That's the Gospel Truth!

We will often say, 'That's the Gospel truth', to emphasise that the point we are making is unquestionably true; without even a hint of doubt. It is an old English phrase that was created because there is nothing more truthful than the spoken words of Jesus Christ as recorded in the Gospels. Christians believe that the entire Bible is significant. The authors of the Holy Scriptures were inspired by God to write their words. Of course, some chapters are challenging and context needs to be taken along with careful interpretation; the message is not always clear! However, there is something uniquely special about the Gospels: these chapters of the Bible contain the actual words and teachings of Jesus Christ, the Son of God; these words are unquestionably true and provide us with the wisdom required to live life to the full.

The importance of the Gospels is highlighted in Church on a Sunday as our Gospel reading is read from a large, decorated 'Gospel book'; its size and design being a helpful sign to highlight the importance of the words. The Gospel reading is also delivered from the centre of the church, with the congregation physically turning to face and listen to the words. This is another important action. The words of Jesus are at the heart and centre of Christianity and they spread out across the entire world. On a Sunday, we also let those Gospel words spread out from the very centre of the church. Finally, after I have finished reading from the Gospel, I will kiss the page, and if a bishop is present, they will also use the Gospel book to give the congregation a blessing. Both of these actions help to emphasise the importance and respect that we offer to the words of Christ; words that change lives, the words of God.

Some years ago, the late Pope Francis suggested that all Christians should carry a small Gospel book with them at all times, either in their pocket or in their bag. Pope Francis suggested that when Christians had a spare moment, that instead of reaching for their phone, they should reach for the Gospels. I followed the Pope's advice and I now carry a very small Gospel book with me at all times. I must admit, it is not always easy to resist the temptation to look at the phone and instead to read the Gospels, however, just having it in my pocket provides a constant source of hope and reassurance.

During the World Wars, every soldier was issued with a small Gospel book to keep in their pockets. The Church teaches that the Word of God will always bring us comfort and strength; therefore, it is important that we always keep it near us.


Village Screen

Significant July rainfall but general drought continues

The total rainfall recorded for July was 80.8mms/3.18in which is 147% of average and the highest monthly total for a year. We experienced the rarity of six consecutive wet days from the 19th to the 24th as low pressure predominated. The highest temperature was 30°C on the 18th but fell to 21°C - 23°C towards the end of the month. In contrast, the first half of August has been mainly dry and very warm with only 4.8mms/0.19in recorded which is just 7% of average so far.

Bridge Club

Artificial Intelligence and the Trickiest Game in Town

Between 30 and 40 people regularly shuffle up to the NVH on Friday mornings to play Duplicate Bridge, have a coffee and chat and vie for the honour of winning some chocolate. But why?

If you've ever had someone try explaining the rules of Bridge to you, you know it's a task fraught with peril. Eyes start to glaze over by the time they reach "declarer" and "dummy," and they're lucky if you stick around for the part where partners communicate through an elaborate ballet of bids that may or may not mean what they seem to mean.

Now, imagine teaching AI to play Bridge. It's like asking a robot to master not only the violin, but also the subtle facial expressions that go with performing in a string quartet. But artificial intelligence is everywhere now, from composing music to diagnosing diseases, so surely it can handle a card game played by retirees. Or can it?

Bridge isn't just about the cards in your hand. It's about reading the mind of your partner (without looking too suspicious), memorising which hearts have already graced the table, and, above all, bluffing just enough to make your opponents doubt their every move. It's a game of inference, deduction, and, at times, outright guesswork.

Consider this: your partner opens with 1NT. Is it a rock-solid 15 points, or is your partner feeling frisky after a second mint imperial? Bridge players know the true art is in storytelling, using bids and card play to convey a narrative, sometimes reliable, sometimes intentionally misleading.

AI, for all its miraculous powers, has no mints, no nerves, and certainly no new partner who insists on playing "their system". Al brings to the table a mind that is superhuman in memory and calculation, but about as subtle as a marching band in a library when it comes to reading between the lines.

Al can evaluate billions of card combinations in a flash. It knows the odds that your queen of spades will hold. It never forgets if two clubs have already been played, and it certainly doesn't get distracted by the joke being shared at the next table. But while it can process more information than any

human, does it really "get" Bridge? Bridge is a dance of incomplete information. You know your own cards, you see what's played, and you hope you can deduce the hidden distributions through a combination of Sherlockian deduction and hopeful guessing.

Humans excel at making leaps of logic based on minimal information. Did your left-hand opponent hesitate just a little before tossing a low diamond? Did your partner's eyebrows arch when you doubled their bid? These cues are beyond the Al's reach. Try as it might, a neural network cannot yet detect the subtle psychological tells that make bridge both infuriating and endlessly fascinating. Bridge is as much about psychology as it is about strategy. Good players read the room, sense tension, and, when in dire straits, might even resort to the ancient art of the "accidental" cough.

Humans can take years to reach even moderate competence at bridge—memorising conventions, learning to count cards, and, most importantly, figuring out how not to accidentally insult their partners. (Deliberate insults are far more effective). Meanwhile, AI can be trained on millions of hands in the time it takes you to shuffle for the next deal.


