Thought for the Month

Following on from last month, we continue to reflect on the theme of Harvest Festival. The deeply rooted traditions of Harvest Festivals in this country extend beyond a simple celebration of a successful crop yield. It is a time for each community to reflect with gratitude, on community life, and the interconnectedness between people and the land.

The essence of Harvest Festival is thanksgiving for the abundance of the harvest and the food provided by land and sea. Historically, a good harvest was crucial for survival through the winter, so the celebration was a sincere expression of appreciation. Even today, though many are less reliant on homegrown produce, the festival prompts us to reflect on the effort required to produce the foods we need and enjoy and the importance of not taking it for granted.

Harvest Festivals provide a wonderful opportunity for celebrating community life. Up and down the country, celebrations in churches, schools, and village halls, foster a spirit of togetherness and generosity.

A key tradition involves bringing gifts of food – often fresh produce, tinned goods, and even handmade crafts – to churches or schools. These donations are then shared with those in need in the local community through food banks.

Traditionally, Harvest Suppers and Barn Dances were hosted by farmers to thank their workers, to bring people together in a shared celebration of the season's bounty. Although less widespread the ancient traditions of making corn dollies and the ceremonial cutting of the last sheaf of grain, still offer a glimpse into the festival's deep historical roots the and connection to the land.

For many, Harvest Festival offers an opportunity to reconnect with the rhythms of nature and the agricultural cycle. It is a time to acknowledge and appreciate the hard work of farmers and agricultural workers who cultivate the crops that sustain us.

Maintaining the traditions of Harvest Festival allows us to appreciate the gifts of the harvest, celebrate the life of our community, and foster a sense of gratitude for the natural world and the efforts of those who work on the land and sea. Very importantly, today, it helps us to remember the importance of sharing and generosity in a world where so many people are deprived many of the things that we take for granted, through war and the effects of climate change.



Eco Tips

The True Value of Wood

Wood is an important resource but it comes at a huge cost to the environment. The UK is the second largest timber importer worldwide and the largest user of wood pellets, mainly for generating electricity. Furniture companies are the world's largest wood consumers.

The world's precious tropical forests are particularly threatened by illegal logging. This destroys habitats that are vital for biodiversity and carbon storage. Illegal logging ignores the rights of communities who own and depend on the forests and threatens the lives of people who live there.

To reduce this huge destruction of Forests and woodlands, we should repair damaged furniture, when possible, or buy second hand furniture. On the Isle of Wight, we are fortunate to have so many charity shops where we can buy excellent items to re-use, saving trees and helping a charity at the same time. When we do need to buy new wood take care to ensure it is only from reputable sources.

We need to know where the wood we use comes from. In the UK, certifications such as the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) and Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification (PEFC) are widely recognised. These certifications help to ensure that the timber has been harvested responsibly, with minimal environmental impact, and supports sustainable forest management.

- Trees provide important habitats for many form of wildlife from our red squirrels to hundreds of species of insects.
- Doubling the amount of UK tree cover could remove 10% of our greenhouse gas emissions from the atmosphere every year, because trees store carbon. Trees release the oxygen we need to breathe.
- Trees in towns and cities help to cool temperatures overnight, where these temperatures are higher than in rural areas.
- Trees absorb dangerous pollutants from the air. Ancient woodlands and other long-established woods store more carbon per hectare than more recently planted woodlands. They make up 25% of UK woodlands - but hold 36% of all woodland carbon. Protecting old, established trees is essential.
- Trees reduce flooding by slowing down the flow of rainwater, reducing the damage of erosion. Trees protect the climate.
- Trees help to provide a range of jobs including fruit harvesting, landscaping, green waste management and tree surgery. In Scotland, forestry is more economically important than the fisheries because it is a £1 billion sector, which employs 25,000 people.

Title: The Rhythm of Life


Celtic Daily Prayer

The whole liturgical year is a mystery, joyful, sorrowful and glorious, that is at work in us and through us. We need to become more aware of these rhythms in our life."

When we pray, we are not praying alone. As David Adam explains, "We are not just reading or acting out the great events of God, we are partaking in them. Our celebrations tune us in to the eternal events, allow us to respond to them and to carry that response into our daily living. Thus, the rhythm of prayer resonates throughout the day."




