## Letter from The Rectory ...

#### Release Hidden Potential - in others

This week I received a link to a blog by Matthew Porter, now Bishop of Bolton in the Diocese of Manchester. It summarises a book he recently read, *Hidden Potential* by Adam Grant, as follows:

At the heart of the book is the idea that there's latent potential in everyone. Yes, there's potential in ourselves, but also in *others*. Our job is to help release it and impact the world for good.



Isn't that a lovely thought! There are so many self-help books out there, but I love the focus on releasing the potential of others. It reminds me of 'chopsticks', aka parable of the long spoons, a story heard repeatedly from my headmistress by anyone who attended her daily assemblies (at Chelmsford County High School):

One day a man said to God, "God, I would like to know what Heaven and Hell are like." In response, God showed the man two rooms.

Behind the first door was a huge banquet sat on a large table in the middle of a large room. It smelled delicious and made the man's mouth water, but the people sitting around the table were thin and sickly. They appeared to be famished. They were holding very long chopsticks so whilst they could use them to pick up morsels of food, could not get the food back into their mouths. The man shuddered at the sight of their misery and suffering. God said, "You have seen Hell."

Behind the second door, was an apparently identical large room. It too had a large table loaded with food that made the man's mouth water. The people in this room were well nourished and plump, laughing and talking. "Let me guess." said the man. "Normallength chopsticks!" "No." said God, "The chopsticks are exactly the same length in both

rooms, but these people have learned the difference that love makes. They have learned to share and feed one another, whilst the unloving only think of themselves..."

This idea of investing in others is one of four things that Matthew Porter lists as having particularly struck him from his reading of Adam Grant's book. They resonate with me as well, so I thought I'd share the other three with you plus my own reflections on each one:

## **Prioritise your Reading**

Reading is one of my favourite occupations so being told to prioritise it is wonderful news, at least for me! However, since this is all in the context of helping others realise their hidden potential, I did a bit of online searching and learned that the benefits of reading include:

strengthening your brain, increasing your ability to empathize, reducing stress, and building your vocabulary. Reading books benefits both your physical and mental health, and those benefits can last a lifetime.

A list of tips to ensure you read more included setting realistic targets as even 5 minutes is beneficial. Five minutes! That would be torture for me as I'd find it impossible to stop. I'd have no problem reading for 5 hours given half a chance! However, I'm well aware that would be considered too much of a good thing since other studies have shown that sitting stationary for too long is very bad for your health.

My online searching also revealed that reading is key to growth, so helping a child to enjoy reading is one the best gifts we can give them. Whether adult or child, reading is clearly going to help us become the people God created us to be, realising our full potential. It should go without saying that Bible should definitely be on your daily reading list – even if it is only for five minutes.

#### Value the Joy

This piece of advice clearly links directly to our 2025 memory verse: rejoice always. I have a friend who is a natural joy-bearer. Even going through a lengthy and hugely stressful period coping (not always well) with her husband's creeping physical disability and dementia and eventual death didn't stop a room lighting up whenever she walked into it. We are not all like that of course, and the Bible does tell us to mourn with those who mourn, as well as laugh with those who laugh. But we forget at our peril that it is the joy of the Lord that is our strength. We need to do all we can to enable everyone to discover what brings joy and introduce it into our ordinary everyday lives, not just save it for high days and holidays.

#### **Grow in Character**

Isn't it interesting that we grow in character yet engage in character-building activities? The former suggests an organic, naturally-occurring process whilst the latter a much more active, dynamic, intentional approach. No doubt, as with so many things, both are necessary. It's certainly true that someone's character is crucial to the way they fit into and get on in the world. You may have brilliant engineering or athletic abilities, but if you are unreliable, if you lie and cheat, if you're selfish and rude, no-one is really going to want you around. And of course you will be limited in your ability to bring out the hidden potential in others, unless perhaps that potential is patience!

Of course, we Christians have a massive advantage here for we have free access to the Holy Spirit who is the best ever character-builder on or off the planet. We normally use the organic metaphor of growing for his work in developing His fruit within us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, faithfulness, humility and self-control.

Back in early March, the One Big Family team invited those present to choose the three fruits they needed more of in their lives and then to hang them on the vine that represents Jesus. They did so as an invitation to God to step up his gardening work and to provide just the right conditions for those particular fruit to grow. The vine is still there, with the plate of extra fruit, so if you haven't yet chosen yours, or you'd like to renew that prayer, please visit St. Martin's one day next week and do so. (Or ask a close friend to do so on your behalf if you are house-bound or live too far away.) And if you have already selected some fruit, then take a moment or few this month to reflect on how God has begun to answer your prayer...

God bless and may your summer reading fill you with joy and build your character as well as help you release the hidden potential in all you meet, even if only with a smile!

Please come and relax with our craft project, tea and a chat. Jill will provide a short bible reflection for you to ponder on and Rita will provide refreshments.

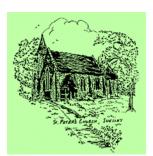
Please save your loo roll cardboard middles so that we can use them to make Christmas crackers for the Advent Fair.

We held a fruitful working party on 19<sup>th</sup> July - we managed to achieve a lot despite the inclement weather!

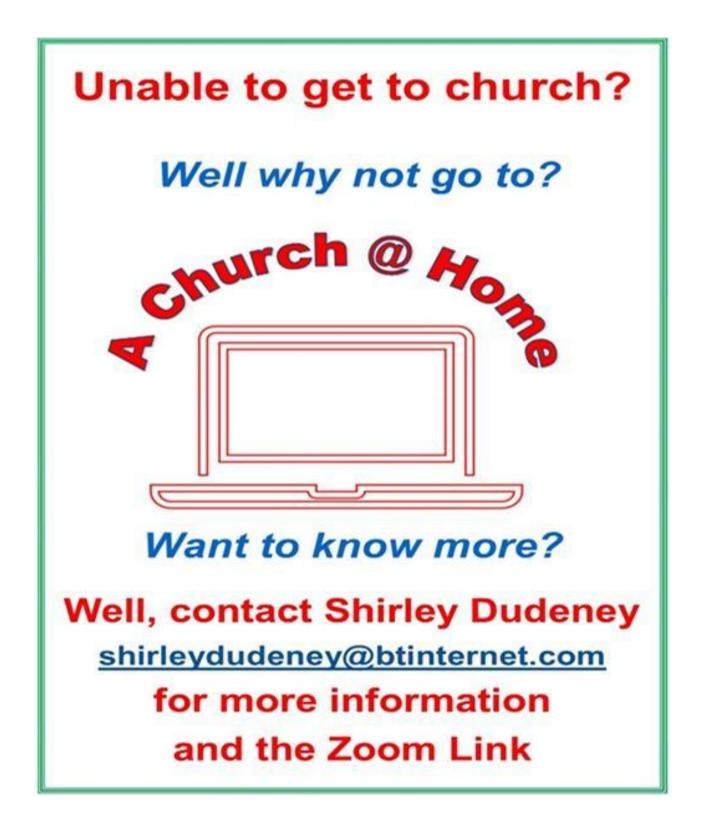
