Dear Friends,

Just a few days ago Diana and I sat out on Studland beach with some friends. We'd brought the table out of our old beach hut and as the evening light faded sat and ate some fish and chips. It had been a busy day for all of us and a hot summer's day too, but now all was hushed a and a gentle breeze cooled us down. In the distance we could see the lights of Poole and Bournemouth and in the bay the riding lights of the various yachts and dinghies twinkled softly. We were glad of each other's company and the conversation and laughter flowed. It was a lovely end to the day.

Such moments always remind me of the great creation narratives in the book of Genesis. These verses are a profound and beautiful meditation on the nature of God as an ordered creator, delighting in all that he has made. The creation of humankind points to His special and profound relationship with us as human beings. The story is filled with such joy and colour, but then something goes wrong. Humans make a poor choice, and what follows are some of the saddest verses in the Bible:

"Then the man and his wife heard the sound of the Lord God as he was walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and they hid from the Lord God among the trees of the garden..."

In the cool of the day, when work was over and all was at rest, God walked into the garden to be with his creation, man and wife, to enjoy their company and talk with them, but they were ashamed and hid from him.

The hot days of summer and the busyness of our lives can sometimes squeeze out our desire to just chat with God and yet the story that emerges from the Bible is of a God who goes out of His way to find and talk with and enjoy our company. Maybe we feel we're too far from God or not good enough for him to come and talk with us. But that's really not the point. Perhaps we all need to find gentle "evening moments," when all is hushed and quiet, when we can just be ourselves in this beautiful world enjoying its peace and then just wait, wait for God to come. He will come if we ask, He loves to be with us and talk with us. There's no need for us to feel ashamed or abashed or to feel too inadequate. God takes us as we are and through the eyes of His Son sees us wonderful, as companions, as someone to sit down with in the cool of the day and have a good chat.

May we all be blessed with rich conversations with our wonderful creator and friend.

Church Alive Writes...

What a great summer! We have already celebrated:

- Natalie's ordination as a Priest
- All Saints' Family Fun Day
- Pimm's and Hymns at St Mark's
- The Year 6 Leavers' event for Purbeck schools
- The Churches Together Carnival Praise, the outreach tent on the Carnival field, and 2nd place in the walking section of the Carnival procession
- Tony Edmonds' commissioning as Associate Priest in Studland

As I write, we are still looking forward to the Lifeboat Service, the Studland Pet Service and the Folk Festival service. Yes, the Church is alive and well and working in a community near you.

Despite these good news stories, we need to recognise that **we are no longer in a world where people come looking for us** – even weddings and funerals are, increasingly, non-religious occasions. While our buildings are often important for heritage, fewer people want to worship in them.

It's easy for churches to become ground down and preoccupied with internal church things, finances, roof leaks, coffee rotas, music rehearsals, and so on..... These are all important, but they are not the reason we are here. We are here to fulfil Jesus' command: "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

So, what do we do to fulfil this command to mission? I don't have all the answers, but I have some suggestions:

Pray: Before Jesus sent his disciples out, he said: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me". (Matthew 28:18). We need the guidance and power of Jesus before we do anything else. Why not join in one of the National Week of Prayer events?

Look outward: The command was "Go", not "Wait for people to come". Our present situation emphasises the fact that we are called to mission. (A bit like the Church in Acts, and look how well they did!)

Trust the Gospel message: The Good News of Jesus has the power to change lives. We need to offer people Jesus, not church. We don't need a hard sell, just a good introduction.

Tell your story: People love stories, hence the success of The Archers and East Enders! Your story, of how Jesus works in your life, is much more interesting than a sermon.

Expect things to change: The church is either renewed, (and renewal means change), or it dies. The message never changes – Jesus is always the crucified, risen and ascended Lord; "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever", (Hebrews 13:8), and God's Word never changes, but our liturgies, our

hymnbooks and our church meetings have changed over the centuries, and will continue to change.

This is not a complete plan for mission, just some basic thoughts. What are your thoughts about mission, how best to share the Good News? The most important thing in any conversation about mission is not answers, but the fact that we are willing to ask some questions. Do share your questions, (and maybe answers), with any of the Clergy Team; I look forward to being swamped by your emails!

