felt that this statement linked all of the images of hope together, and with this in mind, the children decorated sun catchers in the shape of the cross. Hung in windows, these catch the light and remind us of the hope we have in Christ.

July brought the final Stokers session before the summer break and we took the opportunity to review the year and what Stokers means to the children. They identified our Stokers values as kindness, understanding, trust and respect, and made a banner to represent this. A good year!

Stokers will restart in September with an exciting project: watch this space for further details. All 3-12 year olds will be welcome to join us!

A new community of contemplation at St Mary's House, Frome

At St Mary's House in Frome, something tender and hopeful is beginning to take root. Mary's House Community (MHC), a new Christian community based in the former rectory of St Mary's Church, is preparing to welcome its first residents. MHC is envisioned as a place for people who long to live more simply, more prayerfully, and more honestly, in community with others and in gentle connection with the world around them.

Rooted in a shared rhythm of contemplation, dialogue, and creation, Mary's House Community is a place for the spiritually curious, and those wishing to live in deeper connection with others. Daily prayer, shared meals, and local engagement will be held together in a rhythm that nourishes both inner transformation and outward love.

Revd Liz Dudley, Vicar of St Mary's, described the vision for it, "We're not aiming to build a project or a programme. We're trying to create the conditions for community, for friendship, reflection, and prayer to flourish in everyday life. It's less about doing and more about becoming."

Up to five people will live together in the house, with room for a couple or two people open to sharing. During that time, they will pay rent and contribute to living expenses. But the residents will not simply move in as tenants, they will help shape the beginnings of this new community, one that is anchored in faith, but open to mystery and to the wisdom of each person's journey.

Martha Oster, a trustee of Mary's House, describes it this way: "This is a place for questions, not answers. We'll be learning from one another — bringing our whole selves, our real lives, into a shared space of spiritual reflection and mutual care. It's about staying in the conversation."

Mary's House is not a cloister, it's an invitation to live a life that weaves prayer and presence into the world, not apart from it. The hope is that the residents will also engage with the wider Frome community through events, partnerships, conversations, and quiet acts of hospitality., Alongside its residential life, Mary's House Community plan to host a series of retreat days; open to all. These gatherings, including a time of learning together, working in the gardens, shared meals, and a period of silence, will reflect the community's values in action.

"We want to create spaces for reflection and connection," says Martha. "The retreat days are a way for people to experience the spirit of the house — a pattern of learning, of working with our hands, eating together, and being still. A window into a simpler kind of life."

The community also has a heart for creation care. It's hoped that residents will help tend the Giant's Garden, an outdoor space being nurtured as a place to grow food, and offer support to local young adults. A small prayer hut in the rectory grounds which was once a derelict shed, has been lovingly restored into a 24-hour prayer space, open to anyone seeking quiet or connection.

Martha reflects that "At its core, Mary's House is an act of faith: that it is still possible to live lives shaped by the Jesus' wisdom. Spiritual community is a calling both ancient and new; we are called not just to personal wholeness, but to building communities of solidarity and resistance — resisting the isolation, injustice, and speed of the world through a counter-cultural rhythm of shared life, presence, and prayer."

Pioneer and trustee Andrew Alden, says, "We hope Mary's House becomes a place where people are reminded of what really matters. Not big success or perfect answers, but a life that flows from love, rooted in God, and shared with others."

#### **East Mendip Gardening Club**

The last official month of summer is the perfect time to enjoy your garden while it's still at its best. Children are on school holiday, lawns are in full use, and there's plenty of delicious fruit and veg to fill your dinner plate! Perhaps not this year lawns may be in full use but certainly not green and fruit and veg may not be as prolific as in other years. Gardeners and farmers may well be hoping for the pattern of past years for rain as soon as the schools break up to be the norm.

If the rain does come then there will be lots to do particularly weeding as they seem to be the last and first to grow and they compete with your crops for nutrients and water.

climbing hydrangeas, once the blooms are finished and cut back faded perennials to keep borders tidv.

Collect ripened seeds and store them for next year. Leaving some seed heads in place underside of leaves. can be attractive and allows the plant to selfseed in the surrounding soil.

Take cuttings of your favourite tender perennials such as pelargoniums and fuchsia
Winter-flowering pansies can be sown now

Apply a high-potash fertiliser such as tomato food once fruits start to form on peppers, cucumber and aubergine plants.

Cut back herbs to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves that you can harvest before the first frosts. Dry or freeze excess herbs to use seedbeds now — they're a great crop to in the kitchen later on.

Pinch out the tips of your runner bean plants once they reach the top of their support. This a manageable height for picking.

On a sunny day, collect seeds of herbs such as dill, bronze fennel, caraway and chervil and dry in a warm spot out of direct sunlight. Finish planting out kale plants for winter and Chervil must be sown immediately.

If you have plants fruiting in containers, make Plant newly pot grown strawberry plants (or sure you give them a high potash liquid feed to keep them healthy and productive.

Cut back the fruited canes of your summer raspberries, leaving the new green canes for next year's crop. Tie in next year's raspberry canes to support wires or fencing.

Don't worry if your lawn is looking brown, the autumn rains will soon make it green again.

Recycle your water inside the house -

Prune all summer flowering shrubs, such as collect washing up water in a bucket outside for watering beds and lawns.