But here's the thing: all that data still doesn't prepare AI for the beautiful unpredictability of human play. There's always that one person who makes a bid so outlandish, so devoid of logic, that even AI short-circuits in confusion. But Bridge isn't just about logic. It's about creativity, intuition, and the joy of shared experience. The best AI in the world can win tournaments, but it can't appreciate the glint in your partner's eye when you pull off an impossible slam. It doesn't wince at a misplayed hand or celebrate the rare, glorious moment when your wild gamble pays off.

In the end, the intelligence required to play Bridge is delightfully, maddeningly human, messy, emotional and unpredictable. Al can mimic the mechanics and even best us at the tables, but it will never quite capture the spirit of the game. So next time you sit down to play, remember: you might be outnumbered by the robots, but you'll always have the upper hand in table talk, partner drama, and the sacred tradition of blaming the bidding for every lost contract.





Wildlife Working Party

The Common looks beautiful at the moment. The contrast between the cut grass, the meadow and the natural areas surrounding the paths look stunning. Thank you everyone for your help – it really has paid off. We are so lucky to have received grants from NWT and English Nature to restore the ponds. The most recent BioBlitz revealed some interesting new species. The wasp spider is a big brightly coloured spider which is spreading north across the UK, so this is a good sighting. I had only seen them in France and Madeira before. Next to Forge Pond a wasp nest had been dug out and this is good evidence of



badger activity. Also seen were a number of Roesel's bush cricket. Our BioBlitz experts are full of information. Please join them: it's great fun – no need to have any expertise and anything you find is pretty much guaranteed to be identified! If you want to

join the BioBlitz team then let me know using the email below and I will pass on your details to Sophia Hale Sutton.

Grass snakes are very frequent on the common. Ray Plummer and his grandson, Reggie, take regular trips to the common to see them and Reggie is keen to report back how many sees on each of his visits. I'm seeing a lot of silver washed fritillary and swallowtail butterflies in my garden just across from the common. Jerry Simpson says we don't yet have records of these species on the common. Over the summer I've made daily trips over to the buddleia, but have yet to see one there. If you do, please send Jerry or me a photo. The restoration of the ponds which cost several thousand pounds, funded by NWT and Natural England, has resulted in a significant increase in biodiversity as well as an improvement in how the common looks at present. Thanks to everyone who helps and supports us.

The big issue we have at the moment is the high density of ducks. There are more ducks on the common now than there ever have been. This has resulted in a very large bloom of duckweed which stops light from reaching other pond plants and animals. The duckweed thrives on a surplus of nutrients from duck excrement. Ducks at high densities, as they are on the common, decimate invertebrate, amphibian and reptile populations. The reason there are so many ducks on the

common is because they are being fed large quantities of food and this is stopping them from going to other areas to feed on more natural food. Over the years it has been quite common for mallard ducks and even Egyptian geese to breed on the common, but they soon take their chicks down to the broad where there is a plentiful supply of natural food if they are not encouraged to stay by over feeding. There has been some concern that the young won't survive unless they are being fed by humans. Ducks do not need human support to survive. They are very well adapted and are able to feed without our help! In fact, they will be much healthier and be more likely to survive disease. cold weather, etc if they feed on natural foods like insects and pond vegetation. So please don't regularly feed the ducks as this harms just about all the species mentioned above, as well as the ducks, and it undermines all the hard work that everyone in the village, the Parish Council, Natural England and NWT has put in. If you've seen anything of interest on the common then let Jerry Simpson or me know. If you want to help as part of the working party then please contact me.

Wildlife Notes

September is a month of huge change in the bird world with many of our summer visitors moving on and the first of the winter visitors arriving at the end of the month.



Many of you will have read in the local press that the Ospreys at Ranworth Broad successfully raised at least two chicks this summer in a new nest which the pair constructed. Hopes had been raised when the female turned up to join the male much earlier this year (she didn't arrive until May last year) and nest building started almost straight away. Both the adult birds are not ringed but it is assumed that they are the same birds as last year.




Finally, we have breeding Ospreys back in the broads after a gap of about 250 years. September is a good month to see Ospreys in Norfolk as it is estimated that between 20 and 40 birds pass through on migration every year as they move south. The young birds will often hang around for a few days especially at some of the quieter, tree lined broads like Cockshoot and Alderfen, although I have seen them at Barton Broad as well. Adult birds from Scandinavia will pass down the east coast if the wind conditions are right but are less likely to hang around for long as adult birds need to arrive at their wintering destinations before they moult, whereas the young birds have a new set of feathers and can take their time. As I write these notes in mid-August we have already said goodbye to our Swifts and the Common Terns have moved away from Barton Broad, where they successfully fledged some young, to feed up at the coast.

The Blackcaps have been busy stripping the elderberries off our elder bush for the last three weeks and are feeding up before they migrate during September along with most of our other warbler species. I have had some reports from Barton Turf residents of sightings of Silver-washed Fritillaries in their gardens and am aware that they have now been recorded feeding on the buddleia bush on Barton Common, adding another species to the common's list. Many people have reported seeing Swallowtail butterflies in their gardens and it seems that they have had a good summer this year. Although I only found 2 swallowtail caterpillars at the boardwalk this summer the Milk Parslev seems to have remained healthy and not been attacked by the fungal wilt disease which affected lots of the plants at Wheatfen last year and has previously affected the plants at Barton.

Listen out for the first returning Pink-footed Geese at the end of the month.