Updates from the National Trust:

Purple haze: Now's the time to get out onto the

Purbeck Heaths as the heather turns into stunning palette of purple and pink. These delicate flowers are humming with the activity pollinating insects, while rare heathland birds flit among the shrubs. The heather seems to have started flowering early



this year, but hopefully there will still be lovely displays throughout September. (Photo: Mark Bauer Photography)

Heathland horror: We can't talk about the heathland without mentioning the two huge wildfires of August. One destroyed 25 hectares at Newton Heath, near Studland, the other 70 hectares of heathland at Holt Heath, near Wimborne.

Heathland is home to many rare birds including nightjars, woodlarks and Dartford warblers, as well as reptiles like sand lizards, slow worms, smooth snakes and adders. While most birds are able to fly away and escape the flames, reptiles aren't so lucky.



One of our Studland-based rangers, Emma Finlinson, joined a rescue effort at Holt Heath organised by the Amphibian and Reptile Conservation Trust. They rescued almost 30 reptiles from the burnt earth and released them into nearby unaffected heathland.

We can't thank the fire services enough for their tireless work. But worryingly, they have said that both fires were deliberate. Please be vigilant if you are on the

heaths. If you see any suspicious behaviour, report it to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or in an emergency, call 999.

Beaver update - 'tails' of the unexpected! Five months ago, we released wild



beavers into Little Sea, Studland. A lot has happened since then, including three kits being born, a female beaver taking a short break in Swanage, and sadly, the death of one of the male beavers. Their activities have been monitored by our wonderful team of volunteers, who have spent countless hours wading through trail cam footage (or actual swamps!) to record their whereabouts.

Although it's upsetting to have lost one of the beavers, it does highlight that they are wild animals that aren't in enclosures, and there are always risks with reintroductions. The loss doesn't affect the long-term aims of the project to introduce more animals and establish a healthy, viable population of beavers in Purbeck. Work to remove the failing sea defences begins on 8 September and will continue until the end of October. It will involve some heavy machinery on the beach, so we apologise for the inevitable disruption. Beach access will remain closed until the cliffs have stabilised, but the car park, café and toilets will remain open. The end goal is a beautiful, natural cove and wildlife haven.

Lewis-Manning joins Wellbeing Swanage to offer palliative care advice to the community

Dorset's independent charity, Lewis-Manning Hospice Care, has partnered with the Swanage & Purbeck Development Trust to provide palliative care advice at The Focus Centre.

The Welcome Lounge at the Focus Centre in Swanage opened in April 2025 and offers the local community access to confidential drop-in support, and signposting for health and wellbeing services. Lewis-Manning has joined the initiative to provide monthly complimentary advice on palliative care and receive referrals to its related services.

Ellie Suthers, Senior Nurse at Lewis-Manning, said: "Our slot at The Focus Centre each month provides a place where people can come, without the need to wait for an appointment, and ask questions about their diagnosis and our services.

Being diagnosed with a life-limiting illness can be incredibly daunting and scary. When someone is told that they are dying, they often don't know what comes next, or what they can expect life to look like. We're here to help people live well through their illness by empowering them with understanding, information, and the tools to remain independent in their life choices."

Lewis-Manning operates several free-to-the-patient services including occupational therapy, counselling, and complementary therapy. The charity's services enable those with life-limiting illnesses to have the best quality of life throughout their palliative care journey. It also operates a range of services support to families and those facing a bereavement.

In Purbeck, the charity offers anticipatory Hospice at Home care, enabling people to access its services at home, as well as its Day Hospice from Swanage Cricket Club every Friday.

Lewis-Manning's expert nurses operate the drop-in clinic at The Focus Centre in Swanage from 10am to 2pm on the first Tuesday of every month. No appointment or referral is required.

DANCING WITH THE DEVIL

The Devil, a princess and a wayward soldier will take centre stage in a remarkable production combining theatre and music.

Two performances of The Soldier's Tale, in which a "mischievous" narrator, actors and a dancer tell a story based around one of Igor Stravinsky's short musical masterpieces, will take place in Purbeck in September.

And audiences at the cabaret-style presentations have been

told to expect the unexpected in "fun and playful ways."

The productions are the brainchild of renowned international violinist Miranda Fulleylove, who will lead a seven-strong ensemble featuring some of Britain's most accomplished musicians.

Miranda divides her time between Purbeck and London, where she is guest principal with several orchestras including the London Sinfonietta and the BBC Symphony Orchestra. She loves Purbeck's countryside and will donate all profits from the performances to local community group Planet Purbeck, which she describes as a, "wonderful organisation working hard for the environment."



She said: "I chose The Soldier's Tale as it is highly relevant to what Planet Purbeck is doing. The story revolves around an exhausted soldier who is tempted by the Devil as he sits down to rest by a rural stream. Now, Planet Purbeck is doing projects with schoolchildren and adults to raise awareness about how we can clean up streams in the area and get them running freely again, so it's a perfect match. The piece has a moral message about falling prey to greed but is also great fun — very energetic and lively. I think people will love it from both theatrical and musical points of view. They can expect a surprising Devil, a wicked narrator and a beautiful dancer."

The performances will be staged at Langton Matravers village hall, which will be converted into a relaxed cabaret setting with tables and a bar, on September 26th. Elgiva Field, an immersive theatre specialist known for her work with London's Punchdrunk company, will direct the action. And Peter Ash, artistic director of the Odyssey Festival Orchestra, will conduct the ensemble. The day will also include an opportunity for schoolchildren to watch a dress rehearsal. Miranda, who has run the popular Chamber Music In Purbeck Houses series since 2013, said: "I'm thrilled with our wonderful team of performers and can't

Update from Studland Parish Council August 2025

Studland Parish Council met on August 18th. All councillors, other than Lyn Hool (who had sent her apologies) and Peter Hammond, were present. Also

present were Emma Wright from the National Trust, and Cllr Ben Wilson, of Dorset Council.

Minutes of the SPC meeting of 21st July were confirmed.

Emma had submitted a report. This included:

- *Some tree works near Marine Terrace have been applied for.
- *The old sea mine that was positioned outside the old Middle Beach café has now been moved to outside the toilet block on Middle Beach.
- *Emma provided an update on the beavers in Little Sea. The colony there is thriving, with three kits born. The beavers have on occasion been seen crossing Ferry Road: signage will be put up to warn drivers to be aware especially at dusk or nighttime.

*The NT is helping with a series of events – such as with parking for an Open Gardens at Morval on September 7th.

*The beaches have all been exceptionally busy this summer. Despite the signs, some barbecues have been started: if they are spotted, NT staff put them out.

*Works on the gabions at Middle beach will start on September 1st.

Cllr Ben Wilson outlined the processes for the Dorset Local Plans and the Dorset Local Transport Plans. Consultation on these will be starting shortly: all residents are invited to attend a consultation meeting at Emmanuel Baptist Church on Tuesday 30th September from 2pm to 6pm. Ben also encouraged councillors to complete the questionnaire prepared on "Fresh Start", on possible areas for devolution: this asks whether Town and Parish Councils should take on more duties currently performed by Dorset Council. A team of councillors volunteered to go through the Dorset Council "Fresh Start" devolution questionnaire, to understand the issues raised, and to propose a SPC response.

Two planning applications had been received: for tree works to be conducted by the NT (these are largely to remove dead branches), and restorations/renovations to The Villa on Brownsea Island, owned by the Dorset Wildlife Trust. SPC had no objections to either of these.

Notice has been received that the top 110 meters of Heath Green Road will be shut to traffic on October 7th between 09.30 and 16.00 for works to be conducted by Openreach.

No crime had been reported.

The Chairman commented that the results of the Ferry Toll application have not yet been announced: it is now 8 months since the Enquiry. The Inspector's report has apparently been with the Department for Transport since early June, awaiting a decision.

The Chairman also commented that the £500 donated by SPC to the Church for the VJ80 celebrations had been well used. An excellent exhibition had been mounted in the Church Hall. This was well attended. The exhibition boards bought for the displays are available for use by other organisations in Studland.

Thanks, have also been received from the Village Hall committee for the SPC donation towards replacing the doors.

Council Officers gave various updates:

*Chrissy Neville, our Environment and Tree Officer, is organizing a meeting of our Tree Officers to discuss the information on veteran trees in Studland, and how best to use this

*David Battle, Marine and Coastal, said that the Swanage and Studland Water Safety body is looking at redrafting bye-laws to make the whole no-anchor zone a 5mph area.

*Stephen Yeoman, Planning and Transport Officer, will attend the consultation sessions on Dorset Local Plans and Local Transport Plans, and will report back.

Stephen is also contacting Dorset Council to try to have real-time bus arrival information screens installed in Studland.

*Steve Smith, Playing Field and Studland Care Officer, says that our Lengthsman, James, remains busy, keeping the village mowed, trimmed, and kept tidy and in order. Steve is also looking into whether solar panels can be installed on the streetlights to save electricity.

*Tim Yeandle, Rights of Way Officer, explained that the start date for the new Currendon footpath has been delayed; he is finding out when these works will start. Tim is also proposing that a sign be placed at the junction of Heath Green Road and Swanage Road on Woodside Hill, to encourage walkers, for their safety, to walk down Heath Green Road rather than Swanage Road.

*Studland Resilience Officer, Mark Elliott, is meeting, together with Lyn Hool, with the new Dorset Resilience Coordinator. The danger of fires is a major concern for Studland residents. Mark will share, at our next meeting, plans for how we should react if there is a major fire.

Last summer, the NT commissioned an organization called Dorset Coast Forum, to conduct interviews/workshops/surveys of the views of visitors and residents on the key issues affecting the Studland Peninsula over the next 25 or more years. A report, called Future Studland, has been prepared, and the NT in Purbeck have issued a response to the key findings. SPC will discuss these reports at our September meeting. For SPC, the key areas of concern are likely to be about the increasing numbers of visitors, the reduced availability of car parking in NT car parks, and the greater use of parking on Ferry Road and other roads.

SPC decided to press for better mobile coverage in the centre of Studland: Stephen Yeoman will pursue this with Dorset Council and the mobile phone providers.

SPC agreed to a proposal from Steve Smith to dedicate a bench on the Green (opposite the Village Hall) to Peter Bowyer, in thanks and memory of his contribution to Studland.

The next meeting of SPC will be on September 15th. Issues for the agenda will include:

- *The Future Studland report.
- *Resilience/fire safety in Studland.
- *Mobile connectivity.
- *Dorset Local Plans, and Local Transport Plans.
- *Signage at top of Heath Green Road for walkers.



What's the Big Idea? Introducing the Books of the Bible:

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Romans



'Paul's letter to Rome is the high peak of Scripture...all roads in the Bible led to Romans, and all views afforded by the Bible are seen most clearly from Romans' (J I Packer)

Paul probably wrote his letter to the Christians in Rome around AD 57 at Corinth, on his third missionary journey. The original recipients of the letter were predominantly Gentile, although Jews would have constituted a substantial minority of the congregation.

He set out to explain the relationship between Jew and Gentile in God's plan of salvation, as the Jewish Christians were being rejected by the larger Gentile group in the church. Paul begins by showing that both Jews and Gentiles are sinners in need of salvation. He shows how the life, death and resurrection of Jesus eternally affects both world history and every person.

This salvation, secured by Jesus, must be received by faith, as the example of Abraham shows. As salvation is not just about starting the Christian journey, Paul goes on to show how believers are freed from sin, law, and death. This is made possible both through their union with Christ in His death and resurrection and by the indwelling presence and power of the Holy Spirit.

The theme of the book centres on the Gospel of Christ, which brings us into a right standing with God though faith: 'I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes: first for the Jew, then for the Gentile. For in the gospel a righteousness from God is revealed, a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: "The righteous will live by faith."" (Rom. 1:16,17).




